Coy, the only junior elected, was in the Archery club and Glee club last year. During that time and while a freshman, he also went out for track. He has been in the band since entering high school.

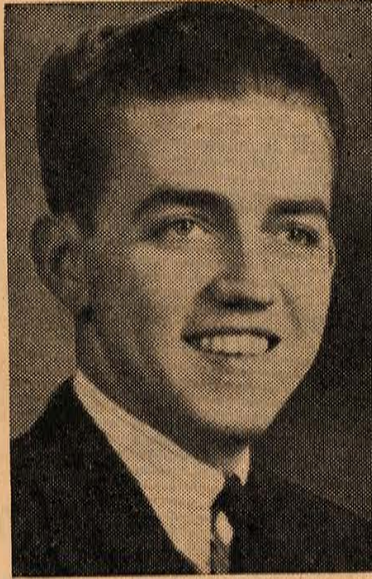

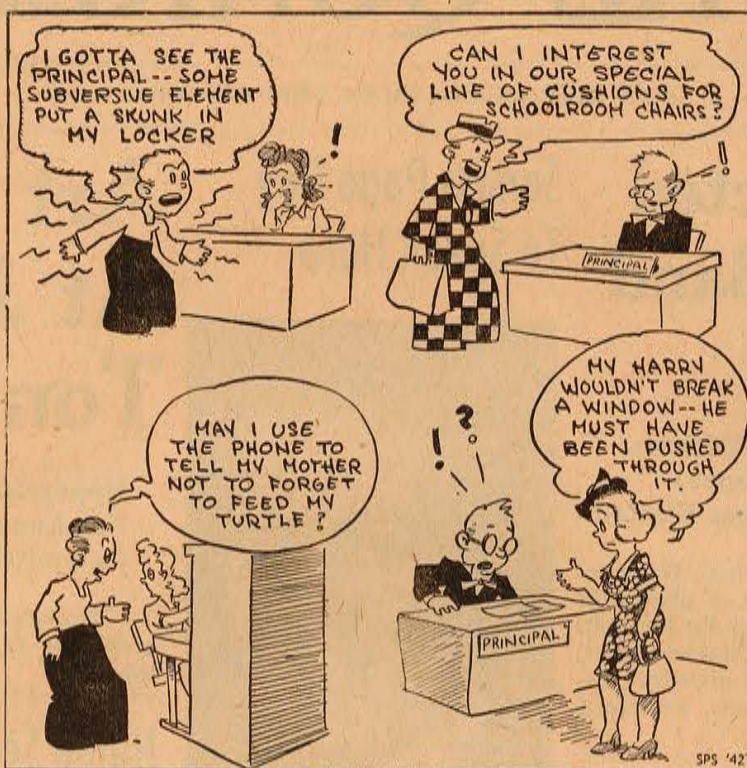

Scullion, Shasteen Also Place On Sport Writers' "Dream Team"

Salem High's passing combine, Johnny Volio and Frank "Pinky" King were awarded berths on the first all-county team which was picked by a group of county sports writers. Both boys proved themselves to be stalwarts on defense and were unanimous choices for their respective quarterback and end posts.

King was named second string center last season on the county "dream team." Having been converted into a "flankster" this season by Coach Ray Overturf, he proved himself to be a deadly tackler and a dangerous pass receiver.

Johnny Volio, undoubtedly the sparkplug of the team in the absence of Scullion, merited his quarterback spot because of his excellent passing, running, blocking, and tackling abilities.

Dick Jackson of Welsville teamed up with the Salem end to perform at the wings. At the tackles the county scribes named Ernie Altomare of Leetonia and Ray Yani of Welsville. Francis Smouse and "Boo" Carter of East Liverpool and Welsville fill in the guard positions, and Dick Johnson of Leetonia was picked to be

Quaker Roundball Team Opens Season Tonight With Game Against Ravenna Ravens at Ravenna; 5 Lettermen Return to Coach Brown's Squad

Coach Herbert Brown's Salem High five will open up the current basketball season when they invade Ravenna High school's gym tonight. Presenting a team of unknown calibre, the Quakers will boast four lettermen on the squad. Opposing the Ravens tonight will be monogram wearers Sal Guappone, Ray McGaffie, Bob Scullion and John Volio. The fifth letterman Phil Cozad, who was a holdover from last year's starting quintet, will view the contest from the sidelines because of a broken leg.

"Ohio Travelogue" Shown at Jr. High

On Wednesday of last week the seventh grade geography classes saw three reels of film on Ohio called "Ohio Travelogue." The first film showed the various monuments in the different sections of Ohio explaining that the McKinley monument in Canton is placed among the ten best of its type in the world. Within three years he was back at work, and it was he who conceived the light-house as the symbol for tuberculosis work. It is a symbol which guides people toward health and safety.
