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
Brown Wins State Crown in a "Big" Way

saving "big things come in small packages" must have been talking about Salem freshman cross-country runner Jenni Brown. Brown not only won the Ohio Div. I Girls Cross Country Championship on Saturday, Nov. 7, she also won in a way no other runner ever has. Her time of 17:15:3 is the fastest in the history of state championships. There wasn't a runner in sight as Brown entered the Scioto Downs Racetrack in Columbus, to the amazement of the crowd. The previous record of 17:15.6 was held by Kristy Orre of Clayton Northwest. Speculation has it that Brown's time is one of the top 10 times this year in the country. Brown will compete against runners from the Midwest in the Regional Cross-Country Championship on Nov. 28 at the University of Wisconsin Parkside. A finish in the top eight there will qualify her for the National High School Kinney Cross-County Championship to be held Dec. 12 in San Diego.

Sexual Harassment in School

Sexual harassment happens all the time. It is all around us. Some people don't know what is so wrong with it or maybe don't really know what it is.

There are two basic definitions of sexual harassment. First of all, it is when submission to it is a basis on whether you pass or fail. For example, a teacher says, "You do this sexual favor for me and I'll give you an A. If not I'll fail you." A second form of sexual harassment causes a hostile environment. Meaning that the atmosphere in school is so uncomfortable that equal treatment of sexes is impossible. In this situation there does not have to be any physical touching or actual sex play.

Some people may think of it as a form of awkward romantic expression, but that is wrong. It might lead a woman to think that it is her fault for the way she behaves or dresses. Through harassment men devalue a woman's role by calling attention to her sexuality. Men often believe that a few dirty words or jokes or pictures are harmless; women often feel they are threatening or de-

In the AAUW's report: "How Schools Shortchange Girls", one study

said that 65% of the girls interviewed had been sexually harassed by peers or

People are working now to educate people about this problem. There are seminars for teachers to help them to recognize sexual harassment of teachers by administrators and of student by their teachers and peers. A recent Supreme Court case of Christine Franklin may help push for more education. Franklin, a former Georgia high school student, is seeking \$11 million in damages from her old school district. She says that during the months of helping her teacher grade papers, "he asked her about her six life, confessed stories about his own, and eventually seduced her." The high court ruled that students have the right to sue their school and school officials for damages caused by sexual harassment. Schools will have to develop formal policies for dealing with such cases to avoid liability.

People need to learn more about sexual harassment. Become more educated on what you can do if it happens to you and what your rights are. People need to learn how their behavior affects

The Bradford School in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania recently gave a United States Department of Labor forecast of the top five career fields by the year 2005. The occupations were respectable and, to me, perhaps surprising.

The number one field was administration and management. This consists of such occupations as accountants, construction inspectors, financial managers, general management and top executives, hotel managers, personnel specialists, purchasing agents, underwriters, and wholesales and retail buy-

The number two occupational field was arts and communications. This field is made up of actors and directors, architects, broadcast announcers, dancers, graphic designers, musicians, newspaper reporters, photographers and camera operators, public relations, and writers and editors.

The third most common occupation is administrative support. This is such people as bank tellers, bookkeepers, cashiers, computer operators, postal clerks, reservation agents, secretaries, shipping clerks, and typists and word processors.

The fourth most popular field was construction. People such as bricklayers, carpenters, carpet installers, cement masons, drywall workers, electricians, glaziers, insulation workers, painters and paper hangers, plasterers, plumbers and pipefitters, roofers, sheetmetal workers, and tilesetters belong in this category.

The fifth most common or popular occupational field was education and social work. Child care workers, college faculty, counselors, education administrators, elementary teachers, librarians, secondary teachers, social workers, and teacher aids are placed under this category.

Abortion: The Right From the Wrong

Abortion is the killing of an unborn baby. Too many teens in today's generation are using abortion as a form of birth control and too many teens are taking this issue too lightly.

Abortion can emotionally and physically scar a young women for the rest of her life. If not done correctly

The decision of Roe vs. Wade in 1973 made abortions safe and legal. By the early 80s, pro-life activists blocked clinics, harassed women, issued death threats, set fire to and bombed clinics. In 1989, the federal government argued to abolish a woman's right to choose by overturning Roe vs. Wade. The courts shocked us by giving states the right to uphold restrictions. In 1990, abortion was finally made illegal unless a mother's life was in danger, the fetus was dis-

abled, rape, or incest. It's a proven fact that 70 percent of women who have abortions want children in the future. If this is true, then why are so many teens having abortions? In 1987, there were 1,015,000 teenage pregnancies; 407,000 ended in abortion. That leaves 608,000 that chose something other than abortion.

Athlete Killers

A serious problem exists among athletes in this country. It effects high school, college, and pro athletes. Most of these athletes simply want to excel or have a good time. The majority of these athletes will ruin their lives and some will die from it. This problem is drug abuse.

First of all, one of the most commonly abused drugs is anabolic steroids. Anabolic steroids cause an increase in muscle mass, resulting in a greater amount of strength. Therefore, the athletes who abuse anabolic steroids are usually athletes who compete in "power" sports. These sports include bodybuilding, football, track and field, weightlifting, swimming, and most other competitive sports. Steroids are detectable in urine and blood tests, however there is no mandatory random drug testing for high school athletes. If steroid abuse goes undetected, it can cause acne and baldness in men, irreversible prominence of male characteristics (deep voice, body and facial hair) in women, and increased risk of heart and liver disease and sterility in both sexes. It is also possible there is a link between anabolic steroid abuse and cancer. Unfortunately, this was made known to the world by the death of Lyle Alzado, former NFL defensive end. Alzado circulated him self on the talk show circuit when he learned of his terminal, inoperable brain tumors. He links the tumors to his steroid abuse while playing in the NFL. He did this to inform athletes of the danger of steroid abuse. He was a depressing example of what steroid abuse can do to a person. His body, once muscular and massive, was ravaged, as he hobbled along with the aid of his wife. He said he used steroids as a result of his desire to win. The sight of a once great athlete, now a shadow of his former self because of steroid abuse, set an example in death to young athletes in their lives.

The other most widely abused group of drugs is amphetamines. This group

includes cocaine, heroin, and other 'uppers". Amphetamines accelerate the heartbeat by attacking the respiratory center of the brain and the heart directly. These drugs are used in a couple of ways. One way is in sporting competition. They are abused in sports in which steady nerves and are not required. Sports amphetamines are abused in include running events, swimming, football, and other such sports. It increases heartbeat and respiration, enabling the athlete to move and react quicker. Secondly, amphetamines, especially cocaine, are used as "party" drugs. Sometimes an athlete will be drawn into cocaine use at a party. Part of what makes amphetamines so deadly is their different effects on different people. A small amount of cocaine many get one person high, but kill someone else. The ways these drugs kill are causing spasms in coronary arteries to induce cardiac arrest, causing continuous seizures, irritating the heart, causing an erratic heartbeat, causing strokes, and causing an allergic reaction so severe that death results. The most publicized cocaine death of an athlete was Len Bias. Bias was a first round draft pick of the Boston Celtics in 1986. Bias achieved fame as a basketball standout at the University of Maryland. One night in his dorm room, Bias decided to celebrate using cocaine. It was reportedly his first experience with the drug, and it would be his last. Bias's

heart could not handle the acceleration. He went into cardiac arrest and died. Doctors were surprised that a cocaine concentration of 6.5 milligrams per liter would kill an athlete like Bias, since his heart was in such good condition. He brought his career and his life crashing to a tragic halt.

In conclusion, drugs have a history of killing or hurting athletes. The deaths of Alzado and Bias should make athletes consider if the shortcut to fame or the good time is worth the end result. Most athletes should find that they should excel by hard work, not drugs. Kristin Doyle - making sure it was not me to get saran wrapped.



Child abuse is a very real problem that everyone must face. The American family and home are perhaps more violent than any other American institution or setting with the exception of the military, and then only in time of war. The abuse stems from the thinking that parents own their children, therefore they may treat them as they please. But the number of children dying from abuse is vast and increasing. In fact, it is the most common cause of death in children today, outnumbering those caused by any of the infectious diseases, leukemia or automobile accidents.

When an innocent, vulnerable child is brutalized by a person he or she may love or trust, child abuse occurs. Four categories are commonly used to classify different kinds of abuse: physical violence, physical and emotional neglect, emotional abuse, and sexual exploitation. Physical violence implies physically harmful action directed against the child. Neglect, both emotional and physical, is the failure of the parent to act properly in safeguarding the health, safety, and well-being of the child. Sexual abuse means the exploitation of immature children through such actions as incest, molestation, and rape

Child abuse in the United States is not a rare disease. In 1987, approximately 2.3 million cases of child abuse and neglect were reported to authorities. The U.S. National Center of Child Abuse and Neglect reports that 40 percent of those identified as being abused or neglected are under 5 years of age; many are infants. Many so-called missing children are actually runaways and are escaping homes in which they were

Some of the signs are: the child will seem unduly afraid of his parents, the child is unusually fearful generally, the child appears to be undernourished, the child is dressed inappropriately for weather conditions, the child is described as "different" or "bad" by the parents, child takes over role as parent, and the child is either destructive and aggressive or passive and withdrawn.

Perhaps the most crucial response to child abuse is providing emotional therapy for the victim. The child needs to learn that the abuse was not his or her fault, and to find other important adult role models. Places to get help are: Parents Anonymous, National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse, and The Child Welfare League

of America. Some of the information for this article was taken from the books "Hear the Children Crying" -"The Child Abuse Epidemic," and "Child Abuse."

SHS Drivers to be "tagged"

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
"Study Says Dropout Rate is Improving"

The second goal of the National Education Goals calls for a 90 percent increase in the high school graduation rate by the year 2000. The U.S. Department of Education claims in a recent study that there is a growing number of high school drop out returning to school to receive their diplomas. The study says that 74 percent of the students finish by age 19, and 86 percent by age 22. Only 75.5 percent of the class of '91 in Ohio graduated on time. The Freedom of Choice

In 1973 a Supreme Court ruling in the case Roe vs. Wade, struck down state laws against abortion in the first trimester of pregnancy. In 1976 a Missouri law requiring a husband's consent for his wife to have an abortion was

These are just two of the major Supreme Court rulings about abortion. Other regulations requiring such things as parental notification for minors and a 24-hour waiting period before the procedure have been decided by each state. In Ohio there is a parental consent law for minors wishing to receive an abortion. The laws regarding abortion in this country change rapidly and people on both sides of the issue must come up with new arguments to support their position.

A woman's right to do whatever she wants to her body is often debated, especially in the case of an unwanted pregnancy. If a woman wants to have an abortion, she should be permitted to do so. No one questions a person's right to have plastic surgery or to get a tattoo.

I recently surveyed 25 students here at Salem. I asked the following question: 1. Absolutely no legal abortions,

regardless of the circumstances, 32 percent (eight) students agreed. 2. Legal abortions for certain circumstances; such as rape, incest, or if the pregnancy threatens the mother's life, 24 precent (six) students agreed with this option. The majority of the students surveyed agreed with my final question: 3. Legal abortions for any woman who wants one, regardless of her reasons, 44 percent of the students said that they agreed with this position.

If abortions are banned, the threat of the number of "back alley" abortions and the number of woman dying from them will greatly increase. Women choose this type of abortion because they feel this is the only choice they have in getting the procedure done. Keeping abortions legal will virtually prevent this from happening in the United States.

The parental consent law also poses problems. Teenage girls generally feel that they cannot tell their parents or request permission from them to have the procedure done. Often times these girls are afraid that their parents will feel let down or ashamed of them. Some

girls say that they will be kicked out of the house. These reasons often send young girls to unqualified people for a very dangerous abortion. While keeping abortions legal in this country will not make everyone happy, it will keep the women who decide on this option away from any of the possible dangers of an illegal abortion.

The girls' team loses one senior varsity member, Greenamyer, and should return strong again next year.

On the boys' side, they celebrated a very successful year. The boys won the MVC championship, placed second at the district meet, second at the regional meet, and third at the state meet. They came in behind Bay Village, last year's state champion, and Ashtabula Edgewood. Jason Julian, sophomore, came in ninth overall, Dan Nye, junior, finished 27th, Mark Rea, junior, 66th, Sean Spanbauer, sophomore, 72nd, Russ Zornick, junior, 81st, Jeff Lutz, freshman, and Carl Sommers, junior completed the varsity scoring. The team's overall success has quieted the speculation in that Salem cross country would have to have a rebuilding, losing year after losing all five of last year's varsity team to graduation. Football Finishes a Rough Season

The Salem Quaker varsity football team had a rough season in 1992. Although the team had put forth the effort, it resulted in close losses. In fact, six of Salem's eight loses came by eight points or less. "It's disappointing when the team puts out a lot of effort, and we didn't have the scoreboard to back us up," said Coach Washinko.

In their seventh contest of the season, Salem was pitted against Struthers. With under a minute left in the game the Quakers led 20 -15 and had Struthers facing a fourth down and 15 yards to go. Struthers made a first down. Then on their first down play, the ball was handed off to Steve DiBacco, who pitched to Mike Johnson. Johnson ran 35 yards for the winning touchdown. Despite the loss, Salem's offense executed well, racking up 307 yards of total offense. Salem's rushing attack was responsible for 286

yards. Most of that total belonged to senior tailback, Jeff Andres. Andres rushed for 220 yards, the fifth highest total in Salem football history. Doug Exline, senior, threw two completions for 21 yards, one interception, and rushed for two touchdowns in the process.

The next game showcased Salem against Beaver Local in their first meeting. The game ended with Beaver Local making a two point conversion with 2:40 left to win 28 - 27. This was a result of Beaver Local having their offensive weapon, Jake Williams. Football analysts say he is possibly the area's best running back. He showed it against Salem, gaining 188 yards and four touchdowns on 23 rushes, upping his total for the year at that point to 1415 yards. However, the Quakers did not stand in awe of this player and his team. Salem showed they also knew how to move

the ball, and how to stop it. Andres ran for 135 yards and two touchdowns. Jason Aldom, senior, caught six balls for 116 yards and two touchdowns. Ryan Keating, senior, had two catches for 32 yards. The defense was led by Mike Bigham, senior, and Exline with one interception a piece.

In the final home game, Salem played Canfield. It was a game dominated by defense, and Canfield managed to come out on top. Aldom had a 13 yard interception return. Exline passed for 74 yards, one touchdown, and one interception on seven completions out of 16 attempts. Corey Belaney, sophomore, led the rushing attack with 44 yards on six rushes. Andres had 33 yards on 13 rushes. He also had 24 yards on two catches.

In the season finale, Salem faced Mahoning Valley Conference rival Girard. It was a tough game, but Girard managed to top Salem 18 - 13. Bob Pitts, senior, led the rushing attack with 72 yards on eight carries. Belaney rushed for 16 yards on two carries, and Exline rushed for 12 yards, one touchdown on five carries. Aldom had a five yard touchdown catch.

Salem finished the year at 2 - 8 overall, and 1-5 in the MVC. "It hurts when the team plays well, puts out a lot of effort, and still loses," said Washinko. He added, "We played well this year, and we'll miss our seniors."

The JV Quakers finished 0 - 4 - 1. The concept of having a JV team is to get everyone some playing time and game experience. The team is comprised of sophomores and juniors who do not get much varsity playing time. "The point of competition is to win, but we like to make sure everyone gets to play," said Washinko of the JV team.

The freshman team finished 4-2-3, winning the MVC with a record of 3 - I - 2 in the conference. "That's quite a turn around, considering last year's freshmen team was 1 - 7," said Coach Headland. 


