Salem schools and the community enter the next era of communication

Still have that small hometown feel, but futuristic tools such as the World Wide Web and the information superhighway have settled into the daily lives of many local residents.

Salem City Hall, Salem Public Library, and even Salem Schools have undergone major changes recently in an attempt to upgrade the city's technology. Besides Salem students, city officials have also begun learning many new computer skills and technological advancements.

"Word processing, spreadsheets, database, e-mail/internet, and desktop publishing are the five things we want every student that graduates from Salem to be able to do," says Salem City Schools Technology Coordinator Steve Stewart. The schools plan to put almost two million dollars towards overhauling and upgrading the current computer system at the junior high and high school and adding computers and internet services at Buckeye, Prospect, Reilly, and Southeast schools.

Among the changes already made at the high school is the addition of 52 new computers in the computer lab, plus fully networked internet access in both the computer by Tracy Drake



lab and the library. The old computers, which were about 12 years old, are currently located in a separate computer lab on the second floor of the high school. Students can reach the internet through Netscape Navigator, and can send electronic mail through Salem's a-site in Youngstown, called ACCESS

Salem's a-site in Youngstown, called ACCESS. "We pay a fee to our a-site and they provide us with internet access for all of our students that have internet accounts," Stewart says. "Over 500 students have accounts right now." All local schools are connected to ACCESS, and can "surf the web" at no cost to the students.

The high school computer lab instructor, Audrey Dohar, says, "The lab has been better for classes because we have additional room and it's much more modern." The lab is currently using Windows but next year should convert to Windows '95 or Windows '97.

"We were not used to using Windows," Dohar says, "so it was modern technology for us, too. Windows is easier for a lot of students because it gives you a visual concept. You don't have to memorize all of the function keys."

Elaine Haddad, who teaches the new freshman applications course in the computer lab, agrees that the new equipment has been effective, saying, "The new equipment that's been brought in, such as the overhead projection panel, has been wonderful. The students can see things on the projection screen and then do it on their own computers."

Dohar says that even though most teachers prefer the old computers that they are more familiar with, some teachers have been forced to learn how to utilize the new technology because their students favor it. "Students prefer the new lab," says Dohar. "So that probably pushes more teachers to use the new equipment. Our language departments are using the lab now because of the new CD-ROMs and Netscape. Programs that we had before are easier to use with Windows. More classes are using [the lab] than before.

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Several teachers have blended the new technology with their classes. Earth science and physics teacher Ken Campradt had his students use the internet for research for Microsoft Power Point, another program the school system recently incorporated. Campradt says, "It's a great source for information because [the students] can transfer it straight to their computers."

The class that has enjoyed the new technology the most is the journalism staff, which produces the high school publication The Quaker. The staff uses Adobe desktop publishing, which was installed two years ago.

years ago. "We received a little state grant two years ago," Stewart says, "and we started with five computers, a scanner, and a laser printer. I think the school newspaper has grown a great deal this year. It's come a long way." "I can't even be-

"I can't even begin to say how much it's helped," says journalism adviser Jeff Ladner of the desktop publishing software. "We've cut our costs in half because we can now lay out everything ourselves." But Ladner says it was bound to happen because "we were 2 or 3 years behind other schools."

Needless to say, the high school computer labs, as Dohar says, "are being utilized quite well."

Besides the junior high and high school, the school district also plans to set up hardware, software,


and internet access in all of the elementary and middle schools. These plans are outlined in the Salem City Schools Technology Plan that was devised by the Educational Technology Team. This team is a committee consisting of teachers, students, parents, administrators, and area business leaders. The committee contrived 6 technological mission goals that the schools are attempting to fulfill through 1999 and beyond.

"The elementary schools are about ready to go through a tremendous change," Stewart says. "We're about ready to put almost half a million dollars in the elementary schools this summer."

The funding for the proposed hardware comes from SchoolNet Plus, a state fund whose goal is to provide one computer for every five students in the state of Ohio. Last summer, the district used the SchoolNet Plus fund to run electrical wire through every classroom in Buckeye and Reilly schools. This summer, Salem will do the same for Southeast and Prospect, and the junior high and high school will follow in 1998. Next year, Buckeye, Reilly and the junior high will also have access to e-mail accounts for all students.

The high school has also undergone curriculum changes by adding two new courses. These classes, Freshman Applications and Tech Prep are required semester courses for all ninth graders.

The applications



The tech prep course is "similar to career exploration," Stewart says. The tech prep room contains 13 modules. The students spend roughly two weeks at each module, which works with career fields such as CAD, animation, research and design, health services, and pneumatics. Stewart praises the class, saying, "[The students] can get a feel for what those jobs might be like."

Salem City Schools also has a web page which can be accessed at www. access.ohio.gov/ sale/sale.htm. "It's quite generic," Stewart says. "It hasn't been updated or upgraded. We want our students to do that."

Beginning next school year, each school building will offer a multimedia type class in which students will create and upkeep storyboard pages for their schools.

An ultimate goal for Stewart is to link the schools and the community together on the internet. "I'd like to see a link between the Salem City Schools home page and the city's web page." Stewart created a link to the city on the schools' web page even before Salem had a web page simply because his vision was that in the future there would be. "I hope that with the city's web page, they'll put a link to the schools as well."

But according to Leesa Lafferre-Thomas, the Salem mayor's secretary, the city's web page is now up and functional and does include a link to the Salem Schools home page. The Salem web site can be viewed at either www/ ci.salem.oh.us or www. Salemohio.com.

The City Hall has had computer networks in the Auditor's office and the Police Department since the 1980's. Each department has continually updated its hardware and software. The most recent advances include a computer system in the Fire Department and a system in the Mayor's office.

Lafferre-Thomas states that when she became the mayor's secretary, she realized the need for a computer to keep up with the demands of the record keeping, especially for the Mayors' Court (which no longer exists). She then went out and sought information on computer systems and court software programs. Lafferre-Thomas presented her findings to City Council, and in 1991, received an ordinance permitting the Mayor to collect bids for computer equipment. By April 1992, the system was operational, and has been upgraded as needed.

In the last two months, the city has entered into the superhighway with the help of Lafferre-Thomas and Digital Venues Inc., an organization that designs and offers technical support and advice to its customers. Digital Venues has their own Salem web page at www. salemohio. com. However, the web page that is being designed by Lafferre-Thomas is run

In the United States in 1992, 56 out of 100 people involved in car accidents were killed due to improper driving. Out of those 56 people, 17 were driving at an unsafe speed, 13 failed to yield, stop at a stop sign, or disregarded a signal, 8 drove left of center, 1 used improper overtaking when passing or changing lanes, 3 made an improper turn, and 1 fol-

lowed the car in front of them too closely. The other 13 people made some other improper driving mistake.* These statistics

This touching story was published in the Ann Landers column of the Salem News about a year ago. It is one of the many articles my mother cut out of the newspaper for me when I got my learner's permit and began driving. It was written by 17-yearold John Berrio and is entitled "Dead at Seventeen."

Agony claws my mind. I am a statistic. When I first got here, I felt very much alone. I was overwhelmed by grief, and I expected to find sympathy. I found no sympa-

thy. I saw only thousands

of others whose bodies were as badly mangled as mine. I was given a number and placed in a category. The category was called "Traffic Fatalities."

The day I died was an ordinary school day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too cool for the bus. I remember how I wheedled the car out of Mom. "Special favor," I pleaded. . "All the kids drive." When the 2:50 p.m. bell rang, I threw my books in my locker...free until tomorrow morning! I ran to the parking lot, excited at the thought of driving a car and being my own boss.

It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off - going too fast, taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my freedom and having fun. The last thing I remember was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard a crash and felt a terrific jolt. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out. I heard myself scream.

Suddenly, I awakened. It was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. I saw a doctor. My body was mangled. I was saturated with blood.

SHS is sniffed out

On Wednesday, April 16, uniformed officers along with the drug task force and their canine companions conducted a locker search for controlled substances at SHS.

Students barricaded in their second period classrooms peeked out their door windows as the drug sniffing dogs identified suspect lockers.

The dogs sniff out controlled substances in lockers by running their noses along the bottom of the lockers. When a dog smells a controlled substance such as marijuana or heroin, it identifies the locker by clawing at it with its paw. The officer holding the leash will bring the dog by the groups of lockers again. If the dog chooses the same locker again, it will be identified as a suspect locker. That locker and the lockers on each side of it are marked by stickers. One officer will stand in front of the lockers as the search continues. When the entire hallway has been sniffed by the dog, a uniformed officer will begin systematically searching the entire contents of the locker.

The officers were very thorough about their searches. They rummaged through coat pockets, lunch bags, and even flipped through pages of textbooks.

Many students may be outraged at the idea that officers can search their belongings. The Salem City School Board policy states, "The privacy of students or his or her belongings may not be violated by unreasonable search and seizure . . . without reasonable suspicion or in an unreasonable manner." However the board also states in its policy that it reserves the right to search anything inside their property such as lockers. This makes it legal for officers to search any belongings in a locker if they have reason to believe there may

Anime and America

When Americans think of cartoons and comic books, just a few narrow visions of what's out there usually come to mind. Crime-fighting superheros like Superman, Batman, and Spider-Man, daily strips like Ziggy and Peanuts, and Disney or Warner Brothers cartoons are just about all that most Americans know about the arts of comics and animation. Americans generally perceive cartoons and comics as being suitable only for children, who are, quite often, the intended audience. Teenagers and adults who enjoy comics and cartoons in America are often seen as dorky or child-

ish, and many Americans never pick up a comic book in their life. Comic books are also often seen as being only for boys. Most young American girls seem to have little to no interest in the superhero fare that dominates comic books in the U.S.

In Japan, however, all of America's misconceptions about comics and cartoons are put to rest, and these ideas are slowly trickling into the shores of the U.S. In Japan, manga (Japanese comics), and anime (Japanese cartoons)

are both severely different from the comics and cartoons Americans are used to seeing. While there is still superhero manga and cutesy children's anime in Japan, their comics and cartoons entertain a much broader audience. Virtually everyone in Japan reads comic books on a daily basis. Not the superhero type comics Americans are used to, but comics about anything and everything you can imagine. In Japan, there is manga and anime for small children, boys, girls, teenagers, men, women, laborers, businessmen, and everyone else. You can find Japanese manga about robots, ninjas, love, superheros, detectives, murder stories, humorous accounts of business, old age, or anything else, aliens, cute children's characters, and basically whatever it is you're looking for. A very large amount of Japan's entertainment comes from these art forms, so, unlike in the U.S., females and adults in Japan are never looked at as being weird for reading manga and watching anime.

Anime and manga usually involve very distinct, highly stylized artwork which no American comic or cartoon studio has yet to recreate successfully. The most popular style, used in everything from children's anime to some extremely adult situations, uses characters with very large eyes, exaggerated hair, and other features relatively small. Any emotion these characters show is always highly over exaggerated. When a character cries, rivers flow from their eyes. When they get nervous, fist-sized drops of sweat appear on their faces. If a character is angry, he or she becomes dark red, ten feet tall, and very devil-looking. The list goes on and on. Anime and manga characters' heights, weights, and other physical characteristics are also often highly exaggerated, their colors are overly bright or dull, and their lives are often somehow mystical or strange. Of course, not all anime and manga is drawn exactly the same, but the most popular stories and most Thursday May 8, 1997

of those that have made their way to the U.S. through translations all have many distinct similarities.

Anime and manga have been imported to U.S. television on several occasions, and still enters our shores on video and laserdisc, but with highly limited success. *Speed Racer*, about a family of race car drivers and their exploits with their high tech Mach 5 car was the first Japanese cartoon on U.S. television. It was followed by Voltron and Robotech, both about giant robots, in the eighties. These were both fairly successful, but were soon forgotten. Most recently, *Sailor Moon*, about teenage superhero girls, and

Dragon Ball, about a wide variety of odd characters and their search for the mystical dragon balls, have been featured on American television. Both of these cartoons earned large followings from American anime fans, but both ultimately failed due to a lack of promotion. Now, just about the only way for American anime fans to get their anime and manga fix is to pay around \$30 per episode for anime translated to English on video, or to search out a comic store that sells imported Japanese comic books.

Although anime and manga does have a small following in the U.S., the fans are generally quite obsessive with their cartoons, so the business is quite successful. Most fans will pay just about anything for the latest Japanese import of one of their favorites. Anime videos like Akira, Ghost in the Shell, Ranma 1/2, Project A-Ko, and others have all achieved great financial success in the U.S. through video and merchandise sales. Not as much success as in Japan, of course, but still enough to keep more videos coming in and to collect more and more American anime fans every day.

The purpose of the web page is to provide residents with a location to access information about the community and even to email messages to city officials. The web page also contains a list of Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's) that residents can view. "People are always asking questions like 'Where do I get a copy of birth certificate?' or 'Do you have an industrial park?' I put all of those types of questions on the FAQ page.

to a point. It markets our industrial park, and it markets tourism for our local businesses and downtown area."

The web page does not, however, endorse certain businesses or offer an opportunity for area businesses to advertise in the site. "We do not do any advertising on our site," Lafferre-Thomas says. Digital Venues's page, though, does contain advertisements for local companies.

C u r r e n t l y, Lafferre-Thomas is working on the industrial park page and is also having maps converted to computer images. In addition, she says tax forms are being installed onto the Income Tax page.

A common inquiry with designing a website is who is going to think to access that specific site. Stewart says, "That's the hard question." He says that people who are contemplating moving to Salem or setting up a business might access Salem's websites to get a feel for what the community is like. Lafferre-Thomas

Latterre-Thomas has increased the likeliness of accessing Salem's web page by registering with different search mechanisms. A search mechanism is a program in which a person, or subject they are searching for, and accesses a list of sites dealing with their desired topic. At the high school, many students log into Web Crawler when researching for an assignment to locate many sources of information.

Lafferre-Thomas has registered Salem with Ohio Local Government, Welcome to Ohio, and ExciteCity. The Ohio Local Government and Welcome to Ohio search devices list all the cities in each state(or just in Ohio) that have a web page or any city that has register with them. ExciteCity creates maps for users by typing in a starting point and ending point. The program then dis-

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plays a map and tells the distance and preferred travel route for the desired location.

"Every time I find a new search mechanism where you can register for free, I do," Lafferre-Thomas says. But she is also considering registering with larger search instruments such as Yahoo, Altavista, and Starting Point.

In the future, any one who accesses the Salem web site will be able to do things such as learn about Salem's history, see what is going on in the community, or send e-mail to any city official. Currently, however, Lafferre-Thomas's computer is the only computer in City Hall site for right now.

"All of this web stuff is still new," she says. "We're still feeling our way through."

Linking the Library

Yet another public building in addition to the schools and the City Hall has been acquiring new technology. The Salem Public Library is now fully computerized and offers internet access to the public.

The director of the public library, George W. S. Hays, explains that the library's automation system was begun in 1990. "The first thing we did was to start creating our database," Hays says. "At the

with access to the internet.

Also, Lafferre-Thomas says, "One of the things we want to do down the line is put a guest book in so that whoever accesses our site can sign the guest book." Presently, the site only contains a counter that displays the number of times the web page has been accessed to date.

Though many more technological advances are in store for the city government, Lafferre-Thomas is focusing on adjusting to the new city web same time, we automated our payment and budget. We automated acquisitions, which is how we order books. All of that was done on-line."

In September of 1994, the library removed the traditional card catalog and installed automated circulation. The circulation network presently embodies 23 computers. Since 1994, the library has installed another network called Windows NT, and internet access. The internet is provided by the Ohio Public Library Information Network (OPLIN). OPLIN is a state funded agency that services the state's public libraries at no cost.

Hays says, "The rest of the automation we have done we have had to fund ourselves, with the exception of the Chamber of Commerce, who provided funds also."

Using the internet at the library costs nothing for the public, although it must be used to access informational sites. "We are not supporting e-mail and we are not supporting chat rooms," Hays says.

The library has also had to provide training for the librarians to keep up with the new hardware and software. They attend workshops, seminars, and lectures to keep up with the fast moving world of technology and cyberspace.

factures to keep up with the fast moving world of technology and cyberspace. "We have continual training now," Hays says. "One thing that technology has taught us is that we have to train people all the time and always will... But we're fortunate to have a staff who enjoys this and is willing to learn." Later this year, the

Later this year, the library will be adding more terminals and is currently responsible for submitting all of the graphics and content dealing with the library to the Salem web site. "We're also look-

"We're also looking to see what the schools are going to do with their technology plan," states Hays, who is a member of the Educational Technology Team. "We want to link and the library and that is what we are trying to explore right now." With the proposed

With the proposed plans and ideas of the schools, the city government, and the public library, Salem is actively attempting to prepare its employees and residents for the technology of the 21st century. As that new century quickly approaches, Salem is making every effort to establish itself as an oldf a s h i o n e. d "cybercommunity."

In addition to those teachers involved with the fine art classes, Mr. McShane said that, "The arts are important to students because it is exposing them to a cultural environment at a young age." He also said that about 90% of students in school have been involved in some type of fine arts class at some point or another, and he supports the all of the art programs.



Teenagers deprived of sleep

In Minneapolis, Minn., Edina City Schools have changed the time school starts from 7:25 a.m until 8:30 a.m. The reason for the change is because of the study on sleep deprivation. According to Edina City Schools Superintendent Kenneth Dragseth, there is now an alertness not only in the morning but all day long.

A student attending S.H.S. is bound to see someone dozing off in at least one of their classes. Many teachers try to pre-

vent kids from sleeping on a regular basis by tapping them on the shoulder, taking points off their grades, making loud and sudden

noises, or stopping class to call out their name and asking them to join the class. Scientist have pondered over the question: "why do teenagers fall asleep during school?"

Each teenager receives approximently seven hours of sleep each night. When you are a teenager you need nine hours and fifteen minutes each night. Mary A. Carskadon, a key researcher in sleep deprivation, says when a person is going through puberty they need even more sleep. If a person does not receive enough sleep they tend to have a hard time concentrating on things. In young chil-

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dren this is normally ignored and misunderstood for other things.

Many teenagers are involved in sports, clubs, and extra curricular activities. On top of school, 40% of students work 20 hours or more at a job. With allof these activities, teens are pressured to do well in everything they do. In school: get good grades so you can make something of yourself. In sports: give it your physical best, do not let your team down. At work: and early age children. This may effect them because they do not have a set bed time. When children do not have a set time for bed, they could be tempted to stay up late and participate in one of the new inventions our technology blow up has given to the world. Children, unlike teenagers, act aggressive, wound up, ziparound, unnecessarily active, and are less likely to take naps.

When a teenager does not receive enough sleep they are likely to have mood and behavior prob-

lems, depression, act cranky, receive lower grades. It also increases drug and alcohol use, and may cause driving accidents.

After speaking to SHS Principal Charles McShane, he commented that at SHS, if the hours changed, students would probably go to bed late and still wake up at the last possible minute. McShane said Salem High does not have a problem with students sleeping in class it is more with the students being alert during school hours. The reason students are not alert is because students sleep until the last possible minute and come to school right after they wake up.




