The usual class A, B, and C basketball leagues will be organized shortly, letting their share of Salem high school students participate.

Zeller is hoping for a good reception from the students, and he requests that anyone interested in any of the above activities contact him so he can make his final plans.

Home Ec, Business, Fine Arts Featured At Heidelberg College

Heidelberg college stands today on the crest of a hill overlooking centrally-situated city of Tiffin, Ohio. The college opened its doors on Nov. 11, 1850, with three teachers and seven students. Since then the size of Heidelberg has increased by leaps and bounds. Some new buildings that have been erected recently are the Conservatory of Music, built in 1948, and a modern Health and Physical Education building, now under construction.

Many fields of education are offered at Heidelberg, such as arts, business administration, secretarial studies, education, music, religion, home economics, sciences, and speech.

Scholarships, one means of getting through college, are awarded primarily on the basis of high academic standing, and grants-in-aid are given primarily on the basis of need, although scholarship, character, and other qualities are considered.

Tuition fee for one year at Heidelberg is \$420.00. Extra fees are charged for board, room, books and supplies, student center, student budget, and laboratory fee for a science course.

Student organizations and other activities help to make the lives of Heidelberg students more enjoyable. The Student Council, Wig and Masque for speech students, choral groups plus the band and orchestra, Varsity H association, and dramatics clubs are just a few of the extra-curricular activities offered at Heidelberg. In place of fraternities and sororities there are societies which each freshman receives an invitation to join sometime during his second semester.

There are three degrees given at Heidelberg, a bachelor of arts degree, a bachelor of science degree, and a bachelor of music degree.

Out of Heidelberg's 750 students a majority enter the teaching profession while others enroll in graduate school and seminaries for further study. The rest enter business, sales, and secretarial fields.

It was a spectacular finish to a hard-fought battle, despite the fact the Quakers held a 14-0 lead in the first quarter. A safety for Lisbon gave the Blue Devils spirit at the end of the first period.

A Lisbon end intercepted a pass and raced into the end zone to cut the lead to 14-8 at halftime.

After seven plays the Blue Devils started a 54-yard drive which ended in a TD and a deadlocked score of 14-all.

Four plays into the fourth period Lisbon inaugurated an 84-yard drive which gave them the lead. The extra point put them ahead, 21-14.

A Lisbon fumble on their own 24-yard line set the machinery in motion for the Quakers to score their third TD of the game. George Mordew carried the ball over his own right tackle for the Quaker score. Hrovatic's attempted pass for the extra point was no good and Lisbon still led, 21-20.

With 5:33 seconds remaining in the contest Lisbon tried two ground plays but the Salem defense gave up only one yard. Baker next intercepted a pass, making possible Salem's final chance at the goal line. Seconds later Hrovatic and Mellinger combined for the winning TD.
