

Barrettmens Win Smashing Victory of 13-0 Over Leetonia High Bears; Team Proves Power on Home Grid

Jim Jensen and Ed Bozick Crash For Touchdowns; Captain Jim Laughlin Completes Extra Point Try

The Salem High Quakers' determination and spirit enabled them to compile a 13 point lead in the first half, and then turn back three touchdown drives during the last half, finally emerging victorious over a stubborn Leetonia grid outfit, 13-0.

For the first time during the current season the Barrettmens proved to the local fans that they can win on the home-town grid-iron.

Leetonia received the kick-off and immediately caught the Quakers off guard when a quick kick sailed over Jimmy Laughlin's head, landing deep in Salem territory.

The Bears drew the first break of the game when the fleet-footed Eddie Bozich fumbled, and Leetonia's potential All-County tackle, Jim Driscoll, recovered the ball. But an intercepted pass and a good kick got the locals out of trouble and put the Leetonians in hot water.

An exchange of fumbles set up the first Salem touchdown drive on the Leetonia 27. Six running plays carried the oval to the rival's seven where at this point Quarterback Laughlin passed to End Jimmy Jensen for the necessary seven yards and the touchdown. Laughlin's place-kick was wide and the score remained 6-0.

Early in the second period Tony Martinelli fell on another Leetonia fumble, this being on the Bears' 44. From here the fighting Quakers marched to their second TD with Eddie Bozich crashing over from the 6-yard line. Laughlin's extra point was good and the score board registered 13 for the locals, 0 for the visitors.

The half-time rest proved beneficial for the visitors and also for the Salem line.

Leetonia received a poor nine-yard boot on the Salem 40 and from here marched to the Salem 12, but their drive was curtailed when Charlie Franks intercepted a pass in the end zone.

HIGH SCHOOL CREDITS NECESSARY FOR ENTRANCE

Candidates for admission as undergraduates must be at least seventeen years of age. They must be graduates of accredited high schools and must present fifteen units of high school work as specified in Groups A, B, and C.

- Group A—7 units.
- English—3 units.
- Algebra—1½ units.
- Plane Geometry—1 unit.
- Solid Geometry—½ unit.
- History—1 unit.

Group B—5 units from any of the following subjects:

- English, advanced algebra, trigonometry, foreign language, history, civics, chemistry, zoology, botany, general science, biology, sociology, physical geography, commercial geography, astronomy, physiology, economics, physics, geology.

Group C—3 units.

The remaining three units may be chosen from any other subjects in which credit for graduation has been allowed.

Employees Hold Meeting With Kerr

On Wednesday afternoon, October 2, Supt. E. S. Kerr met with teachers and all other employees of the Salem School system. He outlined the Board of Education's building program, for which a \$750,000 bond issue is to be submitted to Salem voters at the coming November election.

At the close of Mr. Kerr's talk, a discussion period was held during which teachers and employees were given an opportunity to ask questions about the building program.

Correct Procedure With Admittance Slips Explained

It seems many students are still a little confused about admittance slips. The Deans inform us of the following procedure in case of absence this year.

A pupil after being absent should return to school with an excuse. The excuse must state the reason and date of absence. This excuse should be taken to the Dean's office during home room period. The pupil will then receive a white admittance slip. This slip must be taken to all classes missed and signed by the teachers. After the slip is completely signed, the pupil should return it to his homeroom teacher or the Dean, whichever the home room teacher suggests. These slips must be returned within a week or sooner if possible.

If a student forgets his excuse from home, he will receive a pink admittance slip. This slip admits him for one day, providing he brings an excuse from home the following day. If he does not present an excuse from home, he will receive a blue admittance slip. This slip means he did not present an excuse and must receive zeros for the classes missed. This slip also carries with it a penalty for the classes missed.

Therefore, if you are absent, bring your excuse to school as quickly as possible and save the Deans and yourself a lot of trouble.
