Three old records are shattered Class of '41 gift is highest ever

Three records were set June 1 when the Salem High School Alumni Association staged its 110th annual reunion and dinner in the high school.

A throng of 342 graduates and parents watched as a record \$123,000 in scholarships was presented to 52 senior students, the most ever honored in one year.

The third mark was set by the honored 50-year Class of 1941 when it gave the association a gift of \$3,500, the largest ever presented by any class.

Since the start of its scholarship program, the association has given 779 students \$1,271,150. All those who achieved a grade average of 3.2 earned a scholarship this year.

Singled out by Daniel E. Smith, scholarship chairman, were four who earned 4.0 grade marks. They were Maria Budner (headed for Dennison U.), Mary Winch (Marietta College), Michael A. Nery (Williams College) and Melissa Vidumansky (Bowling Green State U.). The first three received \$5,000 scholarships; Miss Vidumansky got a full scholarship from Bowling Green.

"I hope you all reach your goals in life and become a success," Smith told the seniors.

Charles Gibbs, association treasurer, told the crowd that alumni awards come only from investment income. In the past year, the association received \$31,000 in contributions, he said.

Four vocational scholarships were presented by Cora May Reich Stone of Michigan who suggested establishing the awards five years ago.

Fred E. Cope, retired SHS coach and athletic director, gave out eight Max Fisher athletic awards. The Fisher contribution was increased to \$7,500 this year by the Detroit philanthropist.

In making the 1941 class gift, George Baillie, class president, said he hoped the '91 class members would be back on the scene 50 years from now.

Vance Stewart gave the association a check for \$1,725 from the Class of 1936 which had its 55-year reunion Friday.

Dr. Lowell R. King, 1949 graduate who is now an academic urologist at Duke University, was recognized as the year's outstanding alumnus.

"It was a honor to have had an association with our high school," he said. "It fully prepared me for my college studies."

Saying it was nice to be honored, he set forth three guidelines for the graduating seniors: 1. Pursue what you enjoy and what you are interested in. 2. Learn to think and express yourself verbally and in writing. 3. Learn to take care of yourself.

Dr. King described his work in pediatric surgery and said he felt he was making a contribution. He told the students to decide what they wanted to do in life and then work toward it.


"You have a lot to look forward to," he concluded.

We moved to Georgia in 1960, October of my 7th grade year.

I have read a couple of dad's newsletters and they brought tears to my eyes to see names I remembered from the past, long lost friends.

My high school class in Waycross, GA, is having its 25-year reunion this summer, class of 1966. I thought pos-

sibly the Class of 1966 of Salem High would be having theirs too.

I am trying to locate my very best friend, Cynth ia Sue Mancuso. I thought possibly someone there could help me. We used to write and then I lost track of her. She is the daughter of Ralph and Vivian Mancuso. They lived on E. 10th St.

A few years ago I got to spend about 1 1/2 hours in Salem — we were flying out of Pittsburgh and ran over there to see Salem. I was so excited — I cried when we rode into town. It was just as pretty as I had always remembered it. We rode by my schools and church and through the main street — Scott's candy store was still there — rode out past both houses I lived in on

11th St., rode by the houses of several friends.

I couldn't believe it was still basically the same—except our hill that we went sled riding down was much "smaller" than it used to be, and the "long" walk to McKinley school was much shorter. The town was all kept up so well - all the houses still neat and clean and the yards tidy. It was Bob Pager on the phone. (We used to refer to him as Bob Pager, Salem cager, in the Salem News back in 1948. Not quite a hilarious line. You had to be there.)

Pager was calling from Youngstown where he was following his daughter, Susie Redman, who was competing in the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour stop in Vienna. She has been on the tour for six years and had won about \$30,000 through July.

"If she could putt, she would be tough," her dad said.

It is expensive on the tour. About \$4,000 a month will cover such expenses as motels, entry fees, \$400 for a caddy, and transportation. Sponsors help out because few of the girls can come up with \$50,000 a year.

Pager, a '48 graduate of SHS, talked a blue streak. In high school, you could get little more than a "yep" or a "nope" out of him, but he now expounds on golf freely. He later called his old basketball coach, Bob Miller, and invited him and his wife, Audrey, to the tournament in Vienna. They walked the course with him.

Susie is married to golf pro Bo Redman. Her brother, Bob, is a topnotch golfer who is seeking his PGA card. Her father-in-law is a teaching pro. Golf is the main subject around the dinner table. Pager owned and operated a golf course in Mobile, Alabama, where he has lived for 26 years with his wife, Bonnie, a Toledo native.


Pager played Salem High basketball at an advertised height of 6 ft. 7 in. and had a devastating whirling hook shot that was all but unstoppable. The Associated Press listed him as second team All-Ohio center two years in a row.

He scored 220 points as a sophomore on a 14-8 team, then got 276 as a junior when the team went 17-2. That team featured Frank Lanney, Tony Martinelli, Jim Laughlin, Virgil Kelly, Pete Cain, Carl Ciccozzi and Ray Mercer. As a senior, Pager averaged 20 points and scored 350, breaking Walt Brian's record, set in 1944. The team went 14-3. Bob had high games of 36 and 37 points.

Adolph Rupp himself, the baron of Kentucky, came to Salem to look

Pager over, but concluded he couldn't jump enough to play for the Wildcats. Coach Hank Iba of Oklahoma A & M thought differently and gave him a scholarship. He played for Iba in the 1950-52 seasons as the team finished fourth in the NCAA tourney in 1951. Pager later played in the Old Eastern League and in 1954 for the Akron Goodyear Wingfoots. Then he moved into golf.

Theresa Kaine's win erases 58-year gap

Theresa Kaine, Salem High's brilliant distance runner, became the first SHS athlete in 58 years to win a state meet championship when she captured the 3200-meter run in June.

In addition, Theresa ran second in the 1600-meter run. She clocked a school record 11:19.29 in the 3200 and ran 5:09.73 in the 1600. In 1990 she had placed third in both state meet events. The only other SHS girl to ever score a point in the state carnival was Janet Bettis who was sixth in the 800 in 1979.

Theresa scored 18 points to place Salem fifth in the Girls Division II meet. She is a power runner, who prefers to run her rivals into the ground rather than beat them with a big "kick" at the end of the race. She ran second for a

mile in the 3200 and then stepped up the pace to win by a comfortable 4.4 seconds.

She won the 3200 four years straight in the Columbiana county meet and had been supremely confident she would win in the state meet.


Her victory in Columbus capped an outstanding week for the daughter of Dr. Patricia Kaine. On June 1 she was awarded a Salem High School Alumni Association scholarship of \$4,000 for maintaining a 3.8 grade average during her high school career. She was awarded a track scholarship by Ohio State University where she enrolled this fall. In September, she set a personal best time of 18:39 over a 3.1 mile course.

The last SHS athlete to win a

state meet title was Wayne (Muscles) Russell, who won the shot put in 1933. There have been 15 state meet events won by Salem athletes, five of whom won more than once. Russell Myers set a state meet record in the discus in 1916 and Lowell (Rib) Allen set meet records in the pole vault in both 1927 and 1928.

Bill Robusch won gruelling victories in the high jump and pole vault in 1920. Ed Beck took two firsts and a second in the pole vault in 1930-32. Myers won three times in 1915-16 in the discus and shot put and George Leyda won the 440 and long jump in 1914.

Jack Alexander never won in the state meet, but placed in the high jump four consecutive years, 1953-56.

On July 10 it was Thomas A. Moore of the SHS Class of 1920 who wondered if we would take his check for \$100 "since the Class of '20 hasn't given you much money."

He was assured his check was most welcome and then he was asked if he could recall why there were no Quaker annuals printed from 1917-1920.

"It was World War I," he replied. "Everything was cut back during those years. Ours was kind of a 'lost' class because of it."

He recalled playing basketball and football for Salem High. The football record in the fall of 1919 was an unusual 3-3-3.

"We tied Alliance 7-7 in the last game," he recalled. "I was all set to catch the scoring pass when Bill Robusch cut in front of me and grabbed it. That's the way it is for heroes."

Asked about the 1918 team that played only five games and went 2-3, he wasn't sure.

"Hey, I am 90 years old and I don't remember everything too well." With that he bounced down the stairs as spryly as any 50-year-old.

State cross country titles in the 1930's are recalled

Some deserved publicity in 1991 over Salem High's past state meet champions led several persons to point out that SHS also produced several state cross country champions.

They date back to the remarkable teams coached by the late R. Brom Clarke. His team won the state championship in 1930 and 1931, another was runner-up in 1935 and the 1933 team finished third.

Wilford Brantingham set a meet record of 13:11.5 in the 2.5 mile cross country meet of 1930. Harold Horstman was fifth, Harold Walker sixth, Irwin Beck 16th and Bruce Shasteen 17th in the state meet. Beck had played a full football game on Friday night. The Quakers spread-eagled the field with 35 points as runner-up Columbus East had 102.

A year later Salem won the 1931 meet with 29 points, well ahead of Dayton Roosevelt's 74 points. It was Horstman's year to win and he set a meet record of 10:21.5 as the race was cut to two miles. He finished 50 yards ahead of the second place runner. Shasteen was fifth, Beck seventh, Keith Harris 10th and Stan Kamasky 13th

The team finished second in 1935 as Paul Roelen took second at Columbus. He had been sixth as a sophomore in 1934.

In 1936 Roelen was state champion in 10:08, climaxing a remarkable three years of cross country. At the state meet in Columbus in 1937, Roelen was tripped and fell, denying him a possible gold medal in the mile run. He went on to be a standout distance runner at the University of Pittsburgh.

Costa Ricans warmly greet Salem cagers

Salem High Basketball Coach George Spack took his cagers on a June trip they will never forget. They flew to Costa Rica on a 13-day junket that gave them a wonderful idea of how the other half lives.

The trip came about through Rafael Vargas, a Costa Rican who was an SHS exchange student who played for George in 1985-86. Now an engineering student at Cal Poly in Pomona, Calif., he sold Spack on the trip idea and worked out all the details.

Making the trip were players Rob Roberts, Beau Hendricks, Jeff Mooney, Jeff Shirley, Dave Clunk, Jeff Andres, Shawn Sauerwein, Chris Cochran, Ben Edgerton, Nick Schneider, Brian Petrucci, Eric Thorne and Tom Wainwright. Five were seniors who were graduated two weeks before leaving.


Adults included Spack, Athletic Director Ray Steffan, Assistant Coach Jerry Allen, Atty. Jim Taus, Rotary Club president, and Paul and Rosemary Bryant with whom Vargas lived while going to SHS.

The party flew to San Jose, Costa Rica's capital. The country lies northwest of Panama with a population of 1.6 million. The group spent four days there with host families, then bused to Liberia, Vargas's hometown. A new group of host families took over and entertained the group. After five days, they returned to San Jose.

The team played in two tournaments, one in each city. Competition was very strong, Spack said. The Salem kids were impressed with the skill level and team play. Some of the boys made great friends among the Costa Ricans.

Facilities were not the best. One gym had a tin roof that leaked and newspapers were spread on the floor during games. They kept time with an alarm clock. One ball was provided for warm-ups. "It made us appreciate our facilities," Spack said.

The group went white water rafting, saw coffee growing on hillsides,


macadamia nut trees, sugar cane, rain forests and volcanoes. The rafting was a four-hour trip on a beautiful, fast river.


Vargas's mother, who is a friend of Costa Rica's president, entertained the kids warmly, providing horseback riding and hiking opportunities.

"The people put little value on time," Spack observed. "If they are to pick you up at 9, they may not come until 10 or 11 and not even call. Shops close for siestas from noon to 2." One San Jose school's basketball team wants to come here next summer if it can raise the money. The trip was expensive, costing the Salemites \$9,300 in air fare and another \$2,700 for expenses.

The Salem kids tore down the old gym bleachers and sold parts to the public and also sold tickets to the yearend Alumni game to help pay their way.

It was worth it, everyone involved agreed.

Old Reilly Field lingers only in memory

With the American flag and game ball carried from the skies by parachutists, and a magnificent display of fireworks, the long-awaited rebuilt Reilly Field went into service Sept. 13, 1991.

Salem won 47 to 8 against Cleveland South before a tremendous crowd of cheering fans.

The \$1.3 million project includes a new 2,600-seat west bleachers and a 60-foot press box (top photo); a marching band shelf area in the northeast corner (center photo); a 30-foot scoreboard; and an all-weather 8-lane running track.

The new bleachers are built over dressing rooms, officials' room, concession areas and restrooms. The old facility, built in 1927-28, was simply worn out, and its 5-lane track was never adequate.

The bottom photo shows Reilly School to the south during earlier construction stages of the west side bleachers.
