## Creation of The New Wall

Many citizens of the city of Salem are wondering when the wall will be rebuilt. The original Reilly Wall was taken down because of safety issues. Engineers alerted our school board that the wall was becoming unsafe and could actually topple over at any time. "We knew that was a serious issue, thus we had it removed," Board president Brad Myers stated.

The wall is slated to be up by the end of the school year. "We want to get it going as soon as possible," added Myers. Salem

has waited since January to decide on an appropriate price for the wall. It was not easy for the school board, as they had up to six different construction companies bid on the project.

The Reilly Wall will be built by Kreidler Construction, because they gave us the best possible price of \$114,100. This price was significantly less than the original cost of \$650,000.

The Preservation Society has come up with many ideas for the fundraising of the wall.

People can preserve memories of loved ones by buying a brick for the wall. They are selling three sizes of bricks 4" x 8", 8" x 8", and a 24" x 24" with space for seven lines of text with 26 characters per line. They are also planting trees that will have granite plaques in the size of 16" x 8". Additionally, contributors may sponsor granite benches that will be placed inside the Reilly Stadium gates. One may write up to four lines of text with 26 characters per line, yet there will only be 12 benches available.

## Recent Salem Graduate in Need of your Support

Salem High School graduate, Nick Reed, is in need of support after being diagnosed with a rare form of cancer. His battle against the disease began in 2007. After a tough fight he was deemed cancer free in 2008. Nick was a good student and had been attending college in Minnesota since graduating from Salem in 2011. Nick's knee, which left him with a slight limp after his first battle with cancer, started bothering him again shortly after the start of his freshman year at college and he was forced to use crutches to get around. Nick immediately started receiving strong rounds of chemotherapy.

Over this past summer, Nick's treatment proved only partially successful. Some of the tumors had been shrinking but others failed to decrease in size, specifically the tumor in his knee. Doctors advised that Nick's leg be amputated to prevent any further spread of the cancer. The procedure went successfully and Nick has been recovering well. He will soon be receiving a prosthetic leg and is very determined to keep it from holding him back in life. Nick is a very strong individual and will surely become a stronger person from his setbacks. Nick has temporarily moved back to New Castle, Pa., with his mother and has to travel to Akron to receive his treatment.

Nick is in need of all the support he can get. The staff at our school will be collecting money to support Nick during this year's jeans project but are also hoping that students will be able to help out. Students can create get well cards for Nick that would be sent en masse by a designated teacher, contribute to a possible change collection drive that would be held during lunch and anything else that would provide any of the much needed support for Nick and his family. If students are looking into a selective college or university, AP classes are better to take than Kent, or senior to sophomore, classes.

Some colleges/universities may not transfer your Kent course credits, but almost all colleges/universities will transfer over AP courses if you get over a 3 on your AP exam. You may end up being exempt from a college class. Also, AP classes can affect your GPA/class rank which can also benefit you and

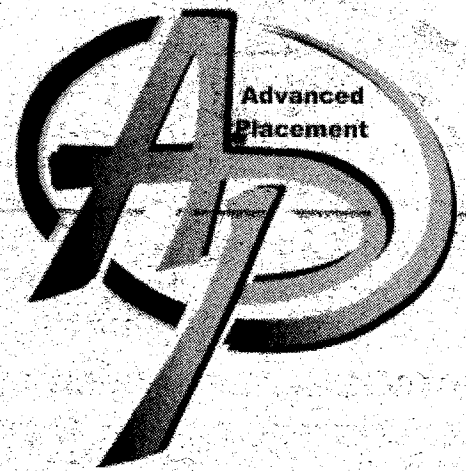
Kent cannot do that. Colleges and universities like seeing that the student was willing to take on the challenge of an advanced class.

Our school offers fourteen AP courses and doing well on these exams can give a student great scholarship opportunities.

Dr. Shivers, our principal, said, "One Student qualified for one full years worth of college credit at an elite private university." The value of this student's test scores was

about \$50,000. Another student attends another elite private university on a 3/4th scholarship worth more than \$120,000. The last two students—both of whom did well on four or more AP exams—qualified for full academic scholarships at an Ohio public university, worth about \$120,000 each.

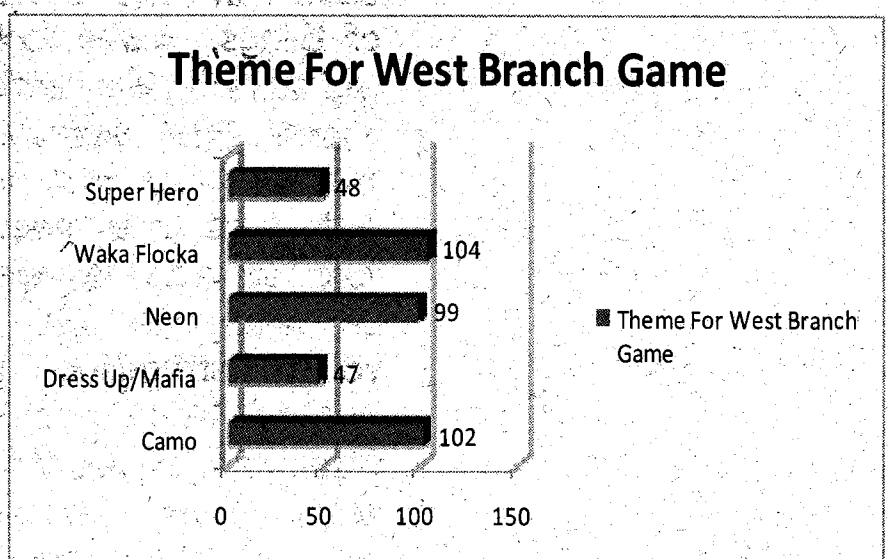
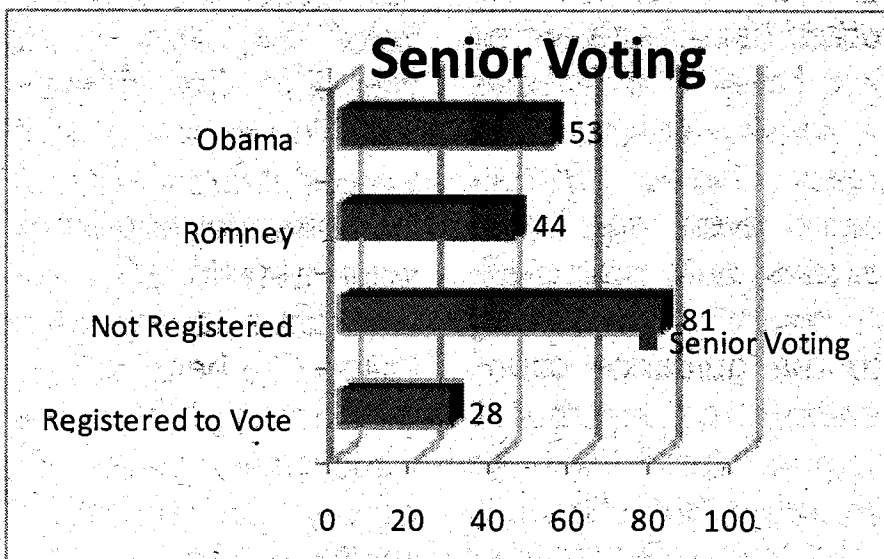

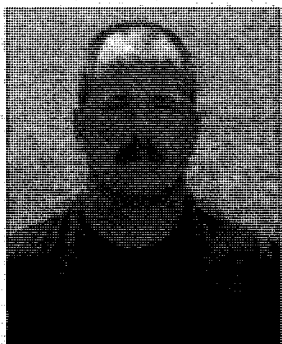

### Familiar Face in Art

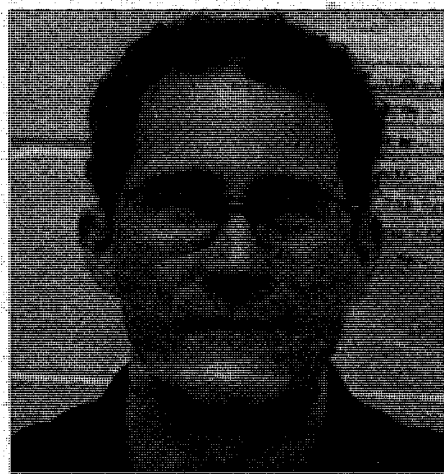

It is located in multiple places in Ohio including North Canton, Akron, Cleveland, Columbus, and Youngstown. The total number of students attending Walsh University is 2,982, and the student to teacher ratio is 12:1.
