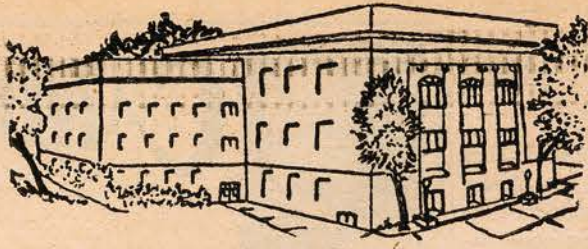

4 Students To Represent Salem At Teen-Age Rodeo

When the Teen Rodeo Driving contest is held today and tomorrow at Lisbon, Salem high will be represented by Kay Paxson, Eileen Jackson, Vernon Squire, and Edward Cope, who are driver education students.

The selection of the total of 32 contestants was made by State Highway Patrolman Norman Kanagy, who is also the contest chairman. The 32—16 boys and 16 girls—represent eight Columbiana county high schools, Salem, Columbiana, East Palestine, Leetonia, New Waterford, Fairfield, East Liverpool, and Lisbon.

The Rodeo is sponsored by the American Automobile association in cooperation with the Ohio State Highway Patrol.

The first part of the contest will be a written test to be conducted today at Lisbon high school under the supervision of Kanagy and the driver training course instructors. The test, prepared by Kent State university, includes 60 questions concerning driving practices and Ohio highway laws and regulations.

The second phase, a driving skill test, will be held at 1 p.m. Saturday at the county fairgrounds in Lisbon. The test will provide for such tasks as diagonal and parallel parking, distance judgment, ability to drive a straight line, and driving in confined areas.

Winners will be selected from both divisions of the contest. United States savings bonds worth \$100, \$50, and \$25 will be given to the first three winners in each division.

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Garfield Nails Class A Title; Salem To Send 3 To State

Akron Garfield won the class A district meet at Reilly stadium last Tuesday, collecting a total of 30 6/7 points. The Salem Quakers ended in seventh position, collecting 10 1/2 markers.

Quaker Eddie Votaw took second in the pole vault jumping 11 feet, his best height of the year. Jack Alexander tied for second in the high jump with Tommy Boone, a former Salemite, at a height of five feet, 10 inches. Jerry Martin also put forth his best effort of the season taking third in the mile run. Votaw, Alexander, and Martin will represent Salem at the state meet this weekend in Columbus.

Alex Adams and Tony Conkle, stars of the Garfield and East Palestine cindermen, were awarded trophies for being the most valuable players of the meet as voted by the officials. They will receive identical trophies.

East Palestine finished second in the list of 32 competing schools with a total of 27 6/7 points. Massillon was third with 20 markers; Ravenna, fourth with 18 3/7 points; Canton McKinley finished fifth with 18; and Barbeon was sixth with 14. Twenty-four teams scored in the meet with many teams failing to place at all.

Adams broke two records in both the high and low hurdles. He knocked two tenths of a second off the high hurdles mark set by Young of East Palestine in 1950, and one and two tenths seconds off the low hurdles mark formerly held by Conkle of East Palestine. Conkle also broke the shot put record with a heave of 55 feet, nine inches. This bettered the old mark by more than three feet.

Conkle was high point man of the meet collecting 22 points, only one point ahead of Adams.

All five winners in each event qualified for the state meet. The winning school received a trophy as did the runner-up. The third place team received a plaque as did the winning mile and half-mile relay teams. Medals went to the first and second place winners in each event with the third, fourth, and fifth place winners receiving ribbons. Betty Bartholow, custodian of awards, gave out the awards with the assistance of Mary Campbell, Betsy Moore, Doris McNamee, Bonnie Campbell, and Donna Cocca.

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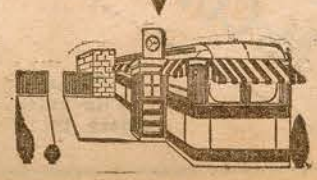
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
