Changes in the Disciplinary Code

As the new year begins, there are a lot of questions about the disciplinary code and other policies. A major change made this year was the school dress code. Students are permitted to wear walking shorts, golf shorts, dress shorts, culottes, jams, Bermuda shorts, and skorts. Shorts that are unacceptable are biking shorts, boxer shorts, swing trunks, cut-off jeans or sweats, gym shorts, sanitaris, lay shorts, or spandex. Students who wear improper shorts will be subject to disciplinary procedure. Another change is the Driver's License Revocation. Licenses may be revoked of any student under 18 if the student drops out of school, is habitually truant, or has been expelled or suspended from school for the use or possession of alcohol or drugs. Any student having possession of a weapon or a look-alike weapon can receive at least five days of suspension. Another rule that will be upheld is the

attendance procedure. Any student missing 13 days in one semester or 26 days over the year may or may not receive credit for the class withheld. A parent must call the school to report the student's absence. Otherwise, the home will be contacted by telephone or postcard. An absence excuse must be presented signed by a parent with the definite reason for absence and the days he/she missed. A yellow slip will be given to the student and this must be shown to each of their teachers. An early excuse must be taken to the cafeteria the day early dismissal is desired. Failure to follow the attendance procedure will result in referral to the Columbian Juvenile Court. Mr. Rabell would like to remind all students to look over this year's folder and read the Code of Conduct given at the start of the year. These changes were made to make Salem High School a better place to be.

The most often asked question from students and their parents is "How do I go about obtaining financial aid?" There are two critical steps that, if followed correctly, could result in a considerable amount of financial aid.

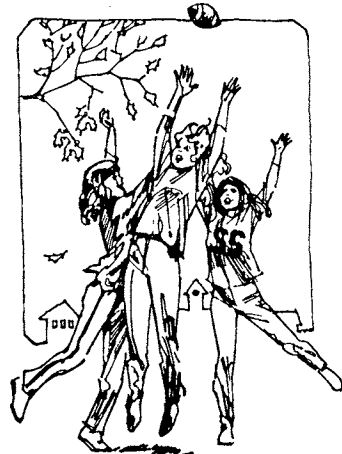

STEP 2: Parents should file their income tax as soon as possible and KEEP COPIES. The figures from the income tax are needed in order to apply for a financial analysis. This is done by filling out a Financial Analysis Form. The FAF form should be sent after January 1, 1993. Mailing the FAF form early will improve the chances of being accepted and obtaining increased financial aid.

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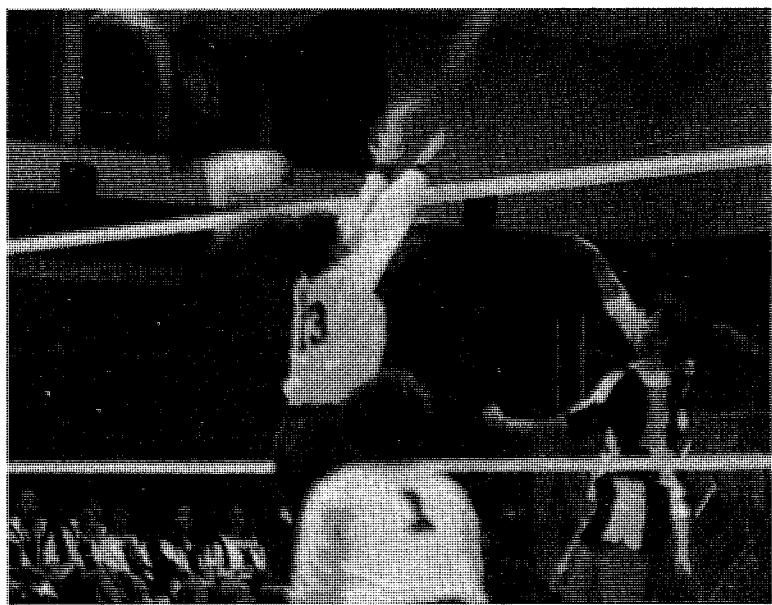

Quaker Volleyball Team still undefeated

The second ranked Salem Girls Volleyball Team has been dominating the courts with a 17-0 record. Team goals, overall good attitude, and pure desire have helped the Lady Quakers bump, set, and spike their way to a perfect record.

The Lady Quakers' two big highlights this year so far have been the defeat of formerly second in the state, Canton South, 15-3, 11-15, and 15-12 for their eighth win of the year; and the defeat of rival, West Branch, 17-15, 12-15, and 15-6 for their eleventh win of the season. 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Quaker Football Having a Tough Season

The Salem Quaker football team has seen some tough times this year. The Quakers have played a tough schedule, including a Division II powerhouse (Louisville), and a state champion (Warren J.F.K.) As one would expect, the season has been a rough one.

The Quakers opened the season at home against a tough East Liverpool team. Most predicted a loss, but the Quakers hung in there to win in overtime. A broken play on a Salem field goal attempt late in the fourth quarter led to overtime. In overtime, Salem got the ball first and scored a touchdown on senior quarterback Doug Exline's pass to senior receiver Mike Bigham. Salem kicked the extra point. Then, East Liverpool got the ball and also scored a touchdown. However, they went for the two point conversion and failed, giving Salem a 28-27 win. Exline had a good night, throwing for 23 yards, three touchdowns, and no interceptions on 10 completions of 15 attempts. His favorite target was senior Jason Aldom, who had six catches for 167 yards and two touchdowns. Salem's rushing attack was led by senior tailback Jeff Andres with 134 yards on 24 rushes, senior fullback Bob Pitts with 38 yards on nine rushes, and senior tailback Mike Huzyak's 11 yards on one rush.

Salem's next game was at Marlinton with the Marlinton Dukes. The Quakers were missing Andres because of an ankle injury. The Quakers led 20-8 going into the fourth quarter, but Marlinton was able to overcome Salem with two fourth quarter touchdowns, defeating the Quakers 22-20. Exline passed for 147 yards and one touch-

down on 10 completions for 23 attempts. Pitts led Salem in receiving with 58 yards and one touchdown on three catches. Senior receiver Ryan Keating contributed with 47 yards on five catches. Exline led the Quakers in rushing with 40 yards and one touchdown on seven rushes. Sophomore running back Jake Cook helped out gaining 28 yards and one touchdown on six rushes.

In week three, the Quakers battled Division I powerhouse, Louisville, on a stormy night. Salem held an 8-7 lead at halftime, but Louisville's offense took its toll on the Quaker defense, winning the game 27-8. Exline had an off night, as he was picked off four times on only 44 yards, completing five for 14 attempts. The rushing attack was led by sophomore running back Corey Belaney's 50 yards and one touchdown on five rushes.

Next, the Quakers lost a close game against Campbell Memorial. The Quakers were ahead 7-6 toward the end of the first half. After a penalty, Campbell had the ball inside their own 20 with under a minute left. Then Campbell running back Eric Weaver went on an 81 yard touchdown run. This big play was the difference as Salem lost 12-7. Exline had a better night, passing for 115 yards and a touchdown on 11 completions for 23 attempts. Andres led the Salem receivers with 65 yards and one touchdown on five catches. Keating had 29 yards on two catches. Pitts led in rushing with 41 yards on 12 carries.

In the fifth week, the Quakers had to play Division IV state champion Warren J. F. K. Warren's offense was too much for the Quakers. Warren scored

down on its first two offensive plays from scrimmage and never looked back, beating Salem 48-12. The Salem offense moved the ball well in the first half, but they could get nothing consistent going. Exline passed for 153 yards and two touchdowns on 12 completions out of 28 attempts. He hooked up with six different receivers for two catches a piece. The were Andres, Pitts, Huzyak, Aldom, and senior Chad Rhodes. The two touchdown passes were to Andres for 49 yards and Pitts for 30 yards. Pitts also led the rushing attack with 65 yards on eight rushes.

"Obviously, no one likes to be 1-4," said Coach Washinko. "We're optimistic for the second half of the season. The players have responded that well to some rough games." This was evident in the Quakers' 20-14 win against Poland last week, beginning the second half of the season.

The Quakers broke a four game losing streak, and did it in a thrill that saw Jeff Andres score three touchdowns and Doug Exline make a game-saving tackle.

The Jayvee Quakers have tied both of their games. The team is composed primarily of sophomores and juniors who do not get much varsity playing time. Coach Washinko says he feels good about simply having a JV team, especially when bigger schools such as Campbell Memorial and Girard do not. "It provides the players with valuable experience," he said.

The varsity team has four more games, including Struthers, Beaver Local, and Girard away, and Canfield home on Oct. 30.
