## Salem Winners At KSU

The Kent State Extension held their 4th Annual Art Show and competition April 17-28. Over 14 schools participated in the show, including Salem.

12 Salem students placed in the show. Curt Criswell, our 1st place winner said, "I was kinda shocked that I got 1st. I've worked hard all year. I hope to have a future in art after the Army."

Most of these students plan to include art in their future. They have the will, determination and talent to make it.

Undoubtedly today's biggest news item is the Falkland or Malvinas Island crisis which started on April 2 when Argentina invaded the islands. Although both countries have been engaging in a hit-and-sink type warfare, new clashes were reported between the Argentine and British forces at a port on the islands where British reinforcements are said to have arrived to widen the beachhead that they established on Friday, May 21.

The geography of the islands is relatively simple. The islands are divided into East and West Falkland with a majority of the seaports and population residing on East Falkland. A body of water, the Falkland Sound separates East and West.

"Argentine forces are still fighting British troops who have established a beachhead on the Falklands near Port San Carlos," according to a military spokesman in Buenos Aires. The two countries tell vastly different stories with Britain stating that they have put 5,000 men on the islands and raised their flag - the

Union Jack, in honor of the Queen. Defense Minister John Noth announced in London that a British missile frigate — the Ardent, was sunk in the Falkland Sound with the presumed loss of 20 men.

Argentina though reports that only 600 British soldiers landed on the island and regained a small beachhead and that 200 of these men have been wounded badly which puts them out of fighting action. The Argentines also say they damaged 6 British warships and probably sank two others but the British only acknowledge the loss of one ship, the Ardent.

There are numerous other developments and policies that most surely are being affected by the crisis at hand. For instance, U.S. interests in South America will inevitably be hurt by the Falkland conflict and by a shift of attitudes — most likely a major one — throughout the region, according to

economic experts here in the United States. One of the problems they said the U.S. will have to deal with is the increased chance that Argentina and other South American nations will develop an atomic bomb and other nuclear warfare.

Some other items that may be changed are Pope John Paul II's proposed visit to Britain on May 28 and the Common Market renewing sanctions against Argentina.

The United Nations Security Council resumed its debate on the Falklands with no clear sign it can end the crisis. Foreign Minister Nicanor Costa Mendez of Argentina has addressed the Council recently with British Foreign Minister Francis Pym remaining in London.

### Falkland Update

Military analysts now predict that the British will launch a second landing on the Falklands. Possible targets include Stanley and Darwin, both located on East Falkland.

I invite the community to visit this school that has been maligned. Talk to the students or the faculty; the answers will be the same. Find out why I'm proud to be a Salem student.

bond. Interest on monies has been given away in the form of scholarships ever since.
