Millenium reunion brings in \$15,000 for boosters

Renewing old friendships, forging new ones with a common bond

B. J. Cooper Abrams ('68) tells us that \$15,000 was raised from the millenium reunion, an amount split between the Band Boosters and the Athletic Boosters. For graduates who wanted to, but couldn't make it, she's written up a reprise of the event:

"Well, it's all over and what an event it was! Renewing old friendships. What a busy weekend. We started by decorating downtown Salem, took tours of Salem junior and senior high school buildings, the historical museum, Butler Institute of Art, the Burchfield Museum and the alumni office. Frank Zamarelli headed up our pancake breakfast, an all class photo was taken and the biggest, best dance ever at the Saxon Club featured the New Breed and five other bands.

"Two hundred people attended the banquet Friday night, with Coach Earle Bruce the speaker.

"A plaque designed by Don Wolfgang ('67) was unveiled, honoring all coaches, athletic directors and band directors for the past 100 years. The plaque was signed by everyone attending the banquet, which was emceed by Tom Vacar ('67).

"Don also designed a commemorative plate with the alma mater on the back. The plate was signed by the author, Barbara Butler Greene ('44). A commemorative book researched and donated by the Salem News was given to everyone who purchased a ticket for any of the events. Gary Bielski ('68) designed a sign used in city parades for advertising. Mayor Larry DeJane

('60) made a special proclamation for the event, and Jerry Wolford ('57) video taped the banquet, breakfast, dance and bands. Larry Shields gave the millenium great press coverage in the Salem News, with about a dozen articles. Gary and Cheryl Kekel ('66) planned the music entertainment.

"A time capsule was sponsored by Connie Bowman Rowe ('62). The capsule was buried Oct. 20 in a special ceremony at the high school by Tom Wright ('66) and Gary Abrams ('64) and marked with markers donated by Logue Monument and The Salem High School Alumni Association. Items in the time capsule include the millennium plate, booklet, photos and video to be opened in July 2050. The Salem High School Marching Band participated in the ceremony."

Nancy Gilbertson featured artist in Kent series

Nancy Cody Gilbertson ('72) presented a piano recital as a featured artist for the Kent State Salem Artist-Lecture Series at the local campus on Sept. 28. Music of Haydn and Brahms was featured as well as selections from her current CD.

She received her first musical training from pianist Helen Timm in Salem. She was active in the high school music department as an accompanist in choral programs under F. Edwin Miller. She also played the saxophone and timpani under band instructors Dr. Howard Pardee and Richard Howenstein.

A member of the music faculty at Wells College in Aurora, N. Y. since

1986, Nancy teaches piano, piano pedagogy, music theory and composition. She maintains a private piano studio in Moravia, N. Y.

She was staff accompanist at Ithaca College from 1988 to 1998. An active performer in the New York Finger Lakes area as a soloist and chamber musician, she has premiered works by Ruth Lomon and Margaret Fairlie-Kennedy.

A graduate of the Hugh A. Glauser School of Music at Kent State University, Nancy received a bachelor and master degree in piano performance. Her teachers include the late Lois Ozanich, Frederick Schoettler and Hugh A. Glauser.

She founded Horizon Performances, a chamber music series funded by the National Endowment of the Arts through the Cayuga County Arts Council.

She serves as a judge for the National Federation of Junior Music Festivals, National Piano Guild Auditions and the Central New York Music Teachers Association Senior Piano Competition.

Nancy recently released her first CD recording, "Mediterranean Magic," featuring the music of Israel, Greece, Egypt, Spain and Italy. The CD also includes work by Kent State University emeritus Professor Halim El-Dabh.

JoAnn Dahlquist discovers world is a small place

I came to Connecticut in 1966 and worked for many years in the legal department of a Fortune 500 company headquartered here in Meriden. When I early retired in 1989 I thought it was time to become involved in volunteer work that I'd never had time for before. A group from my church prepared and served a noon day meal at the local soup kitchen every other Friday. They were short of help and I began helping them.

The soup kitchen operated out of the local Salvation Army building and at that time served a midday meal four days a week. When our group's coordinator became ill I became the coordinator and assumed her seat on the board of directors and was also elected secretary.

Like the U. S. Army, the Salvation Army moves its officers around, and after several years a new and very young lieutenant was sent to this citadel. Shortly after his arrival, he married another young Salvation Army lieutenant. And two lovelier people you could never find.

At that time, I was still getting Yesteryears, included in the Tuesday edition of the Salem News. Needless to say, I pored over both papers. In one issue I noticed a picture of a young man in a naval uniform who bore the same last name as my young Salvation Army friend. Struck by the coincidence since the name is not a common one, I clipped out the article and picture and left it on my friend's desk with a note asking (jokingly, I thought!) if this was a relative.

I had no sooner reached home than came a phone call from him asking where I'd gotten the clipping. From my hometown newspaper, I told him. Where is your home town? Salem, Ohio. Imagine my surprise: The fellow in the picture was his brother. My friend came from Salem, too, he graduated in 1991.

His name is Marcus Jugenheimer, now Captain Jugenheimer and this summer he and his wife and their two adorable little girls transferred to a new post at Staten Island. How we all miss them!

You just cannot imagine the fun we had talking about Salem. His parents now live near Lisbon and he gets back to Ohio much oftener than I. One never knows when "the small world" is going to catch up with you!

After graduating from SHS in 1946, I went to Tokyo in February of 1950 to work for the Department of the Army. As many of you will remember, the "peace action" in Korea began in June of that year, and soon there were many young men from Salem passing through Tokyo on their way to Korea.

By that time I was living in a housing development built on an old kamikaze airfield - the "main drag" was the old airstrip. A short distance beyond this housing area was a replacement depot where the soldiers were processed; they were there for a few days and then sent on to Korea.

Many fellows from Salem went through this depot, and I got many a

call from someone I'd known from Salem. Sometimes there wasn't enough time to do more than a short chat on the phone, other times I was able to meet with one and chat in person. To the best of my knowledge, all but one of these fellows returned home safely. I believe that one is still listed as "missing in action."

The winter of 1950-51 brought a heavy snowstorm to Salem, and my father, who was an avid photographer, sent me a set of pictures he'd taken of the mountainous piles of snow all over town. By this time I was maintaining a correspondence from Tokyo with Salem fellows stationed all over the Far East, and this set of pictures traveled from one to another in Korea, Guam, Okinawa, Japan, and I don't remember where all else.

Millenium reunion footnotes

Mark Hurray ('74) has a "small world" to share with our readers, a meeting which took place during the millenium reunion on July 1. "Like most people, I searched the hundreds and hundreds of faces for old friends and classmates," Mark says. "It took awhile to put a name to one face, but after I approached him I figured out it was Rick Eckstein, SHS 1960. Rick had been my boss in 1998 when I was a senior staff engineer for American Electric Power in Buchanan Michigan Nuclear Generation Headquarters. Rick was the interim engineering manager, on loan from the Institute of Nuclear Power Operations in Atlanta, Ga. I had no idea he was from Salem at the time and had no reason to ask. Rick and I had a good laugh over this at the reunion! It goes to show that Salem Quakers are out there everywhere, and it's a small world sometimes!"

Another note about the millenium reunion from **Chuck Emmerling ('64)** of Westerville: "Thanks for a great weekend; let's schedule the next one!"

Karen Citino ('81) had a wonderful time, too: "Just wanted to express how much fun I had at the 2000 reunion at the Saxon Club. It was great and I think you should plan something again, for all

classes...because it was great seeing people that were older and younger than myself, even though I didn't graduate with them."

Jim Rogers ('65) wrote to thank everyone who made the year 2000 celebration a fun time, and has a neat story to remember from the weekend. "This happened on a tour of the senior high," he writes. "I caught up with the tour a few minutes late. There were about 10 others in the tour. One of the gentlemen in the tour introduced himself as a member of the Class of 1966. After the tour I had a chance to chat a bit with him and another gentleman. He asked me where I was living and what I was doing. I told him I was working for ABC TV in Hollywood and was in the engineering end of the business. ABC happens to be owned by the Walt Disney Company. It turns out he was doing engineering consulting work for the ABC-owned TV station in San Francisco and the other gentleman worked for Disney World in Orlando. I had to think to myself what the chances were for having run into these two gentlemen out of a group of 10 Salem High alumni! We all had a great laugh and talked a little shop. We really do live in a small world!"

Randy Strader's life holds many dimensions

Randy P. Strader ('61) has been in business in Salem for 19 years, with The Al-Xander Co. Inc., located at 3735 McCracken Road, distributing and manufacturing air and hydraulic components such as valves, cylinders, industrial hoses and fittings.

Randy's company was named one of 2000's 50 outstanding small distributors by Cahner's Industrial Distribution Magazine in its July issue. Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. of Akron and CSC Steel Ltd. of Warren nominated his company which he says is "just a mom and pop operation."

His mom and pop operation created a Strader-designed quick-disconnect coupling used on the space shuttle, a design Randy came up with in 1986 for NASA contractors Martin-Marietta and McDonald Douglas. He also worked directly with NASA on the project. The coupling couldn't be patented because he designed it from existing commercially available components.

Al-Xander has been operational since 1961 and was acquired by Randy n September 1981 when he moved the business from North Lima to Salem where it has been family-owned and operated since.

"I"ve always tried to run the business from what a purchasing agent would expect," Randy says. "It's easy for a salesmen to sell and just walk away. But we follow through until the customer has what he needs and is satisfied."

The company owns a 1986 patent on a hydraulic cylinder used for pickup truck beds and has a strong market in the farm, coal and lumber industries for the item. The cylinders are manufactured in Tonawanda, N. Y.

Randy has over 200 customers, mostly in Ohio and Pennsylvania, but he does work for companies as distant as Kansas. Al-Xander does sub-contract work for area manufacturers.

Another company, Amcan Productions is run by his sons, Jeff and Brandon, and is a light welding outfit that sub-contracts machining and also handles his band, Galaxy, in which his sons perform.

Galaxy has been performing for eight years and has been selected by the

Ohio Weekly Entertainment Magazine as one of Ohio's top five classic rock and roll bands, and as the state's most versatile, in its ability to span almost 50 years of rock and roll. The group was featuring during the opening evening of Salem's Jubilee 2000 festivities this past July.

Randy is celebrating his 40th year as a performer. His band, Randy and the Renegades, was the first local band to achieve national attention back in 1961. Randy plays guitar and performs vocals.


Chuck Reaggle is the band's lead guitarist and also performs vocals. He has been performing since 1971.

Jeff Strader, a performer since 1985, performs on drums and vocals. Brandon "Spike" Strader, Randy's younger son, performs vocals for the newer rock music.

Besides his band and business, Randy is interested in athletics. He won the shot put event at the Northeast Ohio Senior Olympics at Struthers on June 2 with a record throw of 36-7, competing in the 55-59 age bracket. He won the discus with a throw of 86-7.

Randy also took first place on June 17 in the 50-plus age group for both the shot put and discus at Pegasus Invitational Track Meet in East Liverpool.

Finishing in first place in both shot put and discus at the Ohio Senior Olympics on

July 15, Randy took third in javelin.

He'll compete in the United States Senior Olympics which will be held in Baton Rouge, La. on July 15 to 28, 2001. Randy has been a member of the United States Masters Track and Field since 1984 and competes in the 55 to 59 age bracket.

Charles Fox was born in Lisbon in 1903 and attended Lisbon public schools and the East Liverpool Business School. He was employed by the Salem China Co. from 1925 to 1950, and then began working at the Salem Label Co. where he retired as secretary-treasurer in 1969.

A love for music resulted in his founding and becoming a charter member of the Community Concert Association. Openly enthusiastic about talented youth, upon his death in 1972 he designated the income from his estate to be used to support the Community Concerts and the Scholarship Fund of the Salem High School Alumni Association.

Providing help for future graduates of Salem High School through memorial gifts, bequests, estate memorials and class gifts, Salem High School Alumni have donated \$83,182.81 since June 1, 2000. This amount includes the \$15,790 donated by the Reunion Classes of 2000 and the \$13,500 raised by the Class of 1942 as a WWII Memorial to Bill Andre and Joe Plegge. For Mary Jane Coffee, these are carefree days

"She had come across a photo of the two of us taken in a photo arcade booth," Mary Jane writes. "I suppose we were 13 or so. She remarked with longing, 'Those were our carefree days!'

"As I thought about her comment, I realized that I am living in my most carefree days now. At the time of the photo I did have fun and enjoyed many wonderful friends and experiences. However, I was fairly serious and my concern about good school performance and decisions about the future weighed heavily.
