

Quakers Win District Championship

Salem Five Meets Potent Akron North Team Tonight In Regionals, Rated Even

Winner To Play Victor of Warren-Lakewood Game Saturday Night; Champion Advances To State

In a meeting held Sunday afternoon at Youngstown, Coach Bob Miller, drawing for Salem, first pulled out a ticket to stay at Youngstown, and then drew Akron North in the pairings. One of three teams, North, St. Vincents or Salem, had to go to New Concord to play. St. Vincents was the unlucky outfit and automatically departed from the Youngstown regionals. Lakewood, winners of 12 and losers of 10 in the Euclid Shore district tournament, drew Warren in tonight's 8 o'clock game, and Salem squares off against the North Vikings.

In Akron North the Quakers will meet a squad which can match them in height. The Vikings have even men above the six-foot mark. However, it is reported that none is as tall as Bob Pager. During the regular season the Northerners won 2 and lost six. They have been led by an Akron all-city forward, Jim Smithy, who has tallied around 270 points this season.

Mainly because of their height and reserve power, Coach Bob White's charges have been able to knock off three rugged teams in journey competition at Kent. They defeated West, 50-42; Buchtel, city champs, 50-38; and Ravenna, 41-34.

This will be the second try in three years in the regional tournament for the North squad. Two years ago the Vikings advanced to the state tournament.

E. S. Kerr Attends School Conference

Superintendent E. S. Kerr attended the regional conference of the American Association of School Administrators held at Manhattan Center and the Pennsylvania Hotel in New York City, March 4-7.

The general theme of the conference was "The Aftermath of War." Speakers at the general sessions included Paul R. Mort of Columbia University, President James B. Conant of Harvard University, President Thomas C. Boushall of the Bank of Virginia, and Verra Fiches Dean, Director of the Foreign Policy Association.

Discussion groups (workshops) were organized in the High School Curriculum, Veterans Education, Post War School Buildings and Adult Education.

Dr. Charles H. Lake, Superintendent of Schools, Cleveland, Ohio, is President of the Association. Other regional conferences of the association are being held at Atlanta, Chicago, Denver and Seattle.

Assists President; 500 Coaches Cast Ballots

At a recent election held by the Ohio Association of Track Coaches, Mr. Frederick E. Cope, faculty manager and track coach of Salem High, was elected to one of three vice presidency posts. Mr. Cope previously served on the relay advisory board whose function was to distribute relay and invitational meets throughout the state.

Mr. Cope's new duties will be to assist the new president, George E. Gauthier, director of athletics at Ohio Wesleyan University, in the administration and organization of track coaches throughout the State. The entire membership of track coaches is trying to bring the Olympics to the U. S. A. in 1948 or 1952.

Lowell Allen, former Salem athlete and now Boardman High track coach, was the only other representative from this district to get an office. He was named to the relays advisory board.

All newly elected officers will be duly installed at a pre-season clinic on Saturday, April 6, at Ohio State University.

About 500 coaches cast ballots in the election conducted by Ed Barker, secretary-treasurer of the Ohio Association of Track Coaches.

Qualify For Region Berth At Youngstown, Beating Yo. South In Finals 42-31

Martinelli, Pager Lead Local Scoring Pace With 33 Points; Entire Team Plays Excellent Ball

If ever a team was out to win, and had no intentions of anything else, the fighting Quakers of Coach Bob Miller was that team. Playing a steady and unbeatable brand of basketball, Salem jumped off to an early lead, which increased as the game wore on.

The thrilling victory put Salem into a class with fifteen other teams in Ohio—a feat equalled by only two other cage teams in Salem's history. There wasn't a man on the team who could be singled out as the individual star. Pager led the scoring and grabbed a major part of the rebounds; Hollinger scored his usual seen points besides his usual stellar job defensively; Tony Martinelli was in his best form, doing some of the neatest dribbling seen in the tournament; Lowell Myers and John Pridon were scoring besides their excellent defensive tactics.

The boasted South defense it seemed, never took effect. From the first minute of play, when Tony Martinelli put the Quakers in the lead until the very end, Salem shot at will and with a good percentage, too. Pridon, Hollinger and Pager continued the first period scoring as Salem stepped out to an 11-8 lead by the period's end.

The second quarter proved to be Salem's best. The locals outscored South 13-8. Pridon racked up four and Martinelli three to comprise the main part. Slick Kay, South's all city man for the past two years, committed his fourth personal foul midway through the period and joined Al Beach for a talk at the bench. By halftime Salem held a 24-16 lead.

With the original starting lineups in at the beginning of the second half, things again went Salem's way. After one minute of play Kay finished his high school basketball career with his fifth foul. The Quakers held South to three points while scoring seven themselves. Hollinger, Laughlin and

Martinelli each scored two and Myers, one.

With six minutes remaining and Salem ahead 34-19, South began a spurt which brought them to within five points of Salem. Stevens and Goodall each scored three quick buckets to throw a scare into Salem, but Pager whipped in a "quickie" to ease the tension. In the remaining three minutes South failed to score and Salem upped the score to 42-31.

The game was a complete reversal of form for Salem. The Quakers hit 16 of 47 shots from the floor, or a 34 per cent average. South could only make 14 of 61 for a 23 per cent mark.

The win extended Salem's streak to ten in a row—pretty good for a team without one letterman!



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Salem Frosh Finish 4th In Tournament

Four games in three straight days proved to be too much for the Salem Frosh as they bowed out of the semi-finals in the Massillon tournament at the hands of Lorin Andrews of Massillon, 39-36.

After pulling their first game out of the bag by beating Alliance State Street in the last thirty seconds, 25-22, Tarr's boys had little trouble in coming out on top in their next two games. Canton Central Catholic fell by the score of 31-18, and Longfellow, a Massillon team, became Salem's third victim, 39-19.

Then came the disastrous Saturday when the local quintet came out on the short end of a 39-36 score. The Young Quakers took a 13-12 quarter lead, but fell behind 24-23 at half time. From this point on Salem trailed until the tilt ended. Three of Salem's starting five, Faulkner, Tolson and Miner, were ejected from the game in the last half because of five personal fouls. "Biggie" Faulkner led the scoring with twelve markers. In the other semi-final game Edmund A. Jones, another Massillon team, beat Canton McKinley and qualified to meet Lorin Andrews in the finals.

Lifeless and tired, the Salem cage crew suffered their second setback of the day in the consolation game to the Canton McKinley Frosh, 30-28. Nip and tuck throughout the encounter, although not very will played because both teams were overfatigued, the Bulldogs clinched the game in the last 55 seconds by caging two foul tries.

Throughout the tourney "Biggie" Faulkner and Eddie Bozich proved to be the main cogs in Salem's scoring punch, while Tom Miner, Dick Tolson, and Walter Ehrhart turned in magnificent defensive games. The lack of experienced substitutes also hindered Coach Tarr's machine.

Edmund A. Jones finally proved to be the winners of the tournament with Lorin Andrews finishing second, Canton McKinley third, and Salem fourth.


Tournament Resume In a Nutshell

This year's Quaker squad is the first to advance as far as the regionals since 1937, when that outfit duplicated the feats of the 1926 team. Salem is now one of SIXTEEN teams remaining in the championship race.... and can outreach any of the other fifteen. This rank may not have been reached if South had not been so generous as to defeat Canton Lehman, rated second in the state, on an off night for the Polar Bears. Warren is the only seeded team which reached the District finals. Lincoln was completely off when they played the Harding High boys. Having had three hot nights in which they defeated Minerva and two favored outfits, Ursuline and McKinley, Lincoln just couldn't click again. Niles, which was beaten by the Quakers, is a one-point team. They won their first two games by one point and lost the third.... by one point. Warren, like Salem, had to come from behind to win their first three games but also like Salem, they were never behind to win their first three games; or even tied in the final game for District championship.

Warren and Salem were awarded gold cups for winning the District meet; South and Lincoln, silver cups for runners-up.

Upsets were the general trend of the tournament this year. Sebring was the only victim in the first round, falling to East Palestine. Niles jumped to a 5-0 lead early in the quarter. Fouls by Pager and Myers made it 5-2. Pager whipped in a push up, but Tom Andres sank two fouls to make it 7-4. Tony Martinelli swished a long set shot just before the buzzer ended the first period.

Salem stepped into its first lead in the opening seconds of the second frame on two foul shots by Captain Mo Hollinger. Gioiella tied it up; Pager put Salem ahead again by one point on a foul, only to have Mahoney give the Dragons the lead again on a rebound shot. By virtue of Page's foul shot and Martinelli's second bucket, Salem took a 12-10 lead. Scores by Martinelli, Hollinger, Depasquale, and Andres ran the total to 16-14 in favor of Salem. As the buzzer sounded, Mark Jennings of Niles was fouled by Martinelli. Both the shot and his foul shot were good and Niles took the half-time lead, 17-16.

In the third fracas, Niles again came out on top, outscoring the locals 7-6. Salem's scores came on two foul conversions, each by Pager and Pridon, and Mo Hollinger's second field goal.

By the middle of the fourth quarter, Niles held an apparently commanding 26-22 lead. With the ejection of Martinelli and Pridon on fouls, Roth and Laughlin entered the game. Pager immediately sank a foul shot and a minute later pivoted and put in a field goal after a beautiful pass from Roth, running

the score to 25-26. As the crowd went wild, Roth stole the ball from Gioiella and was tripped as he started down the floor. He calmly sank the foul to tie the score at 26-26. With two minutes and thirty seconds remaining, Hollinger was fouled as he took a pass from Roth. The ball finally went through the hoop after bounding around ninety-nine times, giving Salem a 27-26 lead. With but thirty seconds left in the waning ball game, Mark Jennings missed two foul shots which could have won the game.
