Four new teachers are among the Salem High School faculty members for the 1946-47 school year. Miss Betty Ulicny replaces H. C. Lehman, while Melvin Frank, Thomas Crothers, and Wilbur Stuckey are additional teachers to the staff.

Miss Ulicny, teacher of English III and advisor for the Quaker Weekly editorial and Annual staffs comes from Louisville High school after teaching English there for five years. She is a graduate of Kent State University.

Mr. Frank of Youngstown is a graduate of Ohio University and is now working on his Master's Degree at Kent State. He taught at Talmadge, Ohio, after which he spent four years in the service. He is teaching in Junior High in the morning and has mechanical drawing in the afternoon at the high school.

Mr. Crothers, public school music supervisor, is also teaching one course of vocal music at the high school this year. He is a graduate of Kent State and has taken additional work at the University of Southern California. Before a term of service in the Navy, Mr. Crothers taught at Junior High.

Mr. Stuckey, teacher of metal industries, comes to Salem High after teaching at Louisville High School. He is a graduate of Manchester College and has taken additional work at Ohio State University.

**Home Room 209 Second With 96%; 201 Third with 90.6%**

The Association Membership Cup has been won by the seniors in room 208 with 100 per cent membership, as was announced this week. Second in line is room 209 with 96 per cent and 201 is third with 90.6 percent.

The percentages for the other rooms are as follows: 101—88; 312—83 1/3; 203—82.9; 205—81.8; 108—81; 201—81.2; 204—80; 309—79; 110—75; 112—74; 306—73.3; 107—71; 281—70.5; 301—70; 307—69; 307—69; 106—67; 207—61; 308—56; 310—55.

In the memory of "Gooney," as he was better known to his friends, we of the Quaker wish to dedicate this first issue of our paper.

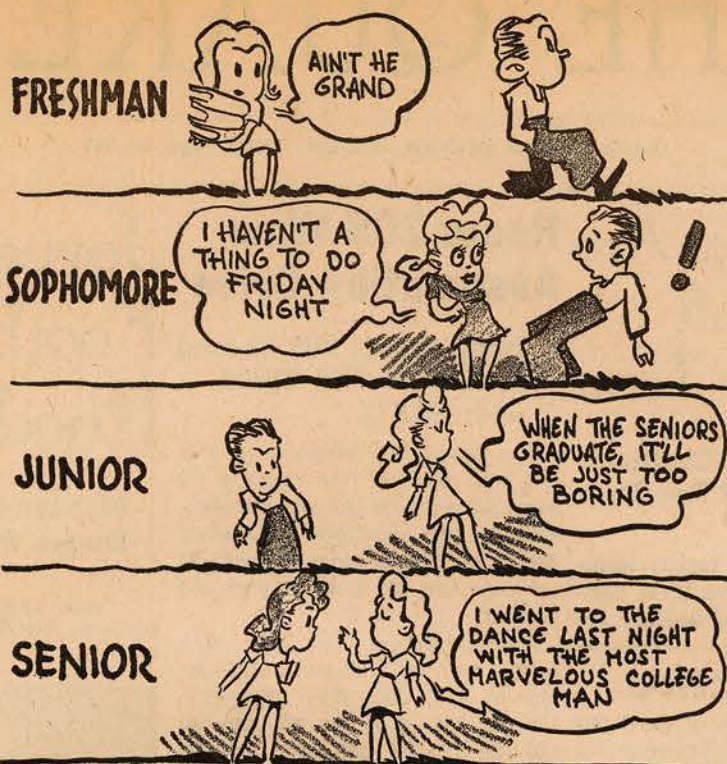
## Make The Right Choice Now

# Salem Quakers Lose Initial Game To Clev. Rhodes Before 4,000

## Successful Aerial Attack Led by Putich of Rhodes; Franks' 30-Yard Run First-Stringers One Threat

Before a screaming crowd of approximately 4,000 fans, the Salem High Quakers pried off the lid of their 1946 season and were rolled under by a smooth aerial attack engineered by Andy Putich, Cleveland Rhodes talented quarterback, to the tune of 19-0.

On the first Quaker offensive play, after receiving the kick-off, Charlie Franks broke into the clear and was caught from behind after running from his own 10 to the Rhodes 40 yard line. This was the only threat the first stringers made and from then on the Clevelanders were out of hot water until the third quarter.

Then, after an exchange of punts and fumbles, the Rams took to the air and promptly moved down the field but were stopped on the Salem one-foot lines. Laughlin was forced to kick from behind his own goal line, which proved to be fruitless to Salem for after a few offensive plays, Charles Lucas crashed over to make it 6-0. Joe Smolko was then inserted into the game to kick the extra point which he did, and when the half ended the score remained 7-0.

The rest between halves proved to be unbeneficial to the hopeless Barrettmen. After the rivals had scored in the opening minutes of the third quarter, Barrett inserted his second stringer which proved to be a good move, for the subs immediately moved the oval down to the Rams' 20-yard line where their threat was curtailed by an intercepted pass.

The Rhodes' boys scored once on the No. 2 Salemites. This touchdown was featured by a 30-yard pass from Putich to Jim Armstrong. Putich then scored by smacking through center for the necessary six yards.

The Quakers failed to progress after this touchdown and finally time ran out and the tilt ended with Salem on the short end of a 19-0.

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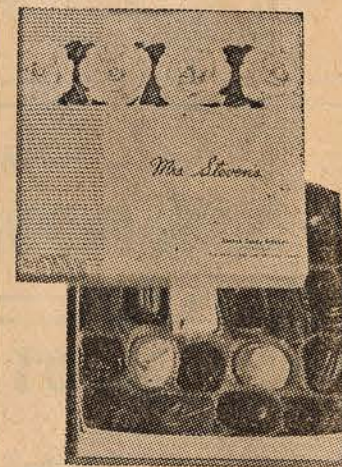
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
