Smith's original work opens Paralympic Winter Games Versatile composer, conductor's interest ranges from rock to symphonic

When the brassy fanfare erupted, heralding the opening ceremony of the VIII Paralympic Winter Games March 7 in Salt Lake City, the music's composer was following every nuance of tone and meaning of his original concepts from his seat in the Olympics stadium.

Greg Smith's theme, "The Spirit Within," underlining the athletes' discipline, determination and triumph, began the two-hour extravaganza which opened the Paralympics competition for 430 athletes from 36 countries with a functional physical disability.

Competition is heavy, because many of the people vying in the games were athletic competitors in various sports before they were disabled. An elite, world class and well-trained group of challenged athletes take part.

Greg's composition was a musical panorama of the west, telling the story of its mountains, valleys and streams and its animal inhabitants and people.

The Utah Symphony performed the music, along with a 150-voice choir comprised of Utah college students. Greg composed an arrangement of the national anthem for the choir, which is heralded by trumpets. Utah resident Donny Osmond sang Greg's centerpiece song, "Inspire the Spirit" which was written with lyricist Sarah Weeks. Among the musical presentations was an ice skating ballet choreographed by Jo Jo Starbuck.

Greg composes his music in a quiet, isolated studio in Iron Canyon in .he Santa Clarita Valley - "the only sounds are the computer and the birds," he says.

Greg and his wife, the former Betty Migliarini, have lived in California for nearly 10 years, and are pleased they made the move from Manhattan where they lived for 11 years. The couple has three boys, Derrick, 16; Brian, 14; and Kevin, 7. "We were discouraged by the day-to-day crimes in New York; then we came out here to LA and it's been a good move. This is one of the three major cities for film and television work; the other two are New York and Nashville."

Because he's versatile and can do a variety of composing work, Greg is a busy man. A self-described "severely eclectic" composer, he is as comfortable with rock and roll as he is with symphonic music. His professional experience covers the entire range of the musical world from serious chamber music to Broadway to movie scores. His television music can be heard on all the major networks as well as stations around the world.

His current television credits include the regal ESPN College Football Theme, the edgy theme to "On the Inside" for the Discovery Channel and the newsy theme for "Market Week" on CNBS. Greg has scored episodes of the various "Star Trek" television series and arranged and conducted the theme for "Seven Days" on the Paramount Network. He has arranged and conducted songs for the Disney animated features, "Pooh's Grand Adventure" and "Pocohantas II, Journey to a New Land." Enjoying a long association with the Walt Disney company, he has served as

composer and arranger for numerous productions at Disney theme parks around the world.

For Warner Brothers, he composed and orchestrated animation music for "Animaniacs," "Tweety and Sylvester Mysteries," "Pinky and the Brain" and "Road Rovers." His broadcast music credits include promotional music for WCBS, Headline News, Showtime, HBO, RTL in Germany, Sky TV in the United Kingdom and jingles and underscores for Kodak, AT & T, American Express, Mattel, Disney and others.

As a conductor, Greg has record-

ed with the London Symphony Orchestra, San Francisco Ballet, Utah Symphony and Seattle Symphony, as well as numerous studio orchestras in New York and Los Angeles.

His concert works include orchestral, orchestral with narrator, choral and pops works. His Young People's Concert-Educational Works have been performed by the Boston Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony, Atlanta Symphony, Cincinnati Symphony, Rochester Philharmonic, the Minnesota Orchestra and numerous others. His "A Major-Minor Mystery" is an exploration of music's major and minor tonalities disguised as a "whodunnit;" "Zoo Song" is the adventure of a young girl's first trip to the zoo; "The Orchestra Games" has audiences cheering their favorite musical instruments in competitions, illustrating music's basic elements. Often, perhaps half a dozen times a year, Greg personally attends the concerts.

A 1976 Salem High School graduate, Greg is an honors graduate of the Dana School of Music. He is the son of Jeanine and Dan Smith of Salem, and Betty Smith is the daughter of Elsie and Enio Migliarini of Bowling Green.

Dr. William E. Ward III is named Alumnus of the Year

Dr. William E. "Bill" Ward III '46 has been named Alumnus of the Year by the association and was honored at the annual alumni scholarship awards dinner at Timberlanes on June 1.

Association President Jeffrey M. Zimmerman was the master of ceremonies, and the Class of 1952 was honored on its 50th year.

Bill served as chair of the Southern Group on Student Affairs, a consortium of 40 medical schools, retiring after 21 years. Following his retirement he was appointed associate dean emeritus at the College of Medicine at Texas A & M University where he was a professor of physiology and associate dean of student affairs.

Since his retirement, Bill has supported a local medical clinic whose mission is to provide free health care to people and families who can't afford health insurance.


Born in Salem, he received his early education at McKinley School, the Fourth Street Junior High School, and the "old" high school. He lettered in football and track and was captain of the track team his senior year. Bill received a bachelor's degree in zoology from Ohio University and a master's degree in marine ecology from Duke University. He taught and coached at West Georgia College in Carrollton, Georgia and served as dean of men there.

He entered the Air Force in 1955, and during his career with the Air Force, he was a site physiologist at Cape Canaveral for the chimpanzee flights of the Project Mercury Astronaut Program. Assigned as an instructor at the U. S. Air Force Academy, he was selected for PhD training in physiology which he received from Kent State University in 1967.

For seven years, he was the premedical advisor at the Air Force Academy, and retired as a lieutenant colonel with the academic rank of tenure professor.

A volunteer for the American Diabetes Association, Bill held several positions in the organization, including chair of the Texas Affiliate to membership on the national board of directors.

Locally he served as president of the Opera and Performing Arts Society, a group dedicated to providing subscription concerts of world class musicians and actors for the university and surrounding community. He also served

as president of the Bryan Rotary Club and was a certified track and field official for Texas A & M University.

Bill and his wife, Elizabeth, reside in Bryan, Texas, where they have been active members of the St. Andrews Episcopal Church for 27 years. The couple are the parents of five children, six grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Tribute to a beloved music teacher

Veteran music teacher Betty Hofmeister died in January at the age of 83, and John E. Fitch has scribed a poetic tribute.

It's time for music class at McKinley Elementary School and my fifth grade class is seated, waiting for the music to begin.

I don't remember that morning, having breakfast with Mom and Dad and sister and brothers up at 1544 East Third Street - all cozy in our loving 1950 serenity, but I probably did.

I don't remember whether I rode my maroon and cream Schwinn bike down Third to Highland to Cleveland and to the waiting bicycle rack, but no doubt I did.

I don't remember which coat I hung up on the ornate protruding wrought iron hook in the separate cloak room.

And I don't remember specifically who was sitting to my right or left in music class, although fondness fills me now for all there that day.

We were waiting, I remember, for the music to begin. You don't have real music, you know, until it arrives. Sometimes, these days, alas, it's slow in coming, and sometimes it doesn't come at all. But that day in 1950 at McKinley grade school in the fifth grade, the music came as we sat waiting.

Lovely, she swept through the door, gleaming red hair and flowing flowery dress, grand entry graciously accomplished. Cosmic sparks of radiant musicality flashed from her contagious, vivacious smile. Joy flowed from her every happy gesture as she approached her piano with such inviting anticipation that we were all instantly captured by the great, gentle, splendid net with which the music would combine us.

She played on while we sang and never since has anyone else quite rolled out the notes just so and caused them to fall with that unmistakable bouquet unique to. Betty Hofmeister at the piano. When tents were missing on the first night in Mozambique, we slept on the beach under the stars. Bless God it was not raining!
