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Safety Assembly Presented; Braking Time Demonstrated

"Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist, if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed," W. W. Morris, safety engineer of the Farm Bureau Insurance companies, declared today as he spoke prior to conducting driving tests at Salem High school.

"Excessive speed is the greatest single cause of automobile accidents," Mr. Morris said. In the demonstration which followed, he pointed out the conditions under which even 20 or 30 miles per hour can be excessive. He added "When drivers know the true facts and base their driving on those facts, highway accidents will drop sharply."

Mr. Morris emphasized the fact that a driver who observes the speed

laws carefully is not a safe driver if he neglects many other items such as proper signaling for turns, approaching an intersection in the proper lane for a turn, the proper way to turn around, and many other things which he demonstrated in the test car.

The safety demonstration, which was brought to Salem High school under the sponsorship of the Student Council, was a part of a long range program of traffic safety now being conducted by the Farm Bureau Insurance companies. Other demonstrations have already been given in more than 3125 high schools and colleges in 12 eastern states.

Successful candidates will be given a four year college education at government expenses and will be commissioned as officers of the Navy or Marine corps upon graduation.

Salem High has been offering applications for these tests for the last four years. Last year 10 Senior boys took the test. All Senior boys and graduates who are interested in NROTC (Naval Reserve Officer's Training corps) should see J. C. Callahan, dean of boys, who has bulletins and further information on the subject.

Barrettmens Defeat Struthers In Rough, Tough Grid Battle

Salem gained revenge last Friday at Reilly field for the defeat Struthers gave them last year by rolling over the Indians in a 32 to 14 tilt.

Salem won the toss and elected to receive. Immediately after getting their hands on the ball they started off on a 66 yard drive, which Bill Crookston climaxed when he scooted around right end for Salem's first of five touchdowns, which they scored during the game.

Struthers was forced to kick after receiving Sinsley's kick off. Gentile got off a fairly good kick which Bob Sebo picked up on the 47 yard line and handed off to Crookston, who went down the left side line for Salem's second TD. James Cusack added the extra point and Salem led 13 to 0.

Struthers scored two touchdowns in the second period. John Pouse, Struthers halfback, took Bill Pasco's punt and raced down the side lines on a 62 yard scamper for the score.
