Scholarships are the preferred form of financial aide because they are not required to be repaid. Scholarships available to students vary form \$500 to full tuition. There are endless opportunities available to students; they just have to look for them. Various scholarships can be found on the Internet, through guidance counselors, or books. Miss Carmello stresses the importance for seniors to apply for the Salem Alumni Association scholarships. Applications will be distributed following spring break and are due by April 20. In 1908 the Alumni Association awarded their first scholarship of \$60. Since that first scholarship they have awarded 2.17 million dollars in scholarship funds. Juniors are urged to research scholarships now so they know what to apply for next year.

Anything you can do, I can do better

When some people hear the Guinness Book of World Records, they mostly think of strange people doing odd things to get their names in history. Some fail to realize that some of their favorite TV shows and celebrities actually hold records in that book as well. For example, back on March 15, 2000, with 242 episodes under his belt, Matt Groening received the record for longest running prime-time cartoon series for his cartoon The Simpsons. The Simpsons also holds the record for most celebrities featured in a TV cartoon series. The series has featured 240 celebrities since the first episode in 1987. Also in 2000, Helen Hunt, star of Mad About You, received the record for richest TV actress having a net worth of \$31 million. During the filming of Mad About You in 1999, Hunt received \$1 million an episode. Which honestly seems like very little compared to Jerry Seinfeld who holds the record for highest-paid TV actor and earned an estimated \$267 million in 1998. With over 150,000 episodes airing since its debut in 1949, Bozo the Clown holds the record for longest running children's program. The program is aired daily on 150 stations in the US. (The first Bozo, Pinto Colvig, also was the original voice for Walt Disney's Goofy, Pluto, Grumpy and Sleepy.) In 2000, Sesame Street was awarded the record of most popular children's educational TV program. It has shown in 180 countries since its debut in November 1969. On May 14, 1998, Seinfeld received the record for largest audience for a TV comedy program when its final episode attracted 108 million viewers. (This was the

largest audience for a final episode of a TV show since the airing of the final episode of M*A*S*H*.) In 2000, Wheel of Fortune received the record for most popular TV game show having an estimated 100 million viewers a week. In June 1996, Baywatch won the record for largest TV audience for a series when it had a weekly audience of more than 1.1 billion viewers in 142 countries. (Since 1996, Baywatch has been broadcast on every continent except Antarctica.) Super Bowl XXX holds the record for largest TV audience for an American football match. Recorded on January 28, 1996, 138.5 million viewers tuned in to the NBC transmission of the Green Bay Packers' 35-10 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs.

Along with all of the serious records in the entertainment world, there also has to be some really odd ones, too. With the episode that aired on December 16, 1997, *Pokemon* received the record for most seizures caused by a TV program when more than 700 children in Japan were rushed to the hospital with seizures after watching the cartoon. The episode that caused the children to have seizures was recalled until April 1998. The USA release of the episode had the animation sequence that caused the problems slowed down, and the strobe effects were deleted. In May 1999, Dave Thomas was given the award for most television commercials starring the company founder. The founder of Wendy's has appeared in a record 652 commercials for his company since April 1989.





Foos fight for grammys and win

The Foo Fighters have been pretty busy lately. On February 20, Dave Grohl won the Gibson Guitar Award for Best Rock Guitarist Male, and the whole group received two Grammys on February 21. Their latest album, *There Is Nothing Left to Lose*, won Best Rock Album, and they also nabbed Best Short Form Video for "Learn To Fly." Although the Grammys lost my respect when Britney Spears got one last year, I think the Foo Fighters' wins were well-deserved.

Not only have they been winning awards, but they're getting set to give us some albums soon. The Foo Fighters will take a break from their non-stop touring schedule to begin recording a new record this spring, which is set to come out in late 2001 or early 2002. Foo Fighters' Chris Shiflett, formerly of No Use For a Name, is also a member of Me First and the Gimme Gimmes, who will release their third album on March 20. The album, titled Blow In the Wind, is yet another collection of cover songs, such as "Sloop John B." by the Beach Boys and The Angels' "My Boyfriend's Back," and will be released on Fat Wreck Chords. Other members of Me First and the Gimme Gimmes include Fat Mike of NOFX, Joey Cape of Lagwagon, and Spike Slawson of the Swingin' Utters. Shiflett may also tour with Me First on this summer's Warped Tour, but this is not yet confirmed. Check www.foofighters.com for more information.



Who did it?

Well, another music artist has made the news. Hip hop singer Sean "Puffy" Combs, or better known as Puff Daddy, has three charges against him. First, he has been accused of two counts of criminal possession of a weapon in the second degree, which means he is accused of possessing a loaded gun with intent to harm or threaten another person. If convicted on this charge, he faces a possible five and one half to fifteen years behind bars on each count. Second, he has been accused of two counts of criminal possession of a weapon in the third degree, meaning possession of a loaded gun outside his place of business or home. He faces one to seven years on each count for this as well. Last, he has been accused of bribing a witness, meaning trying to give money and jewelry to a witness in

an effort to influence their testimony. He faces zero to seven years on top of the other charges for this charge alone if he is convicted. Combs has pleaded not guilty to each of the

above charges.

He had two accomplices: rapper Jamal "Shyne" Barrow, and Combs' bodyguard Anthony Jones. While Jones has been accused of the same charges as Combs, Barrow has been accused of firing the loaded weapon, assault, and attempted murder in the second degree, along with the same charges as Combs and Barrow. Barrow and Jones have also (not surprisingly) pleaded not guilty. The incident occurred at 2:20 AM on Monday, December 27, 1999, outside of a New York City Club when three people were reportedly shot. One victim was just nicked by a bullet and

walked away from the scene while the other two victims were taken to the hospital. The given trial date was set on January 2, 2001, over a year after the shootings originally occurred. Since then, the slow trial process has been steadily progressing.

Although popularity may be at a high altitude, it doesn't look like Puffy is getting out of this one. The evidence at hand is startling. With witnesses of Barrow firing the gun, seeing Combs run out of the club with a black object in his right hand moments proceeding the shootings, and actually seeing the men fire guns, it isn't going to help them by any means. The victims have testified against them and more witnesses are being lined up for information. New reports have told us that another

gun was shot before Shyne fired his own gun. But then again, did he even fire it? David Cubiletti, a flight attendant who is a friend of Combs' former personal assistant, has testified that it wasn't clear to him whether Shyne fired his gun or not. He said that he aimed it at the ceiling, but could not tell if it had been fired or not. Directly before this, according to Cubilleti, another man by the name of Matthew "Scar" Allen threw money at Combs. Combs said that he didn't remember any money being thrown at all. Another witness, an auto mechanic, testified that instead of concealing or holding a gun, Puffy was instead ducking out of harm's way. He said that he was standing next to Puffy at that time.

Everyone's stories seem to be significantly different. When Puffy testified, he swore that he never had a gun. He calmly denied every charge against him with a believable case. The big question left standing is whether or not Puffy's ex-girlfriend Jennifer Lopez will testify or not. Back in December of '99, Lopez was originally arrested but later released. Does Lopez hold the missing key to this case? Who knows? She originally announced that she would not be testifying, but then Combs' lawyer Benjamin Brafman contradicted this publicly announced statement.
