Canton McKinley Bulldogs were too much for the Alliance Aviators, who were defeated, 25-0.

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Salem Gridders Romp Over Blue Devils, 31 To 7

Quakers Down Lisbon's **Grid Squad For Fourth** Win Of This Season

Unleashing their strongest fensive attack of the year, the Salem High Quakers downed Lisbon's Blue Devils, 31-7, at Reilly stadium last Friday night. The Quakers gained their fourth victory of the season by defeating a comparatively weak, but gallant Lisbon High

The Salem eleven gained consistently on both aerial annd running attacks. It was Marvin "Buster" Wukotich who led the Quakers to their third consecutive win. Wukotich scored three touchdowns during the course of the game. Carmen Nocera and George Baillie also tallied for Salem.

Salem received the opening kickoff and marched within scoring distance. The Schroedermen scored on a pass from Marvin Wukotich to Baillie to put them ahead 6-0. The try for the extra point failed on an attempted end sweep.

Lisbon's drive into Salem territory was halted by a pass interception and the Quakers tallied when 'Buster" Wukotich plunged over, climaxing a return journey from the Lisbon 28 yard stripe. A pass from Marvin Wukotich to Baillie netted the extra point and brought the score to 13-0.

Salem opened the half with a kick to the Blue Devil's 20 yard line, which was returned approximately 15 yards. Salem then scored its third touchdown when a Lisbon kick was partially blocked on the 40, from where the Quakers drove to pay dirt and another score for Wukotich. Salem scored again in the third and in the fourth periods on runs by Marvin Wukotich and
