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

## Prosecutor: Jesse Ieropoli admitted 'accidentally' shooting mother

LISBON — A Lisbon-area man previously hinted to be involved in the 2008 shooting death of his mother has admitted to having accidentally shot his mother, county Prosecutor Robert Herron revealed Thursday in county Municipal Court.

Bond was set at \$1 million for Jesse Ieropoli, 20, state Route 45, on a first-degree misdemeanor charge of aggravated menacing. A charge of domestic violence against Ieropoli was dismissed on a motion of the prosecution.

Asked by Judge Mark Frost to clarify whether Ieropoli had admitted to accidentally shooting his mother before her death, Herron responded, "That was the story that was provided at the time."

The county Coroner's Office determined the death of Sherry Ieropoli on Aug. 24, 2008, to be a homicide but the investiga-

tion is still pending.

The aggravated menacing charge stems from an incident Tuesday morning in which Ieropoli is accused of saying he would "take out" his father and then "take himself out," according to an affidavit in the case.

His father, Nick Ieropoli, has testified under oath that he is in fear for his life and has filed a restraining order against his son.

"He felt that he could not sleep in his house as long as the defendant was there," the prosecutor said.

Herron noted both the father and son currently reside in the same home at which the mother was shot and killed. However, he noted Jesse Ieropoli cannot return to the home because of the protection order.

Public defense Eric Kibler said Jesse Ieropoli has a grandmother and an aunt on

## Columbia Gas plans major line work in Salem

SALEM — Columbia Gas will be replacing a number of main gas lines in Salem this summer as part of a \$1 million upgrade, according Dave Rau, communications and community relations manager for the company.

The lines are buried in the street right-of-way, or curblawn.

The work is part of a \$2 billion system replacement program over 25 years, Rau said.

The company will be mailing letters to residents on South Lincoln Ave., Aetna St., Franklin Ave. and Pershing, Walnut and Columbia streets where new gas lines will be installed.

Service Safety Director Steve Andres said a public hearing will be held in city hall at 6 p.m. March 2.

The work will replace aging 2- to 4-inch steel lines with new "state-of-the-art" plastic lines that will not corrode and will, Rau said, "last a very long time."

The work was planned for two years ago, but was postponed, Rau said and the new project actually combines the S. Lincoln and Franklin avenues and Aetna St. project with the other streets further north. Wooden stakes have already been installed in some of the areas.

Rau said anyone, not just the affected residents, can attend the hearing which is aimed at addressing concerns and answering questions. Work will begin about mid-March and continue into the summer and will affect some traffic.

Rau said the work usually begins in northern areas first with new mains and the service lines tying into them. Gas service will be interrupted for a couple of hours when the tap-in lines are disconnected and reconnected and there will be a local inspector on site to restore service.

New gas meters will also be installed outside of houses where they are currently inside, Rau said. If no one is home when the work reaches a house, a tag will be left.

He explained the meters will be moved outside so meter readers don't have to come inside and the meters can be inspected for safety. Rau said excess flow valves will also be install on the main lines past connectors as a safety feature if they are hit when there is digging.

## Todd pleads innocent to baby's murder

LISBON — A former Salem woman accused of purposely causing the 2010 death of her infant son pleaded innocent to charges of murder, involuntary manslaughter and endangering children.

Miranda V. Todd, 23, whose last known address was listed as the county jail in Lisbon, cried as she appeared for arraignment Thursday afternoon in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court before Judge C. Ashley Pike.

She was originally scheduled to appear through video arraignment from the jail, but due to technical difficulties, she was transported in shackles and chains by deputies so she could appear in person, along with some other defendants.

A \$250,000 cash or surety bond was continued, ensuring she'll remain in jail where she's been in custody since Dec. 14. She was found to be indigent and was appointed counsel at county expense, with Salem attorneys Jennifer Gorby and Charley Kidder named as her defense team.

Salem Police were called to the emergency room at Salem Community Hospital on July 23 for a deceased infant who had "multiple bruises and swelling to his head," according to an affidavit by Det. Dave Talbert.

The infant was Todd's 7-month-old son, Derek Dennison. Todd had been living in a residence on North Ellsworth Avenue in Salem at the time and took him to the hospital in an unresponsive state. Efforts to revive him failed.

In the affidavit, Talbert said the autopsy performed on the child by the Cuyahoga County Coroner's Office "revealed numerous injuries including skull and rib fractures." He also said it appeared the injuries occurred over time.

Talbert had filed the affidavit when Todd was charged in December in county Municipal Court with endangering children after authorities heard she may be leaving town. She was indicted last month by the county grand jury for the other charges, along with the endangering children charge.

If convicted of all three charges and ordered to serve consecutive sentences, she could be facing 30 years to life



# Warriors, Quakers set for sectionals

Division II tournament under way tonight at West Branch High School

BELOIT — The road to state starts tonight. Wrestlers from Salem, West Branch and nine other schools will converge on West Branch High School for a Division II sectional wrestling tournament.

The sectional is, for lack of a better word, loaded. West Branch finished the season undefeated in dual meets and is favored to advance a host of wrestlers to the district tournament. Crestwood comes in as the defending team

champions and is being looked at as the favorites once again. Also included are powers out of the NBC Louisville, Marlinton and Alliance. And some of the top teams from around the Youngstown area Canfield, Poland and Hubbard.

Rounding out the group is Mogadore Field and Ravenna Southeast.

"This is becoming a much tougher sectional then it first was when we started coming here," Salem head coach Derek Beck said. "It all comes down to your

draw. You have to get ready on your half and hope you fall in the bracket nice. There are a lot of solid teams in here and a lot of tough wrestlers."

According to West Branch head coach Mike Helm, the numbers don't lie when it comes down to how tough this sectional is.

"If you look at the statistics from last year's sectional feeding into (the Firestone District), we had the strongest sectional. We had more state qualifiers from our sectional than any other sectional. This year is no different."

Salem isn't being mentioned as one of the top teams, but Beck feels his kids are work-

ing hard and in position to pull some surprises this weekend.

"I think they're ready," Beck said of his group. "We've worked exceptionally hard this week. The kids are as ready as they can be. They're hungry to go out there."

To advance out of sectionals and into districts, a wrestler must finish in the top four in each weight class. The fifth place finisher will be named an alternate. One of Salem's top hopefuls to make some noise is Scott Lodge at 140 pounds. Lodge earned the third seed in his weight class. He is recently coming off a sixth place finish



# Crowds descend as Ohio debates union overhaul

COLUMBUS (AP) — Union groups in Ohio brandished Republican-red T-shirts on Thursday as they sought to ease partisan divisions over a GOP-backed bill that would strip public employees of collective bargaining rights.

The attempted show of solidarity by one of many unions plugging Statehouse hallways in protest of the bill came as a similarly momentous bill stirred a furor in Wisconsin, where Democratic senators fled that state to force Republicans to negotiate. It also took place on the same day tea party groups from around Ohio staged their first organized demonstration in favor of the bill.

The Ohio proposal, sponsored by Republican Sen. Shannon Jones, would abolish collective bargaining rights for state workers and restrict teachers, firefighters, police, university employees and local workers in their bargaining abilities. Unions would lose the ability to negotiate salary schedules and step increases in favor of merit-based raises. Unions

would be barred from requiring non-members covered by their contracts to pay dues.

Cincinnati Councilman Jeff Berding told the Senate Insurance, Commerce and Labor Committee during the more than eight hours of testimony Thursday that the current situation has become unworkable for cash-strapped cities.

“City leaders, managers — elected to represent the taxpayers — need the ability to pay what we can afford, and not have it dictated by unions gaming the system and unelected third parties,” he said. “I must share with you my profound personal disappointment to realize that union leaders and their members prioritize pay benefits over averting layoffs.”

Ray Warrick, a member of the Ohio Liberty Council, a coalition of tea party groups, called the days of union protests at the Statehouse “truly sad.”

“It’s one of those occasions where certain power brokers pit citizens against one another to achieve their

goals of self-preservation, retention of power and continued access to the taxpayers’ money,” he said. “The message they are screaming is that the proponents of Senate Bill 5 somehow are against police officers, firefighters, teachers and other innocent public employee rank and file. That is both false and ridiculous.”

Outside the hearing room, thousands of union members — teachers, firefighters, prison guards, police — got a surprise visit by former Gov. Ted Strickland, a union-friendly Democrat ousted in last fall’s election by Republican Gov. John Kasich. Strickland had no formal role in the day’s activities.

Strickland said he wanted to show his support to union workers — who took a pay freeze and 10 furlough days each year under his administration.

“This has little to do with balancing this year’s budget,” he said. “I think it’s a power grab. It’s an attempt to diminish the rights of working people. I think it’s an assault of the middle class of this state and it’s so unfair and out of balance.”

### Bahrain government: Crackdown that killed 5 protesters ‘regrettable’

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Bahrain’s leaders banned public gatherings and sent tanks into the streets Thursday, intensifying a crackdown that killed five anti-government protesters, wounded more than 200 and turned a hospital into a cauldron of anguish and rage against the monarchy.

Bahrain’s streets were mostly empty after the bloody clampdown, but thousands defied authorities by marching in cities in Libya and Yemen as the wave of political unrest continued in the wake of uprisings that toppled leaders in Egypt and Tunisia.

The tiny kingdom of Bahrain is a key part of Washington’s military counterbalance to Iran by hosting the U.S. Navy’s 5th Fleet. Bahrain’s rulers and their Arab allies depict any sign of unrest among their Shiite populations as a move by neighboring Shiite-majority Iran to expand its clout in the region.

While part of the recent revolt in the Arab world, the underlying tensions in Bahrain are decades old and pit the majority Shiites against the Sunni elite.

After allowing several days of rallies in the capital of Manama by disaffected Shiites, the island nation’s Sunni rulers unleashed riot police who stormed a protest encampment in Pearl Square before dawn, firing tear gas, beating demonstrators or blasting them with shotgun sprays of birdshot. Along with two who died in clashes with police Monday, the new killings brought the death toll this week in Bahrain to seven.

### Wisconsin lawmakers flee state to block anti-union bill, say they want to negotiate

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — A group of Democratic Wisconsin lawmakers blocked passage of a sweeping anti-union bill Thursday, refusing to show up for a vote and then abruptly leaving the state in an effort to force Republicans to the negotiating table.

As ever-growing throngs of protesters filled the Capitol for a third day, the 14 Democrats disappeared around noon, just as the Senate was about to begin debating the measure, which would eliminate collective bargaining for most public employees. They were not in their offices, and aides said they did not know where any of them had gone. Hours later, one member of the group told The Associated Press that they had all left Wisconsin.

“The plan is to try and slow this down because it’s an extreme piece of legislation that’s tearing this state apart,” Sen. Jon Erpenbach said in a telephone interview. He refused to say where he was.

Democrats hoped Republican Gov. Scott Walker and GOP lawmakers would consider revisions to the bill.

### GOP, Dems trade shutdown charges; no stopgap funding without cuts, Boehner says

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a deepening struggle over spending, Republicans and Democrats swapped charges Thursday over a possible government shutdown when funding expires March 4 for most federal agencies.

“Read my lips: We’re going to cut spending,” declared House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, who pledged that the GOP-controlled House would refuse to approve even a short-term measure at current funding levels to keep the government operating.

He prefaced his remarks by accusing Democrats of risking a shutdown “rather than to cut spending and to follow the will of the American people.” But moments later, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., retorted that Boehner was resorting “to threats of a shutdown without any negotiation.”

The sparring occurred as the House labored to complete work on veto-threatened legislation to cut more than \$61 billion from the budget year that’s more than a third over. That bill also would provide funding to keep the government operating until Sept. 30.

Kurdish security guards open fire on protesters, killing 2, as unrest spreads in Iraq

SULAIMANIYAH, Iraq (AP) — Kurdish security guards opened fire Thursday on a crowd of protesters calling for political reforms in northern Iraq, killing at least two people, officials said, showing even war-weary Iraq cannot escape the unrest roiling the Middle East.

Separately, a car bomb killed eight people and wounded 30 others in Muqaddiyah, 60 miles (90 kilometers) north of Baghdad, an official said. The area was once one of the strongholds of al-Qaida, and insurgents there stage frequent attacks despite improved security in much of the country.

NFL, players' union agree to mediation

NEW YORK (AP) — Two weeks before a potential lock-out, the NFL and its players' union are asking for help in their stalled negotiations.

Both sides agreed Thursday to mediation as they discuss a new collective bargaining agreement. The Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, an independent U.S. government agency, will oversee talks in Washington beginning Friday.

After holding separate discussions with representatives from the league and the union, FMCS director George H. Cohen said both sides agreed to have the agency mediate. Mediation is not binding.

"Any time that both sides of negotiations can get together, whether through conventional means of bargaining or mediation, to come to an agreement that can benefit all parties, it is a good thing," NFLPA president Kevin Mawae told The Associated Press in an e-mail.

Negotiations broke down last week, leading to the cancellation of one planned session. The players are expecting the owners to lock them out if the CBA expires on March 3 without a new agreement.

"Due to the extreme sensitivity of these negotiations and consistent with the FMCS's

long-standing practice, the agency will refrain from any public comment concerning the future schedule and/or the status of those negotiations until further notice," Cohen said.

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello told The Associated Press in an e-mail: "We are now in mediation."

The league also switched an owners meeting from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., on March 3, to Chantilly, Va., on March 2-3.

In a statement, NFLPA spokesman George Atallah said: "The NFLPA has always focused on a fair collective bargaining agreement through negotiations. We hope that this renewed effort, through mediation, will help the players and owners reach a successful deal."

Cohen said in a statement that the negotiations will be conducted "under my auspices." He is no stranger to sports mediation. He was involved in Major League Soccer talks with its players' union and a work stoppage was avoided last year.

Cohen also has worked with the players' associations for Major League Baseball, helping end the 1994-95 strike as a consulting attorney, and the NBA, and was an advisor to the

NHL players' union before joining the FMCS.

The FMCS website says it "provides free mediation services in contract negotiation disputes between employers and their unionized employees. All the parties have to do is make a request."

The FMCS also became involved in negotiations during the 2004-05 NHL lockout, and a 2005 dispute between the U.S. Soccer Federation and its players.

"Our agency director will be working with the parties to assist them in reaching a voluntary, mutually acceptable agreement," FMCS public affairs director John Arnold said in a telephone interview.

News of mediation could be a positive sign after several months of infrequent negotiations. It also comes only days after the NFL filed an unfair labor practice charge against the NFLPA with the National Labor Relations Board. Monday's filing said the union "consistently has failed to confer in good faith" during negotiations for a new contract and the union's "conduct amounts to surface bargaining and an anticipatory refusal to bargain."

Aiello told the AP the mediation would not have an effect on the NLRB complaint.

Indianapolis Colts owner Jim Irsay recalled the last CBA

negotiations in 2006, a deal the owners opted out of in 2008.

"Since the last time, things have broken off and guys have gone their separate ways," Irsay said Thursday. "I remember that happened the last time and (then-commissioner) Paul Tagliabue ended up texting (union chief) Gene Upshaw and said, 'Why don't we get back together.' So you never know when something positive can happen and something good can get done."

"I don't have a strong anticipation something will get done before (March 3), but I think it's possible."

The biggest issue separating the sides is how to divide about \$9 billion in annual revenues. Among the other significant points in negotiations: the owners' push to expand the regular season from 16 games to 18 while reducing the preseason by two games; a rookie wage scale; and benefits for retired players.

"Our ultimate goal is a new CBA," Atallah wrote Thursday on his Twitter feed. "I will not discuss any details about the next set of negotiations. We are observing a strict media blackout."

Some players, however, were commenting moments after the announcement.

"NFL and NFLPA agreeing to meet with a federal mediator

is a real positive step," Vikings tackle Bryant McKinnie said on his Twitter account. "Let's see if he can get them to make actual progress."

Added player agent Drew Rosenhaus: "Exciting news to see the NFLPA & the Owners talking again through the mediation process — a productive step in the right direction!"

**Irsay: Manning could get 5-year or 6-year deal**  
INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Peyton Manning could still be raking in the big bucks at age 40.

On Thursday, at a hastily called news conference, Colts owner Jim Irsay said he expects Manning to sign a record-setting deal before next season. Tom Brady currently holds the distinction for the highest annual average salary after agreeing to a four-year deal worth \$18 million per year in September. Manning's deal will not only be richer but also longer.

"I think six years is certainly a possibility, five or six years," Irsay said. "There's not a definitive number that I'm stuck on. You don't know how much longer he can play. You hope that it's five years, maybe six years. Until you get longer down the road, it's really uncertain."

supposed to be high on the hill on the first tee. Johnson was penalized two shots, and nearly was disqualified. Players have five minutes to get to the tee, and Johnson got their with 6 seconds to spare.

He wound up with a 73.

Then came the retro movement of Pavin and Fred Couples, who combined to win this tournament four times during a six-year stretch in the early 1990s. Couples, whose back is in such bad shape that he's going for treatment next week, made three straight birdies at the turn and shot a 68.

Pavin was the only player to reach 5 under, and it would have been an amazing story if he didn't have to play the last

six holes. But he made three bogeys in the twilight, including his last two holes, and had to settle for a 69.

"You always want to finish off a round, so it's a little disappointing in that regard," Pavin said. "But I just went out there and hit every shot the best I could, and I just didn't finish the way I wanted to. But if I had said, 'Take 2 under before the round started,' I maybe would have taken it. I'm not sure."

Phil Mickelson got off to a great start with birdies on his opening two holes, only to look suspect with a few irons and a few putts. He wound up with a 71. His hope is that the rain holds off until he finishes the second round.

"I thought it was going to be a great day but I gave a lot of shots back, made too many bogeys," Mickelson said. "I'll

have a good chance tomorrow morning to get out and try to go low. This afternoon it was tough to make some putts. Even though there were some low scores, I struggled getting the ball to go in. And I'm looking forward to tomorrow's early round."

Vijay Singh, who turns 48 on Tuesday, continued to showed signs of getting back into the mix. He had a 68 and was in a large group that included Padraig Harrington.

Geoff Ogilvy was part of the pack at 69, with a round that included a 3-iron to tap-in range for eagle and what will go down as a two-putt par from 70 feet, even though it was much better. Realizing the greens were so fast and the putt could break sharply to the left and roll into a bunker, he chipped his sand wedge some 20 feet right of the

pin and watched it roll to a foot away.

Typical of this tournament, not everyone could finish. Fourteen players will return Friday to finish the round, although the conditions could be much different.

Rain is expected for much of the next two days, which is why Haas was pleased with his start.

"If I was 2 over right now, I wouldn't like the forecast," he said.

But the transformation wasn't complete.

Giuriceo fought Henri White a little more than a year ago to a controversial draw — in the Mahoning Valley no less.

"Bull----," Giuriceo said to news reporters immediately following the decision as a chorus of boos reignited down on the Covelli Center from a hometown crowd that clearly saw the fight the same way Giuriceo did.

Turns out, that draw helped Giuriceo a lot more than it hurt him.

"That draw was the best thing that ever happened in my life," Giuriceo said. "God used that draw to open up my eyes. I was doing things wrong."

While Giuriceo followed that fight with four consecutive wins to improve his record to 9-0-1, something for "The Bull" was still missing.

"I got saved Jan. 10," Giuriceo said of his recent commitment to faith. "I've been working like crazy. I work harder than I did before. In the boxing world you can

never leave it up to the judges. You have to be decisive, because there are no guarantees."

To make sure that his future fights don't end in similar fashion as his bout with White, Giuriceo continued to work hard with Burnside following the draw, and with his blessing, has recently been working in California with former World Bantamweight contender Frankie Duarte.

"Frankie used to be a real aggressive fighter," Giuriceo said. "He knows how to get inside, and he's used to fighting at a lighter weight like me. So it's a little easier for him to be able to tell me what to do. It's a little easier to relate to Frankie in that sense, because Keith is a bigger guy, and fought at heavier weights."

Duarte fought two close matches for the WBA Ban-

tamweight title and was named Ring Magazine's Comeback of the Year in 1987. The title stayed just out of his grasp and he later retired turning his efforts to training other boxers.

"He's been there," Giuriceo said. "He's done it. There are just certain things he can tell you that other boxers can't. He'll take something you do in every day life, over and over exaggerate it and you can take it into the ring."

Giuriceo returned to Youngstown this week to finish working with Burnside and Duarte in his final preparations for his Saturday fight against Angel Hernandez (14-8, 10 KO) at The Byzantine Center in Youngstown.

Hernandez is a lot like some of the fighters Giuriceo has already defeated. But again,

# Salem man gets year in prison for weapons charge

LISBON — A Salem man found with a loaded handgun in his pocket after a report of gunfire at a Salem business last March was sentenced to a year in prison.

Mark A. Lewis, 52, of 530 Walnut St., formerly of Lisbon, appeared for sentencing Thursday in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court before Judge Scott Washam, who gave him credit for three days already served in jail.

He pleaded guilty in December to carrying a concealed weapon, a fourth-degree felony, and having weapons under disability, a third-degree felony, for the incident which occurred March 14 at the Wing Warehouse on South Ellsworth Avenue in Salem.

County Chief Assistant Prosecutor John Gamble had recommended a sentence of two years in prison.

According to a press release issued by the prosecutor’s office, Lewis was pointed out by witnesses after Salem Police officers responded to a report of gunfire at the bar. He was found near the entrance and during a pat-down for safety, a .22-caliber revolver loaded with seven rounds of ammunition was recovered by officers.

The press release said Lewis told police he needed the gun for protection from someone who was accusing him and his relative of taking drug business from him. This will be a return trip to prison for Lewis who was sentenced to prison in 2009 for five counts of permitting drug abuse and one count of tampering with evidence, all felonies.

Court documents said Lewis permitted the sale of crack cocaine at a residence on West Washington Street in Lisbon on March 22, 2006 and April 6, 2006 and threw a crack pipe from a bathroom window in an attempt to conceal it as a search warrant was being executed by drug agents on April 7, 2006.

He also allowed his former residence on West Fourth Street in Salem to be used for the sale of crack cocaine on Dec. 13 and 20 in 2006 and on Jan. 29, 2007.

Also in Common Pleas Court:

- Andrew Welsh, 22, whose last known address was Newgarden Avenue, has been scheduled to face trial June 27 for allegedly endangering a child through excessive physical discipline. Welsh was indicted in December for the endangering children charge, a third-degree felony which carries a possible penalty of one to five years in prison. A status hearing has been set for 9:30 a.m. June 24. Court documents said the incident occurred July 7 at an apartment on Newgarden Avenue in Salem where Welsh was allegedly punishing a 5-month-old child by striking the child in the face, causing substantial bruising. The bill of particulars described the punishment or discipline as “excessive under the circumstances” and said it created a risk of serious physical harm to the child.

Also in Common Pleas Court:

- Robert Vecchio, 46, whose last known address was Lisbon, was sentenced to nine months in prison after violating his probation for charges of vandalism and criminal trespass. The prison term was ordered served at the same time as a current six-month sentence he’s serving out of Mahoning County for a receiving stolen property charge. Vecchio had been placed on probation last February for the vandalism and criminal trespass charges which stemmed from an incident April 18, 2009 at Quaker City Septic on East High Street in Leetonia. Vecchio broke into the office, cutting himself and causing extensive damage.

## Troopers seize 871 lbs. of marijuana

DAYTON (AP) — Ohio troopers say they seized 871 pounds of marijuana and arrested a man from Mexico during a traffic stop in western Ohio.

The State Highway Patrol said troopers on Wednesday stopped a pickup truck on Interstate 70 for violations of having a cracked windshield and following too closely. They say they saw marijuana in the cab of the truck, and a search turned up 36 bundles of the drug, worth an estimated \$2 million.

Police say they arrested the driver, 29-year-old Lazaro Montoya, and charged him with possession of marijuana and possession

of criminal tools. He could face up to nine years in prison and a \$22,500 fine if convicted.

Montoya is being held at Preble County jail, where authorities say he did not have an attorney.

# Kurt Busch 2-for-2 at Daytona with qualifying win

Still, Daytona 500 lacking a clear front-runner

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — Three races down during Speedweeks and nobody has any idea what they'll see in the Daytona 500.

Kurt Busch felt certain he cemented himself the favorite after winning Thursday's first 150-mile qualifying race, backing up last weekend's victory in the exhibition Budweiser Shootout.

Jeff Burton, the winner of the second qualifying race, respectfully disagreed.

The lack of a clear front-runner was the least of NASCAR's problems, though. Drivers have locked in on a new style of tandem racing that has just about everyone unsure how Sunday's season-opener will unfold.

All three races so far have been dominated by two-car packs, as drivers figured out the fastest way around the new asphalt at Daytona International Speedway. It's vastly different from the wild pack racing fans adore at Daytona, and NASCAR has already made a series of rules changes this week in an attempt to separate the cars.

Most drivers seem dazzled

by this radical new racing, but fans are a little freaked out at the potential for a boring race.

Burton insisted nothing will be different come Sunday.

"It's my prediction it will be the same Daytona 500," he said. "When somebody has a chance to take the Daytona 500 trophy home, you do things that you weren't going to do 100 laps before that. It's the same thing every time we come down here."

So far, it's hardly been a wild ride.

As soon as the green flag fell for each of Thursday's qualifying races, the field broke up in two-car packs. It was a repeat of every on-track session since the speedway was paved during the offseason, and drivers determined during two test sessions that hooking up in pairs is the fastest way around the track.

Every minute of practice has been used by drivers trying to figure out who they can work with, how long they can stay hooked up, and how quickly they can swap positions. NASCAR has tried a series of technical adjustments this week to break up the tandems — mostly through changes to the cooling systems that cause

cars to overheat if they stay hooked up too long.

Several drivers, Busch included, have mastered the system in a very short time.

"To find the right drafting partners out there, make different things happen, you're learning every lap," said Busch, who worked with Regan Smith through most of his qualifying win.

"It's amazing what partnerships can do out on the race-track, and when two guys can think the same way without saying a word, things are going to happen for those two guys."

But others are still trying to figure it out.

"Guys, it don't compare to anything," said two-time Daytona 500 winner Bill Elliott, who raced his way into the field in the first qualifying race. "I've never experienced anything like what you have to do to make it work. It's the craziest thing I've ever seen. It's like a bunch of kids playing leapfrog, but they were doing it in pairs."

Elliott was one of seven drivers to earn a spot in the field during Thursday's races. He was joined by two-time Daytona 500 winner Michael Waltrip, who is racing in a paint scheme that commemorates the car he drove to victory

in the 2001 race — when Dale Earnhardt was killed in a last-lap accident. Friday marks the 10-year anniversary.

"I wanted to celebrate Dale's life," Waltrip said, relieved at making the race.

Also earning spots in the field were J.J. Yeley, Travis Kvapil, Dave Blaney, Joe Nemechek and Brian Keselowski, who used help from his little brother, Brad, to earn his first career Sprint Cup start.

The Keselowski hookup was the feel-good story of the day, as the 29-year-old journeyman raced his way into the field driving a 5-year-old car that he prepared with his father. He recruited his uncle to Daytona to help this week, then needed a huge push from Brad, a star for deep-pocketed Penske Racing, to get into NASCAR's biggest race.

"It still goes to show you that you've got a chance no matter what," Brian Keselowski said. "You find a guy to push you — thank God it was my brother, I don't know if anybody else would have stuck with me that long. It gives everybody a shot at it and says that the independent guy that can go out and find a race-car, put it together, get a good push, everybody's got a chance."

enters the No. 2 Buckeyes' game vs. the Boilermakers (21-5, 10-3 Big Ten) with 331 3-pointers made, one behind Penn State's Pete Lisicky (1994-98).

No wonder some call him "3bler."

But it's not as if Diebler ever imagined he'd be the one to do it — or that it was ever in his sights.

"It will be kind of cool if it does happen," he said. "I'm sure it will be something I look back on when I'm older, but right now it's not something I think about. I'm just worried about winning games. That's our team's mentality."

The Buckeyes (25-1, 12-1) are having a banner season. A huge reason is Diebler, a marksman from the perimeter who keeps teams from surrounding post player Jared Sullinger or blanketing fellow shooters William Buford and David Lighty.

Diebler is the Buckeyes' fourth-leading scorer at 11.1 points a game while playing almost 35 minutes a night. He's shooting 48 percent from the field — and 48 percent on 3-pointers. He ranks fifth in the nation in accuracy behind the arc. That, in itself, is remark-

able considering that in his freshman season he shot only 29 percent on 3-pointers.

Coach Thad Matta was asked about Diebler setting the conference mark.

"When he does," he said, laughing, "I'll probably say it could have happened a year ago if he had shot well as a freshman."

Then he turned serious.

"No, I've always said this about Jon. When you coach players and you see how hard they work — even when they're working hard and you're not watching — you want those guys to be rewarded. If and when that (record) happens, I'll be as excited as ever because I know what he's done, what he's put in to get that."

The son of a high school coach, Diebler and his two older brothers and his parents traveled to several outposts in small towns around Ohio before arriving in Upper Sandusky, a farming town of just over 6,000 nestled in the flat but fertile lands about an hour due north of Columbus.

It was there that Jon became a legend. He totaled 3,208 career points to set the all-time Ohio schoolboy record, breaking the mark of 2,958 set by another former Ohio State standout, Jay Burson. His

Rams went unbeaten and won the state championship one year and he captured the Ohio Associated Press Mr. Basketball award in 2007.

No wonder when Jon came to Ohio State his new teammates expected him to step right in and continue churning out the points.

"He was going to come in and score 50 points a game out of high school," Lighty said with a grin.

But Diebler struggled with his shot, and on defense. He wasn't quick enough to keep up with guards and not muscular enough to defend a forward. He gradually improved, and so did his shooting, while the Buckeyes improved as well. They went 24-13 with him coming off the bench as a freshman, and have gone 22-11 and 29-8 heading into this successful season.

Matta stuck by Diebler through the bad times and, now, the good.

"I've always had great faith in Jon. At times, I'm the only one who had great faith in Jon, including himself," he said. "I watched his work ethic from the day he walked in here and I can remember when things maybe didn't go well for him his freshman year. All he cared about was winning. I knew if he kept that mindset and con-

tinued to work at the same level, he was going to be the player that he is today."

No opponent ignores him, that's for sure.

"The thing that's really unique is how big he is," Iowa coach Fran McCaffery said. "He's one of those guys you feel like you got to him, but he's 6-6 and long and he gets it off and shoots it right in your face. He really works hard, so when he gets to that spot, he sprints there. He works, he moves without the ball and makes himself hard to guard."

Diebler has been durable and dependable. He has played in 133 games for the Buckeyes and has scored 1,357 points. Having made 3-pointers in 42 straight games, he also will set Ohio State marks for 3s taken, made and percentage.

Through it all, he hasn't had to pound his chest or raise his arms in self congratulation every time he makes another long-range shot. He prefers to contribute to the cause, to win, instead of calling attention to himself.

"You have to have a certain confidence about you," he said. "That's where I've grown the most. I've become a lot more confident, not only shooting the ball but developing my game as an overall player. I've always been taught from my mother and father, and my brothers, just to be humble."

True to form, he credits his teammates for making him better. "I've been fortunate to play with a lot of great players in my four years here," he said. "That helps a lot, because I get a lot of open looks. But you have to stay humble. That was something I was taught growing up and it's something I've carried over until now."

## NASCAR or Indy? Danica undecided on plans

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Danica Patrick's season hasn't even started, and the main thing everybody wants to know is what she'll do next year.

Going into Saturday's NASCAR Nationwide Series opener at Daytona International Speedway, Patrick says she doesn't know her plans for 2012 and beyond. She acknowledges her contracts in both NASCAR and IndyCar are up at the end of this season — and presumably, she'll have to choose whether she wants to pursue stock car racing on a full-time basis.

Patrick says she isn't under any pressure and there's no need to rush into a decision.

"I have a lot of time to figure it out and let things unfold," Patrick said Thursday. "I think it's just going to be a matter of letting it run its course this year and making the most of every time I'm in a stock car, as well as an IndyCar, and just seeing what opportunities arise. I think that it will become obvious in the end, but it's important to wait for that and not force anything."

Patrick says she hasn't set a date for her decision, beyond obviously needing to know before the start of next season. But she might not have as much time as she thinks, because next year's NASCAR sponsorship and team contracts often are agreed to in the middle of the existing season.

Patrick said some of the decision will be out of her hands and depend largely on what offers she receives.

"It's opportunities, teams, sponsorship, my gut," Patrick said. "It's all those things. It just depends on a lot of things. it's not as easy as just saying, 'I'm going to do this or that.' It's also not a wise idea to say what I'm doing. I'm racing both (series) this year."

## Iowa wrestling standout refuses to face girl

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — After a standout season in which he went 35-4, Joel Northrup had every reason to dream of winning an Iowa wrestling championship this year, but he gave it all up before his first state tournament match Thursday.

Northrup, a home-schooled sophomore who competes for Linn-Mar High School, said his religious beliefs wouldn't allow him to wrestle Cassy Herkelman, a pony-tailed freshman from Cedar Falls who is one of the first two girls to qualify for the tournament in its 85-year history.

Northrup issued a statement through his school expressing his "tremendous" respect for what Herkelman and Ottumwa sophomore Megan Black achieved this season, but he said didn't feel he had a choice.

"Wrestling is a combat sport and it can get violent at times," Northrup said in a statement released by his high school. "As a matter of conscience and my faith I do not believe that it is appropriate for a boy to engage a girl in this manner. It is unfortunate that I have been placed in a situation not seen in most other high school sports in Iowa."

His father, Jamie Northrup, told The Associated Press later Thursday that his son struggled with the decision.

"He's poured his heart and soul into wrestling and into being the best in the state," Jamie Northrup said. "He's never won a state championship, so he's certainly looking forward to that day. So it's agonizing, from all the work and the effort and the hope."

"But it's easy in that, he, a long time ago, drew a line and said 'I don't believe it's right for a boy to wrestle a girl.'"

## Langer, Cook headline field at ACE

NAPLES, Fla. (AP) — The defending champion isn't playing, and neither is last week's winner on the Champions Tour. That doesn't mean there's a lack of star power at the ACE Group Classic this week. Bernhard Langer, last year's Player of the Year, John Cook, one of the hottest players on the tour, and newcomer Mark Calcavecchia headline the list entering Friday's first round. Langer won five times last year, along with sweeping the player of the year title, money title and Charles Schwab Cup points title. So as the 53-year-old prepares to start his fourth full season on the Champions Tour, he had some re-setting to do.

## Education reform must be priority

Ohio public schools have made some improvements during the past several years — but still are lacking in some important measurements of education quality. We hope a new cabinet-level post created by Gov. John Kasich can help address some of the deficiencies.

Kasich has named Robert Sommers as director of the Governor's Office of 21st Century Education. Sommers has an extensive background in schools, including work with a charter school and in career and technical education.

It is unknown just how much authority Sommers will have. Ohio, like many other states, uses a state board of education to manage public education. It has been pointed out that with five members appointed recently by Kasich, the 19-member board is dominated by his Republican Party.



Our experience with boards of education at both the local and state levels is that party affiliation is not a controlling factor, however, so it cannot be predicted that the board will serve merely as a rubber stamp for Kasich and Sommers. Philosophies about education tend to transcend party labels.

Standardized tests — the results of which have to be used with caution — show some improvements in Ohio public schools during the past several years. They also show that in some respects, the quality of education has remained stagnant — or even decreased.

For example, standardized tests used to determine whether students can graduate from high school have shown decidedly mixed results. During the 2005-06 school year, 93.7 percent of 11th graders in public schools passed the reading portion of the test. Only 91.6 percent of those who took it during the 2009-10 school year passed.

In a related statistic, the state showed a high school graduation rate of 85.9 percent five years ago. It climbed to 86.9 percent for the 2007-08 school year, before dropping to 83 percent for 2009-10.

Clearly, school reform needs to be an ongoing priority — not just a "process" — in the Buckeye State. We encourage Sommers and Kasich to approach it that way.



## Egypt did it without US

As a rationale for invading Iraq, then-National Security Advisor Condoleezza Rice said: "The people of the Middle East share the desire for freedom. We have an opportunity -- and an obligation -- to help them turn this desire into reality."

Yes they did, but no we didn't.

The desire for freedom fueled the revolution in Egypt. Thankfully, we Americans stayed out of it. And young Egyptians handled the ouster of their repressive leader with brilliant nonviolence.

Against the advice of some in his administration, President Obama kept the United States on the side of change -- which, in this case, meant the sidelines. Hosni Mubarak's rambling speech and the sight of every kind of Egyptian demanding a new society convinced Obama that this Mideast strongman was on his way out. Not only couldn't America save him, it had better not be seen trying.

The Tunisian and Egyptian upheavals are setting off similar democratic passions elsewhere in the region, including in Iran. Note that no American blood and little treasure are being spent helping the people "turn their desires into reality."

How odd that the unauthorized Wikileaks airing of U.S. embassy cables aided the glorious change in Tunisia. An American diplomat apparently called Tunisian President Zine El Abidine Ben Ali's family a "quasi mafia" running "organized corruption."

America's neocon warriors got one thing right. Mideast youth wanted democracy. But they got the big part wrong, insisting that young American soldiers had to get it for them.

Foreigners can't micromanage another people's revolution, which the neocons thought they had the genius to do. And all that sugary talk about invading countries as a selfless act insulted the intelligence. Sure, we wanted them to have the blessings of democracy, but other agendas, including oil, are why we went into Iraq and not Er-

itrea.

In 2004, pictures emerged of abuses by wayward American prison guards and of Iraqi civilians killed in the war. A U.S.-sponsored poll at the time found that four out of five Iraqis held negative views of our venture.

Asked about this on "Meet the Press," then-Secretary of State Colin Powell kept up the neocon patter: "We're going to stay and help the Iraqis do what we know the Iraqi people want, and that is to have a democracy based on free elections."

American weaponry helped power the pro-democracy demonstrations in Tunisia, Egypt and Iran, but not the kind the Pentagon buys. The armaments this time were the made-in-America social networking systems Facebook and Twitter.

After the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, Americans saw new communications technologies as a frightening tool that empowered the demons. But here it is being used to create democratic movements that will, we hope, open economic opportunity for frustrated Middle Easterners. Once the young people get busy working and making money, their grievances with the West will fade.

During the mass protests in Egypt, many of the old neocon voices worried that Mubarak's ouster would open the floodgates to radical Islamic forces. The story was that *they*, the neocons, knew best how to orchestrate the change. They would prod Mubarak to slowly move toward democratization, something he had no intention of doing.

In 2004, Powell said of Iraq: "We have 138,000 troops there providing security. We have provided \$18 billion for reconstruction, and we're helping now the Iraqi people develop a democratic system."


We have no troops in Egypt and haven't bombed anything we have to reconstruct. The road to Egyptian democracy may run zigzag, but as long as the masses have their Facebook town halls, it won't get blocked. All Americans need do is cheer them on, and isn't that a nice thing?

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## Is seasteading — creating floating cities — future?

Here's a novel idea: Escape the suffocating chains of intrusive government by starting your own country!

That's Patri Friedman's idea. He comes from an impressive line of libertarian thinkers. Milton Friedman, the Nobel-prize-winning free-market economist, was his grandfather. His father is David Friedman, author of the libertarian classic "The Machinery of Freedom."

Milton Friedman advocated severely limited government. David Friedman thinks we need no government at all. And now Patri believes he has an effective solution to bad government: communities on the ocean surface, or seasteading.

As a fan of the free market, Friedman understands the benefits of competition. The competitive process teaches us ways to do things we otherwise never would learn. This is important because resources are scarce and we want the most from them. In the crucible of entrepreneurial rivalry, where consumers are free to say yea or nay, competitors are pushed to do better, and un-

der this pressure they come up with things no monopolistic bureaucrat would ever think of. That's why F.A. Hayek called competition a "discovery procedure."

Governments provide various services, but they do so monopolistically. This makes them inept, even when performing valuable functions. You can move to a different city or state to escape government burdens, but it doesn't seem possible to start a whole new country. Governments claim every square mile of the earth.

What is someone looking for better governance to do? In 2008, Friedman set up The Seasteading Institute. His website states: "(W)e believe that experiments are the source of all progress: To find something better, you have to try something new. But right now, there is no open space for experimenting with new societies. That's why we work to enable *seasteading communities* -- floating cities -- which will allow the next generation of pioneers to peacefully test new ideas for government. The most successful can then inspire change in governments around the world."

In Friedman's view, there is no time to lose. Skyrocketing spending and crushing debt push governments toward crisis. Political incentives being what they are, there is little will for the needed overhaul. The retirement benefits

promised by governments are totally unsustainable, and yet proposing significant cuts in benefits has been political suicide. While there is at least serious talk about cuts now, powerful constituencies will mobilize to try to portray any cutter as a monster.

Friedman is convinced that only competition can produce the way to extricate us from the mess the politicians have created. "Seasteaders believe that government shouldn't be like the cell phone carrier industry, with few choices and high customer lock-in. Instead, we envision a vibrant startup sector for government, with many small groups experimenting with innovative ideas as they compete to serve their citizens. ... The world needs a place where those who wish to experiment with building new societies can go to test out their ideas. All land is already claimed -- which makes the oceans humanity's next frontier."

To promote actual experiments in seasteading, Friedman's institute seeks to launch a "Seasteading Evangelist" program, with local chapters for enthusiasts. By 2015, the institute hopes to present its Poseidon Award, "our prize for the establishment of the first independent seasteading community." To win, a community will need at least 50 full-time residents, financial self-sufficiency, seastead real estate for sale on

the open market and de-facto political autonomy.

Friedman doesn't expect lots of people to drop everything and start living on the ocean immediately. He writes in the upcoming issue of The Freeman ([thefreemanonline.org](http://thefreemanonline.org)): "Technology, though, has the potential to make the ocean a feasible alternative for more people. Early pioneers will learn lessons that will make life on the ocean easier, thus prompting previously unwilling pioneers to make the move. Over time, the costs in comfort, safety and access to civilization will fall and the ocean will be just another place to live. This is the path we see on any frontier."

I will not be among the first to move to a seastead. But I wish Patri well. We need all the alternatives to big arthritic government that we can get.

BRADENTON, Fla. — One year ago at this time, pitcher Kevin Hart was a bundle of raw nerves, a veteran whose desire to earn a spot in the Pirates rotation bordered on an obsession. The results couldn't have been much worse. Not only did Hart struggle with his mechanics and control, but he experienced a shoulder problem that required surgery to repair a torn labrum shortly after the start of the season. "I worked so hard in the offseason to put myself in position to be successful," said Hart, whose season consisted of five appearances for the Triple A Indianapolis farm club. "As I look back at it, I was too amped up at the start of spring training. It was nobody's fault but my own. I put myself in that position."

Consider it to be a lesson learned. Now Hart is far more at ease even if his future remains cloudy. Two weeks ago, the 28-year-old experienced shoulder discomfort, and after an examination, he was shut down as a precautionary measure.

"When something is taken away from you, you tend not to take it for granted as much," he said. "I have a different perspective now. It wasn't fun to play baseball last spring. I didn't enjoy it. Now I'm just glad to be here and have the opportunity again."Although there was no timetable for his return to the mound, Hart held out hope that he would be ready for the regular season. Because he reached the limit of minor league options, another stint on the disabled list was not out of the question.

# Fed may reconsider plan to limit debit card fees

Can dry ice be stored?

**Dear Heloise:** I would like to know how to keep DRY ICE on hand, just in case we lose electricity. I have had dry ice before, and it evaporates in the freezer. Is there a way to store dry ice for a long period of time, like six months or so? Thanks for any help. -- **Teri, via e-mail**

No, there is no safe way to store dry ice for "just in

case." Dry ice is frozen carbon dioxide -- colorless, odorless and much colder than regular ice. It does not melt, but evaporates into gas.

It is not recommended that you try to store dry ice in your freezer, because the dry ice will cause the temperature to get even colder and may cause your freezer to shut down.

If you lose electricity, dry ice is a good way to keep items cold for the short term, but as far as storing it in preparation for power outages, there is no way to store it as you would like. -- **Heloise**

CLEANING PORCH SCREEN

**Dear Heloise:** Is there any good way to clean porch screens? I do not want to cause it to sag by pushing a broom against it. Any suggestions? -- **Judy, via e-mail**

Here is a cleaning method that should work. Mix 1 cup of sudsy ammonia with 1 gallon of water. After taking the screen off, lean it against a tree or anything that the cleaning mixture will not damage. Scrub the screen gently with a soft brush on both sides (wearing gloves), rinse with plenty of water and let dry in the sunshine. For a quick fix, you also can try using your vacuum brush attachment by running it over the screen and sucking up dirt, dust and bugs. Or grab a lint roller. -- **Heloise**



Pericarditis treatable, often curable

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** I am 84 years of age and have been in excellent health. I recently was diagnosed with pericarditis. My cardiologist put me on ibuprofen. Tell me if this ailment is treatable and how dangerous it is. -- **A.L.**

**ANSWER:** The pericardium is a big baggie that holds the heart in place and protects it. Actually, it's a double baggie, one bag inside another. Pericarditis is an inflammation of the two touching surfaces of those bags.

Causes of the inflammation include viruses, bacteria, heart surgery, heart attack and an assault on the pericardium by the immune system. And, as always, there's the category of pericarditis called idiopathic -- doctors cannot find a cause for it.

The symptoms of pericarditis are sudden onset of chest pain, which worsens when people take a deep breath in and lessens when they sit up and lean forward. Doctors, listening to the heart with a stethoscope, hear a grating noise as the two opposing surfaces of the pericardium rub against each other with every heartbeat.

Pericarditis is serious and can be dangerous. For most, however, it is treatable and curable. The medicine you're taking, ibuprofen, often is the first choice of doctors. Other anti-inflammatory drugs also can be used. Indocin is an example. Some doctors prefer their patients take aspirin. In some instances, they add colchicine to the regimen. Colchicine's main purpose lies in the treat-

ment of gout. Serious cases of pericarditis have to be treated in the hospital. You're not hospitalized, so the implication is that yours is a mild case, one that should respond well to treatment.

Sometimes pericarditis interferes with heart pumping, but not in your case. And sometimes it recurs. I have a friend who suffered from recurrent bouts. He is now actively practicing medicine, so even difficult cases usually have a happy ending.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** Our 2-1/2-year-old granddaughter has urinary reflux. She has been on antibiotics much of the time.

Can this continuous use of antibiotics be a concern?

What is the best age for surgical correction? Which hospitals are best known for successful surgery? -- **R.G.**

**ANSWER:** In this condition, "reflux" indicates that urine in the urinary bladder is spurting upward into the ureters and then into the kidneys. The right and left ureters are tubes that drain urine from the kidneys into the bladder.

Ureteral reflux happens to about 1 percent of infants. It leads to kidney infections and kidney scarring. The daily use of antibiotics, at reduced doses, greatly lessens the complications of reflux. It isn't such a threat to the kidneys or the child's health. Since the dose of antibiotics is relatively low, treatment is not a source of great concern. Reflux tends to improve with age. By age 6, most children have outgrown it. If reflux continues after age 6 or if the reflux is causing kidney damage at younger ages, then surgical correction is the answer. Your granddaughter lives in a city with more than one greatly respected hospital center.
