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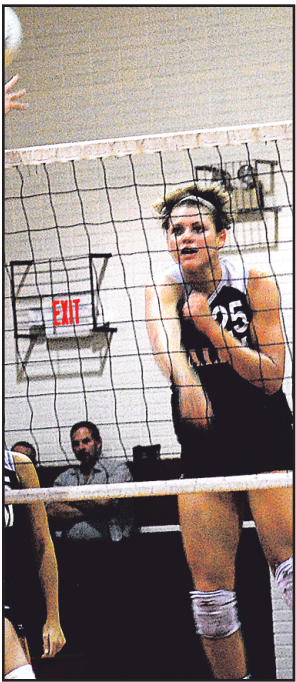

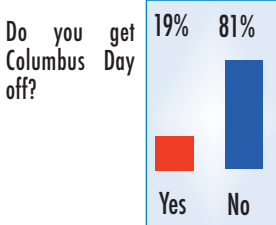

Program calls attention to domestic violence

LISBON — Advocates placed a simple wreath adorned with purple ribbon in front of the Columbian County Courthouse Wednesday as a stark reminder that domestic violence still exists.

"We have to keep it out in the forefront because we can't let domestic violence continue to happen — we can't let people forget," Christina House Program Manager Beth Schmitt said.

Christina House serves as the domestic violence shelter for women and children at an undisclosed location in Columbiana County, with services to victims available at the Catholic Charities Regional Agency Christina Center, located at 115 E. Washington St., Lisbon.

Christina Center case manager Debbie Chaffin and legal advocate Elaine Kloss,

who assists in the filing of protection orders, placed the wreath as part of the agency's commemoration of Domestic Violence Awareness Month in October. Wreaths were also being placed in front of the Columbian County Municipal Court building in Lisbon and East Liverpool City Hall in East Liverpool where the East Liverpool Municipal Court is located.

A program will begin at 10 a.m. Oct. 29 at the Christina Center in Lisbon where speakers will talk about domestic violence, including a survivor of the crime. The event will end with a walk to the square in Lisbon where participants will release purple balloons as a symbol against domestic violence.

According to figures provided by Chaffin, 90 women and children stayed at the Christina House shelter last year, with the

United won't seek project aid in 2010

HANOVERTON — United Local Schools will not see any improvements through an Ohio School Facilities Commission project next year.

The Board of Education Thursday voted 3-2 to defer participation in the commission's construction and renovation program until a future year with board members John Zehentbauer and Mike Ellyson casting the dissenting votes.

The board had not determined what kind of project its members would like to undertake, although Zehentbauer and Ellyson both expressed interest in looking into projects to take advantage of the 83 percent funding the commission would provide.

While the school district should maintain eligibility to receive funding for a construction or renovation project next year, Zehentbauer and high school Principal William Young both expressed concern that the program, like many others in the state, may not have funding to provide next year.

"The money's disappearing everywhere else," Zehentbauer noted.

Even if the board voted to go ahead with a project, he pointed out voters still would need to pass a levy to fund that project or it would not happen. He expressed interest in letting the voters determine whether the project would go forward, noting the buildings will require renovation someday, and the commission may not be there to provide the funding down the road.

Superintendent RuthAnn Rinto acknowledged parts of the school campus are getting old, noting the elementary school portion of the building was constructed in 1951.

"I think we all have dreams of how we'd like it to look someday," she commented.

Ellyson said he could not imagine any huge building projects in the district's immediate future, but he wanted to leave the option open.

Board member Mike Phillis suggested the board look into planning a commission project for next year.

"I think we need to get community input on the whole thing," Board President Sue Drotleff concurred.

In another matter, Elaine Brye and Denise Ward, two of only three teachers from Ohio selected this year to attend professional development with the Educator A Plus Institute, made a presentation on incorporating technology into classrooms.

Ward presented the board with a list of free Web sites and computer programs — for turning text into animated movies or audio files, editing graphics, creating online

Super Nationals return to Canfield, party to Boardman

SALEM — After their contract with the Quaker City Raceway was not renewed, the owners of Core Promotions promised the Steel Valley Super Nationals would still be held and would be returning to another community.
