Anorexia: It's A Problem

Some people say celebrities have it all. That may be so in some instances, but for Karen Carpenter that wasn't the case.

"The Karen Carpenter Story," produced by Richard Carpenter, was aired on CBS, January 1st. The movie enlightens people on the terrible disease, anorexia nervosa. This is an emotional disorder which often leads to self-induced vomiting and taking large doses of laxatives. It is often called self-starvation with a resultant loss of 25% or more of the body weight.

Karen was not one for vomiting, but she did take an awful lot of laxatives. Her doctor, Steven Levenkron said, in an interview with a People Weekly reporter, "She fought a tough battle and won." But Karen Carpenter died of heart failure on February 4, 1983. Her body just could not take the loss of all of that weight and then gaining it

The prime period of anorexia nervosa is 12-19 years of age. One in 100 young women in the age group actually develops anorexia, but 20 percent of this population manifest at least one symptom of an eating

This disease often occurs in

attractive girls from affluent families who need to please their parents. They often want perfection and high achievements in school. That also is why people may refer to anorexia nervosa as "The good girl's disease." They usually keep their emotions inside and take care of other people; not themselves. A person with anorexia nervosa is often obsessed with weight and weighing oneself. Another symptom may be excessive dieting with elimination of some foods from the diet.

A few Nutra-Bolic weight reduction employees agreed "People are dieting more than ever before. Teenagers especially, should stay away from fast food because they contain a lot of sodium. The junk food is bad for the body, as well as the complexion." One woman also stated that teenagers are not exercising enough especially if they are not involved in any kind of sport or activity. This just goes to show that dieting is a life-or-death decision, so do it under a doctor's supervision or at least use your head and eat wisely!

Salem Back on B-Ball Map

Salem is back on the basketball map. They have been playing like the team that won the M.V.C. with a 19 and 3 record in 1985. The team elevated its record to 11 and 4 on an 8 game winning streak before losing a nail biter to M.V.C. leader Canfield last Friday.

Salem was looking for its fifth straight victory when it entered JFK January 14 but it wasn't going to be easy. Salem led the Eagles for most of the game but they hung in there and made Salem make some turnovers to let them back in it. During the fourth quarter there were lead changes. During the stretch Lance Miller made some clutch oneand-one free throws which put Salem up by 3 with 30 seconds left. JFK's Bill McCallister was fouled and calmly sunk two foul shots. The Eagles got the ball back on a missed one-and-one attempt. Allen Ryan was fouled with 2 seconds left. He calmly sunk the first foul shot to tie the game and then bounced the other one off the rim as time ran out. Overtime came and Salem buried the hatchet on JFK beating them 79 to 73. Coach Spack said, "I feel this game is the turning point of the season because the kids know they can win the tough games on the road." Salem placed four guys in double figures and also had good

The Quakers' next game was home against a Campbell team that

beat Canfield earlier. Salem was going for their sixth straight victory but fell behind early 8 to 2 in the first quarter. Quaker then took control and never looked back. For the first time this season each starter reached double figures which is an impressive stat. Tom "Money" Wiggers led them with 14 points while Lance Miller followed with 13. That has been the story of Salem's season, the ability to have different players to lead the team in scoring. Coach Spack said, "I don't know how I would play them if I was an opposing coach because each starting member can score 20."

Salem's next matchup was more like a prize fight against Poland. The game started out like nobody wanted to score. Each team shot under 50 percent with Poland shooting a meager 27 percent from the field and 26 percent from the line. Salem could have been looking forward to their game against West Branch but came away with a rough victory. Quakers proved they were not a bunch of wimps and could play some tough, hard basketball. The win was their seventh in a row as they beat the Bulldogs by 18 points. Tim Steffen led the charge with 11 points as Salem continued to have balanced scoring. Thank the team defense for this victory because the offense was not going to win any awards that night.

Q. — Why did you choose Math as your teaching career?


