## Poslik Advises Boys to Finish High School

Major Joseph Poslik, who is the representative of the Army Recruiting office in Youngstown, has stated that he thinks it is better for boys to complete their high school work rather than to quit school to join the Army. He points out, however, some of the advantages of joining the Army after graduation. An extensive educational program is now being conducted by the United States Army. Under the Army program, men who enlist are given the opportunity of studying one or more of the 200 skills and trades in Army training schools in this country and in overseas theaters throughout the world.

The Army is now giving thousands of young men educational opportunities they would not have been able to afford otherwise. After three years in the Army a man may take advantage of the splendid educational opportunities offered. He may have as much as 48 months of higher education, with tuition paid and a monthly living allowance of \$65 if he is single, or \$90 if he is married. The government will pay up to \$500 tuition for each regular school year.

This will undoubtedly mean higher enrollments in college, trade, and business schools throughout the nation.

# Pager Tallies 21 Points As Quakers Lace Sebring 41-29 In Season's Final

### Locals End Regular Competition With Ten Wins In Eighteen Starts; Brunie Paces Trojan Attack

In the final game of their regularly scheduled season, Coach Bob Miller's Quakers defeated Sebring, 41-29. Big Bob Pager once again led the scoring, this time with 21 points. The victory capped Salem's 18-game season with its sixth straight victory for a record of 10 wins and eight reverses.

The Quakers started out like a house on fire to rack up an 18-4 lead at the first quarter's end. With the insertion of Lowell Myers and Ben Bruderly, the pace slackened and allowed Sebring to equal Salem's second quarter total, as each team bagged nine points. Salem held a 27-13 halftime advantage, 15 of which Pager had scored.

The Quakers looked poor in the third quarter, as they scored only six points, while allowing the Trojans to rack up nine, reducing the lead to 33-22. A tight man to man defense by Sebring coupled with a sudden lapse in ability to put the ball through the hoops put a wrinkle on the brow of most Salem fans.

Sebring slowed down in the final period with the loss of Windy Moore and Red Watson via the foul route. Dick Brunie swished two more to bring his evening's total to fourteen. Lowell Myers, Tony Martinelli and Bob Pager totaled the last period scoring as they hit the hoops for eight. The game ended a little roughly with Salem in possession of the ball.

Tony Martinelli did a slick job of passing, which only went haywire occasionl. Captain "Mo" Hollinger didn't do much scoring, but was valuable for his rebounding. Lowell Myers failed to look as good as he has in the past two games, but still had that scoring "knowhow."

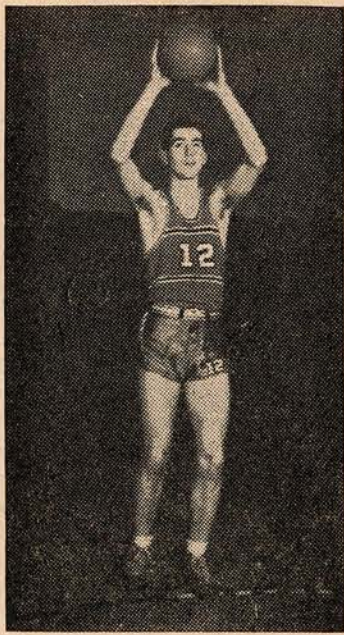
You'll find them easy to sew if you're careful. They're the making of your last year's suit.

He didn't show too much promise in early season games, but has come out as both high average man and the team's individual high scorer. His season's total is 164 giving him an average of 9.7. He has been the scoring wizard of the six-game winning streak which capped the Quaker's reegular season play. For a sophomore, Bob has done exceptionally well this year against more experienced opponents. He has scored heavily against such centers as Thornton of Struthers, Williams of Canton Lincoln, and Cain of Liverpool.

Bob broke into several games last year, although he played reserve ball mainly. He scored six points against Boardman in the tournament.

His only other sport is track. Last year he threw the discus and is expected to make some long heaves this season.

## Reserves Edge Out Sebring 22-21; End Season With 9 Wins

In one of the roughest, dirtiest games seen played on the Salem gym in many a year the Salem reserves eked out a 22-21 victory over a scrappy Sebring reserve outfit before a capacity crowd. Thus the local reserves finished the season with 10 victories and 9 defeats.

Pete Cain although scoring only 6 points turned in one of his best games of the season. After guard Virgil Kelley was taken from the game midway in the third quarter, Cain switched from his center position and took over the chores of bringing the ball up the court. Under Cain's command the local reserves outscored the Sebring quintet in the last quarter, 9-5.

The locals tailed 13-8 at the end of the half and 15-13 as the fourth period began.

The scoring was well divided among the first five of each team although Salem's Cain and Sebring's Buelher led their team with 6 points apiece.
