



Council gets lessons in oil, gas well drilling

City council members, city officials and a handful of residents learned some lessons about oil and well drilling from a Youngstown State University geology professor Wednesday night.

Dr. Jeffrey C. Dick, an environ-

mental petroleum geologist and chair and associate professor of geology, spoke during the Committee of the Whole meeting of City Council, comprised of all seven council members, held at the Salem Community Center.

"The reason we're here is so council can get educated on this," Committee Chair Councilman Dave Nestic said.

Nestic arranged for the presentation by Dick, who lives in nearby Leetonia and has been approached about leasing his land, but hasn't

signed anything yet. Nestic said he's "an advocate of responsible oil and gas well development."

Dick said he's been giving talks for the past nine months, with up to 44 presentations since the beginning of the year, including to boards of township trustees.

Economic workshop details TIF potential

Kosiba directs meeting accenting two zones in city

After discussing Tax Increment Funding, a business incentive in its own right, an economic development workshop focused on what Salem has to offer beyond that.

About 25 residents, business and civic leaders and city officials attended the seminar at the Salem Community Center on Wednesday.

Executive Director of the Sustainable Opportunity Development Center Larry Kosiba led the meeting that tightened the focus on ways the two TIF zones can be used to maximum advantage.

One zone is located in the northern part of the city, just south of the bypass while the second TIF zone is on the east side by the Home Depot property and in the area of the East Pershing Street extension.

Both are zoned for commercial but not industrial development. A TIF is a public financ-

ing method which is used

as a subsidy for redevelopment and community improvement projects.

When a development or public project is carried out, there is often an increase in the value of surrounding real estate from investment in new or rehabilitated buildings, for example.

A TIF uses future gains in taxes to finance current improvements.

City Auditor Betty Brothers elaborated on TIFs, how they work and the necessary analysis needed to provide a workable application.

She said existing taxes are not affected and "the goal is to have the TIF for no more than 10 years at 75 percent" while it benefits the property.

Brothers said TIFs can be approved inside of other TIF zones and, conversely, a business, just because it is in a TIF zone, doesn't have to take part in

She gave an example of a \$100,000 property after \$2.5M in private construction was completed. Thirty-five percent of that or \$875,000 is taxable with \$41,910 generated from

Search continues for missing Lisbon man

LISBON - The search for Gerald G. Klusch has continued for nearly a week, but little evidence has been found to explain what happened to the 71-year-old Lis-

Practice makes prepared

Chief Deputy Allen Haueter said Wednesday the search has continued for Klusch with deputies now branching out and searching neighboring properties and various places in the county where they believe someone may try to hide a

Haueter said they are expecting help from the air, either a plane or helicopter is expected from Columbus to fly over the properties and surrounding areas. However, the weather has been uncooperative. Foggy skies in Columbus prevented the anticipated flight on Wednesday morning. Prior to that, the weather has been rainy since Klusch's disappearance.

Klusch's six properties have already been covered by foot. On Sunday, deputies, 76 firefighters and members of the US SARR, local search and rescue group combed the properties without

anything significant found.

Investigators have also been talking to people in the area, relatives and anyone else possibly con-

Klusch, who lived on U.S. Route 30 just west of Lisbon, was reported missing by his son on Friday morning after he had not returned home Thursday night.

Pilot error determined to be cause of plane crash

SALEM – The National Transportation Safety Board said the crash of a small plane at Salem Airpark on May 19 was pilot error.

In the NTSB "probable cause" (final) finding it said, "The pilot's failure to maintain a stabilized glide path resulted in the airplane touching down short of the runway.'

The NTSB issues three reports on aircraft accidents: preliminary, factual and probable cause.

One of three passengers in the crash suffered injuries and was taken to the hospital.

The flight had departed

The French-made, sixseat, single-engine turboprop Socata TBN-850 was piloted by Patrick Urschel, 34, an executive with Urschel Laboratories, a food-cutting equipment producer in Valparaiso.



Salem residents accused of taking money from elderly man indicted

LISBON – Three Salem residents accused of taking about \$20,000 total from an elderly man were indicted by the grand jury of the Columbiana County Common Pleas Court and served with those charges this week.

Linda L. Faulkner-Bowling, Jack R. Faulkner Jr. and their son, Derrick J. Faulkner, have all been charged with several theft-related charges on different dates in July and August, all involving the business of Henry Schnell.

Derrick Faulkner, 27, West Perry Street, Salem, has been charged with theft, receiving stolen property, misuse of a credit card, a fifth-degree felony forgery and two fourth-degree felony forgeries.

According to court documents, Faulkner is accused of taking between \$5,000 and \$24,999 in cash from Schnell sometime between July 19 and July 24. He also allegedly took Schnell's credit card and used it for purchases totaling between \$5,000 and \$24,999. Finally, Faulkner reportedly wrote three checks for various amounts on Aug. 2 from the Key Private Bank account of H.E. Schnell.

Linda L. Faulkner-Bowling, 50, West Fifth Street, Salem, was charged with two counts of theft and two counts of forgery. Authorities believe she also took cash from Schnell twice on Aug. 8, when she reportedly cashed two checks on Schnell's Key Private Bank account on the same date.

Jack R. Faulkner Jr., 55, West Perry Street, Salem, was charged with three counts each of receiving stolen property, forgery and theft.

In his case, three additional checks were taken from Schnell on Aug. 1, 2 and 5. All three were written and cashed on Schnell's Key Private Bank account for between \$5,000 and \$24,999.



oday marks the sixth anniversary of the death of Lance Cpl. Daniel M. McVicker.




touched by him during his much too short life.

Macaca Media: Squeezing blood from stone

The Washington Post's stoning of Texas GOP Gov. Rick Perry is journalistic malpractice. Instead of calling the newspaper to task, other national media outlets have joined in. And now, the Post is doubling down on slander.

The Post dispatched reporters to the remote hunting grounds of a Perrylinked ranch -- "associated"

with Perry through "his father, partners or his signature on a lease" -- because it once had a rock on it somewhere that had the word "Niggerhead" painted on it. The term is an embarrassing vestige of past racism not just in Texas but on geographical landmarks across the country.

The Washington Post interviewed dozens of people about the remnant, which Perry says his family painted over and turned over years ago. The New York Times piled on Perry with its own crack investigation of hazy memories of bygone days. They unearthed one Perry hunting pal who never saw the sinful stone, but "could not be sure it was the same parcel that was the subject of the Post article." Another friend, Fred McClure, who is black, also could not recall ever seeing the rock and emphatically added that the paper's stone-cold insinuation that Perry is a bigot "is not only untrue but also extremely unfair."

But the actual testimony of black Texans counts for nothing at the newspaper that infamously "Macaca'ed" former Virginia GOP Gov. George Allen after he clumsily traded barbs with a young liberal operative of Indian descent during his failed Senate bid. Recycling the tried-and-true "GOP equals racist" narrative, the Post composters published a second Stone-gate piece on Tuesday claiming that unidentified "minority legislators" had a problem with Perry's "complicated record on mat-Perry appointed the first black Texas Supreme

Court justice, hired several top minority aides and "enjoys warm associations with many black leadaccording to the Post. So what's "complicat ed"? Unidentified minorities don't like his "embrace of the tea party movement" (which currently favors black GOP candidate Herman Cain, but never mind that). They, whoever "they" are, also seem to be upset that he featured race-hustler Jesse Jackson (you know, the demagogue who called New York City "Hymietown") in an old campaign ad.

You don't have to be a Perry supporter (and I am most certainly not) to spot the Post's boulder-sized double standards. These rubble-rakers vetted the origins and whereabouts of a painted-over inanimate object with far more investigative zeal than

they did with any of the actual living, fire-breathing race-baiters Barack Obama consorted with before and during his first presidential run.

Case in point: the continued whitewashing of Obama's ties to the New Black Panther Party and its leader Malik Shabazz, a Jew-bashing, America-hating, 9/11 conspiracy theorist who inveighed: "If 3,000 people perished in the World Trade Center attacks and the Jewish population is 10 percent, you show me records of 300 Jewish people dying in the World Trade Center. ... We're daring anyone to dispute its truth. They got their people out."

Former Justice Department attorney J. Christian Adams blows the lid off the Obama administration's coddling of Shabazz and the NBPP's voter intimidation thugs in his new book, "Injustice" -- and uncovered photos of Obama and the race-hustlers appearing at a 2007 civil rights event in Selma, Ala. The Post's response to Adams' whistle-blowing over the past two years? Liberal columnist E.J. Dionne sneeringly dismissed the career civil servant as a "Republican activist."

But, hey, let's get back to squeezing blood from stones.

Has Perry himself actually used the racial epithet that was once painted on the rock -- you know, like the late former KKK leader Robert Byrd did as recently as 2001 when he referred to "white niggers"?

Did Perry condescendingly refer to a black politician as "articulate and bright and clean" like Joe Biden did when he described Barack Obama in

Did Perry racially stereotype Hispanics for political gain or refer offensively to President Obama's "light skin" and "lack of a Negro dialect" like Senate Democratic leader Harry Reid did just last year?

What does it all say about Rick Perry? Nothing. Nada. Zip. While the Post cites unnamed minority pols decrying Perry's right-wing "racially tinged rhetoric," this is the guy who has indulged in leftwing impulses and disparaged his own base as racist in two separate GOP debates. First, he shamelessly suggested that opponents of in-state tuition discounts for illegal aliens were xenophobes who didn't like the sound of foreign last names. Then, he told them they were haters who lacked compassion: "I don't think you have a heart."

That sounds a lot like the very suggestion the Macaca Media is leveling against him.

It stinks to be falsely accused of racism. Maybe Perry, now under siege by the ruthless race cardplaying media, will remember that the next time he's tempted to accuse conservatives who disagree with him of heartless bigotry.

It's the government that makes us poor

Here's my fantasy: Libertarians are elected to the presidency and to majorities in Congress. What would happen

next? Well, if libertarians were "in charge," you'd have more freedom and prosperity.

Freedom frightens some people. They say if no one is in charge there would be chaos. That is intuitive, but think about a skating rink. Before rinks were invented, if you proposed an amusement in which people strap blades to their feet and skate around on ice at whatever speeds they wish, you'd have been called crazy. There's got to be speed limits, stoplights, turn signals. But we know that people navigate rinks safely on their own. They create their own order, with only minimal rules.

Society would work the same way - and does to a large extent even today. "Great part of that order which reigns among mankind is not the effect of government," Thomas Paine, the soul of the American Revolution, wrote. "It has its origin in the principles of society and the natural constitution of man. ... Common interest (has) a greater influence than the laws of government.'

If libertarians were "in charge," there would be laws to protect us from foreign enemies and those who would steal from us or injure us. Today, by contrast, under the rule of Democans and Republicrats, we're drowning in rules -160,000 pages' worth. Micromanagement kills opportunity and freedom.

Maybe if there were a way to have more competition among governments, things would be better. Competition forces people to become more efficient and to get rid of stupid rules. What if we let people take over some unused land in America to create areas with fewer rules, simpler legal systems, smaller govern-

ment?

I explored that subject last week with Michael Strong and Magatte Wade, founders of the Free Cities Project.

Strong said, "We want to encourage thousands of people to create new governments that have different rules, each competing for customers with the best education and best health care, the most peace and prosperity you could imagine."

Of course, state governments would have to approve this.

"There are already Native American reservations in the U.S. ... They can become more free. Honduras already has something like this. In Senegal, we're encouraging a move toward an autonomous city-state that would allow for peace and prosperity."

Wade is Strong's wife and an entrepreneur from Senegal, where she saw firsthand how bad rules prevent people from creating prosperity.

We need jobs. Who creates

jobs? Entrepreneurs," she said. But Senegal is awash in rules. There was a government monopoly on cement. When the government allowed competition, prices

fell by a third.

She started a beverage compa-

"It was an ordeal. I did it because I am from Senegal. I have an interest in trying to improve things. But for an American company ... why would they put themselves through such a

'What people don't realize is the developing world is massively overregulated," Strong said. "Africa is the most regulated continent on earth."

In the Congo, it requires 18 documents to import anything.

Wade added: "The fact we have so many rules — who benefits most? Multinationals."

'And crony capitalists," Strong added. "Corruption in Africa is a symptom of massive overregula-

Are there any free cities along the lines Strong and Wade envi-

"Hong Kong and Singapore are the best examples," Strong said. "Now they are among the

wealthiest places on earth." And there is a free city in Dubai because the emirate wanted to create a financial sector,

but sharia law prevented it.

"Dubai was brilliant," Strong said. "They looked around the world. They saw that Hong Kong, Singapore, New York, Chicago, Sydney, London all ran British common law. British common law is much better for commerce than is French common law or sharia law. So they took 110 acres of Dubai soil, put British common law with a British judge in charge, and they went from an empty piece of soil to the 16th most powerful financial center in world in eight years."

It's what libertarians have said: Freedom works, and government, when it grows beyond the barest minimum, keeps people

Council approves more changes to net cafe law

SALEM – City council approved more changes to the Internet sweepstakes cafe law Tuesday, including one change made prior to the vote to require a criminal background check only for the license holder instead of all employees.

"I feel like it's a little bit cumbersome for all employees to have to do that," Councilman Brian Whitehill said before recommending the amendment.

The Rules and Ordinances Committee had met last month and agreed to recommend limiting the number of Internet sweepstakes cafes in the city to four and requiring every owner, manager and employee of an Internet sweepstakes cafe to submit to an Ohio Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation background check from an agency approved to provide such background checks. They would have to foot the bill themselves for the background

The ordinance was the last of 17 ordinances to be acted upon by council. Whitehill said liquor establishments don't require employees to undergo criminal background checks. His recommendation to amend it to just the license holder was approved 6-1, with Councilman John Berlin voting

The city has four of the businesses where customers buy sweepstakes cards which contain predetermined prizes, then put them in the terminal devices or computers to play games inside the cafe.

The city first introduced the legislation in June to begin charging a \$5,000 annual fee and a \$500 terminal device fee to the Internet cafe businesses, along with regulating their hours of operation and where they can locate, restricting them to certain zoning areas and keeping them at least 1,000 feet away from a school, library, public playground, church or establishment with a liquor permit.

After a lot of discussion and some complaints from the business owners, the terminal device fee was dropped. Mayor Jerry Wolford then vetoed the ordinance, but took back his veto allowing the legislation to become law after council agreed to discuss the issue. The issue was discussed, but the fee remains at zero.

In other business, council gave city Service/Safety Director Steve Andres permission to hold an auction for the sale of two used 1990 International dump trucks from the city service department.

Council also approved ordinances to rename the McCulloch lot as McCulloch Park, appropriate \$18,200 to building improvements for the lighting improvement program (from First Energy) and to amend the trash ordinance to describe toys considered hazardous or lending to an unsanitary yard as "broken, unused or discarded toys."

runway.

The probable cause report said that during final approach the pilot had calculated the landing distance at 1,400 feet and turned onto the final leg about two miles from the airport, maintaining an air speed of 85 to 90 knots, while descending about 400 feet per minute.

At about 1,800 feet and the pilot proceeded visually to the airport as the plane broke out of the clouds. About a half mile from the airport, the pilot reported he thought the airplane was too high and a "few seconds later" the airplane felt like it "literally just dropped out of the sky."

He immediately applied full power and pitched the nose up to perform a go-around, but "the application of power was too late" and the left main landing gear struck the ground about 120 feet from the runway. The pilot reported that the winds were a direct crosswind

from 190 degrees at 10 knots and he had calculated that the landing distance would be 1,400 feet. The NTSB said the Garmin GPS 1000 MFD (multi-

function display) flash card, which recorded the airplane's performance and waypoint data, was downloaded and the data indicated that the airplane's airspeed varied from about 71 - 81 knots during the 10 seconds prior to ground

The pilot indicated in his report to the NTSB that there was no mechanical malfunction or system failure of the airplane.

He considered the informational session a matter of due diligence before getting into a deal that has multiple considerations. Council already heard a presentation by a representative of DPS Penn, a company securing leases for Chesapeake, about leasing city-owned property for mineral rights. They'll need to determine whether to put it out for bid or not and then whether the lease should include surface drilling or non-surface drilling. The city has more than 550 acres available for lease.

Nestic said another Committee of the Whole meeting will be convened within the next few weeks to get a consensus on the direction council wants to go.

During his presentation, Dick gave a history of oil and gas drilling in Ohio and said it's nothing new, with the first commercial oil well drilled in 1860 in Macksburg. Ohio has produced 1.1 billion barrels of oil and 8.35 trillion cubic feet of natural gas.

He said the Utica Shale formation is the big news now, with Chesapeake projecting a possible yield of 25 billion barrels of oil and an estimated 25,000 wells to be drilled over the next 20 years.

The company also projected a \$200 billion capital investment and thousands of jobs to be created, with huge acreage signing bonuses and future royalty payments and tremendous tax revenues for state and local governments.

Dick spoke in detail about the hydraulic fracturing process and environmental concerns and how some of those concerns are being addressed or are already addressed. Some of those concerns deal with the chemical additives, the flow back of water, a risk of spillage due to improper handling and the disposal of the remaining frac wa-

Other environmental concerns could include poor well construction, naturally occurring methane in the ground water, leakage from the mud pit and frac water pit, naturally occurring radioactive materials, operations noise and truck traffic issues, altered landscapes and well disposal of brines and flow back water.

He did say that Chesapeake was using a steel containment system for mud from the drilling process so there's no contact with the earth, since the mud can be contaminated. In his opinion, that was a good thing.

Dick said a common misconception is that Ohio lacks the regulating legislation and infrastructure to protect the water resources, but he said that's not the case, between the regulations from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources and the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency.

He suggested residents visit the ODNR website at www.ohiodnr.com, where there's a lot of information available. One audience member asked who's responsible for taking care of the roads which will be damaged by the heavy equipment. Dick said the repair and maintenance of the roads won't be an issue because the companies do that.

Also at the meeting was Jeffrey Rudicil, field director for EnergyInDepth, a grass roots oil and gas advocacy and education initiative started in 2009. He said the non-profit is focusing its efforts now in Ohio in response to the Utica Shale discovery.

"We're here to inform the public and fact-check the opposition," he said, referring to environmental groups.

Residents taking advantage of Ohio's early voting period

LISBON – More than 400 residents have taken advantage of the state's early voting period, which began Tuesday.

Under state law, voters can begin voting early 35 days prior to the Nov. 8 election, and close to 500 have chosen to do so as of late Wednesday morning, according to Columbiana County Board of Elections Director Adam Booth.

He said prior to Wednesday they had mailed out 300 absentee ballots and received another 100 to 150 applications in the yesterday's mail. Another 40 to 50 citizens have chosen to cast absentee ballots in person at the board's office.

The state's early voting law allows anyone to cast their ballot prior to the election, regardless of whether they will be in the county that day or not. The old law required they have a reason for voting absentee.

The highest number of absentee ballots cast in the county since the new law took effect the 2005 was 7,851 in the primary election during the 2008 presidential year.

"It'll probably be a little more than other odd-year elections," Booth said of turnout. Voter turnout is higher in even-numbered years, when voters are electing a president, congressmen, or governor, statewide offices and county officeholders.

While Booth does not expect the numbers for this election to reach 2008 levbecause of statewide ballot issues.

One of those issues is about Senate Bill 5, the controversial bill passed by the state legislature that reduces the negotiating power of public employee unions. Opponents have placed an issue on the ballot seeking repeal of Senate Bill 5, and Booth said some groups have mailed out promotional materials to voters that come with absentee-voting applications attached.

He noted there are two other statewide issues on the Nov. 8 ballot: One would increase the age limit for judges from 70 to 75, while the other would amend the state's constitution to prohibit Ohioans from being mandated to purchase government-mandated health insurance.

In addition to statewide issues, voters will also decide the fate of a number of local issues and candidate races.

the effective tax rate of .04789794 with 75 percent, or \$31,433, generated as TIF revenue for the project.

Kosiba said strategy development and completion of a survey to further define the individual desires of the "types" of businesses the city wanted to attract amounted to "an investment in Salem's future.

To that end, new TIFs needed to be based on data, he said, noting there were "multiple thrusts (potential businesses) going on simultaneously (now)."

TIFs are not islands and strategies were needed to deal with companies in bankruptcy while community support is "absolutely critical," he said, and noted risk is inherent and "we're going to leverage everything we can ... and use all available resources ... public and private."

Kosiba said that "right now" he was contacting businesses in Western Pennsylvania as a result of Marcellus shale exploration and reaching out to Ohio-based companies while working with the Columbiana County Port Au-

He asked for input on Salem's best selling points to attract businesses and management-level employees who may want to relocate.

Councilman Dave Nestic pointed to the "low tax rate" while Councilman Bret Apple noted the "reasonable housing costs" and council President Mickey Cope Weaver listed school and the railroad.

Jock Buta, executive vice president of Butech Bliss, noted the medical and senior support services and infrastructure already in place while resident Jim Bonfert pointed to the low water costs.

Nestic said Salem was midway between Cleveland and Pittsburgh while businessman Todd Olson drew the line further out, noting it is also halfway between Baltimore and Chicago.

Councilwoman Rita Joseph O'Leary listed the Salem Public Library as "one of the best in the area" and Nestic said there are six research universities within 50 miles. Buta mentioned Kent State University's nursing pro-

gram and Youngstown State University that could attract management-level and Councilman Brian Whitehill said a company with a competitive program would look at schools and quality of life issues. Kosiba wondered about offering free water and one per-

son commented about trying to get that past the utilities commission and Bonfert said, "ours is cheap anyway" to which Kosiba acknowledged it's "basically an incentive in place already.'

Olson said Salem "could be ground zero for Marcellus shale ... that could be an incentive."

Kosiba asked that a survey regarding TIF economic development opportunities be completed.

"We want to understand what types of businesses to attract by understanding what the community would like to see," Kosiba said.



AKRON - Millions of gallons of drilling waste have been injected underground in Ohio, leading some to worry about possible ties to earthquakes.

The drilling practice known as hydraulic fracturing uses chemically-laced water to free oil and gas from underground shale formations. Ohio has 181 wells to inject waste fluid underground.

The Akron Beacon Journal reported that nearly 50 percent of the drilling waste comes from Pennsylvania, which last year banned shipment of the liquid to state water treatment plants.

In contrast to Ohio, Pennsylvania has only eight injection wells, due to its underground geology.

In Pennsylvania, a drilling boom into the Marcellus shale is under way. Ohio drillers worry that the flood of waste fluid from Pennsylvania will crowd out space for Ohio waste as drilling into the potentially-lucrative Marcellus and Utica shale spreads, Tom Stewart, executive director of the 1,500-member Ohio Oil & Gas Association, told the newspaper.

Ohio cannot ban shipments from other states, as they are protected under the U.S. Constitution. Between 2007 and 2010, Ohio injected nearly 1.2 billion gallons of waste underground. The liquids spread out in the rock layers, making it impossible to predict how much more can be stored. However, it is unlikely the ground can store an extensive amount, as the drilling industry in Ohio has been using injection wells since

the 1930s.

The latest occurred early Friday morning in the Youngstown area near the Brier Hill neighborhood. That quake was an aftershock to a previous quake on Thursday in the Mineral Ridge area. A previous quake occurred at 9:06 a.m. Sept. 26 in the same area.

Injection well operators say there is no clear link between earthquakes and fluid being pumped underground.

No operating Ohio wells have been linked to earthquakes, but a now-closed well in Ashtabula County was.

The operation, run by Resource Environmental Services Inc. from 1986 to 1994, was linked to numerous small earthquakes between 1987 and 2003, Michael Hansen, state geologist and director of the Ohio Seismic Network, said.

LISBON - Leaves for lambs.

The D&L Sheep Farm at 34903 state Route 172 said it can use leaves or shredded paper as bedding for its herd of 190 sheep.

Leanna Stryffeler, who owns the farm with her husband, Don, said anyone who is raking and bagging leaves can drop them off but asked that there are no sticks or stones included, and they can be put to good use.

"There is a wagon out front for bagged

leaves," she said, adding that loose leaves can be dropped off in a shed.

Stryffeler said, "This is a seasonal thing, leaves in the fall and shredded paper in the spring.

She asked that the paper be shredded and that it doesn't contain staples or anything that would hurt the sheep.

She said branches and sticks "are a lot of trouble for us" adding they "would love" to have shredded paper year

Stryffeler explained.

The leaves are best, even when wet,

"They're great for the sheep now plus it's great for recycling. Leaves really compost nicely. Wet leaves ... it doesn't matter, if they're a little damp we spread them out."

She said the herd is building so they will take whatever people want to drop off, adding they'll also take leaves collected by municipalities.

D&L Sheep Farm is five miles west of Lisbon and just east of Depot Road near the top of the hill.



It's the early part of the archery season, typically a time when the weather is warm and the deer move only early and late in the day. Sitting on a stand for hours can be frustrating for a hunter, as the only action may be swarting at the bugs swarming around one's head. Although there are occasional successes, sitting through the middle part of the day is not yet productive. It is time to switch tactics and put on a drive.

When hunters think of a deer drive, the common scenario is one of orange clad hunters making plenty of noise while pushing through the woods trying to scare the deer out to other hunters placed on watch. While it is a common and productive method for gun hunters, it is not a widely used tactics for

Conducted in a proper fashion, drives can be productive at any time during the archery season, though it seems to produce better results earlier in the season. This may be due to the fact that the deer have yet to be pressured and will not run long distances when rousted from their daytime beds. The thick cover of early season may also add to their comfort level in not fleeing far.

Using these factors to their advantage, a small group of bowhunters can put on drives with more than a reasonable chance for success. First, there are a few steps you must abide by to make sure what you are about to undertake will provide the results

First, know the lay of the land. Pick a piece of ground that you are familiar with and use the wind

direction to properly place the hunters in good locations. Normally I would suggest pushing a piece of cover so that the wind is at the backs of those doing the drive. Not only will the intrusion of the hunters push deer from their haunts, but the scent can too. The deer will typically flee on established trails, which is where you want your watchers posted.

Picking a piece of cover that you can effectively hunt with

the group that you have is key. There is no sense trying to walk through a 200-acre woodlot with only three or four people. Yes, you may move deer, but what are the chances that they are going to pick the exact trails where you have a watcher or two set up? I would rather stick to 10-acre woodlots with a couple of deer in them and only a few escape routes. It just increases your odds of getting a shot

Conducting the drive in an orderly fashion is also a must. Since you are using archery equipment, go slowly. Sometimes those doing the drive will have a shot opportunity, but most often it will be those posted on watch who get the action. You want your hunters to have a good opportunity, so going slow is a must so that the deer are not running out of the area.

Since there won't be the shouting that normally accompanies the typical gun hunt deer drive, those pushing the timber must rely on instinct to tell them if they are in line with the others. If you stop and pause, you can often hear others on either side of you moving through the woods and adjust your position if necessary

Consider this rule that our group uses: If you spot a deer fleeing ahead, simply stop for a few minutes to allow the deer to filter out on its own.

'ENTRY LEVEL' RIFLES: HEAD TO HEAD

Each rifle was evaluated at 75 vards during the sighting in process and the typical 100 yards. The weather conditions were not favorable with temperatures in the mid 90's and high humidity. After a rifle was shot 4 to 5 times, it was set aside to let the barrel cool down. A hot barrel will not maintain bullet

groupings. Each cartridge was evaluated using a chronograph to check muzzle velocity and consistency of muzzle velocity. Excessive inconsistentency in muzzle velocity will directly affect the accuracy potential of any cartridge in any

The 75 yard shooting was done with

all of the different types of cartridges. The scopes premounted on three of the rifles from the manufacturer were not tests were done at 75 yards. All cartridges performed well with certain cartridges performing better than the others in individual rifles (see targets shown with each rifle evaluation).


At 100 yards, all four rifles were shot using the same Federal Premium 95 grain Nosler Ballistic Tip and Winchester Super-X 100 grain Power Point cartridges. The results were a surprise. All four rifles shot very respect-fully for being 'entry level' rifles. Three-shot groups under 1.5" at 100 yards are not beyond the capability of any of these rifles; 2-2 1/2" groups would be common. Following are some of the better groups.

And the winner is...

Usually, reviews are on a single very crisp and clear. Hence, accuracy | firearm or a comparison of two. Writing a review on four rifles all at the same time was a massive undertaking. The toughest challenge was editing and reediting to a reasonable length.

Visit a dealer where you can actually hold each rifle and examine it. Determine which factors are important to vou and then decide. For the money, you won't go wrong with any of these four rifles. One piece of advise...get them without the scope, if possible, and install a Bushnell Trophy XLT or similar scope. This adds to the cost, but it is well worth it.

DEAR DR. **DONOHUE:** Regarding fibromyalgia: You stated that there are simple tests that reveal it. My 50-yearold daughter has the symptoms. She has pain in the hips, legs and now the neck and shoulders and has had it for two years. Her

doctor knows of no tests for it. Please inform me. -- M.L.

ANSWER: I am kicking myself for implying that there are simple tests for fibromyalgia. That's wrong.

Fibromyalgia is a condition afflicting 5 million Americans. The symptoms are allover pain, fatigue, fragmented sleep that leaves people groggy during the day, trouble organizing one's thoughts and the presence of tender points -- specific places on the body where pressure from the doctor's examining finger elicits pain far beyond the amount of pressure applied to the site. That's what I meant by simple tests. The presence of 11 of 18 recognized tender points is evidence for fibromyalgia. These days, the significance of tender points is downplayed. People can have the condition without having tender points.

No lab tests, no X-rays and no scans disclose this illness. Neither does the ultimate in medical tests -- a biopsy. Testing for other illnesses that have signs similar to those of fibromyalgia is important to exclude those illnesses as a cause of a person's pain and symptoms. Such illnesses are rheumatoid arthritis, lupus, polymyalgia rheumatica and

Fibromyalgia is believed to be an amplification by the brain of pain signals that reach it. It's like listening to a radio with the volume turned to the highest possible level at all times. Medicines are available that can help some patients to turn the brain's pain volume

Pregabalin (Lyrica), gabapentin (Neurontin), amitriptyline, duloxetine (Cymbalta) and milnacipran (Savella) are examples of medicines that have met with success in some patients. Physical activity is another approach to treatment. The level of activity has to be modest at first -- a short walk -with gradual increase in the amount and intensity of exercise.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have had herpes viral infection of the eye several times in the past seven to 10 years. One doctor thought it was from the Fosamax I took. Another said it was from constant stress and a weakened immune system. What do you think causes it? -- M.M.

ANSWER: The cause is the herpes simplex virus, the same virus that causes cold sores. Recurrences are expected with herpes infections. The virus lives on in nerve cells and comes out of those cells from time to time to travel to, in your case, the eye. Antiviral eyedrops usually can combat a flare. Nothing eliminates the virus for good. An eye doctor should be taking care of you for this infection.

Mother-in-law won't help with kids

Dear Annie: My mother-in-law, "Joan," lives nearby. Since the birth of our son three years ago, she has not once offered to babysit or have him sleep over. She never asks to spend time alone with him. When I've suggested it, she tells me how tired she is, and

yet she runs around with her friends all day. On those rare occasions when we absolutely are desperate for her to babysit, we practically have to beg, and it's only for things like doctors appointments. She would never babysit so my husband and I could go out for an evening.

However, Joan wants to go everywhere with us. She thinks that qualifies as spending time with her grandson. She also says she wants to be there for his first vacation, first movie, first day at school, etc., which makes us feel as if our son can't achieve any milestones without her.

Dear Mom: Both. You may not like it, but grandparents are not obligated to take care of your children because you want a night out. And after being a preschool administrator, we suspect Joan has had enough of watching little kids and correcting their behavior. That is the parents' job. Of course, it would be nice if Joan took a greater interest in spending time with your son, and she may be more inclined when he is a little older, requires less supervision and they can communicate better. 



AP source: Missouri wanted Big Ten invite most ST. LOUIS (AP) — Missouri is hoping to join the Southeastern Conference but would have preferred an offer from the Big Ten that never came, a university official said Wednesday.

Missouri hoped to join the Big Ten last year but the league instead chose Nebraska. The university official said the Big Ten remains Missouri's top choice but that conference "has no interest."

"That's what's left," the official said, referring to the SEC. The official, who is familiar with school discussions involving conference affiliation, spoke on condition of anonymity because the school has not commented publicly about its intentions.

Missouri curators agreed unanimously Tuesday night to give Chancellor Brady Deaton the authority to look elsewhere rather than immediately commit to the reeling Big 12. Just one day earlier, Deaton and other Big 12 chancellors and presidents agreed to equally share revenue from the conference's most lucrative television deals if member schools agree to give those top-tier rights to the league for at least six years.

The agreement is subject to approval by university governing boards. It was a step Missouri curators don't want to take until the school is able to "fully explore options for conference affiliation ... which best serve the interests of the University of Missouri," board chairman Warren Erdman told The Associated

The Big 12 is down to 10 members and will lose Texas A&M to the SEC next year after the departures of Colorado (Pac-12)

SEC athletic directors and Commissioner Mike Slive met Wednesday in Birmingham, Ala., to discuss the logistics of Texas A&M's arrival. Mississippi State athletic director Scott Stricklin said there were no discussions about a 14th team, though Slive has not ruled out further expansion.

Sticking with the Big 12 remains an option, Deaton said Tuesday, and the costs of leaving could prove troublesome with Missouri likely forfeiting most of its annual conference revenues.

The revenue-sharing plan approved Sunday by the Big 12 board of directors - a move designed to keep Missouri and other potential stray members in the fold — would give each school an estimated \$20 million in June.

And that figure is expected to grow by 2013 when the league's new 13-year contract with Fox Sports kicks in, according to two people with knowledge of the deal and ties to the Big 12. They spoke only on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly about the revenue-

The Big 12's television contract with ABC/ESPN expires in 2016 and also likely will bring in additional money when rene-

Bengals' defense top-ranked for 1st time since '83

time in 28 years, the Cincinnati Bengals' defense is No. 1.

The Bengals are at the top of the league's rankings this week after giving up fewer yards than anyone else in the first four games. They moved up after shutting down Buffalo's highpowered offense in a 23-20 win on Sunday, one they considered the best measure yet of how good they can be.

"I think we showed we are a legit defense," middle linebacker Rey Maualuga said. "Now let's take it to a new level the rest of the way.'

They haven't been this legit since they still had the core of a defense that helped them reach their first Super Bowl during the 1981 season. The defense finished ranked No. 1 in 1983, when the offense struggled and the

That defense held opponents to 20 or fewer points in 11 games. This one ranks fifth in points allowed after giving up 74 against Cleveland, Denver, San Francisco and Buffalo.

That high ranking has a chance of staying. The Bengals (2-2) play their next three games against the three lowest-ranked offenses in the league Jacksonville (No. 31), Indianapolis (No. 30) and Seattle (No. 32).

"That's our goal," defensive end Robert Geathers said. "It's no shock that we're in this position, but it's early in the season and we've got to keep working and not buy into all the

The Bengals were counting on an improved defense to carry the offense in the first part of the season. Cincinnati is going through growing pains with rookie quarterback Andy Dalton and rookie receiver A.J. Green

"It's been great," Dalton said. "Our defense has done a really good job. That's why we've been in games. In the fourth quarter, we've had a chance to win the game and they've made big plays. It's great from an offensive standpoint to have a defense like that.'

The defense finished the 2009 season ranked No. 4 in the league, a big reason why the Bengals won the AFC North and reached the playoffs for only the second time in the past 20 years. It was decimated by injuries last season — nine veterans hurt and the backfield virtually wiped out.

They've been mostly healthy so far, and a few offseason changes have signed after cornerback Johnathan Joseph left as a free agent. Maualuga was moved from outside to middle linebacker, his more accustomed spot. Linebackers Thomas Howard and Manny Lawson signed as free

Howard has given the defense more versatility with his ability to drop into pass coverage. During the win over Buffalo, he covered running back Fred Jackson.

"I've never been around a finer athlete at linebacker than what he is," coach Marvin Lewis said. "He is a good football player and he is learning to fit in the spots. It is fun to watch him."

The biggest improvement has been on the line, where the Bengals invested a lot of draft picks in recent years. Second-year end Carlos Dunlap and second-year tackle Geno Atkins have excelled in an eight-man

rotation, a sign of the line's depth. "Everybody can get out there and do the job," Geathers said. "Usually they only keep seven (active), so I guess it speaks volumes that Marvin's been putting eight of us up. I





ustin Dillon faces a significant detour this weekend as he continues his drive for NASCAR's Truck Series champi-

With the trucks taking the week off, Dillon, 21, is scheduled to make his Sprint Cup debut Sunday in the Hollywood Casino 400 at Kansas Speedway.

Dillon might or might not need the distraction, as he leads the Truck standings by a scant three points ahead of James Buescher and 19 over Johnny Sauter. But with a

weekend off — the Truck series resumes next week at Las Vegas Motor Speedway — the timing was right for Dillon to give Cup a try.

"It's going to be huge," Dillon said. "I've always looked up to the Cup guys and racing them will be very cool. I'm very fortunate to have a ride and the experience is going to be great for me."

Dillon's ride, of course, comes from his Richard Childress Racing team, one of the strongest organizations in NASCAR. Team owner Richard Childress is Dillon's

"I've been working with (Kevin) Harvick a lot this year," Dillon said of his RCR teammate, who is tied for the Cup standings lead with Carl Edwards. "I've been leaning on him a lot, and with all the other Cup guys at RCR (also Jeff Burton, Clint Bowyer and Paul Menard), that's a lot of experience for me to take advantage of."

Dillon knows that handling the differences - some subtle, some not so - in another of NASCAR's three series will take a while to figure out. He also has 11 career starts on the Nationwide series.

"You don't really know what it's going to be like until vou get out there," he said. "But Cup races are longer and the traffic is probably going to be different than what I'm used to in trucks. But the Truck series gives you lots of different places to learn about traffic, and I've run these 1.5-mile tracks before. So there should be lots of holes."

When Dillon starts driving regularly in Cup is still unknown. But he does plan on moving up to Nationwide full time next season. He said a sponsor and car-number announcement is expected soon.

This weekend will be a big step in his development. And he'll be watched closely by one man who cares a lot on how he does on several levels - Richard Childress.

"I'm sure he's nervous about it," Dillon said. "But that's like any grandfather should be. I'm going to go out there and do him proud I'm sure."

So Bowyer has found a new home for 2012 and is expected to announce his signing with Michael Waltrip Racing on Friday, when the Sprint Cup series returns

to Kansas Speedway. "Change is not always a bad thing," Bowyer said before finishing eighth in Sunday's AAA 400 at Dover (Del.) International Speedway. "It's time for some change. It's been a good career so far at RCR, and it's a shame things aren't working out over there, but it's not the end of the world."

Bowyer won four Sprint Cup races and qualified for the Chase for the Sprint Cup twice for Childress, finishing third in 2007. He also won the 2008 Nationwide Series championship.

Bowyer, 32, sees no reason he can't be just as successful with Waltrip.

"The way this sport is right now, it all has to do with driver/crew chief and engineer," Bowyer said. "They're the ones who get the most or not much out of the day. The cars are so close, it

doesn't matter where you're at. It's very important to have the right people around you.

"If you can get that environment, you can win anywhere."

Waltrip owns the rides of David Reutimann and Martin Truex Jr., as well as his own car when he drives in selected races. Waltrip apparently has found a primary sponsor for Bowyer with 5-Hour Energy, which sponsors the Nationwide Series car driven by Steve Wallace.

"It's a great partnership to be associated with," Bowyer said. "They're one of the only sponsors in the sport spending money right now and willing to move up and not pull the reins back. If we can get them locked up, it would be great."

Bowyer has yet to win a race

this season and missed the Chase by two positions, but that wasn't a factor in being let go by the Childress team. Childress said that had he been able to secure fulltime sponsorship for the No. 33 Chevrolet, Bowyer would still be part of the organization.

"I want him, I think he wants to be here, it's almost like losing a family member," said Childress, who also fields Sprint Cup cars

for Kevin Harvick, Jeff Burton and Paul Menard. "We just can't put enough full-time sponsorships together. ... We're working on a lot of things ... we have all kinds of options out there. No. 1 was to put Clint in a car, and we haven't been able to put it together."

Bowyer harbors no ill will toward Childress and raced hard for him Sunday in grabbing his second top-10 finish in his last five races.


"Everything is tough in the sport right now," Bowyer said. "Getting the sponsors and money put in place is the hardest thing.
