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New Class At SHS

There is a new class this year at Salem High School. It is the Advanced Placement English Class and it is taught during fourth period by Mrs. Esposito. The Advanced Placement Program is found nationwide and is offered in many courses other than English, such as biology, history, math, and foreign languages. The AP Program lets high school seniors do college level work and receive hours of valuable credit at many colleges and universities throughout the country. The way this credit is determined is through the results of the AP Exam. The students in this course take the AP Exam in May of their senior year. The exam consists of five parts taking a total of three hours. There are two sections of multiple choice and three essays to write. There is no passing or failing grade on this exam. The grades range from 1 to 5, with 5 being the highest. Most universities accept scores of three or higher when giving college credit and some even give credit for a two. Of the 205,000 students who took

the AP Exam last year, 67% scored a three or higher.

The idea of bringing the AP Program to Salem was raised by a member of the Salem School Board. Mr. Delane also encouraged the staff to consider such programs by showing a film on AP. Mrs. Esposito began to look into it two years ago when she taught the members of this year's AP class in English II. There are currently 18 people enrolled in the class and Mrs. Esposito plans on continuing the program next year and throughout the years to come.

The materials taught in the AP Class are similar to those taught in College English. The main difference between them is that in the AP Class, there is more emphasis on student initiated discussions rather than teacher initiated discussions. That is, the students run the class with the teacher as a monitor rather than the teacher asking questions and the class giving answers. When the students discuss the reading selections like that, it prepares them for the essays they must write on the AP Exam. The pupils are given a poetry and a prose selection which they must read, analyze, and write a developed essay on in a time span of 40 minutes. There is also more reading of novels and more in class writing in the AP Class than in College English.

After going 2-5 the first half of the season, the Salem Quaker football team started the second half of the ten game season with two straight M.V.C. losses before beating East Liverpool in a non-conference matchup.

The first M.V.C. game was a 17-14 loss to the Poland Bulldogs. Salem stayed close the entire game, but couldn't pull it off in the end. The second half was relatively quiet as all the scoring came in the first half. The first score came from Poland on a 12 yard pass from John Massarelli to Joe Bonarigo early in the first quarter. Salem came back, though, with a 74 yard drive that was polished off by a 33 yard touchdown run by Dave Petrucci. Petrucci ended the game with 79 yards in 13 rushes. After an interception and a trick play by Poland produced a touchdown to take a 14-7 lead in the second quarter, the Quakers then scored on a 9 yard toss from Dave Exline to Paul Totani that ended a

Quakers Meet Quakers Tonight

The Salem Quaker football team will take on the New Philadelphia Quakers tonight at 8:00 P.M. at Quaker Stadium in New Philadelphia. New Philly, under head coach Dan Evans, is 4-4 on the year. They play in the tough Federal League which includes such teams as Canton Central Catholic and Massillon Perry. Earlier in the year New Philadelphia lost to West Branch by a 22-7 score. They have also gone up against undefeated state power Zanesville, which runs the old single-wing offense (the only team in the state to do so) which was used back in the 1920's. Last week they played Canton South and were defeated 16-7. Quarterback Denny Trimmer leads the New Philadelphia offense. Look for Coach Evans to stay with a balance between running and passing. New Philly is trying to improve on a 4-6 record last year.

Salem is coming off of three straight well played games. Two of them were tough three point losses to Poland and Warren J.F.K. Last week Salem destroyed East Liverpool 39-0 for their third win of the year against five losses. Dave Petrucci led the offense with 94 yards rushing and a touchdown. He also threw for a 60 yard touchdown. That pass was caught by receiving star Scott Corl who had three catches for 66 yards, including his first two touchdowns of the year. Quarterback Dave Exline played a fine game with 4 pass completions for 55 yards and two touchdowns, one to Corl and one to Chuck Juliano, Eric Kunar also scored on a 4 yard run.

As well as the Salem offense played, the defense was even better. It netted its second shutout of the year and produced 9 Potter turnovers. Petrucci had two interceptions to pad his team-leading total of six. Salem caused four fumbles including one returned 13 yards by Dave Tkatch for his first varsity touchdown.

The Quakers will be looking for win number four tonight. An outing like last week's will gain that result. "We need to open it up early. I know that our defense, led by The Family, can shut them out," said senior split end-defensive back Scott Corl. The Family refers to four members of the Salem team. It consists of Corl, and linemen Bob Whitman, Dave Tkatch, and Mike DelFavero, who had two sacks last week.

The key to victory tonight will once again be the offense. The defense has proven week in and week out that it can hold the opposing team down. If Dave Petrucci, Dave Exline, and the fine core of receivers play like last week, the 90 minute bus ride home will be a good one.

52 yard drive. The final score of the game came after a pass-interference call against Salem moved the Bulldogs to the twelve yard line with very little time remaining in the half. Jon Trolio then kicked the winning field goal with 2 seconds left in the first half. Salem's defense did a good job of keeping the yardage low as they held Poland to 64 yards rushing and 82 yards passing. Salem finished the game with 104 yards rushing and 82 yards through the air.

The next game for Salem was a hard fought grudge match against Warren J.F.K. that ended in a 20-17 overtime loss for Salem. It looked as if J.F.K. might blow it open in the first quarter, as Eagle sophomore Anthony Davis scored on runs of 63 yards and 1 yard to give J.F.K. a 14-0 lead. Salem didn't fold, however. Following a fumble recovery by Paul Totani deep in J.F.K. territory, Salem scored on a 22 yard touchdown pass from Dave Exline to Dave Petrucci late in the second quarter. Craig Reinehr added the P.A.T. and the score was cut in half at halftime. After allowing Davis to run wild in the first half, Salem's defense, with great play from Bob Whitman, Chris Theiss, and Paul Totani, stuffed it to Davis in the second half and allowed him to go nowhere. Salem was also aided by 2 interceptions from Scott Sommers and one from Chuck Juliano. One of Sommers' interceptions came late in the game to prevent a touchdown. The teams battled each other throughout the second half and no points were put on the board until the closing moments of play. With only 11 seconds left in regulation and Salem desperately needing a touchdown, Dave Petrucci came through as he plunged in from one yard out to pull within one. Craig Reinehr split the uprights on the P.A.T. and put Salem in a 14-14 deadlock going into overtime.

In overtime, Salem was unable to put it in the end zone, but did get close enough for a Reinehr field goal to put them on top 17-14. With the way Salem's defense had shined in the second half, the Quakers seemed to be in the driver's seat. But the last play of the game came on a 3 yard T.D. run by Anthony Davis. The game was ended and Salem had lost another heartbreaker. Dave Petrucci ended the game with 32 yards on 15 tries. Eric Kunar also ran the ball 8 times for 35 yards. Quarterback Dave Exline finished up the game going 6 of 22 for 98 yards and one T.D. Exline's main target was Chuck Juliano who had 5 receptions for 73 yards.

After losing 2 straight very close games, the Mighty Quakers took their frustrations out on a hapless East Liverpool team. By the time the final second had ticked off the clock, Salem had beaten the Potters in a blowout, 39-0. The first score for Salem came in the second quarter

when Dave Petrucci hit Scott Corl on an option pass that covered 60 yards and gave Salem a 6-0 lead. Following a Petrucci interception later in the quarter, Salem marched 52 yards and scored on a 3 yard pass from Dave Exline to Scott Corl. Reinehr's P.A.T. was good and Salem took a 13-0 lead to the locker room.

The beginning of the third quarter was the beginning of the end for Liverpool, as Salem scored 4 times in the period. The first score of the quarter came after an Eric Bailey interception gave Salem the ball deep in Potter territory. Three plays later, Petrucci dove in from one yard out to finish a short drive. The second score of the quarter came after another Salem interception, this one by Paul Totani, gave Salem good field position. A few plays later, Dave Exline fired his second touchdown of the game, a 33 yarder to Chuck Juliano. This gave Salem a 25-0 lead midway through the quarter. Salem's next score came moments after the kickoff to East Liverpool. Potter quarterback Glenn Bouscher faded back to pass and was crushed by linebacker Eric Bailey, causing Bouscher to fumble the ball. Dave Tkatch alertly picked up the loose ball and rumbled 13 yards into the endzone to give Salem a 31-0 commanding lead. The final score of the quarter, and of the game, came very late in the quarter. Eric Kunar took the handoff from Exline and charged in for a 4 yard touchdown that gave Salem a 37-0 lead. The conversion pass from Petrucci to Corl was good, and that's the way it ended, 39-0.

Scott Corl finished the game with 66 yards on 3 receptions and had 2 touchdowns. Eric Kunar finished with 45 yards on 11 rushes with one T.D. Dave Petrucci had another All-Star performance, rushing 14 times for 94 yards. He also completed 2 passes for 63 yards. Dave Exline had a good game at quarterback, going 4 of 10 for 55 yards and 2 T.D.s. The Quaker defense also had the game of their lives. The defense, which had the best defensive game a Salem team has had in years, held East Liverpool to only 2 rushing yards the entire game and 48 yards total offense. The defense also produced 9 turnovers throughout the game. The Quakers had 5 interceptions; two for Petrucci, while Eric Bailey, Paul Totani, and Scott Sommers each had one. Salem also had 4 fumble recoveries. The recoveries were by Tkatch, Totani, Chris Huffman, and Cliff Petey. The defensive line, led by "The Family" (Mike Del Favero, Bob Whitman, Dave Tkatch, and Scott Corl), did a fantastic job all night of pressuring both of East Liverpool's quarterbacks, and stopping the running game.

Salem now stands at 3-5 and has no more M.V.C. games left as they finish 1-5 in the conference. Salem has 2 games left, the first being tonight at New Philadelphia, and then finishing up at home against a tough Youngstown Rayen team.

The Salem J.V.'s continued their season with three consecutive losses to Canfield 18-0, Poland 13-6 and Warren J.F.K. 25-0. The three losses dropped the team to 0-5-1 overall and 0-5-1 in the M.V.C. The only score for the Quakers, which was against Poland, came when sophomore quarterback Lance Miller fired a T.D. pass to junior Bob Sprowl. The P.A.T. snap was fumbled and Salem could score no more. Credit is given to Joe Righetti, Chris White, and Alan Stokes, who have done a good defensive job all year.

After getting off to a 1-2 start, the Salem freshmen have gone 3-1 in their last four games. The first game was a 28-0 win over Girard. Richard Phillis led the way with 2 touchdowns. Chris Cochran and Jeff Sharp each had one T.D. The next game for Salem was a 28-14 victory over Struthers. Scoring touchdowns for Salem were Brian Faulker, Chris Cochran, Rich

Phillis, and Scott McKinney. The next matchup for Salem was against a big and strong Canfield team. The freshmen came within minutes of winning, but couldn't pull it off as they lost 14-8. George Bigham scored the only touchdown for the Quakers and Brian Ciotti had the conversion. The Quakers' next win was a 20-0 shutout over Poland. Brian Faulkner, Rich Phillis, and George Bigham each had a T.D. for the Quakers. Matt Alix, Jeff Sharp, Brian Faulkner, and Rich Phillis have done a good job all year for the freshman defense. Salem now stands at 4-3 overall and 3-2 in the M.V.C. When asked about the team's performance this year, Coach Headland replied, "We had a very excellent team this year. We would have won the conference if we had beaten Canfield. The team played very tough and physical, and there was never a game that they didn't play hard."

Girls' Volleyball

The J.V.'s beat Girard (15-3, 15-11), Stow (10-15, 15-11, 15-1), Beaver Local (15-2, 3-15, 15-2), Campbell (15-3, 3-15, 15-0), Canton McKinley (6-15, 15-11, 15-6), Canfield (15-8, 15-10) and Wellsville (15-5, 3-15, 16-14) to finish the season.
