Now that national defense is uppermost in everyone's mind, the Christmas seal sale takes on an even greater meaning than before. It is extremely important to keep tuberculosis from getting a hold in the army and navy. Simply rejecting the man who has it does not solve the problem for he still needs expert care to rid him of the disease. To keep the germ from spreading and on the road to decline is an expensive proposition; hence, every year from this time until Christmas day, a nation-wide campaign is carried on to get sufficient funds to stamp out this menace to humanity.
