

Guard officer speaks of Army values at United Veterans Day assembly

HANOVERTON - Loyalty, duty, respect, selfless service, honor, integrity and personal courage — that's what being a soldier is all about, 2nd Lt. Bethany Barnett said.

"Try to apply these values to yourself," she told students at United High School during the annual Veterans Day assembly.

Barnett serves in the Ohio Army National Guard and did some student teaching in freshman social studies at United this fall, returning as the guest speaker for the event which included recognition of local veterans, patriotic songs by the band and chorus and patriotic video clips.

A 1999 graduate of Carrollton High School, Barnett focused on the Army Values soldiers learn during Basic

Combat Training and explained what they mean and how students and civilians could live by those values. She talked about how duty means resisting the temptation to take shortcuts and how selfless service means putting the needs of others above your own.

She also talked about how integrity means doing what's right, both legally and morally, even though doing the right thing can sometimes be difficult.

Barnett also answered some questions submitted by students and said the biggest influence in her life was her parents, who were present in the audi-

"My parents taught me from the time I was a little kid that my purpose in life was to help other people," she said. "My parents taught me my job as a citizen of the United States was to serve my country."

Many veterans who served the coun-

A Lisbon graduate, Boley was in uniform and is home for good now from Afghanistan. He serves in the Ohio Air National Guard 200th Red Horse Squadron. He said he was glad to be home. Being a soldier is a sacrifice, but he said "you get through it."

"If it wasn't for the veterans, nobody would probably be here," Salem resident Roy Guthrie said.

A Purple Heart recipient, Guthrie served in the U.S. Army during World War II and landed on Omaha Beach on D-Day. His brothers, Arthur and Glenn, who are both deceased, also

A&L must pay \$10.6M in penalties, landfill costs

LISBON – A ruling by Judge C. Ashley Pike on Wednesday gave A & L Salvage LLC 10 days to pay the state of Ohio \$10,632,680 to cover the environmental violations and expenses of closing the demolition debris landfill on state Route 45 near Lis-

The majority of the money, \$8.9 million, is civil penalties for continued violations of Ohio's regulations for construction and demolition debris, solid waste and air pollution violations at the landfill.

The money includes \$594,962 to cover the money the state of Ohio has already expended to close the landfill. This money was in addition to the \$4.1 million bond A & L Salvage had paid in 2010 toward the cost of permanently capping the 42-acre dump area facility.

Another \$1,087,418 will repay disposal fees the landfill owes the state. Additionally, \$300 pays for a tax for creating a public nuisance at the landfill. Finally \$50,000 will be paid to the Office of the Attornev General for its attorney fees and other enforcement costs.

The break down of the costs came following a hearing Oct. 25, set so appropriate fees and penalties could be calculated.

Additionally, within 20 lays A & L Salvage was or dered to transfer to the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency a 99-year lease for oil, gas, coal and mineral rights for its property. The EPA is allowed to transfer the lease as it sees fit.

Pike wrote that A & L Salvage's violations were "egregious, reckless and offensive to human health and the environment." He continued the company "exhibited a pattern of noncompliance and general

County farmers helping organize hay lift to Texas

NEW WATERFORD - Longtime farmers Jan and Gene Douglass can empathize with those who lost farmland in central Texas in the September fires that ravished homes and licked the soil clean of precious nutrients.

The Douglass' own a 200-acre farm in New Waterford and can easily imagine the effects that soil devastation can wreak on raising livestock.

But the soil isn't the only thing Texas farmers are concerned about. Thousands of hay bales were also lost and a drought said to be the worst in decades doesn't appear to

"It looks like (hurricane) Katrina down there; it's farm after farm of just rubble. Folks are living in lawn chairs and on the slabs of their homes," Jan Douglass said.

When the Douglass' saw a request for hay donations in a local publication more than a month ago they immediately responded. The couple made phone calls to dozens of people trying to determine the best way to help. They not only wanted to donate hay, but help organize a local effort to get more hay donated as well.

Jan Douglass hopes the local effort will grow statewide. She calls it operation "Ohio Hay Lift to Texas."





Commissioners OK fixing roof of another building

LISBON – Another county building has a leaky roof. Columbiana County Commissioner Jim Hoppel reported they hired Hissom Roofing of East Liverpool to repair leaks on the building in the village square that houses the adult probation department and bar association law library.

In September, commissioners awarded a contract for \$277,200 to repair the leaky roof at the county municipal court building. The cost for repairing the law library building roof is \$13,000, but contract approval was never run through a commissioner meeting because government bodies are not required to seek formal bids for any expenditures under \$25,000. The newspaper only became aware of the repair after seeing scaffolding around the building

Hoppel was asked about the repair job at this week's commission meeting.

In other action at the meeting, commissioners approved a petition filed by Clarence and Marlene Hole of Middleton Township to officially close an alley behind their home that existed only on paper for 200 years and had never been used as a public thoroughfare. The petition also had the approval of the adjoining property owner, and it was approved after no objections were received.

Commissioners transferred \$12,000 to the common pleas court to cover additional health insurance costs being passed onto offices due to increased employee claims. The idea was for the officeholders to absorb the extra cost, but Hoppel said the judges are the only ones so far to ask for additional funds.

The money was from the pot of funds commissioners left unappropriated when they adopted the 2011 county budget. Another \$15,000 was taken from the unappropriated fund account and transferred to the 4-H program, which had yet to receive any county funding this year. This leaves a balance of \$312,000 in the unappropriated fund account.

Finally, commissioners named assistant clerk Aubrey Rose the equal employment officer for the county. Her job is to ensure federal laws against work-place discrimination and related issues are followed. Commissioners said they are required by law to designate someone as the EEO.

Guilford Lake area man faces kiddie porn charges

LISBON - A Guilford Lake area man faces 28 counts of child pornography related charges. Richard L. Haught, 74, Spillway Drive, Lisbon, was among those picked up on October secret indictments by authorities Wednesday. Haught has been indicted with eight counts of pandering sexually oriented matter involving a minor, a fourth-degree felony; eight counts of pandering obscenity involving a minor, a fourthdegree felony; and 12 counts of illegal use of a minor in nudity oriented material or performance, a fifth-degree felony. According to court documents all 28 counts stem from Haught's alleged actions on May 1, 2009.

Morris E. Jones Jr., 29, Mapletree Street, East Liverpool, was served an indictment in East Liverpool for sexual imposition, attempted burglary, criminal trespassing and two counts of burglary. According to court documents, Jones is accused of having sexual contact with a teen between 13 and 16 years old in February. Then on July 7, Jones was on someone else's property while he attempted to break into another neighboring home.



Cain's woman problem

f you were Herman **L**Cain, what would you

Undoubtedly countless men have pondered this question the past several days. The query got trickier when feminist attorney Gloria Allred presented a fourth woman - in person — to recount a past sexual transgression involving the former pizza executive.

Or, as Allred colorfully put it, Cain's idea of a "stimulus package."

Oh, chortle, chortle. Perhaps finding herself in the Friars' Club, where Allred called a news conference, she couldn't resist her inner comic.

If true, the experience related by Sharon Bialek, a former employee of the National Restaurant Association's educational foundation, was more than a joke.

Allegedly, on the pretense of showing Bialek the restaurant association's offices, Cain parked the car and essentially assaulted Bialek, slipping his hand under her skirt and trying to bring her head toward his lap.

Not a very presidential image that.

When Bialek protested, reminding Cain that she had a boyfriend, he allegedly said, "You want a job, right?"

Corroborating testimony via written statements from two other individuals, whom Bialek had told about the incident at the time, including her then-boyfriend, further reduces Cain's wiggle room. Bialek didn't share details of the assault back then, saying now that she was too embarrassed.

Cain said Tuesday he doesn't even know Bialek. He also has denied the allegations of two other women who filed complaints and received settlements from the restaurant association, as well as a third, who says she considered filing a complaint.

Even as one types "three other women," deniability seems less plausible. In journalism, three is a trend. Four is a tipping point.

Whereas the other women remained anonymous (until one's name was revealed Tuesday), Bialek is quite real. She has a name. She has a record of employment. She has a son. Most important, she has Allred, whose entrance into any arena does not usually bode well for a man

Women, too, may wonder what they would do? Would they file a complaint and settle for a year's salary if their boss made sexual advances or otherwise made them feel uncomfortable at work? Would they step forward 14 years later to face a nation's scrutiny, including the inevitable questions of their own credibility?

It's a nasty business.

The male in a sexual harassment equation has two choices: Confess and quit or deny and push on. In his denials,

Cain has said repeatedly that he has never "sexually harassed" anyone, and to his mind, this may be true. In the first three cases, he may well think that his behavior was gregarious and friendly, within the bounds of acceptable.

He may even feel that whatever happened in the car with Bialek was not out-of-bounds depending on his perception of the circumstances. Bialek said she contacted Cain to ask for help in finding a job, met him for drinks and dinner, and, having learned that he had upgraded her room to a suite (talk about smooth), went willingly with him in the car. Was she perhaps naive in thinking he had only an office tour in mind?

Be still my sisters. I'm not suggesting that Bialek was asking for anything more than a job. I'm merely trying to put myself in Cain's shoes and see things as he might have. And this is where he gets into trouble.

No amount of rationalizing, no amount of wine (Bialek recalled that he probably had a couple of glasses with dinner), nothing really justifies this behavior. If Bialek is telling the truth, then Herman Cain is a predator, not to mention a boor, and no man for the presidency.

Still we are left with he said/she said and Cain knows that we can't know what happened. He knows that in sexual harassment cases, the sin is in the eye of the beholder. One man's flirtation is another man's unwelcome advance. One woman's embarrassment of riches is another's hostile workplace.

Politically – and considering the peace in his own home – Cain has nothing to lose by sticking to his guns. He figures his base hates the media more than they hate whatever he did. And there's ample precedent for this approach. Absent a blue dress, why should he confess?

Cain could survive, though whether he should is another question. The claims of four women require a lot of denial, and people are not credulous.

They have a sense of things. They know what "is" is. The beholder's eye is now public opinion and the image has been irretrievably set of a man and a woman in a parked car.

FDA's foot dragging, bureaucracy kills

If politicians and regulators left us alone. But they don't. They always want to do more. Recently, there have been shortages of some medicines. Cancer patients can't get drugs they need. Why not?

rt would be nice

One reason is that a big drugmaker shut down for a year in part to meet Food and Drug Administration rules. The FDA makes it so expensive and difficult to sell drugs that there isn't an eager pack of companies rushing to the fill the gap. The free market would provide that, but government intervention, such as low Medicare reimbursement, strangles it. So people suffer.

Does the FDA say it's sorry for its part and back off? Of course not. Regulators almost never do that. In fact, the FDA wants more power.

It wants to regulate how your doctor uses his smartphone. I'm not kidding! The FDA wants the power to approve mobile medical apps that let doctors monitor patients' vital signs over their phones. As

one doctor put it, "Even though I'm away from the hospital, I can still look at ... real-time wave form data just as if I were at the patient's bedside."

Sounds great. It makes doctors more efficient. But the FDA basically says, "No, you just can't put something on your phone if it's a medical device. What if it doesn't work right? We have to approve it

That caution makes sense to people. Our first instinct is to say, "I don't want someone getting rich off a device that might not work right. It might kill me. I want the FDA to make sure everything is safe and effective."

But lawyer Jonathan Emord says our instinct is wrong.

"It is wrong because these regulations are costly, burdensome, and they prevent essential medical apps from getting into the marketplace," Emord said.

But an app might kill me.

Emord said that although many medical apps are available, there is "not a single complaint that someone has died or been seriously injured by a single one."

But what's the harm in running apps past the regulators?

"There is so much corruption at the Food and Drug Administration ... so much anticompetitive bias."

The FDA takes bribes?

"Almost," Emord explained. "If you feather the right nest, you will do well for yourself after you leave. This is well known."

This is known as "regulatory capture." A regulator makes it tough for some company's competitor and then gets a job with the first company when he leaves his government job.

There's a big cost to the public when companies submit applications and then wait years for FDA approval.

"We're losing time, precious time that lives are dependent upon," Emord said. "MIM Software developed a simple mobile device that would combine MRI images, PET scans, CAT scans all together and produce a super image that was better for diagnosis ... right on your phone. To get that through the agency, it took two and a half years and cost some hundreds of thousands of dollars. All the while it could have been in use, and ultimately it was approved."

Lawyers and reporters encourage bureaucrats to move slowly. If something goes wrong, the media make a huge fuss about it, and the class-action parasites pounce. But when the FDA delays a device for years and people die, we don't report that. We don't even know who the

victims are.

Useful HIV drugs were available in Europe for years before the FDA approved them for use here.

A doctor at the Cleveland Clinic invented a medical app that helped physicians calibrate the amount of radiation to give to women with breast cancer. The FDA demanded so much extra and expensive proof of its safety that he aban-

The FDA's caution leads many companies to just give up on potentially lifesaving ideas.

Yet I don't hear companies complaining.

"If you raise your head above the parapet and you become vocal in your criticism, the FDA remembers like an elephant and will stamp you out of existence. They'll punish you. It's so much discretion in their hands. They sit like emperors reigning over this stuff."

disregard for Ohio's environmental laws."

The Ohio Attorney General's office had filed the lawsuit last year, asking for civil penalties against A & L Salvage and the Amato defendants related to violations of environmental law in the operation of the construction and demolition debris landfill located off of state Route 45, south of Lisbon.

The Amato defendants include Jack Amato Sr., Jeffrey Aldrich, Amato Properties and the Amato Family Trust. The defendants had filed a separate motion contending they were not the owners of A & L Salvage and claimed they only leased property to A & L Salvage and the property they leased was not actually used for the dump.

But in his ruling this week, Pike specifically stated defendants Jack Amato and Jerry Aldrich are "owners" of A & L Salvage Construction and Demolition Debris.

The landfill closed in 2009, following claims in 2008 the landfill was violating its permits by accepting solid waste. It was declared a public nuisance in May 2008.

Although still in the early stages, the operation is coming together with the help of agricultural professionals, farmers and transportation employees from Texas, Tennessee, Ohio and other areas.

Two weeks ago she was connected with a woman from Bastrop, Texas, a rural community located east of Austin.

Jean Crawford and her daughter and granddaughter operate their own farm in that community. By what she says is an act of God, her farm on a hill wasn't touched by the fires even though the land around it was completely devastated.

Impassioned by the loss of those around her she expressed her desire to help, and Farm Aid, a nonprofit organization, later put her in charge of coordinating hay donations.

"We are working with Virginia and Ohio and Wisconsin and many more to follow suit. We are also talking with Kentucky. We have got to get the hay coming in," she said.

Motivating people to donate hay isn't a problem. The problem is getting the necessary funding to transport the hay from other states to Texas.

She estimated it costs \$3,500 for one semi truck to travel from Ohio to Texas with donated hay.

She and Jan Douglass keep in frequent contact and were able to communicate with someone who owns a stockyard in Tennessee that can be used free of charge as a halfway point for hay transportation.

The stockyard is about 20 miles east of Memphis, Jan Douglass said.

A truck will be stopping at the Douglass' farm in a few days to pick up local hay donations, but the effort will con-

tinue as long as people want to donate. Crawford hopes enough hay can be donated before the winter, however.

Farmers avoid fed loan program

Plains. Flooding from the Mississippi and Missouri rivers drowned corn and other crops from Nebraska to Louisiana. A tropical storm on the East Coast submerged Carolina tobacco fields and New Jersey blueberry bushes.

When it comes to natural disasters, this has been a 'monster" year for farmers, one agriculture official said.

Yet few farmers are taking advantage of a federal loan program aimed at helping them recover. Only six states have fewer than threefourths of their counties covered by some type of disaster declaration. In nearly half of the states, every county has been officially designated a disaster area. That means thousands of farms could apply for emergency loans.

But an Associated Press review of disaster loans issued nationwide found the Farm Service Agency made fewer than 300, totaling just \$32.6 million, for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30. To put that in perspective, Texas alone is estimated to have \$1.5 billion in drought losses this year.

Some farmers say they aren't taking out the loans



WICHITA, Kan. (AP) - because recent high crop Extreme drought withered prices have given them grain across the Great enough money to bounce back on their own. Others say they haven't applied for loans because there are better aid programs available.

Both reasons call into question what should be done with the federal emergency loan program as members of Congress look at what to keep - and what to cut - in the next fiveyear farm bill. Many in agriculture say the emergency loan program should be preserved because it helps those who can't get other credit. But if Congress wants it to be useful to most farmers, it needs improvement.

Donated coats ready for distribution

Stocks surge as Italy, Greece allay debt fears

NEW YORK (AP) - Stocks surged Friday, erasing their losses for the week, after Italy and Greece moved closer to getting their financial crises under control. The Dow Jones industrial average jumped back above 12,000.

Italy's benchmark stock index jumped 3.7 percent and its borrowing costs plunged after the country's Senate passed a crucial austerity budget demanded by the European Union. Other European stock markets and the euro also pushed higher as investors became more confident that Italy would avoid a fiscal

The passage clears the way for Italian Premier Silvio Berlusconi to step down. Berlusconi was widely considered an obstacle to serious economic reforms. The yield on Italy's benchmark twoyear bond dropped 0.43 percentage point to 5.69 percent. That's a sign investors think Italy will succeed in managing its massive debt load.

Italy closer to new government after vote

ROME (AP) – Italy's Senate on Friday approved economic reforms demanded by the European Union. Premier Silvio Berlusconi could resign as early as this weekend and a transitional government formed.

The 156-12 vote took place after respected economist Mario Monti – widely expected to become the interim prime minister — was welcomed with sustained applause in the Senate chamber, where he was officially designated senator-for-

Italy's eagerly awaited political transition is expected to happen Saturday, when the lower chamber of parliament also votes on the reforms. It will follow a similar power shift in Greece, where an interim government this week took over under the leadership of former banker Lucas Papademos.

The hope is that politically neutral governments will have the strength to push through deeply unpopular and painful economic reforms needed to reduce the two countries' massive debt loads.

France lashes out at S&P's 'shocking' error

PARIS (AP) - France reacted with outrage after the Standard & Poor's ratings agency accidentally sent out a message saying it was downgrading France's prized "AAA" credit rating during a tumultuous week in Europe's protracted debt crisis.

Germany and the European Commission also bristled Friday, warning ratings agencies to act responsibly and underscoring European unease over the power they wield over gov-

The error stood for an hour and a half on Thursday while the U.S. and most European markets were open before it was corrected by the agency - spooking investors by foreshadowing an event that would rock the 17-nation eurozone.

S&P's blunder came just as Greece and Italy seemed to be getting on the right track by establishing interim governments led by financial experts who might guide them out of their debt crises. For a moment, it seemed as if the crisis was again worsening in its one step forward, two steps back way.

Universal, Sony/ATV to buy EMI for \$4.1B

music company that is home to The Beatles, Coldplay and Katy Perry, is being split and sold for \$4.1 billion.

The deals will open EMI's buyers, Universal Music and Sony/ATV, to regulatory scrutiny as they increase their dominance of the music industry.

Universal Music Group said Friday that it will pay 1.2 billion pounds (\$1.9 billion) for the recording division, joining Universal artists including Lady Gaga and Eminem with EMI superstars such as David Guetta and Lady Antebellum.

A consortium led by Sony/ATV reached a separate deal to pay \$2.2 billion for EMI's publishing division, according to a person familiar with the matter. That business is in charge of songwriting copyrights for such artists as Rihanna and Adele. The person wasn't authorized to speak publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity.

Sony/ATV, a joint venture between Sony Corp. and the Michael Jackson estate, is a 38 percent partner in the consortium. The other parties were not immediately known.

CME offers \$300M to help unfreeze MF Global

NEW YORK (AP) — A futures exchange that handled trades by failed broker MF Global said Friday that it will cover as much as \$300 million to help speed the release of funds frozen since the firm filed for bankruptcy protection.

CME Group's announcement that it will provide a "financial guarantee" to the trustee overseeing the liquidation of brokerage unit of MF Global followed the trustee's disclosure that he fired all of the unit's 1,066 employees.

CME said it was providing the funds to give the trustee "greater latitude" to distribute some of the \$4 billion in customer funds. The funds were frozen by a bankruptcy judge as he evaluates competing claims for the money. MF Global is facing a legally complicated liquidation. In addition to the \$4 billion in frozen customer money, regulators say \$600 million in other client money is missing.

MF Global collapsed after making a disastrous bet on European debt. The company traded derivatives contracts whose value was based on the value of an underlying asset, like interest rates, oil prices or currency rates. It filed for bankruptcy protection on Oct.

SEC disciplines 8 employees over Madoff failure

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Securities and Exchange Commission says it has disciplined eight employees for failing to uncover the Bernard Madoff's Ponzi scheme over a 16-year period. None of the employees were fired.

SEC spokesman John Nester says the discipline varied. Three employees had their pay reduced. Two received 30-day suspensions without pay, one of whom also received a pay cut. The others received shorter suspension or counseling memos. The actions were based on recommendations by a law firm hired by the

Two years ago, the SEC inspector general questioned the conduct of 21 employees in a report on the Madoff affair. Ten of those employees have since left the agency.

The SEC has been criticized for failing to spot the Ponzi scheme. Madoff is serving a 150-year sentence for securities

Action Comics 1 lost 11 yearsup for sale

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Up, up and away is synonymous with Superman and may have a new meaning for collectors, too, as an ultra-rare and pristine copy of Action Comics No. 1 goes up for auction online Friday. The issue, featuring the first appearance of Superman, is expected to surpass the \$1.5 million record set in 2010.

"It's an iconic milestone of the 20th century," said Stephen Fishler, CEO of Comic-Connect.com and Metropolis Collectibles, of the issue, which was published in 1938 and cost just 10 cents. The auction at www.comicconnect.com lasts through Nov. 30.

The issue for sale has a story of its own that wouldn't be out of place in the pages of a comic book plot, either. Twice before it set the record for the most expensive book ever it sold for \$86,000 in 1992 and then \$150,000 in 1997. That, Fishler said, was a nod to its near mint condition.

"It is clearly one of the finest and that it's held the record for the most expensive book ever sold, speaks to that," he said of the issue, which is graded a 9.0.

In March 2010, a copy Action Comics No. 1 - graded at 8.5 - sold for 1.5 million, just a few weeks after another copy of the issue sold for \$1 million.

Neither of those issues are in as good a condition as the issue that goes on sale Friday. There are about 100 copies of Action Comics No. 1 believed to be in existence, and only a handful in good condition.

After it was stolen in 2000 Fishler said collectors figured it would never be found or, worse, would be destroyed.

"It was so recognizable that the risk was that the person who stole it could have tried to destroy it," Fishler said of the comic, whose owner he's not identifying. "I felt there was a chance that it would never turn up." But turn up it did, earlier this year, in a storage shed in California, that had been purchased in an auction. "When we were contacted in April and saw a picture of the book, we were shocked," Fishler said. "After spending so many years looking for the book, I was blown away when it appeared."

Abundant Life collects shoeboxes of gifts for children overseas

NEW WATERFORD – For the fifth consecutive year, Abundant Life Fellowship is a designated drop-off location for churches, groups and individuals participating in a global outreach project for children.

The church, at 46469 state Route 46, is once the Columbiana County drop-off center for Operation Christmas Child, a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international ministry affiliated with evangelists Billy and Franklin Graham.

The concept for the shoebox ministry is simple: People fill shoeboxes with gifts for ageand gender-specific children. The gifts can be toys, school supplies, hygiene items, small clothing items and other things children would

Vivian Carvender of Columbiana, relay center coordinator at Abundant Life, has been involved in the project since 1995.

All boxes dropped off at the church will be loaded onto a tractor-trailer and hauled to Warren, and then be transported directly to the Samaritan Purse headquarters in North Carolina, and then distributed from there to children in the states and overseas.

"Having the drop-off center saves other groups time and money because they don't have to worry about shipping the boxes themselves," Carvender said. Children from Transformation Station, the church's children's ministry, recently spent a Sunday morning filling more than 80 boxes.

'Experiencing God' topic deaths at Occupy camps across US at First Brethren Church bringing pressure for shutdown

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) - Leaders across the country felt increasing pressure Friday to shut down Occupy encampments after two men died in shootings and another was found dead from a suspected combination of drugs and carbon monoxide poisoning caused by a propane heater inside a tent.

Citing a strain on crime-fighting resources, police pleaded with Occupy Oakland protesters to leave their encampment at the City Hall plaza where a man was shot and killed late Thursday.

The Oakland Police Officer's Association, which represents rank-and-file police, issued an open letter saying the camp is pulling officers away from crime-plagued neighborhoods. "With last night's homicide, in broad daylight, in the middle of rush hour, Frank Ogawa Plaza is no longer safe," the letter said. "Please leave peacefully, with your heads held high, so we can get police officers back to work fighting crime in Oakland neighborhoods."

Mayor Jean Quan said the city would issue another official notice to protesters to leave the camp, but she did not give a dead-

Since the shooting, anonymous fliers have been posted around the encampment urging protesters to leave.

"Occupiers, turn on your brains and see the harm you are causing to our town," it says. "You have devolved into mob rule. You have lost sight of the goal."

City Council President Larry Reid said outside City Hall that the shooting was further proof the tents must come down. He was confronted by a protester who said he wouldn't be in office much longer.

"You didn't elect me," Reid snapped back. "You probably ain't even registered to vote!" Reid said the encampment has been a major setback for the area while attracting sex offenders, mentally ill and homeless people, and anarchists. "This is no longer about Occupy Wall Street," he said. "This is about occupying Oakland and extracting whatever you can get out of Oakland by holding our city hostage."

The Oakland shooting occurred the same day a 35-year-old military veteran apparently shot himself to death in a tent at a Burlington, Vt., Occupy encampment.

On Friday, a man was found dead inside a tent at the Occupy Salt Lake City encampment, from what police said was a combination of drug use and carbon monoxide.

A preliminary investigation into the Oakland shooting suggested it resulted from a fight between two groups of men at or near the encampment, police Chief Howard Jordan said. Investigators do not know if the men in the fight were associated with Occupy Oakland, he said.

Protesters said there was no connection between the shooting and the camp.

The coroner's office said it was using fingerprints to identify the victim and that a positive identification was not likely to be released before Monday.

Protesters have been girding for another police raid as several City Council members have said the Oakland camp must go. After police cleared the camp last month, Quan changed course and allowed protesters to return. The mayor's reversal strained relationships with city police and other San Francisco Bay area law enforcement agencies. More than a dozen agencies joined Oakland police in the Oct. 25 raid on the camp under a mutual aid policy in which each agency covers its own costs.

Sheriff: Amish man's beard cut in new Ohio attack

STEUBENVILLE (AP) - An elderly Amish man was attacked by his own son, who a sheriff said cut the man's hair and beard in the latest incident in a breakaway Amish community. The victim told the sheriff he was scared and upset but wouldn't press charges.

"I'm frustrated with it. I'm upset with it. And, here again, the man doesn't want to file charges because of his belief," Jefferson County Sheriff Fred Abdalla said Fri-

Abdalla warned the son in advance that he didn't want trouble and parked nearby during the father-son reunion, the first in several years.

The sheriff said the elderly man was attacked Wednesday while visiting his son in the breakaway Amish community that's home to five suspects charged in an earlier beard-cutting attack. The son, whose father-in-law is the group's leader, wasn't among those charged earlier, Abdalla said. Authorities in three other counties are investigating similar alleged attacks.

Such hair-cutting attacks are offensive to the Amish because they believe the Bible instructs women to let their hair grow long and men to grow beards and stop shaving once they marry.

The man, who Abdalla said was in his 70s, went to his son's home and the two talked. The man said his son then attacked him, with the help of the son's children, and wrestled the elderly man to the ground, Abdalla said.

The sheriff said the elderly man's wife tried to help her husband but was held back by her daughter-in-law.

"This guy was just totally destroyed after this happened. They just humiliated him. I talked to him. I mean, the guy's a broken man," Abdalla said.

Abdalla said the beard-cutting incidents are related to Sam Mullet, leader of the breakaway Amish group in the Bergholz area. The group has had differences with other bishops over the handling of church matters, and Abdalla said the son of the latest victim is married to Mullet's daughter.

Mullet told The Associated Press last month that the haircutting was a response to criticism of his leadership from other Amish bishops.

"They changed the rulings of our church here, and they're trying to force their way down our throat, make us do like they want us to do, and we're not going to do that," Mullet said.

The sheriff said the latest victim traveled from Ashland County in response to an invitation from his son.

The attacks in September and October struck at the core of the Amish identity and tested their principles. While it's uncommon for the Amish to take disputes public and enlist authorities, there is no central authority to decide so it usually falls to the church leaders or those in-

Trumbull County Prosecutor Dennis Watkins has said an Amish man came to his office with an attorney earlier this fall and tried to surrender in the September attack on a couple in Mesopotamia in northeast Ohio. Watkins said he turned the man away because no charges were filed in that case.

In that case, a 57-year-old woman blamed her sons and a son-in-law for an attack on her husband and said they were involved in a cult in the county 75 northwest of Steubenville.

Obama urges debt panel to reach for deal on trimming deficit

ABOARD AIR FORCE ONE (AP) - President Barack Obama strongly urged leaders of Congress' deficit supercommittee on Friday to press hard for a bipartisan deal on slashing deficits before a fast-approaching Thanksgiving deadline and not to look for an end run around a key enforcement mechanism, his spokesman said Friday.

Press secretary Jay Carney said Obama spoke to Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., and Rep. Jeb Hensarling, R-Texas, by phone from Air Force One as he flew to San Diego. They are the two top leaders of the 17-member biparti-

Carney said Obama urged the two in separate calls to "achieve what is eminently achievable." The committee is supposed to come up with at least \$1.2 trillion in new deficit cuts over the next decade by Nov. 23.

The president was on the first leg of a nineday trip that will take him to a Pacific Rim conference in Hawaii, a visit to Australia, to an East Asia summit in Indonesia.

There has been some talk on Capitol Hill of softening the triggering mechanism for automatic cuts since a compromise seemed so diffi-

But Carney said that, even though there's no formal legislative bid for such a move, the president made clear that he will not accept any measure that attempts to turn off the automatic cut trigger.

It was agreed to by both parties during negotiations on a debt-limit increase last August to ensure there is a meaningful enforcement mechanism to force a result from the Committee. "Congress must not shirk its responsibilities," Carney said. "He made clear he will not accept any meas-

ure that attempts to turn off part of the enforcement mechanism."

Carney said Obama told both leaders that Obama said their finished product must contain both sources of new revenue, or taxes, as well as spending cuts. While there is no measure at this time on which to warn of a possible veto, "We heard of discussions on Capitol Hill about turning off the sequester," Carney said.

Va. nuclear plant gets OK to restart after quake

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) - Dominion Virginia Power's North Anna Power Station, the first operating U.S. nuclear plant shut down because of an earthquake, can restart after being offline since the Aug. 23 tremor that shook millions along the East Coast, the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission said Friday.

The two nuclear reactors at the plant about 11 miles from the quake's epicenter automatically shut down after the 5.8-magnitude earthquake caused peak ground movement about twice the level for which it was designed.

Multiple inspections done by both Dominion and federal regulators show the plant's twin 980-megawatt reactors and other safety components did not suffer any functional damage during the temblor. Dominion has spent more than 100,000 hours and \$21 million in inspection, testing and evaluation at the power station about 50 miles northwest

The plant did experience some cosmetic damage ranging from small buckles and cracks in tile floors in one of its technical buildings, to bolts of large metal parts that transfer power from transformers to the electrical grid and into homes. The quake also caused 25 massive nuclear storage containers at the plant to shift, but they remained

"We're satisfied the plant meets our requirements to restart safely, and we'll monitor Dominion's ongoing tests and inspections during startup of both reactors," Eric Leeds, director of the NRC's Office of Nuclear Reactor Regulation, said in a statement.

Leeds said because the earthquake shook the reactors more strongly than the plant's design anticipated, Dominion had to prove that the quake caused no functional damage to the reactors' safety systems.

In making the decision to allow the reactors to be restarted, the NRC said its staff reviewed Dominion's findings and conducted its own inspections. The agency paid close attention to the plant's piping systems, nuclear fuel assemblies, steam generators, pumps and valves, and emergency diesel generators.

Dominion said it expects it will take about 10 days for the plant to be fully operational as both reactors will be restarted in phases and testing of all safety equipment and inspections of containment areas will be done during that process. The company also said it plans to have additional staffing at the plant during the restart.

It will first start Unit 1, gradually raising the water temperature to 580 degrees Fahrenheit and increasing the pressure to 2,250 pounds per square inch over six days. The restart process for the second unit also will start during that time in order to bring both reactors to 100 percent and provide electricity to the transmission grid.

Various groups have said the quake and subsequent shutdown at North Anna Power Station brought attention to the danger of another event in the area. Some have asked Dominion to retrofit the two reactors to higher earthquake safety standards.

The NRC has said it plans to order all U.S. plants to update their earthquake risk analyses, a complex exercise that could take two years for some plants. The review, launched well before the East Coast quake and the Japan nuclear disaster in March, marks the first complete update to seismic risk in years for the nation's 104 existing reactors, despite research showing greater hazards.

Buckeyes take 3-game streak to Purdue

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. — With little fanfare, things appear to have returned to normal for Ohio State.

The Big Ten season has been dominated by Penn State's firing of Joe Paterno, Wisconsin's early run near the top of the polls, Michigan State's rise and fall, and newcomer Nebraska's chances at winning the league.

The Buckeyes struggled early while several players were suspended, and seemed a lost team after an epic collapse led to a 34-27 loss at Nebraska.

Now, a three-game winning streak has given the Buckeyes an outside shot at winning the Leaders Division. The Buckeyes are two games behind Penn State and can't afford to slip Saturday at Purdue.

Ohio State linebacker Tyler Moeller doesn't expect focus to be an issue.

"We do have a strong identity," he said. "We're tough. Anything that comes our way I think we can handle. We dealt with so many things on the field, off the field this year. If something happens, I think guys are doing a great job of handling it, kind of just shrugging it off, han-



SYDNEY (AP) — Tiger Woods started out Saturday in the lead at the Australian Open. Three bogeys later, he was

trying to stay in the hunt.

Atop the leaderboard for the first time in nearly a year, Woods began the third round at The Lakes with three straight bogeys and only had one birdie on the front nine to fall three shots behind Jason Day of Australia.

Woods didn't look terrible doing it.

His approach on the first went about a yard too long and tumbled over the side of the green, leaving him a tough chip that came out strong to about 15 feet. With a strong breeze at his back, he went over the back of the second green and pitched 30 feet long. On the third, his drive just went into a sand dune and he came up short of the green. Facing a simple pitch, he was 15 feet long for another bogey.

Woods finally settled down with a 7-foot birdie putt on the fourth, and while he hit every fairway and green the rest of the front nine, he had to settle for pars and an outward 38.

Day surged into the lead with a birdie on the fifth, then hit driver off the deck to set up a birdie on the par-5 eighth and

Recruiting picture cloudy as PSU regroups

PITTSBURGH (AP) - The man who built Penn State into a national power is gone, replaced — for the moment - by chaos.

Joe Paterno's sudden ouster following the arrest of longtime assistant Jerry Sandusky on charges of child molestation has rocked one of college football's most enduring programs to the core.

While Paterno's firing after 46 seasons was stunning to be sure, the things Paterno put in place that made the Nittany Lions a desired destination for some of the nation's top talent for decades remain.

Beaver Stadium still seats 107,000. The facilities are still pristine. The Big Ten is still formidable and on television every week.

It's why the expected flood of recruits out the door following Paterno's departure has been a trickle at best. Only Windsor (Colo.) offensive lineman Joey O'Conner has backed out of his verbal commitment.

The rest remain on board waiting to see who will fill Paterno's iconic black sneakers.

"It's not catastrophic," said Mike Farrell, national recruiting analyst for Rivals.com. "Everybody in every industry is saying 'Oh my gosh, this is the end of Penn State and it's going to take years and years to recover.' If they get the right person in there, moving forward they'll be Penn State again.'

Even if they won't look quite the same without Paterno, and that's not necessarily a bad thing.

Though the Nittany Lions have routinely landed Top 25 recruiting classes, Farrell gives the program a "B-minus" over the last decade, due in part to the physical limitations Paterno faced in his advanced age. His limited travel schedule prevented him from hitting the recruiting trail during November and December, allowing key recruits in Penn State's backyard to slip through the school's grasp.

The list of Pennsylvania natives who opted to play out of state over the last decade include Terrelle Pryor (Jeannette, Pa.), who went to Ohio State. And then, there were those key recruits from Pennsylvania, who stayed in state, but ignored Penn State, like Darrelle Revis (Aliquippa, Pa.), who chose Pitt.

"They've had limitations, one of those being Joe Paterno being unable to do in home visits and really not being an active member of the recruiting staff," Farrell said. "Plus they had an older group of coaches that weren't not as energetic on recruiting trail. They've been underachieving a bit."

Farrell understands it's difficult to talk about the recruiting impact when there's so much more at stake. Yet the football program will move on, and despite the upheaval high school coaches who have urged their best players to head Happy Valley for years will continue to do so if it remains a good fit.

"I'd send a kid to Penn State, I still have respect for Penn State," longtime George Washington (Philadelphia, Pa.) coach Ron Cohen said. "Penn State is still a great school. The program is good. But I would think change is inevitable. It's about money and public

And the school is eager to distance its image from the one of Sandusky being led away in handcuffs, even though the retired defensive coordinator continued to be a vigorous advocate for his alma mater even as a grand jury investigated claims he molested underage boys over a 15-year period.

Sandusky attended a football camp for Polynesian players in Utah over the summer and urged all in attendance to play for Paterno. His message resonated with Adam Ah Ching, a linebacker at Greer (S.C.) High.

"Who wouldn't want to go to Linebacker U?" said Otto Ah Ching, Adam's father.

Not Adam, who removed Penn State from his list of possible destinations after charges were levied against Sandusky.

"It was really devastating," Otto Ah Ching said. "We were all surprised."

The widespread fallout, however, could help the school move on quickly. Paterno, former university president Graham Spanier and university vice president Gary Schultz are all gone. Athletic director Tim Curley is on leave, as is assistant coach Mike Mc-Queary, who witnessed Sandusky and a young boy in the shower together in 2002 and reported the incident to Paterno but did not go to authorities.

More changes will be on the way. Tom Bradley will coach the team on Saturday against No. 19 Nebraska, but he's not expected to be a viable candidate to replace his mentor. New school president Rod Erickson stressed Bradley has the title only on an interim

The massive shift away from Paterno is jarring. It was also expected on some level.

Despite his insistence to not put an expiration date on his career, his days atop the program were dwindling to a precious few. Paterno was in the final year of his contract, even if no one anticipated the end coming on a quick phone call from the board of trustees telling the man who spent the last 61 years on campus his services would no longer be needed.

The next few months will be difficult to be sure. Yet there are a number of high-profile candidates out there,

some life back into the program. The Nittany Lions are ranked in the Top 15 in mid-November on the talent of players who committed to the program even though they didn't know or expect the 84-year-old Paterno to be there when they graduated.

"The one slight advantage they have is that all the kids that were looking at Penn State, chose Penn State for reasons other than Joe Paterno," Farrell

When national signing day arrives in February, Paterno won't be around to tout the next wave of Nittany Lions for the first time since Harry Truman was president. There will be a coach there, however. And there will still be scholarships to offer. And there will be players looking to put on blue-and-white and run through the tunnel and wait for the student section to bounce to the sounds of the band playing "Seven Nation Army.'

One of them could be St. Joseph's Prep (Philadelphia, Pa.) quarterback Skyler Mornhinweg, a highly touted recruit who chose Penn State, and is the son of Philadelphia Eagles offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg.

Mornhinweg has had an interesting recruiting journey already. He originally committed to Stanford, but backed out of it, when former Cardinal coach Jim Harbaugh left for the San Francisco 49ers.

Would he back out again?

'We have to wait to see how things play out," St. Joseph's Prep coach Gabe Infante said. "In fairness to the university, and everyone around Penn State football, you have to see how things play out, because one person made an alleged poor decision. It would be prudent for a recruit to take

Those who do choose Penn State, will do so based largely on faith in the new coach. Not disbelief in what happened in the final days of the last one.

'Football is football," Farrell said. These kids are going to look at it differently when a new face is brought in there and a new staff brought in there and they march them out with new president and a new athletic director and say 'This is the new Penn State."

McQueary testified in a grand jury investigation that eventually led to child sexabuse charges being filed against former Penn State defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky. The ensuing scandal brought down longtime coach Joe Paterno, who was fired by university trustees amid growing criticism that he should have done more to stop the al-

McQueary, who testified that he saw Sandusky sodomizing a boy in the shower in 2002, has endured similar scrutiny. The university's athletic department released a one-line statement Thursday night saving it would be "in the best interest of all" if the receivers coach didn't attend the season's final home game at Beaver Stadium. The school did not provide details on precisely who threatened McQueary.

Asked if McQueary was

placed on leave for his conduct or to ensure his safety, Erickson said it was "a complicated situ-

"What became clear is that, under any circumstances, he would not be able to function in a coaching role," Erickson said in his first news conference as president. He replaced Graham Spanier who, like Paterno, was fired Wednesday night.

Athletic director Tim Curley and vice president Gary Schultz have each been charged with perjury and failing to report an incident of abuse to authorities after Mc-Queary relayed what he had seen. Curley has taken administrative leave, while Schultz who was already working on an interim capacity — has returned to retirement.

Paterno has not been implicated, and prosecutors have said he is not a target of the investigation. Curley Schultz, through their attor-

neys, have denied wrongdoing. The campus leaders faced mounting public criticism for failing to call police and prevent further suspected cases. So, too, has McQueary, who has not spoken publicly. His mother, Anne, said Thursday they have been advised not to

Described in court papers as distraught about witnessing the 2002 attack, unrelated local newspaper accounts from the time indicate McOueary appeared in the months and years that followed in charity events that Sandusky also took part in, or were to benefit Sandusky's group The Second Mile.

Asked if McQueary would be fired, Erickson said "there are complexities to that issue that I am not prepared to go into at this point."

In forums online, and in comments on other websites. some have indeed called for McQueary to be ousted, but the assistant coach could be protected as a whistleblower.

Gerald J. Williams, a partner at a Philadelphia law firm, said Pennsylvania law is broad in protecting a person who reports wrongdoing, as long as that person is part of a governmental or quasi-governmental institution, such as Penn State. "There are certain provisions

out there for whistleblowers.

(It) doesn't matter if it's frustrating or not," Gov. Tom Corbett said Friday in State College, where he attended a Penn State trustees meeting.

"Assuming, and the grand jury doesn't say it, but assuming that certain people are witnesses ... they are witnesses, so you have to take that into consideration.' According to Williams, such

protections whistleblower could include any kind of adverse employment action such as being fired, demoted, ostracized or punished — although a court ultimately would determine whether the person is protected if they bring

According to the grand jury report, McQueary "reported what he had seen" to Paterno the next day, and Paterno then spoke to Curley.

McQueary was also called to a separate meeting with Curley and Schultz. Schultz, in turn, notified university president Graham Spanier.

Curley and Schultz — as well as Paterno - testified they were told that Sandusky behaved inappropriately in that

2002 incident, but not to the extent of McQueary's graphic account to the grand jury.

Sandusky was arrested and charged last Saturday. His lawyer maintains his client is innocent.

A Penn State graduate and State College native, Mc-Queary played for Paterno. He was the starting quarterback of the 1997 team that finished 9-3. McQueary joined the staff as a graduate assistant in 2000 the season after Sandusky retired — and moved on to become receivers coach and recruiting coordinator in 2

McQueary has relayed the offensive play calls from the press box on the field. Graduate assistant coach Terrell Golden is expected to assume McQueary's duties against Ne-

Regardless of what university administrators do, the outcome of the search for a new coach could affect McQueary's future at Penn State. In college football, when a coach is hired from outside a university, he frequently brings along his own set of assistants who replace the current group.

AP source: Free-agent Pujols visits Marlins MIAMI (AP) — Albert Pujols' free-agent tour is off to a surprising start: The three-time NL MVP visited the Florida Marlins.

Pujols had lunch Friday with Marlins officials and checked out the team's new ballpark, a person familiar with the discussions said. The person spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because the team hadn't commented publicly.

It was unknown whether the notoriously thrifty franchise made a contract offer before Pujols departed.

Free agents Jose Reyes and left-hander Mark Buehrle also took ballpark tours during visits earlier this week.

The 31-year-old Pujols is a free agent for the first time after spending his first 11 major league seasons with St. Louis. Pujols and the Cardinals didn't discuss a contract extension during the season, which ended with a World Series title, but he hasn't ruled out remaining in St. Louis.

"We're just going to see where God takes us," Pujols said last week. His visit with the Marlins came only hours before the franchise officially changed its name to the Miami Marlins during an event at the team's new ballpark near downtown. The Marlins expect crowds of more than 30,000 nightly next season,

meaning a revenue increase that will allow the frugal franchise to be more active in free agency. New manager Ozzie Guillen is expected to help the Marlins' sales pitch.

Marlins owner Jeffrey Loria and a contingent of team officials visited the Dominican Republic on Thursday to watch a private workout by highly regarded Cuban outfielder Yoenis Cespedes.

The Marlins are expected to increase their payroll from \$57 million this year to at least \$80 million in 2012. Signing Pujols would likely mean spending even more.

The Cardinals exercised a \$16 million option on Pujols' contract after last season. The slugger rejected a multiyear extension that included a small percentage of the franchise during the winter, and cut off negotiations on the first day of spring training.

NCAA finds major violations in Sooners basketball

NORMAN, Okla. (ÅP) — Oklahoma had about one quarter of its recruiting days this season taken away by the NCAA on Friday as punishment for committing major violations while the men's basketball program already was on probation.

The NCAA Division I infractions committee reduced the Sooners' reuiting days from 130 to 100 and also put Oklahoma on probation for three years, vacated all 13 wins from the 2009-10 season, took away one scholarship and eliminated two of the school's 12 allowed official visits

Former assistant coach Oronde Taliaferro, who resigned during the investigation, also was prohibited from recruiting for two years.

However, the Sooners were not labeled a "repeat violator," avoiding the possibility of more severe penalties.

"Importantly, this case did not involve any inappropriate action by the university or its staff, other than the cited assistant coach," the university said in an unattributed statement.

The case did not constitute lack of institutional control or failure to monitor. The University of Oklahoma has had and continues to have personnel and systems in place to promote and support an atmosphere of NCAA rules compliance within our institution."

Most of the penalties had been proposed by the school, which said Taliaferro broke NCAA rules by failing to report that a player had received an impermissible extra benefit and by lying to investigators. The NCAA said its findings included unethical conduct by the former coach, extra benefits, preferential treatment and ineligible participation.

Oklahoma had proposed a reduction of only 10 recruiting days — an amount tripled by the infractions board — and two years of probation instead of three. The NCAA also tacked on a \$15,000 fine - \$500 for each of the 30 games the player, Keith "Tiny" Gallon, played while ineligible.

Kyle Busch to tace more penalties trom JGR

AVONDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Kyle Busch, contrite and remorseful, promised Friday to change his behavior and conduct himself in a way that will restore the respect he lost with his road rage incident at Texas.

It's a long way back for Busch, and he'll be on a very short leash.

Busch has been warned by M&M's that the primary sponsor will not tolerate any more incidents by him, and team owner Joe Gibbs said the driver is still facing further punishment for wrecking Ron Hornaday Jr. under caution in last week's Truck Series race.

NASCAR suspended Busch from all on-track activity at Texas, fined him \$50,000 and placed the driver on probation through the end of the

It led to a frantic week of behind-the-scenes negotiations with Joe Gibbs Racing and sponsors who viewed Busch's latest incident as the

final straw for the polarizing driver.

Firing him was not an option, Gibbs said.

The fallout from Busch losing his temper at Texas stretched deep into the sponsorship side of NASCAR, where every team is heavily dependent on funding from outside businesses. Although M&M's parent company Mars Inc. has a contract with JGR, company officials wrangled with JGR all week over whether they wanted Busch to represent the brand any-

Gibbs admitted Friday the team was in limbo most of the week, unsure if NASCAR would suspend Busch longer and if M&M's would refuse to allow him in the car.

Ultimately, M&M's did withdrawal from the final two races of the year, but Gibbs put longtime partner Interstate Batteries on the No. 18 Toyota. Gibbs would not discuss whether the team had to refund money to Mars, if Busch will collect salary these final two weeks, or if Interstate Batteries had to pay to get on the car.

Players get a new deal and a break to ponder it

Stern ready to start 72-game season on Dec. 15

NEW YORK (AP) — David Stern is ready to start a 72-game season on Dec. 15.

Players, however, aren't prepared to make that happen just yet.

If they choose to reject the league's latest ultimatum, they will get a far harsher offer, one that could put the entire NBA season in jeop-

The answer should come early next week — and Stern made it clear: Yes or no, no more negotiating.

"I would not presume to project or predict what the union would do," the NBA commissioner said. "I can hope, and my hope is that the events of next week will lead us to a 72-game schedule starting on Dec. 15.

The league presented the players' association with the new offer Thursday after nearly 11 hours of bargaining, hoping it would be enough to end the lockout. Stern had previously said the original proposal needed to be accepted by the close of business Wednesday to avoid the less favorable proposal, but had "stopped the clock" while the sides were bargaining.

The clock starts again once the union has had time to meet and plot its strategy.

Union president Derek Fisher said the revised proposal doesn't address all the necessary system issues that players are seeking before they would agree to the economic concessions owners are demanding.

"It does not meet us entirely on the system issues that we felt were extremely important to try and close this thing out, and so at this point

we've decided to end things for now, take a step back," Fisher said. "We'll go back as an executive committee, as a board, confer with our player reps and additional players over the next few days. Then we'll make decisions about what our next steps will be at that point."

And that could include disbanding the union,

Union executive director Billy Hunter said the hope was to get the player reps to New York for a meeting by Monday or Tuesday, then discuss whether the new proposal was good enough to present to the full membership for a vote.

Stern made it clear that whatever they say, they shouldn't bother to ask to meet again about this proposal.

"There comes a time when you have to be through negotiating, and we are," Stern said.

He added if there's another bargaining meeting, it would be off the proposal in waiting: a 53-47 split of revenues in the owners' favor, a flex cap with a hard ceiling and salary rollbacks.

That leaves the union to decide if it can persuade its members to accept the revised offer. The league has been willing to offer a 50-50 split of basketball-related income, and Stern said the proposal put in play Thursday night attempted to meet the union on its system issues.

Hunter provided only one specific change, allowing the "mini" midlevel exception for teams over the luxury tax to be for three years at \$3 million a year, as opposed to two years at \$2.5 annually. The league has been trying to curb spending by the big-market teams to create more competitive balance, but players want a system like the current one that leaves them with the most free agent options.

"It's not the greatest proposal in the world, but I have an obligation to at least present it to our membership and so that's what we're going to do," Hunter said.

Stern said he didn't expect the players to like every aspect of the revised proposal, saying there were many teams, too, that didn't like aspects of the revised offer.

But he said he can get it passed, even with some hardline owners preferring to go to the 53-47 deal already.

"This is the best attempt by the labor relations committee and therefore the NBA to address the concerns that the players expressed coming out of their meeting of the player representatives," Stern said.

The union had nearly its entire executive committee in attendance, with Fisher and Hunter joined by players Chris Paul, Maurice Evans, Roger Mason Jr., Keyon Dooling, Theo Ratliff, Etan Thomas, Matt Bonner; attorneys Jeffrey Kessler and Ron Klempner, and economist Kevin Murphy. Management stuck with the same small group as Wednesday: Stern, Silver, Spurs owner Peter Holt, the chairman of the labor relations committee, and attorneys Rick Buchanan and Dan

A 72-game season would mean a loss of only 10 games, despite starting 1 1/2 months after the original Nov. 1 opening night. Deputy Commissioner Adam Silver said that

would require moving the playoffs and NBA finals back roughly a week. Game 7 of the NBA finals would have been scheduled for

A Dec. 15 opening night schedule would include Miami at New York, according to a person who is aware of the plans.

Beyond the system issues that divide the sides, Hunter said there were six pages of what he called ancillary items, such as the draft age and the commissioner's disciplinary rights, that still must be addressed before a deal.

"There's not enough progress to get a deal done," Fisher said. "That's the disappointing part. We want to get back on the court."

But if they decline the offer, it could be a while before that happens. Some agents have long pushed for decertification and a fight against the league in court, and Hunter said this week he was aware players were already collecting signatures to go that lengthy and risky route.

Even so, there still would be time for bargaining, though there would be no need if players decide this deal is good enough.

That didn't seem to be the case Thursday

'As Derek has alluded, there has been some movement by the NBA, obviously not enough," Hunter said. "The question now is, how will those reps respond when we sit down with them early next week and disclose to them the revised proposal that the NBA has presented to us this evening.

Exercises can help restore your balance

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Please suggest some exercises for my husband, who is having a problem with balance. He admits it's a problem. He looks like he's about to fall when he gets out of a chair. He has to grab something to steady himself. This is only one example of his balance difficulty. He's 78. He knows I'm writing, and he wants me to tell you he's not dizzy. We

look forward to your suggestions. - L.Y. **ANSWER:** I'll give you and your husband some exercises, but you must take him to a doctor to make sure his problem isn't rooted in a medical disorder that needs attention. Balance training isn't strictly for older people. Athletes have to work on balance, too. The Karate Kid's training included a great deal of balance exercises. Loss of balance isn't a sensation of whirling around. That's dizziness — a quite different problem. With loss of balance, a person has to grab hold of something to stay steady and keep from falling. Rising from a chair is a good example of a situation where balance keeps us upright. However, part of the rising-from-a-chair difficulty is a loss of legmuscle strength. These exercises will help overcome that, too. During these exercises, someone has to stand next to your husband to grab him should he be

on the verge of falling.

A simple exercise is practicing rising from a very low chair. Your husband should spend five minutes rising and sitting from such a chair, and repeat this exercise three times during the day. As he gets stronger and more stable, he should do this with arms crossed over his chest. Have your husband stand in the doorway between two rooms. He can greatly improve balance by standing on one foot and then the other. He holds the one-leg position for 10 seconds. Repeat the exercise for at least five minutes. The doorway gives him something to steady himself if he needs it. Once he's gotten confident in one-leg standing, have him swing the raised leg from right to left. Tiptoe standing is another good balance exercise.

Student driver can't overcome fear to go

DEAR ABBY: I'm a senior in high school and I'm stressed out about the idea of driving. I took driver's ed during the summer and passed the course. Instead of being excited about taking that first step toward independence, I'm scared to death. I know the goal of driver's ed is to learn safety precautions in driving, but I can't shake the feeling that every time I get into a car I'm risking my life. It has taken an emotional toll on me since last summer, and I wonder if I'll ever get past this fear. I have talked to friends about driving, and my mom is investing in more driving lessons to boost my confidence. DEAR RATHER WALK: A car is only a machine. Like any machine, in the hands of someone who is careless -- or hasn't learned to use it properly -- it can be dangerous. You have successfully passed driver's ed. You will be getting more lessons so you can practice with supervision, which should make you an extra safe driver. If that doesn't give you confidence, then it's time to talk to a therapist.

DEAR ABBY: People write so often complaining about all sorts of irritating issues, so I thought I would add a touch of positivity. I'm 27. My boyfriend of five years and I struggle a lot. We're not where we'd like to be professionally, we're often strapped for cash, and frankly, life isn't going the way we planned. But the thing is, I'm happy. 
