Money Needed

Trying "to take care of what we have," Salem City Schools are asking for a two-mill improvement levy on the November 8 general election ballot.

The two-mill levy would be a temporary levy limited to a period of five years. It would generate about \$1,500,000 to be used to take care of some problems in our buildings that get worse each year and cannot be handled within the general operating budget.

The funds can be used to construct, renovate, remodel, rehabilitate, improve or equip buildings and facilities. They cannot be transferred to the general fund and used for daily operating expenses or salaries.

At our school, after thorough review and inspection of the building, the items under consideration for much needed attention are:

Other school buildings throughout the system will also get needed renovations, such as restroom renovation, acoustical ceilings, window and door replacements, and roof, cement area and masonry repairs.

Board of education members say, "We hope voters will remember

funds for some of these repairs were asked for as far back as 1974. We're not just discovering the problems now. But the patch-work that has been done for many years will just not be effective much longer."

Schools are urging support for the two-mill levy — "To take care of what we have."

Two of Salem's former students have moved on to become involved in baseball. Jerry Meals and Walt DeShields have become involved in minor league baseball. I had a chance to talk to both of these people.

Jerry Meals is an umpire in the minor leagues with hopes of someday umpiring major league baseball. He started by going to Joe Brinkman's umpiring school in Florida. The school lasted from January 31 to March 6. Only 12 out of 115 student would make it to advanced training. The other one school in the United States joined his school and went to advanced training in Bradenton, Florida where 33 students were permitted. Only 13 of 33 students would make the cut for spring training umpiring. He made the cuts and was assigned to the St. Louis Cardinals farm teams in the minors. Extended spring training was his next job, but then he was assigned to the Appalachian league. I asked him what he liked about his new job and he replied, "It was lots of fun, but there are pressures of making 'the right' call on the field. Also there is traveling, but you see a lot of the country and people."

Walt DeShields was a baseball

and basketball player in high school. He set a record scoring 45 points in one basketball game for the Quakers. In baseball he was a pitcher. Ohio Northern University is where he went to college. The Ohio Northern baseball team has won the Ohio Athletic Conference (OAC) championship the last two seasons.

Birth of "Heavy Metal"

Most experts agree that "heavy metal" rock 'n' roll was born with Led Zeppelin. Zeppelin's founder, Jimmy Page, played with the Yardbirds in the late 60's. The Yardbirds were led by two of the all-time greatest guitar players, Jeff Beck and Eric Clapton. Page himself was no slouch at the guitar, either. When the Yardbirds broke up, Jimmy Page and his friend John Paul Jones met rival bandmen John Bonham and Robert Plant and formed the group Led Zeppelin. From their first album in 1969 (*Led Zeppelin I*), the group was an incredible success. They even made a pre-dawn appearance at Woodstock. They followed in successive years with *Led Zeppelin II*, *III*, and *IV*. *Zeppelin IV* contains the No. 1 song of the 70's decade, "Stairway To Heaven."

Other albums soon followed, such as *Physical Graffiti*, their only double album. Robert Plant, the group's lead singer, said that *Physical Graffiti* was the band's best musical effort. *The Song Remains The Same* — the group's only live album — became the title of their amazing movie. Another album, *In Through The Out Door*, was released in 1979. Shortly after its release, it hit a spot on the top ten album chart. That's not so amazing, but the fact that all eight of their previous albums were soon on the top ten chart is incredible. No other group in history has ever done this. Their two other albums are *Houses Of The Holy* and their newly released *Coda*. *Coda* was released in 1983, four years after the breakup of Led Zeppelin.

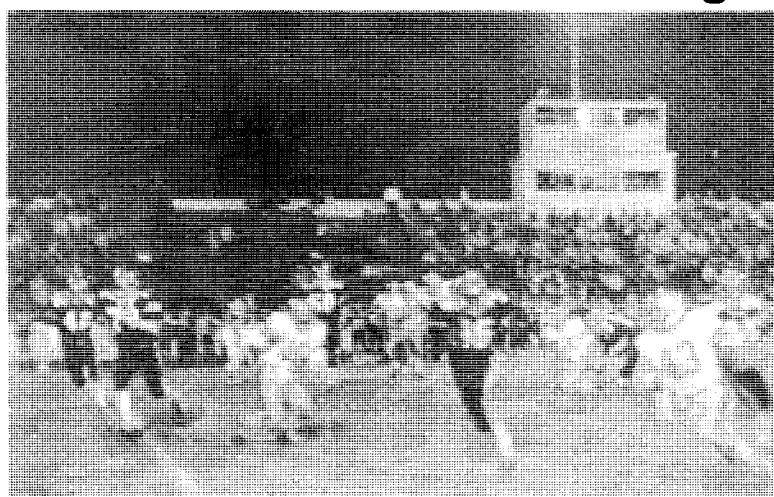
The band broke up due to the death of John Bonham, the group's drummer. Because of this, Robert Plant refuses to sing another Led Zeppelin song on stage again, not even "Stairway to Heaven," which has special meaning to him. Since the group's dispersal, Plant has come out with 2 solo albums — *Pictures At Eleven* and *The Principal Of Moments*. He has recently visited the Cleveland Coliseum on his American Tour, which has been a great success. It is practical to say that groups such as Def Leppard, Judas Priest, or Van Halen would not exist today if it were not for the musical breakthroughs of Led Zeppelin.

Salem's first game was an impressive victory over Cleveland East(20-14). Bob Magyaros rushed for an impressive 121 yards and scoring was as follows: Carl Apicella on a 6-yard run, Jay Watterson on a 6-yard run, Brian Toothman 3-yard run. Then Salem went to Campbell and lost a hard fought game to the Campbell Red Devils by the margin of one point (14-13). Salem recovered, but was soon defeated by Youngstown East (34-28). 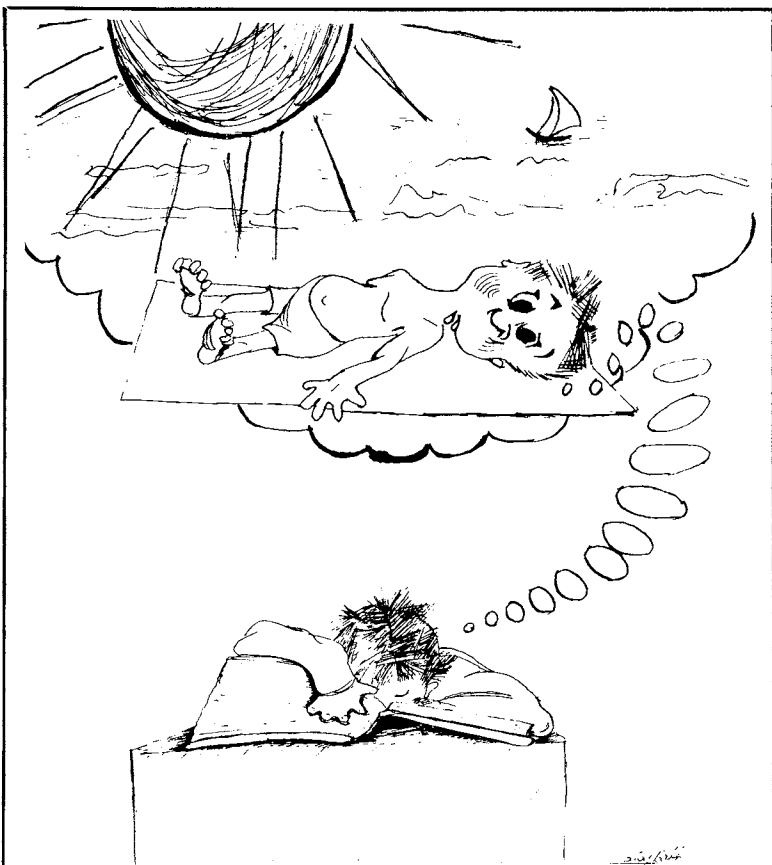
Girls' Tennis
