

The college opened its s on Nov. 11, 1850, with three teachers and seven students. ce then the size of Heidelberg has increased by leaps and nds. Many fields of education are ered at Heidelberg, such as arts, siness administration, secretaristudies, education, music, reion, home economics, sciences, d speech.

Scholarships, one means of getig through college, are awarded imarily on the basis of high ademic standing, and grants-inare given primarily on the asis of need, although scholarip, character, and other qualities e considered.

Tuition fee for one year at eidelberg is \$420.00. Extra fees charged for board, room, books d supplies, student center, stuat budget, and laboratory fee r a science course.

Student organizations and other ctivities help to make the lives Heidelberg students more enbyable. The Student Council, Wig nd Masque for speech students, horal groups plus the band and rchestra, Varsity H association, and dramatics clubs are just a few the extra-curricular activities fered at Heidelberg. In place of aternities and sororities here are societies which each reshman receives an invitation to join sometime during his second semester.

There are three degrees given at Heidelberg, a bachelor of arts degree, a bachelor of science degree, nd a bachelor of music degree.

Out of Heidelberg's 750 students a majority enter the teaching profession while others enroll in graduate school and seminaries for further study. The rest enter business, sales, and secretarial fields.


