It's 78th birthday for 'old' SHS

A most notable event took place 78 years ago at 8 p.m. on Jan. 5, 1917. It was the dedication of the new high school building (now the junior high) on Garfield (N. Lincoln) Ave. The facility had actually opened for use on Jan. 2. Many Salemites retain fond memories of this structure, having attended high school there long before it became a junior high.

Dedication services were in the "magnificent" new auditorium. From 4 to 8 p.m., the structure was open for inspection by the public and hundreds walked through it. Strains of beautiful music by the Hundertmarck-Gilson orchestra gradually called people into the auditorium. In future years, a lot more music and sounds would echo from those walls during concerts, pep rallies and graduation ceremonies. Few cities of 10,000 had such a modernly-designed and equipped high school at that time. Constructed of vitreous white brick, it was considered one of the most prominent structures in the city. Today, 78 years later, it still is.

The building sits on the former Trotter and Silver properties. The board of education, on March 18, 1912, had taken options of \$5,000 and \$1,000 on the two properties -- 1.07 acres from Trotter, and a 78-by-107-ft. lot from Emmor W. Silver. At the time, a log cabin stood on the Silver lot. These two properties provided a building site with frontage of 225 ft. and depth of 250 ft.

The building cost approximately \$225,000 which was a lot of money to spend on a school building in 1917. Initially, the board of education proposed a (continued on page 2)

Sebo's big surprise gift called just the beginning


A surprise gift of 1,000 shares of Paychex Inc. common stock was given to the Salem High School Alumni Association this spring by J. Robert Sebo, a SHS graduate of 1954.

In addition, Sebo promised additional gifts until such time as his contributions top \$100,000 when a specialized scholarship will be set up in his name.

Sebo was instrumental in forming the Paychex firm. His spectacular business success story was culminated in December when he retired from Paychex.

The son of John and Gertrude Sebo of Salem, he was graduated from Bowling Green State University, followed by two years as a U.S. Army officer. He then spent 15 years in sales in the Cadillac Motor Car Division of General Motors Corp.

In 1974 he established a franchise arrangement with Tom Golisano,

founder and chief executive officer of Paychex Inc.

At that time Golisano had o three employees. Sebo moved Cleveland to start the first Paychex operation outside of New York state. For five years, he built up his business as a privately held corporation.

In 1979, he merged his firm with Golisano and several others to form Paychex, a privately held organization. In 1983, they took Paychex public and since then it has been traded through the NASDAQ stock exchange.

During those years, Sebo covered just about every position as the firm went from an original four employees to more than 3,500 today, serving 190,000 clients in every major city in the U.S. Sebo will continue to serve Paychex as a member of the board of directors.

Sebo is currently building a home in Keystone, Colorado, and will be spending his winters there pursuing his favorite hobby, skiing. He is planning to golf in the summers at Salem Golf Club and Oak Hill Country Club in Rochester, NY.

bond issue for \$85,000, but it was defeated at the polls. A few months later a second vote was taken, this time for \$100,000. It, too, was turned down. Finally, a third vote was taken for \$125,000 and it passed.

There were 50 rooms in the building, including the auditorium that would hold 900 people, and a gymnasium with a playing floor that measured 72 feet by 74 feet. (This was deemed to be a glorious facility, but in later years schools such as Alliance refused to play basketball here because the floor was so small.) A running track circled overhead.

Twenty-three classrooms were planned, including special rooms for mechanical drawing, woodworking, iron-working, sewing and millinery, cooking, bookkeeping, shorthand, typing and music. There were additional rooms for offices, laboratories, lockers, heating boilers and restrooms.

Both hot air and steam were used in the automatic heating system. A large fan forced hot air throughout the rooms. It took several months, however, for the McGinnis Co. to finally adjust the system so that heat was distributed equally throughout all rooms of the building. Superintendent of schools in 1917 was John S. Alan, and L. B. French was president of the board. Frank W. Lease was high school principal. The architect was C. W. Owsley, and Frank L. Stewart (soon to be a candidate for mayor of Salem) was superintendent of construction. President French remarked at the dedication that "Stewart has been on the job since the first stakes were set, and has seen to it that the people of Salem got the school building to which they were entitled."

A silk flag was presented to the high school by Phillip Triem Camp No. 43, Sons of Veterans. In accepting the flag, Principal Lease (a member of the camp) commented: "The future security of this nation does not rest upon its armies or navies or material wealth. Real preparedness is love for the flag and the principles it represents. It stands for good citizenship, honest industry, and the principles of universal brotherhood."

(Editor's note: There were no Quaker annuals printed in 1917, 1918, 1919 and 1920 because Salem schools were closed for a time during a terrible flu epidemic. When school resumed, most of the "extras" were eliminated to permit students to catch up with their studies.)

More pictures, data requested

The research committee of the African-American History Project is busily studying inscriptions in family bibles, perusing newspaper articles and high school yearbooks and searching for oral histories and genealogies. The goal: To document the contributions of African-Americans in Salem and to publish the findings in a book.

Formed in 1994, the committee is working in conjunction with the Salem Historical Society and cooperating with the Peace Fellowship. Members include Margaret Starbuck, Minnie Kirksey, Helen Chalfont, Vivian Mason, Louise Proctor, Mary Alice Alexander, Frances Davidson and Oprice Gaskin.

For several months the committee has been reviewing yearbooks stored at the Salem High School Alumni Association where the group duplicated material from the high school annuals. Photos with black students pictured in the books have been copied in hopes of identifying them. At the same time, members have been compiling lists of area families.

The committee is gathering information from other sources, including the extensive individual research being done by project members and materials on file at the Salem Historical Museum.

Several families are being researched with hopes of making one. on-one in-depth studies.

True friend is lost

'Solid education' in Salem led to success, bequest

Dorothy Failer Binyon Sullivan, a 1921 graduate of Salem High, died in March, 1994, and left the SHS Alumni Association \$60,808 in her will. The bequest was received this spring.

Mrs. Sullivan, always a gracious lady, was a regular contributor to the association. She stipulated in her will that the bequest be used for the specific purpose of providing scholarship grants to "deserving graduating students of Salem High School."

Although born in Deerfield, she attended Salem High where she played basketball, was active in dramatics, served on the Quaker editorial staff and was vice president of the 1921 class, an unusual honor for a girl at that time.

She was a talented singer who could have had a musical career, but that line of endeavor was vetoed by her first husband. Always fond of SHS, she felt she got a solid education here that prepared her for college. Her mother sold her house here and moved to Columbus so Dorothy could attend Ohio State University.

She won a law degree there with the class of 1935 and was a member of the Delta, Delta, Delta Sorority. Her late brother, Jay ('17) also went to OSU.

After passing the Ohio bar, she worked in the legal section of the Ohio Industrial Commission, then went to New York to study music and painting. After World War II, she moved to Cleveland and became director of public relations at old Fenn College, and a member of the board of trustees of Cleveland Council on World Affairs. She was later named director of the council and stayed on for 13 years.

Her second husband, George Sullivan, died in 1991. The two had traveled extensively and spent their

Krogness pens new book *'Just Teach Me, Mrs. K.'*

Mary Mercer Krogness ('56), the talented and inspirational Shaker Heights, Ohio, teacher who was honored in 1987 as outstanding alumna by the Alumni Association, has written an outstanding new book.

Even though encumbered by the bulky title of "Just Teach Me, Mrs. K.: Talking, Reading & Writing with Resistant Adolescent Learners" the book has been enthusiastically reviewed. Mrs. Krogness says the book is designed for classroom teachers, teacher-educators, and policymakers.

It describes one teacher's journey with non-mainstream, often over-age, under-achieving 7th and 8th graders. Mrs. Krogness, a public school classroom teacher for nearly 30 years, and with broad teaching experience in grades K-8, presents classroom stories about young people from a wide range of cultural and socio-economic backgrounds. All of them share the risk of being lost to learning forever.

The book illustrates the frustrations and successes the teacher and her students faced every day in their classroom laboratory. She shows how she used nontraditional means such as improvised classroom drama, story telling, performing and writing poetry, play writing, engaging in a family folklore project, filmmaking and drawing to engage students in language learning.

"Just Teach Me, Mrs. K." tells the compelling story of a teacher who empowered her students to take control of their learning and their lives. The book is designed to inspire all teachers who want to engage students actively, to build spirit and self-esteem. It is published by Heinemann.

Lowry is Alumnus of Year

Raymond J. Lowry, a 1941 graduate, will be honored at the annual Salem High School Alumni Association banquet on June 3 as the outstanding alumnus of 1995. The dinner will be in the high school cafeteria at 6:30 p.m., according to Joe Ciotti, association president.

Lowry, a Salem businessman for many years, was selected by the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association. He will be the 38th alumnus to be honored since the custom began in 1958.

The honoree lives at 2150 Quaker Lane with his wife, the former Suzanne Bissell. They have three adult children, Barbara Sobotka, Nancy Mahon and Christopher Lowry, all Salem High graduates. Lowry is the son of the late Raymond and Gertrude Layden Lowry.

He attended St. Paul School ('37), Salem High ('41) and after three years in the Army attended and was graduatd from Ohio Wesleyan University in 1949. He returned to Salem and purchased the Salem Builders Supply which evolved into Lowry Supply Co. and subsidiaries as an industrial supply company.

He is currently chairman of the Lowry Supply Co., Lowry Packaging and Lowry Grinding Service in Salem. He also is chairman of Tri-Co Tool Sales of Cuyahoga Falls and Adventure Tool Supply of Meadville, Pa.

Lowry was elected to the board of directors of Citizens Banking Co. in 1985 and became a director of its affiliate, First National Bank of Chester, in 1990. In 1993 he was elected chairman of the board of directors of Citizens Banking Co. and vice chairman of Citizens Bancshares. The latter is a \$750 million bank holding company and the parent of Freedom Financial Life Insurance Co., First National Bank of Chester and Citizens Banking Co. Prior to his appointment, owry served 21 years as a director and then vice chairman of the First National Bank of Salem.

He also served as director and

executive committee member of Society Bank of Northeast Ohio.

His community service includes 25 years as director of Salem Community Hospital and former service on the and Salem Planning Zoning Salem Utilities Commission. Commission, Industrial Development Commission of Ohio and the Salem Industrial Development Area Corporation.

If the ring needs fitted, sized or the stone is damaged the Jostens firm will replace stones and size the ring free of charge.



Works in pathology

War ends 50 years ago. . . Battered teletype clatters the message: It's over!

Here we are at the summer of 1995. I can't believe it was 50 years ago when I was a Tec 4, camped with the 223rd Signal Company up in the far northeast corner of India, ready to start the long trip to China. Our convoy left Chabua early one morning (the army always did everything at night or early in the morning) and headed south on the Stilwell Road to Burma.

I still remember the funny names of the towns along the way ----Shingbwiyang, Shadazup, Myitkyina (Mitcheena), Bhamo. At Muse we crossed the Irrawaddy River and joined old Burma Road and headed northeast to the Chinese border.

Of all the places I saw in the CBI (China-Burma-India) Theater, Burma was the prettiest. Beautiful green valleys, rice paddies surrounding the villages, handsome people, and the kids running beside us calling and waving.

Crossing into China, we went through Lungling, Paoshan, and finally arrived at a camp on the side of a hill overlooking a tiny village called Yunnanyi. There was nothing much there but an airstrip used by the Flying Tigers. The whole trip covered about 650 miles and for 10 days we just ground along in the heat, eating dust and K Rations. Yunnanyi looked pretty good even if it was out in the boondocks and 100 miles from anywhere. It was so remote that even though binding the feet of females had been outlawed a long time back, some of the old women still hobbled around on badly deformed stumps.

Then one night it happened. I was Charge of Quarters on duty from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. A battered old teletype machine started to chatter. I wondered how in the world a message could be so important it had to go on the wire at 2 a.m.

Then it began to appear: "...It was announced earlier today that an atomic device has been detonated over the city of Hiroshima, Japan, resulting in total destruction and a large number of casualties."

Being an engineering student, I had read enough physics to understand what this meant. Releasing the energy of the atom would produce an explosion beyond all comprehension.

Tearing the paper from the machine I raced down the company street yelling "WAKE UP!....WAKE

Honored were the memories of Bill Andre and Joe Plegge. Officers of the '42 class said the response to the plea to members was gratifying.



Where they were at war's end

The end of World War II in August of 1945 found Salemites all over the world and the good news was widely celebrated.

Bob Schaeffer ('35) was a Marine stationed in Washington where everyone knew it meant getting out of the service early. "Everyone got drunk," he says.

Bob Zeck ('43) was serving aboard a Navy cargo ship between Okinawa and Guam. "The captain announced the news over the intercom and all work was halted. We dumped our ammo in crates and then fired at it as it floated away."

Jack Rance ('44), a Navy storekeeper, was stationed on Okinawa where the wild celebration turned ugly. Six servicemen were killed by gunfire before all firearms were confiscated.

Bob Dixon ('40), a Coast Guard yeoman, was in San Francisco where young servicemen all but dismantled historic Market Street. The celebration lasted for two days.

Crazy 17-16 game was wild!

March 11, 1938 was the date of one of the most exciting and unusual Salem High basketball victories in history. Played at the Goodyear Gym in Akron, the game pitted the Quakers in a district tournament game against city champion Akron North. The Vikings featured All-Ohio center Stan Baughman, who later starred for Mt. Union college, and guard Freddie Fanelly.

Salem's squad included Max Lutsch, Gilbert Everhart, Ollie Olexa, Jim Dickey, Bill Schaeffer, Burton Sutter, Galen Duncan, Leonard Bonsall, Les Knepp, Glenn (Dinty) McLaughlin and Amos Dunlap. They were coached by Herb Brown. Team managers were Ward Eckstein and Earl (Pete) Taflan.

The Quakers had only a 10-4 regular season record and were accorded little or no chance against North. Compared to today's racehorse game, the battle at Akron was truly a strange he.

Throwing up a smothering man-to man defense, Salem humiliated North in the first half. After the first quarter ended 2-2, Salem moved to a halftime 7-2 lead, holding North scoreless in the second quarter. And this was a high scoring Viking team that was aiming at a state championship season.

The Quakers outscored North 7-1



The Quakers hung on tenaciously to win, 17-16, although outscored 13-3 in the last eight minutes. Wild-eyed Quaker followers had screamed themselves hoarse.

Olexa led the Salem club with seven points, while Dickey and Lutsch each scored four. Dickey now lives in Akron and says he runs into Fanelly occasionally and kids the old Viking star about the tournament game.

Talk about defense! The Quakers made only six of 33 shots for 18 per cent, compared to North's seven for 41 and 17 percent. Salem was five of 11 at the foul line, North made only two of nine. Lutsch, Olexa, Sutter, Dunlap and Knepp are deceased, but the rest of the team is still around and more than glad to talk about that crazy Akron North game. They likely don't care to discuss their 19-18 loss to Akron St. Vincent the following night.
