

Metal recycler to operate at Colfor site

SALEM - R.D. Swindell Enterprises is converting the former Colfor Mfg. property into a fullservice metal recycling operation with plans to lease manufacturing space across the street and placing the old Deming office building up for sale.

On Thursday, owner Rob Swindell, who purchased the property for \$485,000, said he expected to have a full-service recycling plant running with 10 to 15 full**SALEM**

time employees in April.

There are five properties on East Perry Street and South Broadway Avenue intersection with a total of 181,761 square feet on the complex; 174,731 square feet of manufacturing and warehouse space and 7,030 square feet of office

"We're tearing down most of the buildings and taking out equipment," Swindell said of the of manufacturing space at 373 E. Perry St., known as Plant 1.

He said local commercial accounts were targeted for the recycling operation that will take nonferrous metals (no iron) including copper, brass and aluminum for direct delivery to the mills.

He wanted to dispel a rumor that the company would re-enter the forging business, explaining his company signed a non-compete clause when it purchased the property from Colfor.

"We're not forging," he said. Two other buildings, known as Plant 2 on S. Broadway Ave., will

be leased for manufacturing and could have tenants signed up as early as next week, Swindell said, noting there are weekend meetings that could "hopefully lead to inking a deal next week.'

The former Deming building and the all the acreage north to Aetna Street is for sale, Swindell said.

American Axle Manufacturing, the parent company of Colfor Mfg., closed the plant on Dec. 17, 2010 consolidating it with a plant in Malvern.

Snow, shovel, repeat: East Coast digs out over and over again

NEW YORK (AP) - Enough already. People across the Northeast wearily shoveled their sidewalks and dug out their cars - again - after getting clobbered by the latest in a seemingly never-ending string of snowstorms, this one an overachieving mess that packed more punch than anyone expected.

"I've lived in New York 70 years, and this year is the worst I remember," said Lenny Eitelberg, 77. "It's the continuity of it. It just keeps coming. Every week there's something new to be worried about. It's almost become

comical."

In the Washington area, up to 7 inches of snow renewed memories of last year's "snowpocalypse" and created chaos when it hit the nation's capital at the height of the evening rush hour Wednesday, forcing commuters into treacherous, eight-hour drives home. Even the president got caught in traf-

New Yorkers, keeping close watch on the cleanup after a post-Christmas blizzard paralyzed the city for days, had it a little easier this time. The heaviest snow arrived overnight, when

there weren't many cars and buses around to get stuck.

The forecast had called for up to a foot of snow, but the storm brought far more than that. New York got 19 inches, Philadelphia 17. Boston got about a foot, as expected. Many schools closed for a second day Thursday. Airports ground to a halt, and nearly a half-million people lost power at some

Bogart lawyer: Times up for charges

LISBON - Charles Bogart Jr.'s defense attorney argued Thursday that the second indictment against his client should be dismissed because time has run out for bringing the case to trial.

"My client's right to due process was clearly violated," James Hartford said during a hearing in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court before Judge Scott Washam.

Hartford filed a motion for discharge last week in an attempt to eliminate the latest indictment which charges Bogart for allegedly possessing property belonging to William Young, a man found dead in Au-

Bogart, 35, of 37509 Hazel Run Road, Hammondsville, had been named as a person of interest in the death investigation by Columbiana County Prosecutor Robert Herron, who also said during an arraignment hearing in September that Young was found shot to death in the woods behind his home on Spring Valley Road in Wayne Township.

He said Bogart had been caught driving Young's pickup and that Young's wallet was found on Bogart, and other items belonging to Young were found

Ohio teachers' board votes to raise retirement age

COLUMBUS (AP) - Ohio public school teachers would pay a larger share of their retirement costs, work until they're older and see pension benefits cut under changes approved Thursday that aim to keep their primary pension fund solvent by saving \$10.9 billion.

The State Teachers Retirement System board approved a host of changes to the benefit program that serves the bulk of the pension fund's 470,000 members. The changes must be approved by lawmakers and the gover-

Spokeswoman Laura Ecklar said the package marks the end of a two-year effort to find a way to keep the pension fund afloat for the long haul.

"The bottom line is, without changes, sometime in the future the fund wouldn't be able to pay benefits. And, difficult as it was to develop this plan and recommend reducing benefits, it is necessary to do," Ecklar said. "And it still provides a reasonable, reliable pension for our re-

The plan calls for increasing minimum age and service requirements necessary to qualify for retirement benefits and requiring teachers to pay 13 percent of their salaries See TEACHERS, 5A

The Steelers have won more Super Bowls than any team in the NFL, and are one victory away from hoisting the Vince Lombardi Trophy a seventh time. The Penguins have reached the Stanley Cup finals twice in the last three seasons. Pitt has developed into a Top 5 college basketball program.

They have beautiful new stadiums, state-of-the-art practice facilities, and a supportive fan base, too

ons is a more fitting moniker for this blue-collar, gritty town.

"It's a great label," Steelers wide receiver Antwaan Randle El said. "I would have to say it's accurate to a certain degree because of Steelers foot-

ball, Pitt basketball and you can't discount hockey. They've always had big-time players and all of those players always come back."

Bostonians have a legit argument. The Patriots, Red Sox and Celtics have combined to win six championships since 2002. That's wicked good.

But in this what-have-youdone-for-me-lately society, Pittsburgh is the hot city and the 'Stillers' are the hot team.

Ben Roethlisberger and the Steelers are on the verge of

winning their third Super Bowl in six seasons. They'll face the Green Bay Packers in Dallas on Feb. 6.

Sidney Crosby and the Penguins could make it two Stanley Cup titles in three years later this spring.
If the woeful Pirates could

only go back to the days of Clemente or Stargell or Bonds, then Pittsburgh would be the clear-cut choice. Then again, baseball is irrel-

evant here these days. Football is No. 1 among the sportscrazed folks, and the Steelers as Jay-Z would say — run this town.

"The fans here don't just love football, they understand football," nose tackle Chris Hoke said. "They know the

down is eager to put the club's 18-consecutive losing seasons in the rear-view window.

On Inursday, the Pirates 2011 Winter Caravan stopped at The Butler Institute of American Art to connect with fans, and share their vision of what future summers can be like at PNC Park.

"What ever happened in history is history ... we're here to win – it's that simple," Pirates pitching coach Ray Searage said. "I just can't go out there and tell these guys to try and finish .500 - it doesn't make sense. We have the talent to be successful here, so it's just a matter of being aggressive, ex-

ecuting, and playing to win." For the team's fifth-year general manager, Neal Huntington, those goals aren't unrealistic based on what he's seen on the field.



Daly, Mickelson three off lead, Tiger five back after first round of Farmers **Insurance Open**

SAN DIEGO - Tiger Woods began his new season with no bogeys, no birdies on the par 5s and no drama.

Looking for a new start after a disastrous year on and off the golf course, Woods felt little

stress Thursday in the Farmers Insurance Open with a 3-under 69 on the North Course that left him five shots behind South Korean rookie Sunghoon Kang.

If the setting was familiar for Woods, so was his middleof-the-pack position. In four of his six wins at this tournaments, he has been at least five shots behind after the opening round.

"I'm happy with the way I played, absolutely," Woods said. "I could have been a lot better if I took care of the par 5s a little bit more, but obviously, I didn't do that."

Kang, a 24-year-old rookie, finished with back-to-back birdies on the North Course for an 8-under 64, giving him a one-shot lead over fellow rookie Chris Kirk, Alex Prugh and Rickie Fowler.

Phil Mickelson shot 32 on the back nine for a 5-under 67 to match the best score on the tougher South Course, which hosted the 2008 U.S. Open that Woods won in a playoff. Also at 67 on the South was John Daly, whose last win came in 2004 at this tournament. He is the last player to win at Torrey Pines when Woods was in the

"This place means a lot to me," Daly said. "The top golfers play here every year. That says something.'

Woods no longer is No. 1 he has slipped to No. 3 in the world ranking and can't improve on that this week — but he has not played the public course he has practically owned since that U.S. Open in 2008. He missed the next year because of knee surgery, and last year while in a Mississippi addiction clinic after being caught in extramarital affairs.

"Welcome back to Torrey," was a popular phrase from the gallery throughout his round,

Grand jury indicts Wellsville man on burglary charge

LISBON – The Columbiana County grand jury issued an open indictment for aggravated burglary against a Wellsville man who injured an elderly woman during a home invasion last month.

David Wright Jr., 25, of 1766 Clark Ave., was charged with the first-degree felony count for allegedly trespassing in the home on Broadway Avenue in Wellsville on Dec. 28. Court documents alleged he pushed the 75-year-old resident, resulting in her suffering a broken rib, sprained wrist and bruised side.

The charge carries a possible penalty of three to 10 years in prison if he's convicted.

The grand jury issued 14 open indictments and two secret indictments Wednesday after meeting for two days.

Man to serve 6 years in cop beating

HAMILTON (AP) - A southwest Ohio man has been sentenced to six years in prison for beating a police officer so severely that prosecutors said he required facial reconstruction surgery. The Hamilton JournalNews reports that a judge on Thursday sentenced 46-year-old Eric German after convicting him of impersonating an officer and failure to stop after an accident. A Butler County jury had found the Middletown man guilty of felonious assault and obstructing official business. The judge acquitted him on one charge of failure to comply with a police order. Authorities say German beat Middletown officer James Deaton after a July traffic stop captured on a cruiser's dashboard camera.



Titans, Fisher parting ways after 16 seasons

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) In a surprising move, the Tennessee Titans have parted Jeff

with Fisher, who was the longest-NFL's tenured coach.

The team said in a Thursday release night that "Fisher will no longer be the head coach of the team."

The Titans announced the move within an hour of a report by SI.com that they were negotiating Fisher's departure and released a longer statement a couple hours later saying they will always appreciate his leadership through some of their "greatest heights" during 16 full seasons as coach.

'It became evident that consensus was increasingly hard to find and reality wasn't matching the vision we discussed. It is unfortunate that this decision is coming at this juncture, but we believe that we have reached the point where change is in the best interest of both parties," according to the statement.

Though the 52-year-old Fisher had been derided locally as "Coach .500" or "Coacho Ocho," he seemingly had just

owner announced two days later that he would be keeping Fisher.

Fisher and Young never really jelled in five seasons together after the Titans drafted the former Texas standout with the third overall pick in 2006 under orders from Adams.

The relationship frayed even as Fisher publicly defended Young until Nov. 21 when the situation boiled over.

Young tossed his shoulder pads and other equipment into the stands after an overtime loss in which the quarterback suffered a season-ending injury. Running back Chris Johnson said Wednesday while practicing in Hawaii for the Pro Bowl he didn't think Fisher or Young could work together after "it hit the fan."

In the end, neither Fisher nor Young survived with the Titans.

Even though Adams announced he was sticking with Fisher for the final year of his contract the move meant Fisher would be coaching for his future in 2011. Fisher has repeatedly said he wanted to finish his career with the franchise, but the coach known for never losing his cool in public while hiding behind his sunglasses may have decided Adams' decision wasn't good

Fisher thanked Adams and the franchise for "a special 17 years" in a statement released by the team.

"It has been a tremendous experience. We all did our very best and I think I can look back with fond memories and be very proud of what we accomplished. I want to wish the organization, the current players and the fans nothing but the best in the future.'

The team scheduled a news conference for Friday with Fisher expected to attend to discuss the first coaching change since the franchise relocated to Tennessee from Houston in 1997. One of the leading candidates to replace Fisher is Mike Munchak, the Titans offensive line coach. The Hall of Famer is a favorite

Among the four major U.S. sports, only Jerry Sloan with the NBA's Utah Jazz has been with the same team longer than Fisher had been with the Titans. Andy Reid of Philadelphia now takes over as the NFL's longest-tenured coach having finished up his 12th season with the Eagles.

A flurry of coaching changes didn't help Fisher's situation. He fired his defensive coordinator Chuck Cecil a week ago after giving him a

contract for the 2011 season. Defensive line coach Jim Washburn decided last week to take the same job with Philadelphia and his departure was followed by running backs coach Craig Johnson, who signed with Minnesota as the Vikings quarterbacks coach.

Fisher seemed to be taking his time filling those holes.

Fisher has coached more NFL games for one franchise than all but six Hall of Famers: George Halas, Tom Landry, Don Shula, Chuck Noll, Curly Lambeau and Bud Grant. He ranks third among active coaches in career wins with a record of 147-126, behind only Bill Belichick (176) and Mike Shanahan (160), and he is 20th all-time in coaching victories.

Adams promoted Fisher from defensive coordinator to interim coach with six games left in the 1994 season after firing Jack Pardee. Adams removed the interim tag after that season and has staved with Fisher longer than any other coach in the history of the franchise the billionaire founded.

Fisher took the team to its only Super Bowl in 2000.

Fisher oversaw the team's relocation from Houston in which the Oilers played in four different stadiums between 1996 and 1999 before moving into their current home.

Steelers' Pouncey, McFadden don't practice again

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pittsburgh Steelers center Maurkice Pouncey did not practice again Thursday because of the left ankle injury he sustained during Sunday's AFC championship game victory over the New York Jets Sunday.

Pouncey said after the game Sunday that he intended on playing in the Super Bowl, and was seen in a cast and on crutches Wednesday. Teammate Chris Kemoeatu had told reporters Wednesday that Pouncey was not going to play in the Super Bowl, but he backed off those comments Thursday.

Also not practicing for the Steelers was starting cornerback Bryant Mc-Fadden, who has a strained abdomen. McFadden also did not practice early last week, but he returned to practice Friday and played Sunday — albeit with a somewhat reduced workload.

William Gay assumed McFadden's role as the team's No. 2 cornerback, and Doug Legursky replaced Pouncey.

There was no change in the Steelers' injury status from Wednesday to Thursday: All Pro safety Troy Polamalu (Achilles), wide receiver Emmanuel Sanders (foot), left tackle Jonathan Scott ribs) and special teamer Will Allen (knee) all did not practice again, but Allen is the only one with an injury expected to be serious enough to put his status for the Feb. 6 Super Bowl in question.

Defensive end Aaron Smith continues to be limited in practice participation, as he has been for the past three weeks. He has not played since tearing a triceps Oct. 24 and is not expected to be ready face the Green Bay Packers in the Super Bowl.

Indians say Sizemore, Santana expected back

CLEVELAND (AP) — Grady Śizemore isn't going anywhere — except back to center field for the Cleveland Indians as soon as he is fully recovered from knee surgery. New general manager Chris Antonetti refuted trade rumors involving Sizemore, a three-time All-Star, during a meeting with fans Thursday night in a town hall setting in downtown Cleveland.

"I don't comment on individual players, but in this instance I will say we have had absolutely no discussions with any team regarding Grady," Antonetti said. "His rehab has gone as well as can be expected. He's already in our training camp in Goodyear, (Ariz.), doing baseball-related activities. It is hopeful he will be in spring training games by mid-March."

Antonetti said a healthy Sizemore and Carlos Santana, a switch-hitting catcher who was in the midst of a strong rookie season before getting hurt, can help boost the Indians into AL Central contention this year. Both players had their 2010 seasons cut short by knee surgery as Cleveland finished fourth with a 69-93 record.

"Certainly a lot of things must go right, but I don't think there should be a limit on our expectations," Antonetti said. "We were disappointed last year and will be disappointed this year if we're not in the playoffs."

Cleveland manager Manny Acta said he's eager to show that the Indians can contend. He pointed to a young pitching staff that had the fourth-lowest ERA in the AL in the second half of 2010 as being a good starting point, but acknowledged he'll be trying to find both a starting third baseman and second baseman during camp.

"The competition at third is up for grabs," Acta said. "I like competition." Entering his second year in Cleveland, Acta will be looking at several rookies at both open infield spots, including Lonnie Chisenhall, Jared Goedert, Jason Kipnis and Cord Phelps. Veterans Jayson Nix, Jason Donald, Luis Valbuena and Adam Everett are among others in the mix.

Antonetti's only major signing since replacing Mark Shapiro as GM in October was free-agent outfielder Austin Kearns, who started the 2010 season with Cleveland and was dealt to the New York Yankees in June.

"We don't want to bring in a guy just to say we can," Antonetti said. "We had the youngest team in the league last year and believe the nucleus is in place. We'll start with the guys we have internally. We hope some of them (rookies) can force our hand and earn playing time this year."

COLUMBUS (AP) — Stan Drayton, who has been an assistant at nine col-

leges, is Ohio State's new wide receivers coach. Coach Jim Tressel announced the hiring on Thursday.

Drayton replaces Darrell Hazell who recently took the head coaching job at Kent State.

Drayton served as Florida's running backs coach and recruiting coordinator last season. The Ohio native also served as Florida's running backs coach from 2005-07, and held the same position at SEC schools Tennessee (2008)

"This is one of baseball's heritage franchises, and when you play in the shadow of Roberto Clemente, you try to live up to that standard. We stopped at an elementary school in Poland before this, and we want to win, so those kids will want to be Pirates fans."

Ohio provisional ballots in need of common-sense fix

Ohio's laws on provisional ballots are so confusing and convoluted that even the courts can't sort them out. State legislators need to step in and make corrections.

Provisional ballots are those cast when election poll workers are not certain potential voters are legitimate. That can happen for several reasons. Perhaps a voter forgot to take identification documents to the polls, moved and didn't update his registration, or simply went to the wrong polling place.


The idea behind state law is that election workers can accept ballots provisionally, then check later to determine whether votes should be counted.


State law on the matter is confusing enough that some election workers do not seem to understand it. Certainly, many voters do not.

And now, the courts are involved in conflict over provisional ballots. Lawsuits involving one disputed race in the election last fall were filed in the state Supreme Court and at U.S. District Court. You guessed it: The two courts issued conflicting rulings. Now, a higher federal court is being asked to determine whether state or federal courts have jurisdiction over Ohio election laws.

Regardless of what happens in the court case, state legislators should take another look at provisional balloting laws. They need to be clear enough that there is no confusion among either voters or election workers. They also need to be fair — not disenfranchising voters for relatively minor errors but at the same time preventing vote fraud.

However the issue is decided in the courts, Ohio legislators should take another look at provisional voting laws. Last fall, more than 105,000 of them were cast throughout the state, so the matter clearly is an important one. As soon as possible, Gov. John Kasich and lawmakers should devise common-sense repairs to the law.





Cash for education clunkers



er countries," President Obama urged this week. How? By out-spending them, of course! It's the same old quack cure for America's fat and failing government-run schools monopoly. The one-trick ponies at the White House call their academic improvement agenda "targeted investing" for "winning the

66 We're going to have to out-educate oth-

future." Truth in advertising: Get ready to fork over more Cash for Education Clunkers.

Our government already spends more per capita on education than any other of the 34 wealthiest countries in the world except for Switzerland, according to recent analysis of data from the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development. Overall inflation-adjusted K-12 spending has tripled over the past 40 years, the Michigan-based Mackinac Center for Public Policy points out. Yet American test scores and graduation rates are stagnant. One in 10 high schools is a dropout factory. And our students' performance in one of the most prestigious global math competitions has been so abysmal that the U.S. simply withdrew altogether.

Obama's fiscal year 2011 budget already represents "one of the largest increases" in federal education spending history, and hikes total discretionary spending to nearly \$51 billion. Toss in another \$35 billion for mandatory Pell grants. And add another \$4 billion for the illusory "Race to the Top" charade to improve academic standards.

Then there's the \$10 billion for the Education Jobs Fund signed into law last August -- a naked payoff to the public teachers union, which also includes \$50 million for the Striving Readers comprehensive literacy development and education program; \$82 million for Student Aid Administration; and \$10.7 million for the Ready to Teach program.

Oh, and don't forget the \$100 billion in federal stimulus funding for school programs and initiatives administered by the U.S. Department of Education.

As he extols the virtues of "innovation" and "accountability," the last thing Obama wants you to think about is the actual results of these profligate federal ed binges:

☐ As education analyst Neal McCluskey accurately described the real impact of the \$4 billion Race to the Top paperwork theater: "States must say how they would improve lots of things, but they actually have to do very little. It is decades of public schooling -- from the Great Society to No

Child Left Behind -- in a nutshell." You need a chainsaw to cut through the bureaucratese of the winning state applications, but the bottom line is that the "race" is "won" only when school reformers get buy-in from the teachers unions -- the most stalwart enemies of introducing choice and competition to the atrophying system.

Despite massive multibillion-dollar "investments" in teacher training, America's educators are horrifyingly incompetent at even elementary math. Explaining why American grade-school students can't master simple fractions, one math professor confessed: "Part of the reason the kids don't know it is because the teachers aren't transmitting that." Instead, they've ditched "drill and kill" -- otherwise known as the basics -- for costly educational fads ranging from "Mayan Math" to "Everyday Math" that substitute art, self-esteem and multiculturalism for the fundamentals of computation.

☐ Among the supposedly cutting-edge programs funded by Obama's federal stimulus program is the \$49 million technology initiative for the Detroit Public Schools. The urban school system is overrun by corruption, violence and incompetence. The teachers union sabotaged classroom instruction and denied schoolchildren an education through an apparent illegal work stoppage. Yet, Washington went ahead and forked over a whopping \$530 million in federal porkulus funds to reward yet more Detroit government school failure and bail out the reckless-spending boobs who mismanaged the DPS budget and engineered a fiscal crisis. The \$49 million technology program distributed some 40,000 new (foreign-made) ASUS netbook computers, plus thousands of printers, scanners and desktop computers to teachers and kids from early childhood through 12th grade.

One teacher was caught late last year trying to pawn his shiny new booty. No doubt, he has company. Nationwide, in both urban and rural school districts, large and small, these technology infusions have turned out to be gesture-driven boondoggles and political payoffs that squander precious educational resources -- with little, if any, measurable academic benefits. Mark Lawson, school board president of one of New York state's first districts to put technology directly in students' hands told The New York Times in 2007: "After seven years, there was literally no evidence it had any impact on student achievement -- none. The teachers were telling us when there's a one-to-one relationship between the student and the laptop, the box gets in the way. It's a distraction to the educational process."

That about sums up federal intervention in public schooling: It's a taxpayer-subsidized distraction to the local educational process that throttles true competition, rewards failure and mistakes blind government largesse for achievement.

The speech: Once again, Obama calls for new spending



In his State of the Union address, President Obama at times sounded like he was channeling Ronald Reagan: cutting the deficit, hailing private enterprise and individual initiative, talking about the future.

But for all his

eloquence, the president wrapped his liberal ideology in conservative sheep's clothing.

On the surface, the president said many things with which conservatives might agree, but words can mean something, or they can mask true intentions

There was no indication the president plans to retreat on his far-left agenda of the last two years. Why should he? That would require denying who he is.

Absent the glamorous rhetoric, let's examine the major subjects on which the president touched.

EDUCATION: Anyone who has seen the film "Waiting for Superman" knows the public education system in this country is a mess and that if all the money now being spent on education

isn't improving the product, especially for the poor, whom Democrats are supposed to be championing, more money will not help. Competition through school choice would improve education. The speech was another sop to teachers' unions that care more about their members than students' futures.

INNOVATION: Government doesn't innovate. It regulates. It taxes. According to The Cato Institute (www.cato.org/), the average combined federal and state corporate tax rate in the U.S. is 40 percent, first among Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) countries. Japan comes in second with a combined rate of 35.7 percent. In his speech, the president said he supports reducing the corporate tax rate for the first time in 25 years, but then came the caveat: "without adding to our deficit." Cutting taxes without reducing spending will add to the deficit and so the president can eschew responsibility

DEFICIT REDUCTION: Where to begin? A president and until recently an all-Democratic Congress has put our financial house in jeopardy by running up a \$14 trillion debt. In March 2006, when he was a senator, Obama called the \$8.27 trillion debt ceiling "a sign of leadership failure." If the debt ceil-

when Democrats refuse to vote for

business tax reductions.

ing during the George W. Bush presidency was a sign of failed leadership, who's failing in his leadership when the debt has climbed to \$14 trillion? Deficit reduction will come when the government cuts (not caps) spending.

REFORMING GOVERNMENT: The best way to "reform" government is to reduce unneeded and unnecessary programs and agencies. Congress should establish a commission similar to the successful Base Realignment and Closing Commission (BRAC), which shuttered outmoded military bases. Every government agency and program should be required to justify its existence consistent with its cost and benefit to the greatest number of Americans. If they can't, they should be eliminated.

INFRASTRUCTURE: From better roads to high-speed inter- and intracity trains, the U.S. lags behind many European and Asian countries in providing low-cost, efficient and fast transportation for its citizens. It is one of the few areas where Americans would be willing to pay more in fares or even taxes to improve the way we move around.

move around.

Included in infrastructure ought to be the mining of America's considerable natural gas supply and a "to the moon" emphasis on nuclear power and drilling

for more oil in America's backyard to

ease our dependence on foreign oil. It will take years to break our foreign oil addiction and so new sources of petroleum on American territory must be explored, something this president won't

Curiously, Obama invoked a space analogy, mentioning the Russian "Sputnik" satellite launched in 1957 and the American Apollo program that sent astronauts to the moon in 1969. And yet this president has effectively mothballed our space program at a time when China is moving rapidly forward with theirs.

The president's speech was all about new spending ("investment" he called it), no matter what he said about reducing the deficit. Spending on big government is what liberals do. No one should be fooled by the rhetoric, or the theatrics of congressional Republicans and Democrats sitting together. The Republican challenge is to stop the president's liberal agenda while making the case for a better one.

on or near Bogart's property.

The information came to light after he was asked why the \$250,000 bond couldn't be reduced for Bogart since he was only charged with one count of receiving stolen property, then he explained the extenuating circumstances. No charges have filed against Bogart or anyone else related to Young's death.

Bogart has been in custody since Aug. 11, the same day Young's body was later found. He was charged with receiving stolen property for possession of a stolen ATV found during a search of his property that day.

A second indictment was filed against him in December charging him with two counts of receiving stolen property, a single count of forgery, and identity fraud. The indictment alleged that Bogart had a check belonging to Young and forged it on Aug. 3, that he possessed a 2004 silver PT Cruiser belonging to Young and that he possessed Young's personal identity information with the intent to hold himself out to be Young.

Hartford said the evidence for the second indictment was all seized at the time of his client's initial arrest on the day of the search back in August. By law, he said the time to take him to trial has passed for the second charge since he's been incarcerated longer than 90 days.

He argued that the time should toll for the second indictment because "the state has sat on the evidence since Aug. 11, 2010." He also said the state has continued to sit on charges they'll mete out over time, which he said rises to the level of "outrageous governmental conduct" and is grounds for dismissing the indictment.

"Given the foregoing scenario the State of Ohio could keep this defendant incarcerated ad infinitum by way of their 'trickle down' process of indictment, holding evidence until it suits the government's fancy and continually indicting the defendant until they are able to secure a conviction on something," Hartford wrote in his motion.

Chief Assistant Prosecutor John Gamble said the issue isn't the speedy trial requirement, but the statute of limitations, which he said has not lapsed. He said the indictments clearly follow a different set of facts, with the charges in the second indictment stemming from Aug. 3. The charge from the first indictment occurred on Aug. 11.

In his written response to Hartford's motion, he said challenges such as this are limited to entrapment defenses "and in cases where charges are brought against defendants for exercising their constitutional rights. Absolutely no authority exists for the claims made by the defendant in this case."

Washam took all the arguments under advisement and gave each side seven days to file any additional documentation. A tentative trial date for the second indictment was set for Feb. 28, with a status hearing on Feb. 24, under objection from the defense per their argument to have the case dismissed.

The first case remains pending with a trial date of March 14 and a status hearing on March 3.

In other personnel matters, the board hired Alison Thompson as a part-time intervention specialist at Knox Elementary, and Jennifer Rohaley and Annie Grischow as Title I tutors for the remainder of the school year.

Also at the meeting, the board obtained a waiver from the Ohio Department of Education to request the delay of the unfunded state mandated allday, every day kindergarten for the 2011-2-12 school year.

According to schools Superintendent Dr. Scott Weingart, the waiver is required for all districts that do not have an all-day kindergarten class.

West Branch has an all-day "experience," consisting of a half day with a teacher and a half day with an aide, so by law must obtain the waiver to continue the program as is, he explained.

The board also accepted anonymous donations of \$11,500 for technology, staff development and recognition for the district; and of \$2,000 for the athletic program.

"It's gratifying to be able to accept these donations," Weingart said, noting total donations in January of over \$16,000. "We're thankful for all the donations we receive, whether identified or not, because they allow us to do things that our general fund wouldn't normally permit."

"That's the nightmarish situation that we've been dealing with as quickly as we can," Gov. Martin O'Malley said.

The federal government let 300,000 Washingtonarea employees go home two hours early Wednesday,

the teeth of the late-afternoon storm. It took many people more than eight hours to get home.

The men's basketball team from Maryland's Towson University got stuck in traffic just a few miles from its game at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va. team eventually checked into hotel rooms in nearby Manassas around 1 a.m. – six hours after the scheduled tip-off. Even old hands marveled at the continuing power of this winter, whose endless snowstorms are being helped along by a cold-air phenomenon off the coast known as the North Atlantic Oscillation.

After digging out his driveway for 'umpteenth time'' knocking some large chunks of ice off his car, Joel Davis stood outside his home in Toms River, N.J., and wondered when he would ever see his lawn again.

"I like the snow and I expect to get some living here, but this is nuts," he said. "I can't remember the last time everything wasn't snowcovered. We didn't get a white Christmas, but it seems that it's been white ever since."

New York City typically gets 21 inches of snow a winter. Mayor Michael Bloomberg said the latest storm makes this January the snowiest since the city started keeping records; at 36 inches, it easily breaks the mark of 27.4 inches set in 1925. The New York area has been hit with snow eight times since mid-December.

The city, slammed for its slow response to a big storm in late December, handled this one better. It closed schools and some government offices. Federal courts in Manhattan and the United Nations shut down as well. The Statue of Liberty closed for snow removal. The Queens borough president's office got only three or four complaint calls - compared to dozens following day-after-Christmas the

Bloomberg said the city benefited both from lessons learned and the storm's timing. "This time people were already home by the time the snow really got bad," he

Still, the city wasn't hassle-free. Dozens of passengers spent the hours from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. huddled in subway cars after their train got stuck at a Brooklyn station because of malfunctioning signals.

into the system while receiving reduced benefits and smaller cost-of-living increases. Those payments are made in lieu of paying into Social Security.

Ohio Education Association spokeswoman Michele Prater said the state's largest teachers' union does not support the plan.

"We understand the timeline and the constraints the STRS board was under to put their plan together, but this proposal includes cuts that are too deep and that don't offer sufficient flexibility to teachers who are nearing the end of their careers," she said.

Board recommendations call for reducing retirees' increases cost-of-living from 3 percent a year to 2 percent a year beginning July 1, 2012. Member contributions would also begin to rise on that date, increasing 1 percent a year to a total of 3 percent above the current 10 percent level between 2012 and 2014.

Other changes are scheduled to kick in Aug. 1, 2015 – assuming they are approved by the Legisla-

Republican state Rep. Lynn Wachtmann, chairman of the House Health and Aging Committee, said Wednesday that he plans to introduce a pension reform bill next week. The legislation is slated to include proposed eligibility and benefit changes to all five of

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Ohio's public pension funds.

Gov. John Kasich has signaled he could play hardball on the issue, including opposing pension reforms he does not see as going far enough.

Ecklar said a combination of factors made current pension formulas unsustainable - including the hit to investment losses during the recent economic downturn and longer lives for retirees and their survivors.

Recommendations approved Thursday would reduce the difference between assets held by the pension fund and what it owes in pension payments to \$27.9 billion - an amount the fund could feasibly pay off in the legally required 30 years.

To get there, the board voted to set a minimum age of 60 with 35 years of service as the new threshold for full pension eligibility. Under current rules, teachers can retire at any age once they've served 30 years. Members could still be eligible for partial early retirement benefits at 55, but after 30 years of service rather than the current 25.

The new age and service

requirements phased in over eight years. Members will still be able to retire at age 65 with 5 years of service.

Teachers retiring after 35 years at age 60 or older would receive 77 percent of their final average salary as pension, a reduction from the current rate. The average salary would be calculated over five years rather than the current three, which could reduce payouts further.

The plan does not include any changes to the amount teachers' employers, including school districts, colleges and universities, pay into the retirement system.

P&G, Colgate squeeze means prices to rise

CINCINNATI (AP) - Shoppers can expect some higher prices as the makers of toothpaste, soap and other everyday household products see their profit margins pinched by rising ingredient costs.

Both Procter & Gamble Co. and rival Colgate-Palmolive Co. reported lower profits Thursday and posted revenue below Wall Street expectations for the last quarter, and their stocks slid. They both said commodity costs are rising more than expected. P&G said they are adding \$1 billion in costs for the year, double what it anticipated.

P&G, which counts Pampers diapers, Gillette shavers and Crest toothpaste among its major brands, said fast-rising costs for product-making materials and fuel likely will mean some price increases, with hikes already planned for its Duracell batteries in March.

Colgate-Palmolive President and CEO Ian Cook said during a conference call that the price increases would run 1 to 2 percent.

Consumers can expect to see not only household product makers, but beverage, food and other companies to try to pass along price increases, said Jack Russo, an Edward Jones analyst. That will test whether they are feeling confident enough about the economy to pay higher prices again for their favorite brands.

S&P cuts Japan's credit rating on debt

TOKYO (AP) – Standard & Poor's cut Japan's credit rating for the first time in almost nine years Thursday, issuing a harsh critique of the government's ability to control its ballooning debt. The agency lowered Japan's long-term sovereign debt rating one notch to AA-, which is the fourth highest level and the same rating given to China, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. The news sent the dollar as high as 83.18 yen from 82.20 yen.

The downgrade is a stern reminder to Japan that it faces consequences for letting its debt swell to twice the size of gross domestic product. Prime Minister Naoto Kan is pushing to reform the country's tax and social security systems, but the downgrade could complicate the fiscal picture by making it more expensive to finance the country's debt. Creditors typically demand higher interest rates when credit ratings fall.

Japan's debt ratio, already among the highest in the developed world, is on track to rise more than expected and won't peak until the mid-2020s, S&P said in a statement. The country's problems, it added, are exacerbated by persistent deflation and a rapidly aging population.

Japan is the world's fastest-aging country, with its population projected to shrink from 127 million people now to 90 million by 2055 - 40 percent of whom will be over 65.

Rate on 30-year mortgage rises to 4.80%

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The average rate on a 30-year fixed mortgage rose for the second week in a row, buoyed by higher bond yields.

Freddie Mac said Thursday that the average rate rose to 4.80 percent this week from 4.74 percent the previous week. The average rate on the 15-year loan, a popular refi-

nance option, inched up to 4.09 percent from 4.05 percent. Mortgage rates have changed little in the new year after spiking more than half a percentage point in the last two months. Investors sold off Treasurys bonds during that stretch, driving yields lower. Mortgage rates tend to track

the yield on the 10-year Treasury note. The 30-year loan rate reached a 40-year low of 4.17 percent in November, and the 15-year mortgage rate fell to 3.57 percent, the lowest level on records dating back to

Record high foreclosures, a weak job market and expectations that prices will fall further have convinced potential buyers to hold off on purchasing homes. And historically low rates have done little to boost demand.

Fewer people bought previously owned homes last year than in any year since 1997, according to the National Association of Realtors. Sales fell 4.8 percent last year to 4.91 million units, the worst level in 13 years.

AT&T to push Android phones

NEW YORK (AP) - The CEO of AT&T Inc. on Thursday said the company will start "very aggressively" marketing smart phones based on Google Inc.'s Android software now that it will no longer be the exclusive carrier for Apple Inc.'s iPhone in the U.S.

So far, Verizon Wireless, AT&T's chief competitor, has been the biggest supporter of Android. But it will start selling the iPhone on Feb. 10, and is likely to shift resources away from Android.

Motorola on Wednesday said it's already seeing a dropoff in sales of its Android phones in Verizon stores, as customers are holding off, waiting for the iPhone.

In effect, AT&T and Verizon Wireless are set to swap strategies in the high-stakes smart phone market, with AT&T turning to Android and Verizon to the iPhone.

AT&T, the nation's largest telecommunications company, also provided an earnings forecast for the year that disappointed analysts, and said it signed up a net of just 400,000 new customers on contract-based wireless plans in the last three months of last year. It was the lowest quarterly number in at least five years.

The low number of new contracts demonstrated that even though AT&T activated a lot of iPhones - 4.1 million the iconic phone has lost much of its power to attract customers from other carriers.

Requests for jobless aid up due to snow

WASHINGTON (AP) – The number of people applying for unemployment benefits rose sharply last week, but the figures were largely distorted by rare snowstorms that swept through the Southeast.

Applications surged last week by a seasonally adjusted 51,000 to 454,000, the highest level since late October, the Labor Department said Thursday.

A government analyst said that a major reason for the spike was the harsh weather in Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina. That forced many companies to shut down temporarily and also prevented many people from applying for benefits in the previous week.

Roots of meltdown: Does it even matter?

WASHINGTON (AP) - A government panel's failure to reach a firm conclusion about what caused the financial crisis shows how complex Wall Street has become and how partisan Washington has grown.

The blurriness of its report comes months after a new law already has begun tightening financial rules to prevent another crisis.

All of which raises a question: Do the findings of the 633-page report matter?

In its report, the Financial Crisis Inquiry Commission blames a range of obvious culprits: Banks that made reckless bets. Credit rating agencies that endorsed risky mortgage bonds. Government regulators who overlooked danger signs until they threatened the global financial system.

It concludes that the crisis might have been prevented if banks had been more careful and regulators had asked tougher questions.

Those views have long since become mainstream in the more than two years since the crisis peaked. Yet among panel members, they sowed dissension. In the end, the commission's six Democratic appointees embraced its conclusions. The four named by Republicans did not; they offered their own reasons for the crisis - and three complained that the majority's conclusions were too broad.

The absence of a sharp and unifying message dulls the report's impact, analysts say.

"If only one side is picking and pulling different facts and trying to weave them into a narrative, you don't end up with a cohesive final product that's useful in policymaking," said Paul Atkins, a former member of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The report's conclusions are also too generic to help steer regulators who have been writing rules for the financial overhaul law enacted last summer, Atkins said.

The crisis panel has been likened to the Pecora Commission, which investigated the cause of the 1929 stock market crash. It's also drawn comparisons to the independent panel that investigated the September 2001 terrorist at-

Yet those reports were more influential than the financial crisis report is likely to be.

The Pecora hearings were held before Congress debated securities laws aimed at protecting investors in the future. And the 9/11 commission crafted conclusions that managed to command a unanimous backing from appointees of both political parties.

By contrast, the financial crisis report "is either too late or it's too early," said Daniel Alpert, managing partner at the investment bank Westwood Capital LLC.

A year ago, the report might have shaped the new financial rules now taking effect. Alternatively, if the commissioners had waited a few years, they might have been able to detect flaws in the new financial regulations and suggest improvements.

She is how I have gotten through my life this far. There are support groups out there for everything under the sun, except for losing a best friend due to indifference and lack of caring. Please advise me.

THROWN AWAY IN PASADENA, TEXAS DEAR THROWN AWAY: I know you are hurting, and I am sorry. But friendships are not just made up of helping each other through the hard times; there is also a component of celebrating the good ones. While she may have been your leaning post, you need to examine what you were to her. If the load became too much to carry, it's understandable that she would need to back off. While there are no support groups for people in your situation, there are counselors who can help you sort through your feelings - and because this experience has been devastating, you should talk with one.

DEAR ABBY: I'm a 16-year-old girl from a religious home. When I was 7, my father got very drunk and molested me. It had a terrible impact on me. He has apologized for what happened and knows I hate him for it and can't forgive him. It hasn't happened since. I feel the next step in my healing is to confide in my friends and ask them to pray for me. But if I do, I know they won't look at me the same. I'm afraid they'll get their parents to intervene and something will happen to Dad. That's the last thing I want. Should I tell? - NEEDS SUPPORT IN PHILLY

DEAR NEEDS SUPPORT: You appear to be an idealistic, intelligent young woman. But it's important you understand that apologizing for committing a crime against someone is not enough. The person must also be willing to accept the consequences of his actions. Drop by an elementary school and look at the 7-year-olds on the playground. That's how small and vulnerable you were when your father molested you. Ask yourself: Did he quit drinking and get help for his alcohol problem? Did he talk to his minister and confess what he did? Did he seek professional help? Are there little girls in your extended family?

You are exhibiting two classic signs of an abuse victim. One is thinking that people will regard you differently if you disclose that you were victimized. Another is the impulse to "protect" your abuser. I'm all for the power of prayer, but rather than tell your girlfriends, is your mother aware of what happened? If she is unavailable to you, then you should talk to your minister or a trusted counselor at school. If you're afraid this will "betray" your father, call the Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network (RAINN) toll-free at (800) 656-4673. You can speak to one of the counselors there in complete confidence. They are experienced and can guide you about what or what not — to do next.

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How to deal with jet lag

DEAR DR. **DONOHUE:** My wife and I are traveling to Australia. What are your suggestions for minimizing jet lag? We leave Los Angeles at 10:30 p.m. and arrive in Sydney at 8:30 a.m. local time. A suggestion was to keep our original

time zone schedule until arrival. It was also suggested that we consider taking a sleeping pill on the plane. We appreciate

your thoughts. - **S.T.** ANSWER: Our inner clock adjusts how we feel and how the body works according to a light-dark cycle that keeps us awake during the day and asleep during the night. Nighttime secretion of the hormone melatonin readies the body for sleep. Body temperature also prepares us for sleep or for daytime activity. Temperature is lowest in the early morning and highest in the late afternoon. These are only two of the mechanisms involved in keeping us alert and making us groggy.

8:30 a.m. in Sidney will be approximately 6:30 p.m. in your hometown. In preparing for this change, go to sleep an

hour earlier on the day before leaving. When you arrive at your destination, eat breakfast, lunch and dinner according to the appropriate Sydney time. On your first day in Sidney, take 2 or 3 mg of melatonin in the evening, and you can continue that for the next two days.

Since you're arriving in the morning, try to stay awake all day.

Ask your doctor about a sleeping pill to take during your nighttime plane trip. One that is often recommended is Ambien. Use it sparingly and briefly, if your doctor concurs.

Want some personal, unscientific thoughts? Many times I have crossed as many time zones as you are going to cross without taking any precautions or any medicines. I never suffered from jet lag.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My sister, age 61, has been told she has obsessivecompulsive disorder. What is it? How does it affect her husband? Is it heredi-

ANSWER: An obsession is a recurring thought that generates anxiety. A compulsion is an act, a ritual, performed to banish the obsessive thought. It relieves anxiety. Examples of compulsions are endless hand-washing, neatness that requires expenditures of huge amounts of time, checking and rechecking to see if the oven is turned off, constant straightening of a throw rug's fringes and similar, nonproductive tasks. They can take over a person's life. Obsessive-compulsive disorder, OCD, isn't the fault of the affected person. It most likely has to do with an imbalance of brain messenger chemicals. Genes are partly to blame, but are not the entire story. Your brother-in-law might be exasperated by his wife's compulsions, but if he understands that they are not under her control, he ought to be patient. A therapist can help overcome OCD, and medicines are also a help.

Dear Annie: Last August, one of my favorite authors published a new book. My husband told me not to buy it and hinted that his parents were planning to get it for me for Christmas. This was the type of thing they had done before, and I was happy to

However, come Christmas Day, the book they gave me was something entirely different and not one I was eager to read. I was

initially exasperated because I had given up several opportunities to buy my book at a discount, and the book they purchased was about hiking. I do not hike, camp or participate in any similar outdoor activities and had absolutely no interest in this book. Although my in-laws had given me inappropriate or head-scratching gifts before, this one took the cake.

Now, a month later, my husband and I are thinking there may be more to it. His mother had specifically told him she was buying me the book I wanted. His concern is that his mother, who is 77, may be suffering from dementia. Her own mother had it for years

at that age. We are not sure if the book thing was a simple mistake or an early sign of a more serious problem. We obviously cannot come out and ask her why she bought a hiking book instead of the one she knew I wanted. We would sound accusatory and ungrateful. Can you suggest a way we could approach her with our concerns without prying? – Concerned Daughter-in-Law

Dear Concerned: There is no need to point out the book's unsuitability. Mom's family history, however, indicates a need to pay attention. Make a point to see and speak to her often. Does she forget familiar names? Have trouble recalling what keys are for? Where the milk goes? Does she follow the conversation? (There also could be hearing loss that prevents her from participating appropriately or medications that interfere with cognition.) We hope she has a good doctor, preferably a geriatrician, who will evaluate her at her next checkup. You might call the doctor in advance and alert him or her.






