Merchandise Buyer Needs Good Taste

Ambition, self-confidence, loyalty and integrity, the qualities necessary to success in any field, apply particularly to the merchandise buyer. A keen bargaining sense and good taste in the selection of style merchandise are also assets.

Buying is that phase of merchandising which pertains to the purchase of goods in exchange for money. In the case of the merchandise buyer, it is the exchange which takes place between the retailer and his source of supply.

The buyer has many responsibilities. As head of his department the responsibility for the success or failure of the department rests squarely upon him and his ability to interpret consumer demand, secure the merchandise and then present it to the public in a manner that will assure its sale. Also he has the responsibility of supervising the salespeople and clerks in his department and training them for their work.

The chief advantage of work as a merchandise buyer is the unusual opportunities offered the individual to hold executive positions and to advance to jobs of increasing importance. There is little routine in the work of a buyer. Each day brings new problems, new people and new merchandise to stimulate the interest of the buyer.

Buyers' salaries in large department stores range from a minimum of \$60 to \$100 a week to a maximum of \$200 a week.

Formal education in retailing is but the beginning of the real practical training and the gaining of the necessary experience that comes with actual work in a store. New York University School of Retailing is one of the best schools for one interested in becoming a merchandise buyer.
