Well, it's that time again. Time to hang up the spikes and toss the helmet. Once again basketball season has started and Salem is out to show the area what they are made of. After a dismal season last year, winning only eight games, the Quakers opened at home against M.V.C. rival Warren J.F.K.

The Ouakers came out ready to play that night and got things going from the start. Tom Wiggers opened with the first bucket of the year off the fast break and the Quakers never looked back. The defense was red hot and forced J.F.K. to commit many turnovers in the 73-57 win.

Seniors Tim Steffen and Burt Capel led the defensive front while Bill Kress scooped up the rebounds. Scoring wise, the key word was balance. Wiggers and Kress had 19 points each, Brooke Pidgeon had 15, and Steffin had 14.

Pidgeon made it all happen on. offense by taking command of the

team. He had some passes that would have made Magic Johnson stop and look. Juniors Lance Miller and Charlie Honeywell got some good playing time also and could prove to be a factor in later games.

After the superb opening the Quakers had to face a quick Youngstown South team. South was a more experienced team and much faster. The Quakers hung in there though and made a game of it. The shooting was the downfall of the team. All the shots that fell the previous night were landing like bricks. With determination, however, the Quakers kept it close until the end when they lost 61-47.

Because South is one of the fastest teams that they will face, Salem should be proud of the game they played. Kress had another great night with 16 points and 13 rebounds. Wiggers was next in line for Salem with 9 points.

shooting. Salem had trouble with the outside shots the whole game. When asked to comment, Tim Steffen had this to say, "Outside shooting is our main problem right now, but it will get better as the year goes on.'

The Quakers went to Campbell for another M.V.C. showdown and proved they still can win. Salem outhustled the Red Devils and shot much better. The defense was once again a big help by shutting down the Campbell offense and the Quakers won this one 69-53.

Steffen and Capel were once more hot on defense and got great help from Miller and Pidgeon. Miller came into his own tht night and managed to sink 15 points. In games to come, he will be a major part of the team. Steffen, who pulled a hamstring muscle, gave 11 points to the strong team effort. Wiggers was the big gun on offense though with another great game and 19 points.

He also had a three pointer; those shots will come in handy in the later games. He has managed to get at least a three pointer in every game so far, one bright star in the shooting department.

Bill Kress was plagued with foul trouble and never really was a factor on the offense but still managed to rip down quite a few rebounds. The team showed balance here and proved they can win with a key player on the bench. The next test would be Youngstown East, without the injured Tim Steffen.

The Quakers ended up losing 63-56 in a gallant effort. So far they are 2-0 in the M.V.C. and 0-2 against Youngstown teams. The Quakers will have a chance to prove themselves later; they have one of the toughest schedules around.

Pidgeon was hot on offense with 19 points and was helped considerably by Miller with 13 and Wiggers, who had 11. The shooting was off again, but the Quakers still kept it close until the end. They played their hearts out against the 2-1 Golden Bears who shot extremely well.

There is a large room in the SHS that everybody visits at least once a day, what room is this? Our school cafeteria!

The director of the cafeteria is Mr. Havelock who was formerly a chef at Mariott's Restaurant for 6 years, and also at Lee Win Restaurant (now Salem Hills). Mr. Havelock also attended Galvaston Community College, where he studied restaurant management and accounting.

Mr. Havelock has been working here at the SHS for 14 months now. When asked how he feels about the switch from a restaurant chef to cafeteria director, he replied, "Working as a chef gets better pay, but you also do twice the work; besides. I like the kids here.'

Mr. Havelock has already made a few changes in the cafeteria. One such change is the vending machines. He began use of the machines hoping to make it easier for students who only want something to drink or something to snack on. Students no longer have to wait in line for Fruit Punch, Iced Tea, crackers, or other such items. However, Federal regulations do not allow carbonated beverages to be sold to students.

Mr. Havelock also tried ordering

add two french friers and two convection ovens to the SHS kitchen, to replace some old equipment. But new equipment is expensive and these things would cost approximately \$15,000. For the most part, Mr. Havelock feels the kitchen has been maintained well.

Mr. Havelock tries to plan the menus using the items that almost everybody likes. French fries are a big item, selling usually eight cases a day, another favorite is mashed potatoes. There are also items that don't sell well. Mr. Havelock tries to avoid these items, such as tuna noodles. He also tries to replace them with new items, such as Nacho Supreme; which we will be tasting for the first time this month.

New and better lunches take more planning and preparing, and inevitably more money. That is the reason for the 10 cent price increase this year. Ten cents is quite reasonable considering it is the first price raise in eight years.

Mr. Havelock says, "Students are customers the same as in a restaurant." And he does his best to treat us in that respect.

A special holiday season is upon us where friends and family gather together to share in the holiday spirit. Sometimes we neglect or forget about those that are less fortunate than ourselves but local organizations, clubs, churches, factories, and schools haven't forgotten and are involved in helping these families that need their help.

One such organization is the Salvation Army, which takes applications from different families around the Salem area and then supplies them with a complete outfit for each child and a toy for each. Also, a basket of food is available.

Church Women United are working toward getting different necessities children may need along with helping the Salvation Army

and Rotary Club supply the clothing for infants and children up to the age of 14. These include such things as hats, gloves, or mittens, pajamas, socks, and undergarments.

Schools and colleges are also involved in collecting nonperishable canned foods and giving them to the Red Cross. Colleges such as YSU put up what is called a Star Tree. On the back of each star is a child's name and you sponsor that child by buying him a gift that costs a little over five dollars. Then the school delivers the gifts.

A spokesperson at the Salvation Army said, "If any donations can be made, please contact the Salvation Army, Red Cross, and the Church Women United; it would be greatly appreciated."

For this issue Mr. Rabell spoke with the QUAKER on three topics of student conduct. These topics concerned avoiding absences, smoking on school property, and being harrassed by other students. According to Mr. Rabell all students should look at their Salem High Student folders and review the rules on tardiness and accumulated absences. For a year long class tardiness up to six times is up to the teacher's discretion. The seventh time there is one night's detention. The eighth time two nights detention and a letter sent home to parents warning of a suspension next time. The ninth time there is one day school suspension, and the tenth time there is three days suspension. Students should check the other rules for tardiness for semester courses, for arriving during period one, and arriving after period one.

There are further rules for absence from school. No more than 13 days in a semester class can be missed. Therefore, for a full year, a student cannot miss more than twenty-six days.

Mr. Rabell also said there is to be no smoking on school property and those caught with tobacco products will be punished. On the subject of harrassment Mr. Rabell said do not fight back, but go to either a teacher, the principal's office, or a guidance counselor and the problem will be dealt with by the proper authorities.
