Therefore, as a firm believer that larger is not always better, in this instance, I vote a big yes for Salem.



 Salem's offensive and defensive lines are light weight, compared to last year. How does this affect the team?


A. — Right now we are getting off the line better. They are more aggressive and are doing a good job both offensively and defensively.

A. — Our passing and running games are both equally strong. Lance Miller runs the offense and passes just as efficiently. Austin and White are good backs, along with good receivers. We can do both


Q. — The football team seems to be more together, such as in the separate lunch room, why?

Struggles for winning season

The 1989 Salem Quaker Football is 3-5 with only two more games to go in the season. Their first game of the season was against Cleveland South. The Quakers started off strong winning 8-0. Leading rushing was Jason Austin, 26 carries for 124 yards, and Chris White 12 carries for 84 yards. Receiving was George Bigham, 3 receptions for 24 yards, and Chris White, 1 catch for 17 yards. Salem had a total offense of 262 yards and 13 first downs.

Salem did not do so well their second game, against the Marlington Dukes. Nothing seemed to go right for the Quakers, having lost 4 out of 5 of their own fumbles, and having lost a total of 60 yards due to penalties. On the lighter side, they had 144 yards rushing, Austin for 131, Lance Miller for 7 and White for 6. Shawn Binsley had 5 catches for 46 yards, Bigham, 1 catch for 22 yards, and White, 1 reception for 10 yards. Nick Schneider had an interception return for 23 yards.

The Quakers sprang back to life in an exciting game against Hudson Western Reserve, winning 22-20. The Quakers played a strong game all four quarters. Leading the rushing was Austin, 18 carries for 89 yards, and White, 7 carries for 15 yards. Brian Martin caught 4 passes for 87 yards, Binsley grabbed 3 passes for 32 yards, and Matt Schramm caught 2 for 17 yards. Salem had 15 first downs and 262 total yards offense and completed 63 percent of their passes.

The next game did not go Salem's way, losing 34-0 against Campbell Memorial. The Campbell defense proved to be too mighty for the Quakers, holding them to just 62 total yards offense and only 4 first downs. Salem's own defense did not do so well either, by letting Campbell have a total of 376 yards offense. The combined yardage of the receivers was only 24 yards, led by Binsley, who had 16 yards in receptions. Salem's rushing game had a rough night also, only having 21 yards from Austin, 8 yards from White, 11 yards from Lance Penick and 5 yards from Mike Grande. In the end Salem got shut out 34 to 0.

In the 6th game of the season, the Quakers lost 24-7 against Warren J.F.K. The Quakers, with only 75 yards rushing and 92 yards passing could not keep up with the vigorous pace that J.F.K. was setting. Catching passes

for the Quakers were Binsley 4 for 27 yards, Bigham 2 for 15 yards, Penick 1 for 47 yards and Grande 1 carry for 4 yards. Miller threw 14 passes for 39 yards having only 6 of them completed, and Nick Schneider threw 2 passes for 53 yards having both of them completed.

Salem totally dominated the game against Poland, shutting them out 27-0. Leading the Quakers in receiving were Bigham 2 catches for 33 yards, followed by Schramm and White with 1 catch each for 16 and 13 yards. Miller returned an interception 20 yards for a


