SHS TOP TEN SENIORS

Ten students in the Class of 1983 achieving the highest academic standing for their four years at Salem High School have been announced by Principal Rob Delane. Two of the students share honors as valedictorians, and there are two salutatorians.

Earning perfect 4.0 grade point averages are Mark Thomas Johnson, son of Dr. and Mrs. Thomas Johnson of 2247 Southeast Blvd.; and Michael Mozina, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Edward Mozina of 432 S. Madison Ave.

Grade point averages of 3.97 were earned by Robert S. Abrams, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Abrams of 1940 Whinnery Rd.; and Diana Milheim, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Milheim of 2322 Kennedy Drive.

Following closely in the top 10 are James Kay, with a 3.94 average; Jose A. Soriano, 3.86; Lisa R. Scullion, 3.86; Jeanine Huzyak, 3.85; Melissa L. Conn, 3.81; and Michael A. Medford, 3.78.

Parents of the scholars are Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kay of 1230 Conser Drive, Dr. and Mrs. Antonio S. Soriano of 2245 Edgewood Drive, Mrs. Suellen Scullion of 233 W. Pine Lake Rd., Mr. and Mrs. Paul Huzyak of 1243 Fairview Ave., Mr. and Mrs. Harry R. Conn of 344 Highland Ave., and Rev. and Mrs. William Medford of 595 N. Union Ave.

Principal Delane points out the students have not only earned academic honors but have exhibited a wide variety of interests and made contributions to school and community activities through their participation.

Johnson plans to attend Cornell University in the fall to major in biology. In school he has been a member of the Academic Honor Society, Mu Alpha Theta math honorary (secretary), Academic Challenge, Spanish Club, Yearbook

staff, biology aide, band, Key Club, and earned three varsity letters in tennis.

His awards have included Brooks Writing, Buckeye Boys State, Who's Who Among American High School Students (junior and senior years), and the National English Merit Award. He is a member of the National Junior Music Club, Medical Explorers, Christian Education Committee and the United Presbyterian Church group.

Planning to study engineering at Ohio State University, Mozina has served as president of Mu Alpha Theta and been active in Academic Honor Society, Key Club, Spanish Club, Academic Challenge and band. He has won a National Merit Scholarship, Ohio Certificate of Superior Achievement in Mathematics, Bronze Medal in National Mathematics Test and was listed in Who's Who.

A Buckeye Boys State delegate and member of the American Legion Band, Mozina has been employed as a stockboy at Salem Foodland since 1982.

Abrams will attend Adrian College to study accounting following his graduation. He has been in German Club four years, two years on Academic Challenge teams, and two years in the Academic Honor Society. He has been named to the United States Achievement Academy for English, to Who's Who, and was a member of the winning County Bowl team.

President of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship, he also manages the church's softball team and has been a paper carrier for The Salem News for seven years.

Miss Milheim has been designated as a Freshman Scholar at Ohio State University where she will major in biology as a pre-optometry student. A member of the Academic Honor Society and activities co-

editor of the Yearbook staff, she has won the Brooks Writing Award and been a delegate to Buckeye Girls State. Named to Who's Who, she has been band librarian two years, won underclass high point awards for track three years, was Senior Academic Award winner for volleyball and served as the VFW's Royalty Day Athletic Queen.

A Junior Music Study Club member, she has also been active in the United Presbyterian Church and its softball program, and the Strouss Junior Advisory Board.

With an engineering major his goal, Kay plans to attend the General Motors Engineering and Management Institute. In school he has belonged to Mu Alpha Theta, Key Club, Spanish Club, Academic Honor Society, Academic Challenge, band, Pep Band, and the tennis team.

A Buckeye Boys State delegate, he has won the Brooks Writing Award, National English Merit Award, Who's Who (junior and senior years), and was on school teams for the American High School Mathematics Exam and Ohio Council of Teachers of Mathematics contest. Kay is active in the Salem Nazarene Church Youth Group and is employed at Long John Silver's.

Soriano will be attending Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine for a doctor of medicine degree. His school activities have included participation in Academic Challenge, Academic Honor Society, American Field Service Club, Spanish Club, Key Club, Yearbook staff and biology aide. He is in Who's Who and was Buckeye Boys State alternate and member of the Biology Olympics and County Bowl teams.

On the golf and tennis teams, he has earned two varsity letters in golf. Out of school, he is treasurer of Medical Explorers Post 5, and a

member of Boy Scouts, golf leagues and church league basketball.

Miss Scullion also plans a medical career and will attend Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine's six-year program at the University of Akron and possibly specialize in pediatrics. Member of Academic Honor Society for two years, band four years, a Buckeye Girls State delegate, Yearbook activities co-editor and Yearbook senior editor, she has also included Academic Challenge two years, French Club two years, American Field Service Club, Prom and White Christmas dance committees among her activities.

Winner of the National English Merit Award, Marian Award, the Elks "Most Valuable Student" Scholarship (local and state), she is also listed in Who's Who. Community activities have included Camp Fire (12 years), Candystriper (two years), Music Makers (four years), Medical Explorers, Junior Catholic Daughters of America, and St. Paul Catholic Church.

Planning to study bilingual education, Miss Huzyak will attend Akron University. Named student mayor in upcoming Youth in Government Day activities, she has belonged to Spanish Club, American Field Service Club and the Academic Honor Society. She has earned a National Merit Special Scholarship, an Honor Scholarship from Akron University and Brooks Writing awards. She is employed as receptionist at St. Paul Rectory.

Planning to major in biology, Miss Conn will be attending Wake Forest University in the fall. Her activities have included presidency of American Field Service Club, vice-presidency of Mu Alpha Theta, membership in Spanish Club, French Club, Academic Challenge, Academic Honor Society and Yearbook staff.

She has her varsity letter for tennis, has won the Brooks Writing Award, and was named a senator at Buckeye Girls State. Miss Conn has been a cast member in three Salem Community Theatre productions and is treasurer of the Young Peoples Theatre. She has been employed at the Shop for Pappagallo since 1980.

Medford will head for Capital University and a major in psychology following graduation. He has been a member of Key Club, German Club, Academic Honor Society, and was an honor prize winner in the Mount Union Essay Competition.

A tri-captain in track and cross country, he was named Most Valuable Runner in the cross country program. A member of Emmanuel Luther League of the Emmanuel Church, he enjoys road racing, bike touring and camping.

The top 10 ranking seniors will be honored at an awards assembly Thursday, May 26, when they will be presented with gold cords. The cords will be worn with their gowns during graduation and baccalaureate ceremonies June 5 in the high school auditorium.

A Caring Teacher At SHS

Mrs. Cozza is not just a family living teacher, she is a lady who really cares for her students. Mrs. Cozza grew up in Hanoverton and received a formal education at Kent State University where she majored in home economics. Mrs. Cozza married her husband, Frank, after completing three years of college. They now have three sons; Craig age 19, Matthew age 18 and Frank, age 17. Home for the Cozza family is at Guilford Lake. Also included in the household is an English sheepdog named Cana. ("That's Italian for dog."), and a cat called Whiskers. Some of the Cozza family's hobbies are canoeing, snow skiing, and Mrs. Cozza enjoys running. Mrs. Cozza also serves on the Columbiana County Joint Vocational and United Local Boards of Education.

Mrs. Cozza has been here at Salem Senior High School for all sixteen years of her teaching career. For the first five years she taught general home ec classes; now Mrs. Cozza teaches family living classes only. She says, "I love this much better." Among Mrs. Cozza's criteria for her senior classes every year are pretend marriages for the students. Although these in-class marriages are very short lived, Mrs. Cozza believes they are very similar to real life, "The feelings about marriage are very typical in class. Everyone probably knows couples in real life like the couples in class, such as a partner who insists on the other partner doing everything or a specific task."

Mrs. Cozza is also very much involved with the school system's new drug and alcohol treatment program along with other school

officials. Mrs. Cozza related that the program is intended to "help young people deal with chemically related problems." Mrs. Cozza is very sincere in her desire to help young people and comments further on the subject, "I wish people made wiser decisions about the implications upon their lives. I guess my frustration is that too many people will have to hit bottom before they will admit their problem. I don't like to see that happen. There's no shame in having a problem; the problem is in admitting there is a problem."

Mrs. Cozza loves teaching and is especially fond of students who keep in touch and tell her that the information they learned in class really helped them in some of their situations. When asked if she thinks kids coming out of her class feel more confident about facing the outside world, Mrs. Cozza replies, "I guess that's my goal."

Salem traveled to Borts Field in Youngstown to play Austintown-Fitch in the first game of the tournaments. After a disappointing

loss to the Falcons, the Quakers are still without an opening day tournament win. Now with the season coming to a close, the Quakers will lose the following seniors: Jack Bimber, Chuck Delvichio, Dan Edgerton, Brad Myers and Chuck Sanfillippo. The Quakers will start looking towards next year and the return of the many juniors to aid Salem in a winning season.

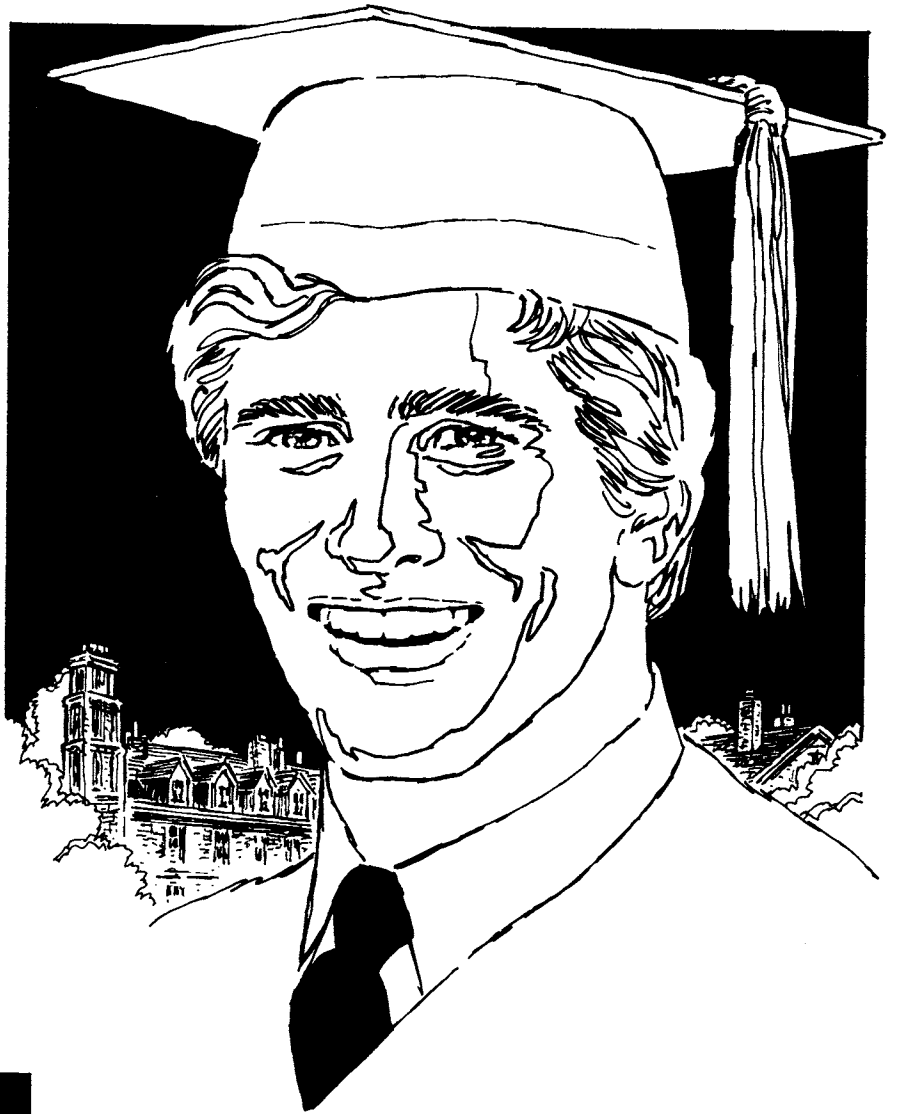
