SALEM'S TOP TEN SENIORS

An unprecedented seven students have tied as valedictorians among the top 10 graduates in Salem High School's Class of '86, all having earned 4.0 grade point averages for their four years of high school studies.

"As far as I know, this has never happened before," Principal Rob Delane says. "Students seem to realize more and more they are entering a highly competitive society and are taking more time to achieve academically."

He emphasizes the school is not watering down its courses, "It's just that students are realizing hard work yields rewards."

Delane notes 42 students in the class of 208 graduates have earned 3.2 grade point averages and will be eligible for scholarships from the Salem Alumni Association, as well as from other schools and organizations.




John Barrette

RICH HUFFMAN is on his way to play football at OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY. He is leaving on July 29th. He will be studying Business Administration.

Rich led the MVC in receiving this season by catching 35 passes for 542 yards and 4 touchdowns. He registered 81 solo tackles, 3 sacks, and 2 fumble recoveries as a defensive end. He was all MVC, all County, all Area and all North Eastern OHIO. Rich or "Huff" to most people has played football for 4 years, lettering 3 of the 4 years. He has also played basketball and baseball for 3 years. He couldn't play his senior year because of a shoulder injury from football.
