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Floyd Stone didn't forget Salem

At age 88, Dr. Floyd W. Stone, former Salem High School coach, died of cancer Sept. 17 after a year-long illness. Before he died, however, he and his wife, the former Cora May Reich ('35), gave the SHS Alumni Association scholarship fund the second largest gift in its history.

The Stones, Ellenton, Fla., sent a check for \$150,000 last May. On Sept. 16, the day before Dr. Stone died, \$243,873 in stock in a major steel corporation was transferred to the Alumni Association.

The total gift of \$393,873 has been exceeded only by the \$601,000 left the association by the late Leon Colley. Oddly enough, neither Dr. Stone nor Mr. Colley ever attended Salem schools.

"A real surprise and a marvelous gift for the people of Salem," said Joe Ciotti, association president. "Dr. Stone must have been impressed with our city while he was here. This will help our students attain their goals and move on to higher education."

The large gift got an enthusiastic response also from Dr. Gail Herron, chairman of the scholarship committee.

"A gift like this demonstrates tremendous faith in both the youth of Salem and our scholarship program. On behalf of all alumni who have worked to establish and maintain our scholarships and for the future students who will benefit directly from them, we express our gratitude to Mrs. Stone and honor the memory of her husband."

Dr. Stone was the coach of the last undefeated, untied football team at Salem High, the 1929 squad that rolled to an 11-0 record. He had a record of 39-17-7 in his six seasons for football at SHS and he produced outstanding track teams as well.

In 1990, Dr. Stone was host to 14 of the surviving 20 members of the 1929 team at a dinner in Salem.

He was highly praised by his former players.

Stone, a Logan, Ohio, native, attended Logan High where he competed in football, track, wrestling and handball. He was graduated from Ohio University, married Ruth Pickering and began coaching at Nelsonville High. While taking summer classes at Harvard University, he met Wilbur Springer, then coach at Salem High who was to become principal in the fall of 1928.

With the approval of Supt. of Schools John S. Alan, Springer offered Stone his coaching job and the young man accepted. He stayed six school years. During this time he spent two summers at Camp Bonaventure in Canada, which was run by Sam S. Willaman, Salem native and head football coach at Ohio State. Several Salem boys attended the camp.

Night football and night track meets were started under his tenure in Salem.

He was liked and respected by students, faculty and local residents. The 1930 Quaker annual was dedicated to Stone. At subsequent reunions of the 1929 team, he was told by his players, "I looked upon you as a father" and "thanks for helping me become the person I am." He also heard "you flunked me in commercial arithmetic" and "you kicked me off the team."

In 1934, at the height of the Great Depression, he

Lady trucker gets her ring

This story could well be printed in our letters column, but is so unusual it deserves its own headline. It started as a routine lost class ring affair that became more interesting as we went along.

The ring, bearing the initials CR inside the band, had been worn off so that only the figures 9 and 6 were decipherable. That meant it belonged to a girl who had been graduated in the 1960s. Our computer revealed six girls with those initials between 1960 and 1969. We called one and wrote to four others. We had no address for the sixth.

Immediately we got a reply from Colleen Rhodes Judge ('67) of P.O. Box 67, Jewett, Ohio, 43986, who said the ring described was a 1967 model and that since she had no middle initial her ring had only the two initials engraved on it. We mailed the ring to her and got a quick reply.

Her letter: "I received the class ring in the mail today. It fits and is a 1967 ring. I feel it must be mine. Thank you very much for the effort you put forth in returning it to me.

"In answer to your question, yes, I am still driving truck with my husband Tom. We drive for Tri-State Motor Transit Co. out of Joplin, MO. TSMT is one of the largest and most respected

government munitions and hazardous materials, including hazardous waste, haulers in the country. Over the years we have had the opportunity to haul an engine for the space shuttle in our 18-wheeler. We are currently making New York-to-Phoenix runs and get home most weekends.

"A really neat thing happened while driving on I-94 in Montana in March, 1993. I saw another TSMT truck approaching from the rear, so I turned on my CB radio and started a conversation with the lady driving the other truck.

"As truckers conversations usually do, the question was asked, 'Where do you live?' She said she lived in Florida. When I told her I lived in Ohio she told me her husband was from Alliance and she had been raised in the small town of Salem. Imagine my surprise to find someone from my home town, driving truck for the same company I drive for. This lady turned out to be Lenny Vaughters Myers, Class of 1969 (PO Box 2062, Winter Park, FL, 32790).

"Of course, we stopped for coffee just down the road. Delivery schedules didn't allow much time but we did the best we could to cram 20-plus years into about an hour. It just goes to show that you never know when you'll run into a former school mate.

"Enclosed is my check to the Alumni Association in appreciation for returning my class ring and also in memory of my mother, M. Elaine McGhee Hickling, Class of 1944.

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was asked to take a pay cut and decided to go to Ohio State and attend dental school.

Dr. Stone was graduated from Northwestern School of Orthodontistry and set up practice in Cincinnati where he remained for 37 years. His son and daughter live in that area.

Dr. Stone was an investor in many businesses in Salem, Lisbon, Midland and Newton Falls and oil ventures in Ohio, West Virginia and Michigan. He was an avid hunter and fisherman.

Alumni Association Coordinator Robert Dixon, who received the news of the gift from Mrs. Stone, said: "Only a six-year window of his life was spent in Salem, but he left his mark here. When word got out that he was battling cancer, a number of his old Salem football players wrote or called him and he was really touched by their concern."

Mrs. Stone suggested that memorial gifts may be made to the SHS Alumni Association. She continues to live at 7920 DeSoto Drive, Ellenton, FL 34222.

SHS scholars earn \$96,700

Theiss named Alumnus of '94 during 113th gathering

Another outstanding Salem High School Alumni Association annual reunion and banquet was staged at Timberlanes in Salem on June 4. It was the 113th gathering by the association.

Fifty-five SHS seniors were given scholarships totaling \$96,700. In addition, Richard J. Theiss ('48) was honored as the year's Outstanding Alumnus and the Class of 1944 commemorated its 50-year anniversary.

The 424 attending heard Treasurer Charles Gibbs report that \$215,000 had been given to the association in the previous 12 months. He mentioned a \$150,000 gift from former coach Floyd Stone and a sizeable check from Stella Loop in memory of her late husband, Wade.

The scholarship total since 1908 has reached \$1,604,725 and has aided 929 students, according to Dr. Gail Herron, scholarship committee chairman. Scholarships have been awarded for 87 consecutive years.

Five vocational scholarships, a program started in 1987, were awarded by Joyce Cosgrove Ehrhart. Association President Joe Ciotti awarded eight Max Fisher athletic scholarships.

The graduating Class of 1994 responded through Kenneth Lee, class president, who gave the association a \$200 check and thanked it for its support. He recalled great memories from the four years of high school and said it was a place to learn socially as well as academically.

Jack Rance responded for the Class of '44 and gave the association a check for \$1,944. He pointed out that his class had been graduated at the height of World War II on the heels of the Great Depression. "It was not the best of times," he said.

A check for \$1,939 was presented by Don Vincent and James Dickey for

the Class of '39. Vincent announced that the class planned to turn over its entire treasury to the association when its members became too old to hold any more reunions.

Theiss, a TV and film producer, directed his remarks at the graduating seniors.

"Only those who have gone before me can know how big an honor this is," he said.

"When I got through high school in 1948, I wondered why my parents insisted I go on to college because I already knew everything there was to know. I found out later how naive, ignorant and stupid I really was.

"It was different in those years before television and when only a few of us had access to a car. One thing hasn't changed: We did go cruising then, especially when we celebrated VE Day and VJ Day.

"I urge you seniors to be respectful of your teachers, parents and each other. Be responsible for your activities; it is not always someone else's fault.

"Be choosy of your friends. If you hang out with winners, you will win. If you hang out with losers, the outcome can be quite different.



Joy, sorrow of coming home in 1945

Fifty years is a very, very long time. One-half century sounds even longer and, for the recent Salem High School Class of 1994, one-half century is an unimaginably long period of time, for life ahead is forever.

Salem, and the nation, were treated to extensive television, magazine and newspaper coverage of the ceremonies commemorating the one-half century anniversary of the D-day landings in Normandy, and ever so briefly were able to see, from the comfort of their living rooms, in awe, what took place in what is now known as "The Longest Day."

Did it really, really ever happen? Unless one was there, one does not realize that The Longest Day took place each and every day of the long months many Salemites spent "in the line" in North Africa, Italy, Guadalcanal, Leyte, Okinawa, France and Germany.

As visual proof, just look at the April 1944 issue of Life Magazine of the gaunt, hollow-eyed face of 19-year-old Bob (Doggie) Scullion of the Class of '42 displaying his Purple Heart while sitting on a cot in a bombed-out hospital tent on the Anzio beachhead in Italy.

Anyhow, for many of those of the classes of 1934 through 1944, this is a time for memories brought back by that infamous period of time, those two to four years stolen from our youth.

And now we look forward to the one-half century celebrations of the final victory, and the humongous joy of coming home. At least, the humongous joy for those of us who made it back. Which brings me to my final war experience involving a Salem family.

Making my way home

After 27 months overseas with an infantry division, I was finally making my way home in mid-November, 1945. My parents and family knew I was back in the States, but did not know exactly when I would be released and actually come home.

I arrived in Youngstown on a late train and made my way to the bus station, only to find that there were no buses to Salem at that late hour. I walked to the outskirts of Youngstown and at about 2 a.m. in a cold drizzle, in full uniform, with all my worldly possessions stuffed in a duffel bag, I started to hitchhike.

One of the very first cars did stop and an older couple confirmed that they were going to Salem. I was in luck. There was no disguising the exuberance of the occasion, to be coming home in the wee hours of the morning to the total surprise of family, and sharing this extreme joy with my hosts.

'We lost him'

They asked and I told them my name. They identified themselves as Mr. and Mrs. Vance McBane. Of course! Everybody in Salem knew and patronized the McBane-McArtor drugstore. And knowing of their son, Bob, who was in my brother's class of '39, I joyously asked, "and how is Bob?"

Over this last one-half century, I have often wondered of the pain, suf-

fering and emotion they must have felt at that moment, delivering an ebullient soldier to his family's doorstep, and responding, "Bob won't be coming home from the war. We lost him." When their tail lights vanished down Wilson Street, I paused a moment to re-sort my emotions, and then raced up our driveway to experience the joy of coming home.

So one-half century later in 1995, as our nation, and Salem, celebrate the great victory of World War II, I will remember the extreme height of the joy of coming home.

And I will remember and imagine what emotion and pain, and thoughts and conversation must have passed between Mr. and Mrs. McBane that cold November morning. I will also remember Bob McBane in November, 1995, one-half century later....

Enemy sniper fire

Pfc. V. Robert McBane, 24, Co. L, 60th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division, was killed by enemy sniper fire while on night patrol in Germany on April 19, 1945, a scant 17 days before the cessation of hostilities in Europe. He had been overseas only two months. The account of his death was not printed in the Salem News until May 7, the same day the huge headline at the top of Page One screamed: "GERMANY SURRENDERS."

Mary Alice McBane Mathews ('40) of 243 Palmer Blvd., North Fort Myers, FL 33903 distinctly recalls the day after her parents picked up that soldier returning home in November, 1945. She remembers her parents' extreme concern for the feelings of that soldier when he learned of Bob's death.

It's a small, small world!

McBane memories come via New York and California, each unknown by the other

It was one of those cool, wet spring days when gusts of wind would push rows of tulips back and forth in a lazy cadence. The promise of spring had been announced with budding trees and lawns of that early electric green color.

I was driving around Salem doing some last minute errands for my parents before starting the trip back to my home near Buffalo.

The wipers slapped away the drizzle as I caught the red light at Lundy and State Street. I looked ahead at the State Theatre building where a pastel confection called The Ice Cream Parlor now is on the corner. This once was the McBane - McArtor Drugstore, the busiest, little drugstore in Salem.

As I waited I remembered my first day of work there, August, 1953. Starting my first real job, 16, working papers in hand, polished penny loafers, bobby sox, broomstick skirt, I waited at the front of the store to be trained by some of the seniors who would soon be leaving for college. My salary would be 52¢ an hour.

It was busy that day. Sally Moore, suffering from her August allergies, dabbed at her watery eyes between customers. Gerry VanHovel glided from customer to pharmacist with prescriptions in hand. The peppery Yakubek sisters, Anna and Jeanie, were manning the soda fountains. Jere Hochadel was restocking shelves.

It was a small drugstore with a soda fountain on the left hand side. Four dark wooden booths with green formica tables. This area led to two crowded rooms where drugs were dispensed.

Vance McBane and Russell McArtor read illegible scrips, counted pills,

mixed ointments with mortar and pestle and helped care for people in Salem who knew them as Mac and Russ.

Through the years these pharmacists had employed countless Salem High juniors and seniors.

By their warm and professional demeanor these men gave many of us our first practical experience in the business world. Their influence, no doubt, sent many young men and women into pharmacy and medicine. Of my teenage co-workers Jere Hochadel is a Salem pharmacist, Pete Kerr represents a major pharmaceutical company and Bob McArtor, Russ's son, is a physician.

While these men ran their business they took a paternal interest in these young people. They were of the old school of courtesy and social grace. They always greeted us when we started a shift and never failed to bid us good night as we would close up at night. They asked about our grades, and were interested in our college plans.

The soda fountain was the center of interest for us who worked there. It had a green marble counter where a napkin dispenser and a plastic container that had crisp pretzel rods that sold for two cents were placed. Andalusia Dairy vanilla ice cream, white as snow,

was the staple for thick, frothy milk shakes, whipped by a Hamilton Beach mixer and poured into tall shake glasses. A large aluminum electric pot heated dark, rich hot fudge that would slide and puddle around ice cream mountains. Cherry and lemon Cokes were the most popular; some kids preferred the muddy taste of chocolate Cokes.

Making a soda was an art. Two squirts of flavor into the soda glass, two scoops of ice cream, drawing down the handle to direct a fine stream of carbonated soda water that churned and mixed flavor, and ice cream that bubbled up to the top and flowed down the side, a fizzy, creamy sweet delight presented with a straw and long handled spoon.

To maintain quality control all the kids who worked there freely sampled the fountain products.

Mac must have been in his early 60's when I worked there. He was a big man with closely trimmed white hair, a neat and conservative dresser who occasionally sported a bow tie. His only jewelry was a large, gold Masonic ring worn on big freckled hand.

What I remember most was his explosive booming laugh that filled the tiny store, leaving him coughing and teary eyed. He would bid the laughing salesman or customer good-bye with a pat on the back, come to the fountain, ask for a glass and draw himself a seltzer water. Still grinning he would

walk back to the tiny pharmacy area, take phone calls, peck out prescriptions on a manual typewriter.

He had lost a son in WWII. His family, wife Minnie, daughters Mary Alice and Betty, had given the Presbyterian church a long table in his memory. In the spare and functional context of this faith it served as an altar; carved gold letters read THIS DO IN REMEMBRANCE OF ME.

The only time I remember Mac losing his temper with me was as I was helping an elderly woman customer decide between two cold remedies. With all the self confidence of a 17-year-old I advised her against a certain brand. She then decided against buying either one and left the store empty handed. Mac had been standing in the middle of the store over the furnace grate. I could feel the heat of his wrath even as I spoke. A lesson learned.

Russ was younger, perhaps in his middle 40's. A spare, lean man with a high forehead, black hair combed straight back, rimless glasses that

made him look older and dark, friendly eyes. He was a quiet, deliberate man who always seemed to be in motion, rarely stopping from one task to another.

He had a low-key sense of humor, sharing jokes with the drug salesmen at the back of the store, kidding the high school boys as they went about their duties.

One quiet Saturday evening in the summer I was working alone with Russ. He was in the rear of the store when a young man in his 20's came into the empty store. He must have been a farmer, plaid shirt, pressed jeans and the kind of suntan that comes from riding a tractor all day.

I was behind the counter when he asked "Do you have any r-r-r--- bers?" The word hung between us like a heavy rope. I could feel the flush of embarrassment wash up my neck and spread over my face. I stammered, "I'll get the pharmacist." He followed me to the back room while I retreated behind the fountain. I could hear Russ's voice rising in muffled anger as he berated the young romeo. I busied myself drying glasses as the young man scuttled out of the store and into the soft, sultry twilight.

As I sat in the car it seemed as if I saw Mac, dressed in a grey topcoat, step out of the door, turn up his collar and walk to where Minnie waited in the big green Oldsmobile by the Murphy Five and Dime. She drove away and the car disappeared into the drizzle. I watched as Russ, in a black raincoat and dark hat, opened his umbrella, hunched his shoulders and walked home as he always did, with long, quick strides past Zimmerman's garage.

I was startled as the car horn sounded behind me. The light had changed.

As I drove through the intersection the sun was throwing warm splashes of light against the tired bricks of the Five and Dime. Sunlight poked lacey holes through the grey sky above Second Street.

Hall of Fame induction applauds Dixon's work

As a local newspaper columnist wrote: "Every time my wife receives an alumni newsletter I am again impressed by the professionalism and incredible accomplishment of Dixon in his work for the alumni office."

"His accomplishments rival that of alumni development officials at universities."

And so, apparently, did the Salem Hall of Fame committee when members tapped Robert J. Dixon for induction into the Hall of Fame last summer.

Dixon ('40) has overseen the daily operation of the Salem High School Alumni Association office for 10 years and initiated and produced this semi-annual newsletter sent to more than 10,000 SHS alumni nationwide.

His dedicated work has brought praise and recognition to the alumni association for providing generous scholarships to SHS seniors.

Inducted along with Dixon in 1994 were Dale Shaffer ('47), noted Salem historian; William Galchick, long-time youth

leader; and, posthumously, Brooks Bowman, composer and lyricist whose work included the song, "East of the Sun."

The Salem Hall of Fame recognizes "outstanding individual contributions to the community through accomplishments in athletics, fine arts, education, business or other significant achievements."

As established in 1989 by Kirk Lowdermilk ('81), center for the Indianapolis Colts; and Rich Karlis ('77), a former place-kicker for the Denver Broncos, the Hall of Fame is the focal point for a foundation whose mission is to assist local youths to expand their potential and prepare them to succeed in their chosen endeavor.

The foundation's distribution of \$82,645 to date has benefited youth in the areas of education, fine arts and athletics.

Inductees are presented with an engraved, personal silver bowl. Their plaques are hung in the Hall of Fame in the Salem High School foyer.

Holly Rogers is 'coach of year'

Holly Holroyd Rogers ('72), girls' cross-country coach at Clyde (Ohio) High School, was singled out for honors at the end of last season.

She was named coach of the year for District 6 which includes 49 schools from seven counties. A psychology teacher for 17 years at Clyde High, she has been cross-country coach since 1986 and is involved in the track program, too.

Her runners have reached the regional meet in six of the past eight years.

Rogers praises the girls who compete in cross-country. "I believe that

cross-country running is a sport that the girls can use the rest of their lives. It is a sport that doesn't receive a lot of recognition or support except from their parents.

"It is hard work to run 3.1 miles at a fast pace or to run five to 10 miles in practice," she says. "We usually start with girls who can't run even three miles, but they start to believe in themselves and realize that they can be competitive if they wish. It is fun to watch them improve and develop self-confidence."

The coach is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Holroyd of Salem. She was graduated from Malone College in 1976.
