B.G. — "A la carte is excellent."

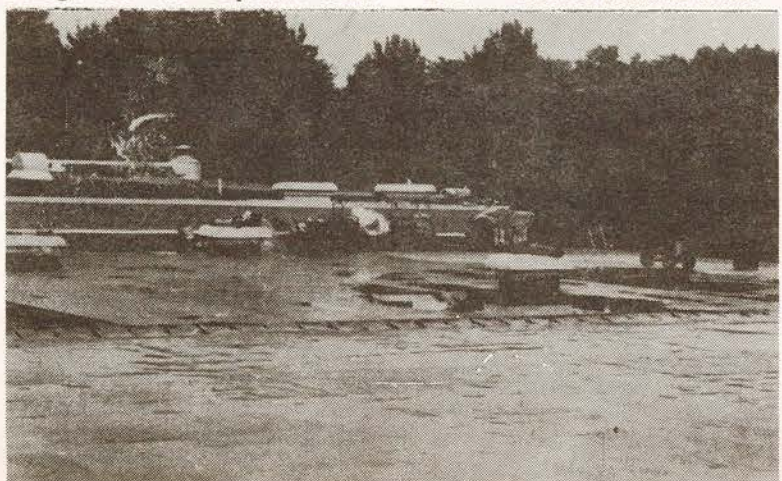
P.H. — "The fifth period gets all the good food, and the sixth period gets all the left-overs."

Roof Repairs Underway

Does \$40,000 dollars sound like a lot of money to you? Well it does to Mr. Delane, school principal, and other tax payers of the city of Salem that have to pay for the new roof being put on the high school this year. The job is being done by the Hickey Roofing of Salem. The six men started the job the second week of August and have been working ever since, depending on the weather though. The new roof is being put on because of the bad leakage in the halls and some of the classrooms. The leakage last year did damage to the library rug and some lockers, but none of the damage was beyond repair.

The process of putting on a new roof is a very complicated one. First the company had to clear off the old roofing by removing all the old stone and slag already left from the previous roof job. Then putting on the new roof begins. The type of roofing being done is called a cold tar pitch roof. How the company

goes about this is this: To start things off, sealing paper is layed down on the roof, then the sealing paper is flooded with cold tar. Insulation is layed on top of this to try to conserve energy this winter. On top of the insulation more sealing paper and cold tar are placed. Three finishing coats of tar paper are layed on top of this and then stone slag is spread over the entire job. The areas completely finished are the English wing, the Art wing and the entire second floor. This type of roof will give flexibility and won't crack and should last.

"I feel the company is doing an excellent job. I've been up on the roof watching them," says Mr. Delane, who is anxiously awaiting the result of the new roof. Mr. Delane also noted that he is hoping this new roof will work out so that the students and faculty will not have to put up with the mess, constant turmoil and inconvenience of that of last year.

Joe Namath was on the football team of course and the slogan under his name still fits him, "Joe . . . magician with a football . . . always ready to have fun . . . carefree."

For those who found fame in the theater there are signs, too. Charlton Heston was in every high school play at New Trier High in Winnetka, Ill., and was a member of the drama club. Johnny Carson was a member of the Thespians and Dick Van Dyke and Jimmy Stewart also had roles in class plays.

Yearbooks have been a part of U.S. students' lives for nearly 200 years. They are frequently used as a background source by the news media.

Famous people often worked on their high school yearbook, too. For example David Soul, who plays Hutch in the hit television show "Starsky and Hutch," was once a member of his yearbook staff. Gladys Knight was on her high school yearbook staff, and had a
