Rich Karlis Returns To Salem . . . Talks To Students

Who would have thought four years ago that a Salem High graduate, namely Rich Karlis, would be one of the premier kickers in the NFL? Monday, the 9th, he came back to Salem to talk to all the classes.

Rich, a 1977 SHS graduate, was a walk-on to the University of Cincinnati football team. There he worked hard until he kicked off and did field goals. After college he went to the Houston Oilers camp. He was there for three week and got cut. "It was probably the worst day in my life," Rich said, remembering the event.

After that he was invited to the Denver Broncos' invitational free agent camp. "There were about 75 kickers there. They told us to get in groups of 5." Rich continued, "They had us kick field goals without warm-ups. After that they told us to sit down. A couple hours later they had us punt 2 balls. We all had numbers, and they called mine, and I made the team."



Salem High School students are eligible to compete with students at more than 5,000 high schools across the country in the second annual U.S. Army Reserve National Essay

A winner will be selected from all of the entries at Salem High School, and will receive a certificate of achievement from the Chief, Army Reserve. His or her essay will then go on to compete with other win essays from participating schools throughout the United states. The deadline for submission to the national competition is May 11, 1984. A panel of judges will select three national winners, who will receive U.S. Savings Bonds, courtesy of the Reserve Officers Association (ROA) — a \$1,000 bond for first place and \$500 bonds for the two runners-up. They will also receive etchedglass trophies. The top winner will be honored at the annual ROA convention in Chicago, Illinois, in June. Travel expenses will be covered for the winner and an escort.
