A review of the Senior play was given in an assembly yesterday.

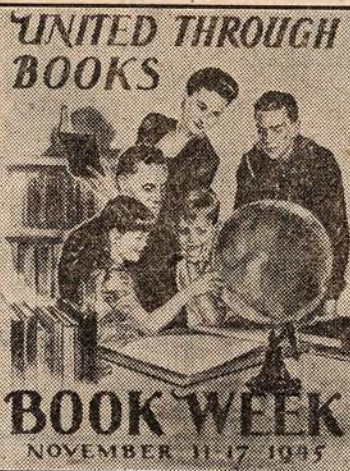
Next Monday another assembly will be held for football recognition.

Book Week Now International



CHILDREN'S Book Week, to be held this year from November 11 to November 17, is fast becoming an international celebration, according to Frederick Melcher, editor of Publishers' Weekly and chairman of the Children's Book Council. Last year many countries, including Australia, New Zealand, Brazil, Russia, and England held Book Week celebrations despite wartime handicaps. This year these countries and many more will have extensive Book Week displays and projects.

American children's books play an important part in foreign exhibits. During the war, thousands of our books were sent as gifts through the Women's Council for Post-War Europe Treasure Chest plan. In response to the success of this venture and to the hunger for books in all the liberated countries, thousands of Treasure Chests are being planned as part of this year's Book Week celebrations. They will be sent to China, Belgium, Greece, and other countries where the need for children's books far outweighs the scanty supply.

Also, in this country there are hundreds of thousands of children who have never seen anything but their school books. In view of the constantly increasing attractiveness and importance of American children's books, the Council is applying its slogan "more books in the hands of more children" both at home and abroad this year. Book Week celebrations, with displays of books, speeches, school and library programs and parties, are being planned for communities.

Book Week At S. H. S.

The Salem High school library will celebrate Book Week this year by displaying favorite books as well as new ones; by sponsoring a bookmark contest; and by conducting a Treasure Chest. Pupils who wish to display their favorite books should report to Miss Lehman. Rules for entering the bookmark contest will be given in all English classes and new books will be presented for prizes. Plans for the Treasure Chest will be announced through the home rooms and the books contributed will be sent to children abroad.

As Book Week is a part of our customary activities at Salem High school and in thousands of other schools throughout the land, let's welcome it with enthusiasm and with an awareness of the important part books play in all our lives.

Symphony To Come To Salem for First Time In Years

For the first time in many years, a symphony orchestra is coming to Salem to present a concert. Bohumir Kryl, of Chicago, with his orchestra of 35 women, are on tour from coast to coast and will be in the Salem High school auditorium Tuesday evening, Nov. 20. Of special interest to people in this vicinity are the three Lisbon girls who appear with the orchestra.

The program will include three soloists, a violinist, a harpist, and a colorature soprano.

This concert will be sponsored by the two Junior Music Clubs in Salem. Tickets may be purchased from any member.

Considering that Salem High is a coed school with an enrollment in the 500-900 student enrollment class, the rating is exceptionally high. Only 47 other yearbooks of all the schools in the country belonging to the National Scholastic Press Association and in the 500-900 student enrollment bracket attained this honor while only 13 yearbooks received the top rating of all-American honors.

The judging was done on a point basis with so many points being awarded for each section of the yearbook. The Quaker, edited by Jim Kelley and Pat Keener with Chris Paporadis as business manager, totaled 1280 points, 120 points short of an all-American Honor rating.

You don't have to buy a bond; but, just think, if every student would buy one stamp every day, how many stamps would be sold.

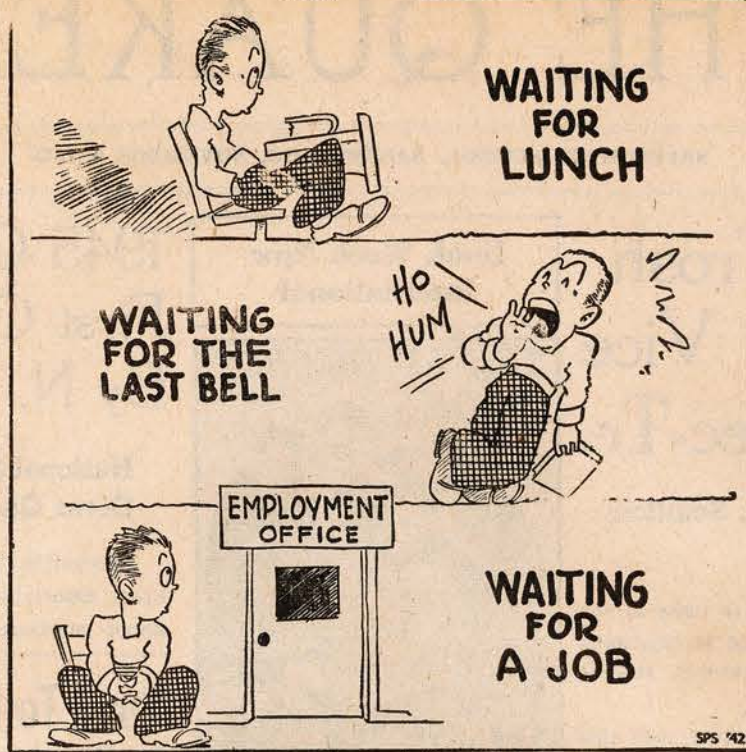
Tighten Up On Gossip

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Salem Trounced By Huge E. Liverpool Team; Pack, Spencer Spearhead Attack

Louie Juliano Leads Salem Defense; Howard Herrington, Bob Boone Salem Offensive Stars

The Quakers of Salem High battled valiantly but were overcome by the superior weight and reserve strength of the Potters. Lacking nothing a college team could ask for, including a pair of 220-pound tackles, East Liverpool wore Salem out with great weight advantage and the hardest running set of backs yet witnessed by the Salem fans this season.

The Potters were held to a 32-0 score by some fine defensive work by Louie Juliano, who looked as good a man as could be found on either team. He wasn't fooled by the East Liverpool shifts and refused to be taken out by any Potters, no matter what the size. Dan Smith, in addition to his "now or never" tackles, accounted for some fine punts, removing Salem from dangerous territory.

Salem missed a scoring chance in the first period after Don Chappell recovered a fumble on the Potters' 20. East Liverpool took over late in the quarter and had a first and ten to go from the Salem 22 when it ended. Spencer went to the four and Pack went over. He also plunged for the point to make it 7-0. After a punt return deep into Quaker territory by Bob Ward, Pack scored again to climax a short march. Beefy Rudy Trbovich missed a try for the conversion.

In the third period, after a fumble by Herrington was recovered by Means on the Salem 22, East Liverpool drove to the three on straight power plays. With a fourth down and still three to go, Spencer went around end for the score. Pack plunged again, and it was 20-0.

In the fourth quarter the Quakers resorted to passes, for which they were rewarded by an interception. A substitute fullback, Don Wolf, sparked a drive from the 22 to the one, and then went over. Trbovich missed again, and it was 26-0.

Minutes later Salem stopped a drive on the 13 and rolled for several plays. Bob Boone went 18 yards and Herrington picked up another first down. Ogden sent in his first team again and stopped things cold. Bob Ward climaxed another drive by going 19 yards around end for the final score. Trbovich missed his third attempt, and the game ended 32-0.

Quakers Face Lisbon In Final

Tonight the Quakers will venture out on the field as heavy favorites over the Lisbon Blue Devils but may get much more than they are looking for. Although Coach Lyle Warren's charges have lost six of eight games, they are improving every time out.

They possess a mighty passing attack with fullback Webber pitching them to Freshman left end Woods or right end Ruteki.

Lisbon beat Chester (W. Va.) 19-0, and East Palestine 7-6. The Boardman 13-7 and by Louisville Blue Devils were edged out by 14-12.

Columbiana, Minerva, Sebring and Leetonia beat them decisively by the score of 216, 23-7, 31-0 and 33-7 respectively.
