American Legion Essay Subject, Rules Announced

The rules and regulations for the annual American Legion essay contest have been released recently by an announcement from the office.

The subject of this year's American Legion essay contest is, "Can World Peace Be Secure Through The Allied Nations?"

The essays shall contain not fewer than 400 nor more than 600 words, and will be graded as follows: Ninety per cent maximum for content, and 10 per cent maximum for form and style. For content, attention should be given to originality, value of thought, sequence of thought, adherence to title, and choice of subject matter; for form and style, choice of language, clarity of expression, sentence structure, paragraphing and mechanics.

All essays should be legibly written or typewritten on one side of 8½ by 11 paper and bound with pins or fasteners in covers of plain white paper.

The name, grade, home address of contestant, school name, school address and county must be written or printed on the lower right hand corner of the cover sheet only, so that when the essays are submitted the post may cut off the lower section of the cover sheet and substitute serial numbers.

The essay contest closes February 15, 1946.

All pupils of the 9th, 11th, 11th and 12th grades of all schools are eligible to enter an essay in the contest.

"Best From Yank" Now In Library

"The Best From The Yank," one of the new non-fiction books recently received by the library, contains an interesting and unusual article written by Robert K. Schwartz, Y 2/c, an alumnus of 1938. The many articles and poems which appear in this book were taken from the "Yank", an Army Weekly, published by the men in service and issued only to G. I.'s. In the pages of this newspaper the men in uniform founded a new tradition in journalism.

This outstanding and dramatic book tells you how to get lost in a jungle, what the G. I.'s think of the British, it gives you a blow-by-blow description of a U. S. Navy battleship crew slugging it out with the Japs somewhere in the South Pacific, and it takes you along when a G. I. invades the Fashion Front. It takes you with Rosie's Riveters over Germany, with Montgomery's Eighth Army when it chased Rommel out of Africa, and with MacArthur on his march to the Philippines.

"The Best from the Yank" describes the soldier, his daily life at home and abroad, how he takes 2 cracks at his officers, stands up for his buddies, and lets off steam as he never lets it off in his letters home.

This book is indeed a hokum-free picture of what our men and women were doing and saying in the war. Everyone in the armed forces, everyone who has had a G. I. in the service, will treasure it as a permanent record of those in the service.

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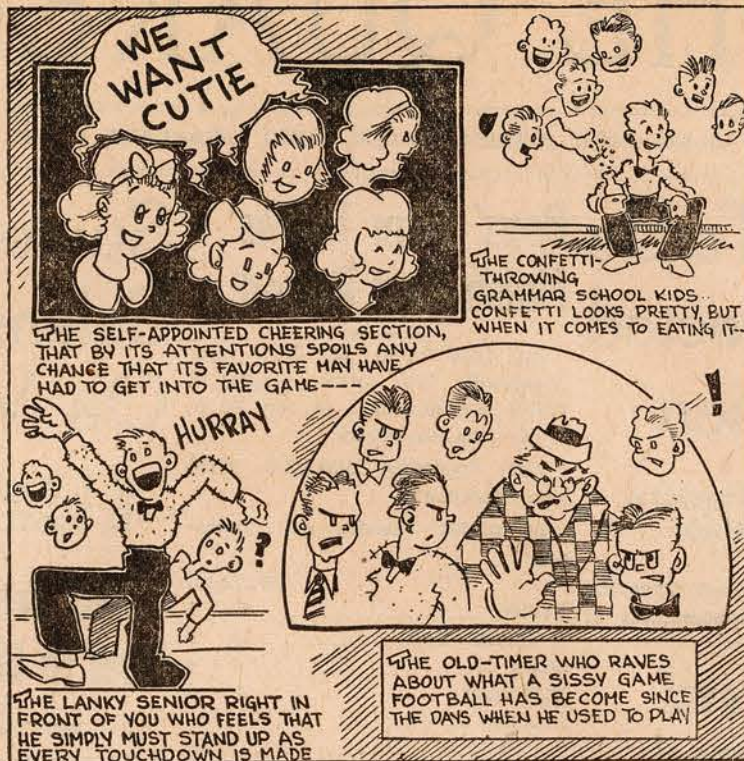
Wait For Steps; Don't "Cut"

Hoe Hollinger, Bob Pager Pace Salemites With 33; Manual Parada, George Stephenson Visitors' Aces

Coach Bob Miller's Quaker boys reached the zenith of their first eleven games last Friday by thumping a highly-touted Youngstown Rayen outfit, 47-33. Salem wasted no time in getting started off to their fourth victory.

Believing in the adage that the team which controls the ball throughout the game will win, Salem was led by Captain Moe Hollinger and Bob Pager, who did an excellent job of taking the rebounds off both boards. Rayen was bottled up the whole game, except briefly in the third quarter, by stiff Salem defensive tactics. The Quakers played such an aggressive defensive game that nearly everyone had four personal fouls on him at the game's end.

The locals gave fair warning in the opening minutes of play that they were out to win. Tony Martinelli swished a long one; Pager and Hollinger each put one in before Parada dumped in a foul shot. Rayen was completely overwhelmed by the Quaker gymnastics offensively and defensively but managed to score an occasional basket. Hollinger and Pager ran wild and Salem had a commanding 16-7 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Salem started out the second period a wee bit shaky, but found the range and lost no more time. Ben Bruderly came in for "Butch" Roth and started the ball rolling with a long one.
