



Mrs. Cox, Appointed To Post Of Collaborator For "Biological Abstracts"

Scientific Agency Honors Local Teacher; Letter to Mr. Kerr Confirms Announcement

Mrs. Ella Thea Cox, Salem High biology instructor, has been selected as collaborator for "Biological Abstracts," an agency through which the scientists of this country and the rest of the world can cooperatively keep track of the vast growing research literature of the biological sciences, according to the following letter received by Mr. Kerr, local superintendent.

The letter is as follows:

Dear Mr. Kerr:

It gives me genuine satisfaction to announce the selection of Mrs. Ella Thea Smith Cox, Biology teacher in the Salem High school, as collaborator for BIOLOGICAL ABSTRACTS.

Mrs. Cox has been abstracting the papers relating to biological education in the AMERICAN BIOLOGY TEACHER. She is doing a marvelous job and one that will, I feel sure, be of real value to biology teachers not only throughout the United States, but throughout the world also.

BIOLOGICAL ABSTRACTS is a non-profit abstracting agency set up in 1926 by a joint committee on the National Academy of Sciences, the National Research Council and the Union of American Biological Societies, as an agency through which the scientists of this nation and those of the world generally could cooperatively keep track of the vast and rapidly growing research literature of the biological sciences. Its collaborators, drawn mainly from university and college to teaching and research staffs, are a distinguished group numbering approximately 3,000, each being available to abstract a fraction of the world's research literature in biology.

No compensation is offered but the collaborators have the distinction of participating, as good citizens of the scientific community, in a non-profit enterprise which is essential for the common good.

Story of "Ike's" Life In Library

One of the new books featured in the Library this year is: "Born to Command," an absorbing and human biography of General Dwight Eisenhower.

The book touches quickly and effectively, the General's early life, school days in Abilene, Kansas, years at West Point, his marriage, and early military service in the Canal Zone and Philippines under the command of MacArthur.

This background adds to the great story which begins with Eisenhower's departure for London as commander-in-chief in the European area.

Here is a closely-packed, colorful, quick moving account of the big job of setting up the machinery for the United Nations, of the launching of the North African campaign, the crucial political and diplomatic situations that had to be dealt with, the great invasion of France, the fighting in the hedgerows, and the fall of Paris. This shows how with the cooperation of land, sea, and air forces, all this was made possible.

These all add up to an inspiring and vivid story of today and tomorrow--and of the leader, split-second thinker, the man who can make cooperation practical.

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Quakers Flash Power In Swamping Struthers 26-6 On Wet Gridiron

**Bozich, Herrington, Boone Score For Locals;
Dugas Outstanding For Struthers Eleven**

A fighting Salem Quaker football squad spotted Struthers' in the opening minutes of the game Friday night and still roared to a 26-6 win. Paced by Eddie Bosick, Howard Herrington, and Ted Boone, the Quaker aggregation pleased about 2,000 Salem fans who braved a heavy rain.

Struthers started off with a bang, driving hard to Salem 9 where they lost the ball on downs. After a poor boot by Dan Smith slipped off the side of his shoe and went out on the 25, they started all over again and Fullback Fabis went over center for the score on the fifth play after Smith's punt. He was stopped short on a plunge for the extra point.

Salem bounced back after receiving a lucky break, when they gained 19 yards and possession of ball on a punt. From the Struthers 49, Bosich gained most of the yardage to the 4, from where Herrington went over. Bosick's plunge for the extra was good and Salem led 7-6.

After the kickoff, Struthers couldn't gain and punted to the Salem 38. Ted Boone had a 13 yard run and later climaxed this drive, going over from the 4. Smith tried the line for the extra point, but didn't make it. The half ended with Struthers deep in Quaker territory via a 36 yard run by Maki to the 20 yard line; the score standing 13-6.

The Quakers started the third quarter with a 68 yard drive which iced the game. Herrington and Bosick gained most of the distance along with occasional assistance by Bill Ward who contributed a nine yard run. Bosich dived over from the 1-yard line and Herrington scored the extra point on a power drive, bringing the total to 20-6.

On the Struther's fourth down after the kickoff, Sullivan was smeared as he attempted to punt from his 21. Herrington picked up 6 yards and Bosick went through for 15 yards and a touchdown. Smith failed to convert and the score stood 26-6.

The Salem subs threatened twice and Struthers once, but never scored. One Salem touchdown was actually made but was nullified by a holding penalty.

The Quakers were generally impressive. The line play glittered from end to end with Louie Juliano, Fred Koenreich, and Lee Sproat smearing Big Red ball carriers and opening large holes on the offense.

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Glen Thorne Fifth In District Meet

The Salem Quakers took fifth place in the District Cross-Country Meet held at Akron last Saturday. In a field of twelve schools, representing 77 athletes into competition, Akron North placed all five members in the first twenty to win.

Glenn Thorne of Salem took fifth place, entitling him to go to the state meet at Mansfield this week. Dewey of North took the meet with a time of 10 minutes and 11 seconds, and Thorne's time was 10:20, still five seconds better than the state title time last year.

Thorne was the only Salem man who qualified for the meet tomorrow. The first ten from the District meet earned the distinction of getting gold medals and a chance to run in the State meet; the second ten were given silver medals.
