Alumni office nearing 10th birthday

Having completed nine years of duty in the SHS Alumni Association office on September 1, we feel it is time for a personal report to the membership. When prevailed upon by Daniel E. Smith to oversee the office, we had no idea the job would stretch out so long. The office was completed in June, 1984 and we began work here three months later.

People are generally surprised to find such a nice office in second floor space on E. State St. It lacks nothing. Good heating and air conditioning, computer, printer, electric typewriter, copy machine (gift of the Class of '58) and even a coffee maker.

Assisting in the operation is Henrietta Hilliard Kilbreath ('42), who is on duty two mornings a week, and Bob Lieder ('40), who puts in a lot of volunteer hours. The Class of 1938 helps out with the mailing of 10,600 newsletters and several others also contribute.

My wife, Ruth, lays out and dummies the newsletter, giving it a professional appearance. Her efforts are really appreciated by the printers, who find it easy to put the publication together from her layout.

A steady stream of visitors comes through the office, quite often coming from out of state. They are curious as to what goes on here.

We try to accommodate every request made on us by ex-grads, supplying addresses, printouts and other information. We don't give people the bureaucratic hustle they encounter in many public offices; we try to go the extra mile with everyone.

About 70 class meetings a year are conducted in our office. Each group is given a key and opens and locks up the office when through. We have never suffered any damage from their visits.

Below are some other odds and ends that may be of interest.

Many people have lost their Quaker annuals. We have many extras at the office, although very few from 1980 on. We supply them to anyone requesting copies. There is no set price for the books. We ask only that recipients make a contribution to the Alumni Association.

The oddest request for an annual came from a lady who said, "Oh, this annual has been used. I want a brand-new book."

Sorry, lady, there are no new ones. The last new one was printed 50 years ago.

The renovation of downtown Salem this summer saw a flurry of activity among people wanting personal decorative paving bricks implanted in the sidewalks. includes his/her class year when corresponding with the Alumni Association. Everyone is listed in our computer by class year.

We know we rank pretty far down the totem pole when it comes to advising us of your new address when you move. Please try to let us know so you won't miss any copies of the newsletter. Hundreds of grads move every year and it is a constant struggle to stay abreast of the new locations.

We issue 50 to 60 scholarship checks to graduating seniors each year, but find it takes more than a month before all the checks are picked up by the winners. This fall the last one was not collected until Sept. 1, exactly 31 days after the checks were made available.

We called one youth and asked why he had not come in to get his \$1,000 check. "You people close the office at noon," he said, "and I don't get up that early."

Can you imagine what a Depression era mother would have said if her son had used that as an excuse?

This office works closely with classes that are organizing reunions. We provide them with class printouts to give them an early start on address corrections. We furnish address labels for the entire class. Most important, we provide the meeting room for their committee.

A number of classes have conducted an open house in this office prior to their reunion dinners. The informal session provides a great place for chit-chat which is often limited at the dinner. Class members are also interested in our collection of memorabilia.

Our twice-a-year newsletter needs stories and pictures from the 1960-1990 era. They can be mailed in or dropped off at the office and we guarantee they will be returned. Please enclose identifications with the pictures.

through with generous checks to help cover the cost of printing and mailing our newsletter. Each was much appreciated and helpful.

Alumni associations seem to be springing up all over the area and we are often asked to meet with organizers from other communities and help them with their start-up problems.

We tell them there is no special secret to Salem's success in the field other than that the association started 111 years ago and that someone had to have done something right through the years for it to survive. The scholarship program started in 1908 and never missed a year.

Cynthia Roessler Schmidt ('81) has been named to Pi Theta Epsilon, the national occupational therapy honorary society.

She was recently awarded one of 10 Charles Fox medical scholarships in the amount of \$1,875. She works with the rehabilitation unit of St. Rita's Medical Center in Lima.

Residency begun

Dr. Nicholas R. Watkins, who received his doctor of medicine degree from Ohio State University College of Medicine on June 11, has begun a three-year residency in family practice at Grant Medical Center in Columbus. Watkins won a \$5,500 scholarship from the Alumni Association in 1985 and then earned his bachelor's degree in biology and was graduated cum laude from Mount Union College in 1989.

Theiss Award set

After 42 years of service to the YMCA, William (Bill) Theiss ('41) retired on August 1. He resides at 2140 Onward Rd., Midlothian, Texas 76065.

The retirement was his second. In 1985 he retired from full-time employment as a professional director in the YMCA after 34 years. His second retirement was from an eight-year part-time position as state director of the Texas YMCA Youth and Government Program which serves 2,000 high school youth annually. Theiss calls the premier program among 40 state programs in the U.S. Although retired, he is now giving 10 percent of his time as financial development officer for the program, aiming to establish a \$200,000 endowment fund. Half of that amount has been raised.

The YMCA announced last spring that an annual Bill Theiss Award will be established beginning in 1994 to honor the professional staff person who has given outstanding service to the Youth and Government Program in Texas.

Theiss was thrilled by the honor, saying: "No amount of money could equal this kind of recognition. It has been a great eight years."

Esposito honored

Jean Kiliman Esposito, who won a \$1,000 scholarship as the No. 1 graduate from Salem High in 1971, is now chairman of the English department at SHS. A teacher here since 1975, she was honored by having the 1993 Quaker annual dedicated to her.

Scholarships given top \$1.5 million plateau

A new plateau was reached by the Salem High School Alumni Association when it distributed \$105,375 in scholarships to 52 graduating SHS seniors at its annual dinner on June 5.

The amount ran the scholarship total past the \$1.5 million mark since the first scholarship was granted in 1908. The association has given out \$892,375 in the last eight years alone.

Responding to a welcome from Association President Sally Snowball Chappell, a gift of \$200 was presented by Denise Lee ('93) who said her class was a unique one. She thanked the association for the scholarships.

Top graduates in the class were Michael Bigham and Kalpana Mohan who both received \$5,000 scholarships, presented by Scholarship Committee Chairman Dr. Gail Herron ('62). Other scholarship winners are listed elsewhere in this newsletter. Of 191 seniors, 43 had grade averages of 3.2 or better.

Treasurer Charles Gibbs ('43) reported \$38,000 in contributions during the year, declaring that the alumni newsletter was largely responsible for the increase in gifts.

Dr. Herron saluted Daniel E. Smith for his long service as Scholarship Chairman and his unswerving devotion to the Alumni Association.

Frederick E. Cope ('25) presented six \$1,000 checks to winners of the annual Max Fisher athletic awards. Joyce Cosgrove Ehrhart ('53) gave out four \$1,000 awards to Vocational Scholarship winners.

President Chappell introduced the 50-year Class of 1943 which had held its reunion the previous night. Carl Thomas ('43) responded for his 81 fellow class members, recalling their graduation during the height of World War II. He gave twin checks of \$1,334 to the scholarship and vocational funds. This \$2,668 amount was later augmented to bring the total gift to \$3,000.

Dr. William L. Hoppes ('57) of Canton, Ohio, was saluted as the honored alumnus of the year. He thanked the group for the honor after recalling that he was 33 before he got his first "real" job, following 12 years of schooling. Citing his specific interest in prevention of AIDS, he said 120 million people may contract the disease by the year 2000. Now a professor of medicine, Dr. Hoppes recounted some of the present day difficulties in the practice of medicine.

Joe Ciotti ('65) was announced as the new president of the association and Frank Hoopes ('47) and Melissa Moffett Costa ('78) became new Executive Committee members.

The dinner, staged in the high school cafeteria, was attended by 385 people.

Med students get Fox funds

For the first time last July, a distribution of \$25,000 was made to graduate medical students from funds left by the late Charles Fox.

Dr. Gail C. Herron, chairman of the scholarship committee of the Salem High School Alumni Association, said 10 scholarships were granted to selected graduates of Salem High who are now pursuing graduate studies related to health care.

The distribution represented two years' income from the Fox funds, Herron said. "It is certain that a lesser amount will be available next year."

Fox was a native of the Lisbon area who died in 1972. He worked for both the Salem China Co. and the Salem Label Co. where he served as secretary-treasurer. He was actively involved as one of the founders of the Community Concert Association.

Herron said this is the first time the Alumni Association has awarded scholarships at the post high school level.

The 10 recipients are: Linda Beeler, West Virginia University, clinical psychology, \$3,000; Amy Coy, Kent State University, Salem, radiology, \$1,875; Mario DiBiase, Chicago School of Professional Psychology, clinical psychology, \$3,000; Jamie Elliott, Trident Technical College, nursing, \$1,875; Robert A. Monteleone, U. of Cincinnati College of Medicine, medicine, \$3,000.

Beverly Kay Panezott, Kent State University, East Liverpool, nursing, \$1,875; Cynthia Schmidt, Medical College of Ohio at Toledo, occupational therapy, \$1,875; Ted A. Schuster, Case Western Reserve University, dentistry, \$3,000; Regina Wendel, Kent State University at Kent, audiology, \$2,500; George Wilson, Ohio University at Athens, osteopathic medicine, \$3,000.

Alumni boost funds for scholarships

Over the last six months, Salem High graduates have contributed a generous \$26,308 to the SHS Alumni Association scholarship fund. The period covered was April 25 through September 20.

Included in the total was \$11,550 given by 12 classes that held summer reunions. The 50-year Class of 1943 gave \$3,000 to the fund and the graduating Class of 1993 gave \$200. Also included was a \$5,000 bequest from the estate of Eugene W. McCready ('40).

The classes of 1953, 1958 and 1963 all gave more than \$1,000. The '58 gift was earmarked by the class to purchase an office copying machine. The Class of '48 held its reunion on Oct. 23 and is not included.

Herb Brown: In memoriam

Herbert H. Brown, 81, of Dayton, who was varsity basketball coach at Salem Senior High School from 1933-34 through 1943-44, died August 21 at the Kettering Medical Center in Dayton.

During his 11 seasons here, he showed himself to be a strong disciplinarian and a conservative coach. Some of his teams played fierce defense that came to the fore in smashing upset tournament victories over Akron West and Akron North in the mid-30's. His 1939 team won in overtime at Massillon in a memorable upset, 27-24.

He always said his 1934-35 team was his best at Salem. That club included Charlie McCloskey, Jack Mullins, Ben Cope, Charles Palmer, Earle Zelle, Cliff Beck, Ed Pukalski, Kenny Shears and John Lutsch. Coach Brown took his 1937 team to the state tournament, losing to Bridgeport in the first round.

After leaving Salem, he entered the real estate business in Dayton and became president of the Ohio Association of Realtors. He was quite active in the Jaycees in both Salem and Dayton. He was a member of the Dayton Stivers High School and Ohio State University alumni associations. He was active until the last two months of his life in real estate appraisals and maintained his interest in golf and the Agonis Club.

Mr. Brown was preceded in death by his wife, Janet, in 1991. He is survived by a daughter, Cindy, of Indianapolis and two grandchildren. He was last in Salem at the SHS Alumni Association

banquet on June 5 where he made a short talk.

He was a member of the Dayton Stivers basketball team that won the state high school championship in 1928, 1929 and 1930, then went on to play for the Ohio State varsity.

In the mid-40's he coached the Dayton Mets, a professional team.

While in Salem, he always played in the Little City basketball tournament, generally forming a team that included a number of his former SHS players.

The 1938 Quaker was dedicated to Brown "not only because he coached great teams but because he is a fine teacher."

'Think about trying again': Mildred Lanney Peer

(Excerpted from Salem News story by Larry Shields)

She attended St. Paul school and should have been graduated from Salem High School in 1940. But for Mildred Lanney Peer annual bouts with chronic bronchitis in high school left her short of credits and without a diploma.

At Christmas time 1939 she was in her senior year when school officials gave her the news. "They dropped me because I didn't have enough credits each of the last three years," the 72-year-old great-grandmother said from her home in Whittier, Calif.

She had only five credits and needed 20 or 22. "I never really got past my sophomore year. I kept going back trying, but in my senior year...I had tried too many times and I couldn't make it up," she commented. "It made me feel very bad, but I understood."

There were no remedial or special classes in education at the time to assist students so Mildred stayed around Salem working a variety of jobs. She worked for the J.W. Lease corner grocery at Howard and State Streets, for the Firestone Tire Store and at Simons Meat

Market. After marrying in 1945, she worked at E. W. Bliss and for DeVille's grocery at Franklin and Maple Streets. In 1956, her family moved to Whittier. Her sister, Doris, still lives in Salem.

After raising four children in Whittier, Mildred retired as a seamstress 14 years ago. After her husband died and her children were grown, she decided to return to school and enrolled in the Adult School Program at Sierra Fiesta High School in Whittier.

She attended from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. five days a week. All studying was done at the school. She set a school record for acquiring 16 credits straight and was graduated last June 17, a mere 53 years after the Class of '40. She says it was the best thing that ever happened to her.

That sentiment is reflected in her advice to non-high school graduates: "I hope everyone thinks about trying again. I'm glad I experienced it. I really enjoyed it."

Mildred is not done yet. She is aiming "to learn computers" and was to start instruction in that field this fall.

She will be reading this because the SHS Class of 1940 still carries her on its rolls.

Mega payback

Dr. Gene E. Tullis ('68), a cardiovascular thoracic surgeon in Colorado, repaid his Alumni Association scholarship while in Salem for his class reunion in July.

"I am repaying my scholarship that got me started in college 25 years ago," said Tullis, who lives at 95 Falcon Hills Drive, Highlands Ranch, CO 80126. He is the son of Gene and Aggie Kamasky Tullis of Salem.

The unusual aspect of his contribution was that he "repaid" his \$500 scholarship with a check for \$2,500.

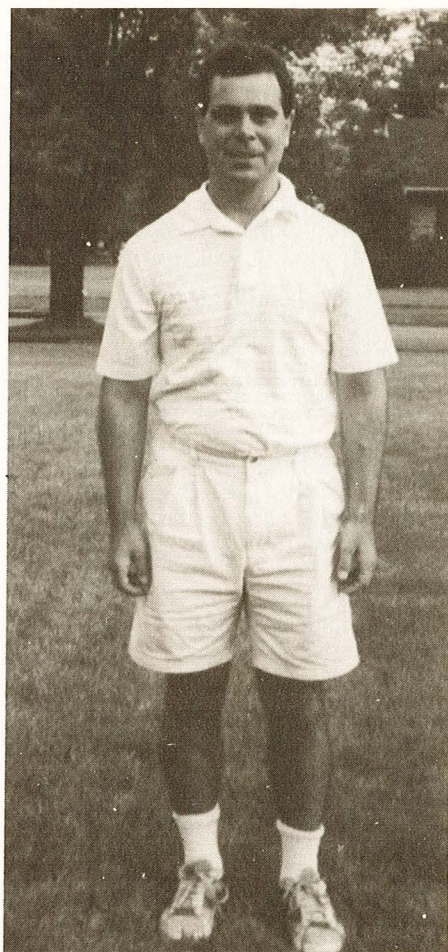
