Miss Alice Gladden, head librarian of Salem Carnegie Public Library, stated yesterday that there is not much increase in reading among young people since the start of the present war.

'Young girls," said Miss Gladden, "prefer reading lighter love stories and recent novels which do not concern the war. The boys prefer books on vocational war work and the armed services. I believe that the decline in reading among boys is that there is more war work after school and most of the boys are employed and do not have much time to read."

The librarian continued that because of the recent filming of biographical movies there has been a considerable increase in the reading of biographies.

Answering the question of how up to date and well beanie to match. equipped the library is, Miss Gladden remarked, "The Carnegie Public Library is ranked as one of the best of its size in the state. I order all the books for the library and always welcome recommendations. The library has a well equipped reference room and files about recent subjects that have not yet been written about in book form."

When asked how she liked her work Miss Gladden answered, "There is nothing I like better."

In conclusion Miss Gladden stated, "The library is free and democratic. No one has to pay to borrow books or to use the other library facilities. This opportunity is given to all people, old and young. Young people should explore and broaden their minds by reading more literature with good English." -0-




