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Cheryl and Gary Kekel compose SHS fight song

Theme focuses on pride of being a Quaker from Salem

Their collaboration in all things musical goes back in time to their seventh grade days at Salem Junior High School when the two became close friends.

Cheryl Hundertmarck and Gary Kekel shared their joy in music as they sang in ensembles and choirs during those junior high days and on into high school, the friendship continuing past graduation in 1966. After going their separate ways to college, Gary to Dana and Cheryl to Baldwin Wallace, and beyond, the two always kept in touch.

Cheryl Lanza was a young widow with two youngsters living in Salem and singing with the Youngstown Symphony Choir and a group, Cashmere, comprised of Roger Ziegler, Steve Pridon and John Volio.

Gary was entertaining cruise guests and club goers in the Tampa Bay-Clearwater areas for several years. He was the musical director for singer Maureen McGovern's national tour in the 1970s.

Eventually, they renewed their special friendship, which blossomed into marriage. And as seasoned veterans in the recording and music production business, they are true partners.

Today, the duo's special chemistry stimulates their audiences in their appearances as Kekel and Kekel at country clubs, private parties and special events. They've never grown tired of working together, and look forward to planning their performances or working day-to-day in their fully-

digital audio production house, Mainsail Music and Audio Production on the Green in Canfield for the past six years.

The company's success is based on the individual musical talents of the owners as performers and writers, and on a mutual understanding of advertising concepts.

So it wasn't a surprise when their friends Salem High Band Director Jim Purrington, Assistant Director John Krauss, and Junior High Instructor Lu Ann Cole brought up the idea this past spring of the Kekels creating an original Quaker Fight Song for Salem High School. School Superintendent David Brobeck was pushing for a new

song to create a "unifying momentum" within the high school, they told the Kekels. Fight songs used in the past at the high school were adapted from Ohio State, Notre Dame and other colleges. Bob and Karen Sebo commissioned the project. Sebo was a bandsman during his high school years in Salem, and since retiring has been involved in numerous community projects.

The basic idea in writing the fight song, Gary says, was to downplay violence. "To feel pride where you came from, and honor in doing your best, rather than 'beat them up, smear them and knock them down,'" Gary

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says. "What we wanted to say was to give all your effort to something and be proud of it, whether it applied to a sports team, music or a debate team."

The last line was dedicated to the alumni, Gary says, "because being alums, we know what influence Salem High School has had in our lives." The line reads, "With our heads held high and our Quaker pride, we show the world that we're from Salem High!"

"When we were writing lyrics, we agreed that that was the whole image we wanted to project," Cheryl says. "We want people to feel proud that they're from Salem."

When devising the fight song, Gary was aware that the melody must be easy to sing and within the range of most singers.

For Gary, the musical idea lies inside him and he pulls it out to develop the music and melody. As he composes, he imagines the instrumentation and orchestration of the song.

For alumni who want to hear the Quaker Pride song, Cheryl and Gary are recording the lyrics for the alumni web page, and they'll be placing a second version, the recording of the marching band on the site, too. Bob Dixon's contribution to alumni is lasting

I'd raised my family and was working as a reporter and feature writer for Editor Gail Beck at the Salem News in 1984 when I met Robert James Dixon. I'd heard that he'd been a reporter for the News in his early years, and that he was back in town to start a unique job, to open an office for the Salem High School Alumni Association which had been "loosely" run since its inception in 1880. As the executive coordinator for the association, his duties were to set up and manage an association office in quarters above Danny Smith Jewelers along State Street.

To say he threw himself into the job is an understatement; his dedication was obvious to everyone who knew him, and the new alumni operation was an immediate success. Ten years after he opened the office, he was inducted into the Salem Hall of Fame in recognition of his dedication to the association. In particular, he was lauded for initiating a newsletter to be sent to over 11,000 Salem graduates.

Bob Dixon was 79 when he died Sept. 18 at his home in Oscoda, Mich. He and his wife, the former Ruth Esther Koelbl had moved following his retirement in December 1995.

Bob was born Sept. 12, 1922 in Salem to Andrew W. and Mabel Barton Dixon, and graduated from Salem High in 1940. He enrolled in classes at Brigham Young University in Utah.

During World War II, he served as a yeoman in the Coast Guard, seeing duty aboard a troop transport ship in the Pacific Theater and at the District Coast Guard Office in San Francisco.

A newspaperman for 28 years, he started as a reporter at the Salem News in 1946, and moved on to become sports editor. In 1951 he moved to the Massillon Evening Independent and later to the Ashland Times Gazette and Mansfield News Journal. For 16 years, he worked for the Mount Vernon News and was named managing editor in 1971. A year later he was appointed editor.

In 1977, he moved into state gov-

ernment, taking a writing position with the Ohio CETA program in Columbus. There he edited the departmental newsletter. After seven years, he retired from the Ohio Bureau of Employment Service and returned to Salem.

The Dixons covered the Munich Olympic games for the Mount Vernon News. In 1967 he attended the American Press Institute at Columbia University in New York City.

A track and field enthusiast, he was the field announcer at the Mansfield Relays. He also served on

the board of directors and was later president of the Wayne Russell Track Classic in Salem.

A life member of Elks Lodge 305, Bob was a member of the Associated Press Managing Editors Association, Bowling Writers Association of America and Oscoda Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 3735. He served as president of the Knox County Bowling Association in the 1960s.

Memorial contributions in Bob's memory can be made to the alumni association.

Former teacher Mumford remembers students

When a member of the Salem High Class of 1951 heard that a favorite teacher, Donald Mumford, would be in the Pittsburgh area in July for a family reunion and business meetings, she decided to organize a luncheon meeting.

Eva Rae Hannay Cody got on the phone and contacted him, then called Mr. Mumford's former students, and the get together was set for a Holiday Inn restaurant on the Beaver Falls-New Castle Turnpike.

Below is a portion of the text of the letter Mr. Mumford scribed to Eva Rae:

"For a person who claims not to write well you have a beautiful hand, and have been most helpful to me as I struggle through my lack of memory to bring back so many names and faces from Salem. I have never seen anything like the SHS alumni Association Newsletter into which some people must be putting plenty of energy and time, not to mention talent. The articles are pure gold, Johnny Cabas, Bob Sebo, Bruce Gordon, all of whom I remember. I was, however, disappointed that there was no mention of the 50th reunion of the Class of 1951. Well, maybe next time. If it is possible to get on the Letter's mailing list I would appreciate it and if a fee is necessary I will pay it."

"I now have the reunion booklet and the group picture - what a great group of people! I also received a note from Treva Bush Miller, Class of '50, who was in Spanish II back then.

"It will be a busy time for us old folks. Dinner with friends from 70 years ago on Friday evening, hopefully lunch with people from Salem Saturday noon, the reunion in the evening, back to the old church on Sunday morning and then to family cemetery plots in Beaver Falls and Grove City later in the day. I have an appointment with a publisher in Pittsburgh on Monday morning on our way back home which will just about finish off the old geezers.

"If anyone is interested, and knowledgeable about the Internet I

have a book of six short stories published which can be ordered by bringing up www.xlibris.com/donmumford. The title is 'Life After Death,' eerie isn't it? But it's not supernatural at all, just some meanderings of my mind about those who are left to mourn after los-

ing a loved one. Come to think of it, you probably understand as well as anyone, this idea. And it is true, isn't that some people don't mourn, they are at loose ends and find a way to cope."

Mumford's letter to the Class of 1951

That first day, Spanish II, and that unforgettable gang of kids.

Earl Kerr appearing with Nivea Marta Vergel - turning her over to me and taking off. Nivea confiding in me her huge crush on Jaime. A fiesta in the gym, Miss Doxsee kept turning on the lights, and I kept turning them off.

As a reward, getting the U. S. History and Government courses since Miss Ulichy was returning from an illness. Joe Guiler was a great sport about it. A trip to Youngstown to the theater, to meet Bill Lawrence and ask him to choose the Quaker King and Queen.

Eligible bachelor Kenny Jacobs who arrived on the faculty the same day I did and a girl (none of you, of course) screaming, "Oh, he's so dreamy!"

The day I wrapped up the Studebaker at the intersection of routes 7 and 14, hitched a ride and spent the night at Marge Willis' home.

The Big Snow, the day after Thanksgiving 1950. Each year the

snow gets deeper as I retell the story. Why, oh why, did I go to Salem that day?

The Prom - and a bunch of otherwise dignified local businessmen entertaining you, in drag.

Graduation at Reilly Field, you all marching in the breeze across and then down front to the chairs (I must add here that I made two round trips to Salem that day and evening. I wanted my wife to see you, and like many teachers, I had a tear or two, seeing you leave). My editors were the student speakers, and I was so proud.

I hesitate to mention names for fear of omitting someone, but after all, I'm 78 and senile. But as I finish this I must say goodbye to the ones I knew best: Jim, Bob, Skip, Don, Tommie, Ed, two more Bobs, Mary, Nancy, Koula, Liz, Jeanne and of course, Barbara and Dick.

Bruce Gordon urges seniors to remember their roots

Change is inevitable, progress is optional and commitment is necessary. Alumnus of the Year Bruce Gordon ('52) told students and alumni gathered for the annual scholarship awards program June 2 at Salem High School. The dinner portion of the event, hosted by the Salem Alumni Association, was cancelled by the Board of Education because a third case of meningitis occurred in the area. People attending received the antibiotic which was handed out throughout the evening at Southeast School.

"Never forget your values," Gordon told the graduating seniors. "Your small town roots will do you well. Community service and volunteerism is what has made Salem a great city."

Quoting Calvin Coolidge's words that character comes from roots, he said that "roots are more important than leaves." He said that his wish for the graduating seniors is "that you don't forget where you came from."

Members of the Class of 1951 who were honored as 50-year graduates, donated \$10,900 to the Alumni Association. The Class of 1941 gave \$3,062.50 to the association.

A total of \$167,125 was given to 49 students in the 2001 graduating class by the Alumni Association. Among the awards presented by the Alumni Association was the J. Robert Sebo Bowling Green University Scholarship.

Betty Lucas dies in Cleveland

Services for Betty Lucas, 79, of Cleveland Heights ('40), retired director of scheduling for all Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority bus and transit routes died Aug. 21 at the Homewood Residence, an assisted-living center.

She began her career with the Cleveland Transit System, later RTA, as a streetcar operator in 1943. Five years later, she started working in the scheduling department. Betty was promoted to superintendent of schedules for RTA in 1977 and to director of scheduling in 1980. She supervised a staff of workers who continually updated schedules to meet the changing needs of RTA riders.

After retiring in 1983, Betty worked as a consultant to transit systems in other parts of the United States.

A volunteer at Huron Hospital in East Cleveland, she was a member of the Eta Phi Beta Sorority, Baha'i Faith of Cleveland Heights and East Cleveland Kiwanis Club.

Contributors are cornerstone of association

The large contributions made to the Alumni Association in past decades are the cornerstone of the endowment.

Their foresight in looking toward the future has been the strength of the association. Although many of them are remembered as benevolent givers by the alumni of Salem High, others may not be as familiar.

Leon Colley was the youngest bank examiner in the United States when he accepted the position of cashier at the First National Bank in Salem. He and his wife, Enid were childless, but adopted Salem as theirs. Leon moved up to the presidency of the bank and then given the duties of chief operating officer. When he died on May 1, 1981, he left the alumni association \$601,000; the growth and income from this bequest represents a large portion of the association endowment.

Florence C. Schafer ('23) left the Alumni Association \$231,003 when she died on Nov. 21, 1996. The Alumni Association owns the building, and has its offices on the second floor of Florence's father's tavern. Her class ring is displayed in a case where visitors can view the football from the Thanksgiving Day game in 1929.

Doris Tetlow was a seventh grade teacher in the Salem School District and a talented singer, living with her mother in Salem. When she died on Dec. 6, 1982, the bequest in her will totalled nearly \$222,000 to the Alumni Association.

Stella Loop, the sister-in-law of longtime Salem High School history teacher, Ruth Loop, first gave a memorial of \$10,000 in memory of her husband, Wade Loop. Then she left a bequest of \$53,000 in her will.

Dorothy Failer Sullivan ('21) was an attorney who died on March 23, 1994, leaving the Alumni Association 25 percent of her estate which was about \$61,000.

Born in Lisbon and educated in Lisbon schools, Charles Fox was openly enthusiastic about talented youth and when he died in 1972, he designated the income from his estate be used to support the Community Concerts and the Scholarship Fund of the SHS Alumni Association. Given to students in fields related to medicine who are beginning the second year of their professional program since 1992, the income is generally around \$9,000 per year, so this ongoing contribution to

date has made available about \$89,000 for the needs of this group of SHS graduates. The Scholarship Fund has supplemented the money by about \$26,000 to produce \$114,500 in Fox Medical Scholarships since their inception.

Donald Greenamyre left about \$25,000 as a memorial in memory of his wife, Betty Roessler Greenamyre ('42).

Fred Cope ('25) was another Honored Alumnus as well as a teacher, coach and athletic director. When he died on Oct. 1, 1997, his family established the Fred and Doris Cope Scholarship Fund. Memorial totals over \$35,000 today. Additional Max Fisher Athletic Scholarships have been given

from time to time with income from this fund.

When William Guappone ('35) died on July 1, 1998, he made the Association the beneficiary of an insurance policy. It bequeathed \$10,668.

Named Honored Alumnus in 1988, Harvey M. Walken ('46) contributed \$10,000 to the Scholarship Fund.

Originally, Eugene Young donated \$7500 to the Alumni Association with the W. Eugene Young Trust in memory of his parents, Harry W. and Bessie Young. The trust, administered by the Salem Community Foundation, produces about \$800 in income per annum.

Edith Lynn White left the Association a total of \$33,210.

Elizabeth previously earned the coveted James Beard Foundation Award as 1995 America's Best Chef: Southeast.

Among people in the restaurant world, the James Beard Foundation nominations and awards rival the status of Oscar in the movie industry; it's the pinnacle of achievement. Entrants are judged by colleagues in the food world and nominations go to only the five with the most votes.

Desserts are a specialty at Elizabeth's and people come back time and again for her sherry-laced Savannah Cream Cake, her version of the English trifle. "The highest compliment I receive is when 'regular' clients, those who visit us annually on business trips or en route to or from Florida, remark, 'This is as good as three years ago or as good as I remembered,'" Elizabeth says.

"The trick is to be creative for our frequent local customers from Savannah," she says. "We do that by using seasonal ingredients and offering inventive daily specials in addition to the consistent menu items."

Some classic entrees include Savannah red rice with Georgia

shrimp and Coastal Grouper Celeste. Seasonal specials feature shad stuffed with shad roe or local crab cakes and local sauteed oysters. "We know what we do, and when we do that well, we've succeeded. So, we keep our menu focused on what we do best," she says.

Elizabeth continues as executive chef and works alongside the staff, particularly on special events, season-

al menus and on business decisions.

She and Michael are no longer in the dining room every night, but they spend many days in the restaurant. They enjoy sitting at their favorite tables, admiring the live oaks and herb gardens through the windows.

The state-to-state rates are 4.9 cents per minute for both long distance and toll-free number calls, 5.9 cents within Ohio, calling card calls are 12.9 cents per minute with no access charges, and still six second billing increments on all calls (30 second min-

imum). We really feel that this six second billing increment is what produces the tremendous savings on our phone bills. However, there is a \$2.95 monthly fee, which is waived in any month your monthly usage is \$25 or more. You can receive the lowest long distance rates available and every call you make supports the Salem High School Alumni Association.

Facts about fundraising in this fall of 2001

The largest tax cut in two decades made its way through Congress with blinding speed, offering tax savings of various kinds to nearly all tax-paying Americans. But before you start planning what to do with your newfound tax savings, you need to be aware of some of the not so usual aspects of this new act: Some provisions are phased in over a number of years, some do not take effect until much later and some will disappear in 2011 unless re-enacted into law at that time. Anyone who paid federal income tax in 2000 probably already has the promised rebate check by now. The source of this rebate is a reduction in the 15% tax bracket on the first \$6000 of taxable income to 10%. The alternative minimum tax break that some taxpayers are subject to may not be as large as those subject to the regular tax. Federal tax brackets dropped by 1% this July 1, and continue to drop until 2006. And the federal estate tax will be

gradually reduced and eventually repealed until 2010. But in 2011 it will be back unless the repeal is re-enacted all over again.

Your deductions are worth more in 2001 than any other time in the foreseeable future, since tax rates will continue to fall. Perhaps your most flexible deductions are your charitable contributions. If you are planning a gift in the near future, it might make sense to make it this year. You may be able to give more without diminishing what you planned to leave to other beneficiaries because of the estate-tax changes and/or through tax savings on gifts during your lifetime.

Gifts can be given that not only further the mission of the Alumni association but also help you with year-end tax breaks. The government allows unlimited gifts to non-profit organizations such as the Salem High School Alumni Association. More and more charitable gifts are made with non-

cash assets, such as stocks of publicly traded companies or shares of mutual funds. The appreciated value of a stock that may be paying low dividends can be "unlocked" through the use of various charitable gift techniques. Remember that appreciated property such as stock or mutual fund shares makes an ideal way to fund the scholarship awards made by the Salem High School Alumni Association. Gifts must be made by December 31 in the tax year for which you plan to take the deduction. And be sure to consult a tax advisor.

Remember that funds for scholarships are our only purpose! Whether you help us provide those funds by giving a memorial for a close friend, family member or classmate, or make a contribution to offset the newsletter and office costs, it all furthers our mission of raising scholarship money for our Salem High School graduating seniors.
