Alumni gifts for year are \$29,000

Class of 1940 makes record contribution

Meeting at its 109th annual banquet on June 2, the Salem High School Alumni Association bestowed 47 graduating seniors with scholarships totaling \$115,000. The banquet was held at the high school.

According to Daniel E. Smith, scholarship committee chairman, the awards ran the association's scholarship total to \$1,148,150 since the program started in 1908. To date, 727 students have won awards. This year, all those who achieved 3.2 or higher grade averages won awards.

Senior Shawn Scharf was the only student with a 4.0 grade average and his award was \$6,000. There were 38 scholastic awards, four vocational scholarships and five Max Fisher athletic awards.

Smith told the seniors, "We have given you \$115,000 and the only return we hope for is that you reach your goals. When you do, please take your turn and help the association continue its work."

A formal thank-you was voiced by 1990 class president Jennifer Pshsniak.

Charles Gibbs, treasurer, reported the association received \$29,000 in gifts the last 12 months and had an income of \$134,500. Its assets increased by \$153,000.

The added monies were needed, it was reported, because of "staggering" tuitions costs. Gibbs said the organization's expenses totaled \$17,000, "including the cost of our very fine newsletter."

Fred E. Cope presented the Fisher awards to five recipients. George Schmid, speaking for the Class of 1930 which had 27 members present, presented a check to the association. The class gift totaled \$2,050.

He was followed by Ralph Landwert from the 50-year class of 1940, which was honored at the banquet. "We had a goal of \$1,940 for our gift," he said, "but we couldn't shut off the money. Therefore, we are giving \$3,000 tonight." It was the highest class gift ever.

Responding for the 1940 class, Allen Fehr of Simsbury, Conn., said as he looked back to 1940 he realized it was not the best of times because World War II was on its way. "But there was no better place to get an education than Salem. Our class is proud to make an investment in the future and we hope you 1990 seniors will return in the year 2040 and do your part, too."

William M. Schaeffer ('39) was the honored alumnus of 1990. (See related story.)

It was announced that officers of the Executive Committee had been re-elected. They are Joe Ciotti, president; Sally Snowball Chappell, vice president; Polly Begalla Schaffer, secretary; and Jackie Welsh Hergenrother, treasurer. Other committee members are: Dorothy Day Corso, Dr. Willard Stamp, Patricia Schmidt McNicol, Barbara J. Beery Lippiatt and Dr. Michael Love.

Also re-elected were members of the Scholarship Committee: Smith, chairman; Gibbs, treasurer; Betsy Young Johnson, Cope, Joyce Cosgrove Ehrhart, Chappell, Dr. Gail Herron, Ciotti, Robert C. Roberts and SHS Principal Charles McShane.

The banquet was served buffet style in the high school cafeteria with approximately 400 persons attending.

William Schaeffer is 1990 alumnus

William M. (Bill) Schaeffer, a lifelong Salem resident and an SHS graduate of 1939, was honored as the 1990 outstanding alumnus at the annual SHS Alumni Association banquet on June 2.

He was the 33rd alumnus to be honored in a custom begun in 1958.

Schaeffer, 1327 E. 3rd St., Salem, is the son of the late Sam and Elsie Robinson Schaeffer. He and his wife, the former Jane Gilbert, have two daughters and five grandchildren.

He is a past supreme counselor (international president) of The Order of United Commercial Travelers of America. He served in that office during 1979-80 and the following year served as chairman of UCT's international board of governors.

Schaeffer has been a member of UCT since 1949, serving as senior counselor (president) of Salem Council 590 in 1954-55. In 1964, he was elected secretary-treasurer of the council, a position he still holds. He was elected to a state office in 1965 and served as state president of UCT's Ohio Jurisdiction during 1969-70.

At Salem High, he played football and basketball for four years, was on the track team for three years and was president of the Varsity S Club.

He joined the Army Air Force in October, 1942, and served with the 11th Air Force in Alaska during World War II. He was discharged as a staff sergeant in 1946. He was employed by the U.S. Postal Service for more than 30 years and served as Salem superintendent of mails from 1960 until his retirement in 1976. He has been employed by Stark Memorial for 12 years.

Schaeffer served nine years as a trustee of Salem First Friends Church. He is a past president of the Charles H. Carey Post 56, American Legion; a past captain of the Ohio State Highway Patrol Auxiliary; and a member of the Columbiana County 40/8.

Undefeated 'boys' of '29 huddle again

(Editor's note: On June 15 members of the undefeated Quaker football team of 1929 gathered at a reunion in Salem, guests of Coach Floyd Stone. Salem News sports writer Ron Firth attended and wrote the following story.)

The members of Salem's unbeaten football team of 1929 were boys again Friday.

The aches and pains that have accumulated over the years disappeared for a day.

Fourteen of the 20 surviving members of the Quakers' last unbeaten squad gathered for their 61-year reunion, which was hosted by their coach, Floyd Stone.

Stone, who will be 85 years old in becember, continues to typify the toughness that was characteristic of his teams.

He still cuts his one-acre lawn in Traverse City, Mich., with a push mower and was digging up a tree days before the reunion.

"He's unreal. He really is," said his wife, Cora May Reich Stone, a member of the Salem High Class of 1935.

Stone's vigorous training schedule is credited with much of the team's success.

"I worked them pretty hard, but they took it," Stone said. "I never asked them to do anything I wouldn't do myself."

The days of the 1929 season, when the Quakers carried the title of mythical state champs, are among the most glorious in Salem sports history.

"I think about them every day," Stone said. "A lot of these games, to me, happened yesterday."

He still sees scrappy Sam

Drakulich running through the snow and the opposition at Reilly Field.

And Ed Beck getting off another booming 60-yard punt.

And Glenn Whinnery scoring the game-winning touchdown against Alliance to cap the unbeaten season.

And on and on.

"I remember a lot of those plays like it was yesterday," Stone said.

Players attending the reunion were Drakulich, August Corso Jr., George Schmid, Merle Whitcomb, John Barnes, Gordon Scullion, Hugh Bailey and Keith Hess, all of Salem; Oscar Hippley of Fairview Park; Wilbert Webber of Boardman; Purn Sidinger of Clearwater, Fla.; Lawrence Weigand of Seminole, Fla.; Paul Snyder of Burbank, Calif.; and Gordon Keyes of Modesto, Calif. ("He's just a freshman," Corso told everyone.)

"We all have memories," Corso said.

They all have great memories of their families and grandchildren, "but we all cherish one big memory," Corso said of the unbeaten team.

"No one else can claim that here and in many other communities. I've claimed that all these years and I've been proud."

Of course, everyone was telling stories. Memories last a lifetime, although the truth doesn't.

"We opened the season and we beat Leetonia, 30-0," recalled Corso.

"Naw, it was 60-0," quipped Schmid.

The score was 40-0.

won, 7-0.

"Your mathematics are terrible," Schmid replied. "It was more than that."

"I'm glad to see them because so many have died," Drakulich said. "I haven't seen some of these guys in a long time. We enjoyed it."

It also was sad to think that this very well may have been their last hurrah too. There may not be another chance to get this many of the players back together.

"I'll tell you, with this group, if they have another football get-together, it better be before five years," Stone said. "There's too many of us, including me, who are on the border."

Still, they all smile when they think about the past 61 years.

"It's gone fast," Drakulich said. "Too fast."

"I hope the next 61 are as good," Stone said.

Earns degree 50 years later

Some sort of local record may have been set in the spring when Jean Stone Piersol ('40) earned an Associate of Arts degree at Kent State University branch in Salem at age 67.

Deciding to return to work after 17 years as a housewife, she wanted some refresher courses in English and grammar. She found she could handle college work even after the long layoff and so decided to go after the degree. She made the dean's list with a 4.0 grade average, climaxing eight years of effort, taking classes on a parttime basis while working an eight-hour day at her job at St. Paul's Church.

"I never achieved a 4.0 in high school because I fooled around too much," she said. Actually, she tied for No. 1 ranking in her 1940 class of 203 students. Recently she designed the program for the 50-year reunion of her class, held June 1.


The games will feature teams from 1950s-1960s, 1970s and 1980s. Anyone who played varsity ball is eligible.

I recently received by copy of your Spring 1990 newsletter. This has motivated me to end my procrastination, and to send the enclosed check as a small contribution to your scholarship committee in memory of Mark Harroff ('67).

Mark and I were classmates throughout school, and I followed his successful career with interest after we left Salem. The two of us differed politically from an early age. We both were in Bob Flickinger's sixth grade class at Reilly School during the 1960 presidential campaign. Bob, whose creative teaching methods were ahead of their time, organized a series of mock elections among the Reilly students. Mark managed the Nixon-Lodge campaign, while I managed the Kennedy-Johnson effort. The Democratic ticket was given an unusual boost when our candidate. then-Senator John F. Kennedy, made a personal appearance at the school before a well-attended outdoor public rally at Reilly Stadium. Salem Mayor Dean Cranmer arranged for me to meet Sen. Kennedy; I still remember this, of course. We split the subsequent Reilly mock voting, with Kennedy and Nixon winning one election apiece. The astute political skills that Mark put to good use during his career in Republican politics undoubtedly had their beginnings in his educational experiences in the Salem public school system.

I last saw Mark in 1987 at the SHS Class of 1967 20-year reunion. He gave us no indication that he was ill. This SHS class produced an unusually large number of graduates who have made significant contributions to our country in their professional careers. Mark was perhaps the best known.

We will miss him.

I also would like to congratulate you on your continually excellent newsletter. As you know, this publication is highly unusual. My colleagues are often amazed to see that an alumni organization for a public high school actually produces a publication like this. Salem is extremely fortunate to have an organization like the Alumni Association as a major part of community support structure for its schools.

New gym seats are 'for sale'

The first phase of Salem High School's gym renovation was completed in 1989 with the removal of the east side wooden bleachers. They were replaced by vinyl-on-steel bleachers that open and close mechanically.

The second phase, completed this past summer, included the installation of telescopic platform chairs, made of hard plastic installed on aluminum and steel decks.

Athletic Director Ray Steffen says Salem is the first high school in the country to have these state-of-the-art chairs.
