Salem Frosh Finish 4th In Tournament

Four games in three straight days Andrews of Massillon, 39-36.

After pulling their first game out of the bag by beating Alliance State Street in the last thirty seconds, 25-22, Tarr's boys had little trouble in coming out on top in their next two games.
