In conclusion Miss Gladden stated, "The library is free and democratic. No one has to pay to borrow books or to use the other library facilities. 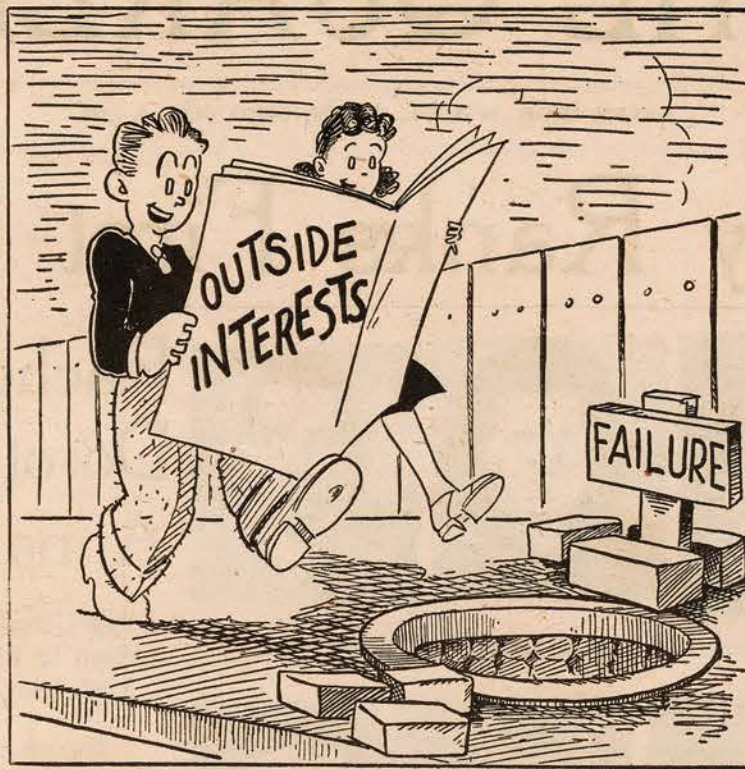

# Quakers Take First In Uhrichsville Meet

## Place In All 16 Events; Dunlap, Entrikin Star For Red And Black

**Dunlap Scores 15½ Points for High Point Honors; Entriken Close Behind With .5; 12 Teams Entered**

Placing in all 16 events, the Salem High track team scored 64 5-6 points to win the seventh annual Uhrichsville Relay last Saturday afternoon in which 12 teams took part.

Charlie Dunlap for the third successive time this year copped high scoring honors for the Quakers by taking first in the 100-yard dash, tying for first in the high jump, and taking thirds in the broad jump and 220-yard dash. Dunlap was also high point man of the meet with 15½ points.

Flick Entriken won first place in the pole vault and 220-yard low hurdles, and took second in the high hurdles. Flick won second scoring honors with 15 points.

Fred Marshall of Boardman copped first place in the shot put and discus. Marshall made a new meet record by throwing the discus 141 feet 11 inches. He put the shot 42 feet 7 inches to edge out Charlie Myers by one inch.

The Salem half-mile relay team took first place by making their best time of the year.

Coach Fred Cope's Quaker tracksters romped over Boardman High's squad 73½ to 44½ in a dual meet April 26. The Quakers won all but four events and tied another.

Charlie Dunlap won four events for a total of 20 points. These four events were the 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, high jump and broad jump.

Coach Rib Allen's Fred Marshall won both the discus and shot put events for Boardman.

Flick Entriken won the pole vault and 220-yard low hurdles and placed second in the high hurdles. Tony Hoover and John Jardine tied for first in the mile run, which is very unusual.

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## French Student Receives Letter From Frenchman

The addresses of a few French soldiers were left with the French club, hoping that some of the French students would write to them. Some of them did so, and one of the most interesting letters was received by a sophomore, France Sechler. The letter is as follows:

My dear friend France:

I have just received your charming letter, and I am hurrying to answer it. I am very glad to be able to correspond with you, and to know that your mother is French, and that you was born in my country.

I was born the 31st of December, 1920, at Mulhouse, Alsace, where I was living with my mother and my brother. My father died the end of October, 1938.

I am without news from my mother and my brother since the month of May, 1940. So it is impossible for me to tell you if they are still in France, because the provinces of Alsace and Lorraine are again once more annexed to Germany. But I hope for not very long.

I left my mother in October, 1939, to enter in the army of the air in a French school of pilotage. Where I had my training to become a pilot.

After the Armistice the school closed and several of my friends were sent back to their families. I was sent to the Alps to a Youth Organization for Aviation to train the young recruits who are resisting now in Savoy.

I was demobilized the first of November, 1942, to go to North Africa, where I found a job at the Post du Maroc at Casablanca. I had to leave France very fast being condemned to death by the Germans.

Then I came here to the United States to be transformed on modern American airplanes.

I will send you a picture of myself as soon as I have some ready. I hope that you will send me one of yours.

Now I will close my letter, after having resumed the story of my life since the starting of the war.

However, from these two teams and odd rules, we have our present game of baseball—a game which grew up with America.
