

# Salem board hires Buckeye principal

SALEM – John Lundin, the newly-named principal at Buckeye Elementary School effective Aug. 1, said he's heard nothing but great things about the Salem city school district.

The school board approved his hiring Monday night to replace longtime Buckeye Principal Dennis Niederhiser, who's retiring at the end of the school year after 36 years with the district.

"I'm really grateful and honored for the opportunity. I've got some big shoes to fill," Lundin told board members.

The 44-year-old from Canton currently serves as the principal at Sandy Valley Elementary in the Sandy Valley school district, a posi-

tion he's held since 1999. Over his 21 years in education, he's racked up 15 years of administrative experience.

"You bring a lot to the table," Superintendent Tom Bratten said.

Lundin was one of 30 applicants for the position. Bratten said the list was narrowed to six who were interviewed and then down to two. Niederhiser and the other principals and administrators were involved in the process.

"It wasn't going to be good enough for us without his blessing," Bratten said of Niederhiser, who has already spent some time talking with Lundin and will be meeting with him again.

The board approved a three-year contract with a base salary of \$81,000. Board President

Brad Myers welcomed him and said "we appreciate your willingness to serve here."

Lundin attended the meeting with his wife Cindy and their children, Taylor, 15, and Tom, 13.

"I am honored and privileged to serve the Salem community and Buckeye," he

# Port finds buyer for old Y&S railroad

EAST LIVERPOOL – The Columbiana County Port Authority has found another potential buyer for its railroad for what they hope is the last time.

The port authority board approved a letter of intent at Monday's meeting to sell the former Youngstown & Southern Railroad to an environmental and energy services company by the name of Tervita for \$2.9 million, with \$1.7 million going to pay off loans related to the purchase and upgrade of the rail line.

"This represents, hopefully, the culmination of our efforts to get this railroad back into private hands," said port authority CEO Tracy Drake.

Tervita is the fourth company to agree to purchase and operate the rail line since it was acquired by the port authority in 2000. The first operator filed for bankruptcy in 2004, while the second company pulled out in 2006 before a deal was completed.

A lease/purchase agreement was then reached with Eastern States Railroad, a spinoff company created by Total Waste Logistics to transport demolition debris to its landfill in Negley. Eastern States failed to close on the deal by the 2009 deadline as the landfill business plummeted due to the recession, leaving the port authority to make the various loan payments.

As recently as November, the port authority had been working on a new deal that would have resulted in Total Waste Logistics purchasing the railroad, but the deal instead morphed into one with Tervita, a Canadian-based company that provides environmental and energy services to various industries, including the shale gas industry. The shale gas boom underway in the region is the reason for the company's interest in acquiring the railroad.

# Washingtonville businessman: Pinpoint leak, 'I will fix it'

WASHINGTONVILLE — Mayor Will Jones said he will follow up on a complaint by Washingtonville Plaza owner Fred Rasul regarding a water leak from Bill Willie's Cook Shack to the city line on Monday.

The village recently commissioned Underground Utility Services to survey the water system for leaks.

The company located a leak on the "customer side" that was leaking at five gallons per minute. The line was estimated at about 44 yards under the plaza's asphalt parking lot and Rasul said he didn't want to dig it all up. He asked the village to narrow down the

"I'm not going to dig 44 yards, you find the leak for me and I'll fix it," he said, noting he had consulted with two other people.

"You guys say I have a leak, you show me and I'll show my lawyer. They say I lost between 400,000 and 500,000 gallons of water, I should have a swimming pool," he said, adding that if the leak goes to state Route 14 the road should have caved in.

"The only thing I'm saying is please find the leak for me and I will fix it. If you find it tomorrow, I'll fix it," Rasul said.

"Give me a section. Find where the leak is and I'll fix that spot."

Councilwoman Laura Trummer said, "They should have been more specific and Jones said he agreed with Rasul.

"I promise you I will get back to you by Wednesday," he said.

Councilman Jim Smith said he wanted the village to be business friendly.

In other business, resident Barb Bell also advised council of a water pressure problem because of

"We've got a Kinetico system and it's going to ruin it," she said, adding she received a note on her door advising they needed to check their meter and Jones said he would check into that.

Bell also aired a complaint about loose trash flying off a dumpster at Davidson and High streets.

Jones said she could call the police and Bell said she did and assistant Police Chief Mark Husk said they've had problems in the

"We spoke to them, at the Marathon (gas station) and it needs netting on there," Husk

"We'll have it addressed," Jones said regarding that and another issue Bell brought up.



## Youngstown woman sentenced for car scam

Youngstown woman was sentenced in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court to 30 months in prison after pulling a scam last year at Performance GMC in New Waterford, which involved the purchase of three vehicles with dishonored checks. Jessica L. Keene, 28,

pleaded guilty in January to passing bad checks, theft and identity fraud. According to court documents, Keene in March and April of 2011 issued or transferred seven checks on a money network account, which she knew would be dishonored. The checks were for payment of \$100,000 or more. The checks were written for the purchase of a 2002 Dodge Ram 1500 pickup truck, a 2000 Ford Mustang GT and a 2006 Dodge Ram 2500 pickup.

Scott Caron, a manager from Performance GMC, testified when Keene came to the dealership she did not qualify for financing. However, Keene claimed her grandfather had died and she had received a large trust fund. She called the bank while at the dealership and confirmed the account was open, allowing Caron to speak with the bank. The person on the other end confirmed there was an open account, but could not confirm how much was in

write a check for the vehicle and returned a few days later to purchase two more. In all, she wrote checks for more than \$50,000 worth of vehicles.

When the dealership learned the first check was not clearing, Keene claimed it was because she had not filled it out properly. She reissued checks for the vehicles again for more than \$50,000.

Jones said it was later learned Keene had made three deposits into the account she was writing the checks on. However, the deposits were for \$1, 50 cents and 71 cents.

A second victim, Farnham, was also asked to speak prior to sentencing. She said besides using her identity in this case, Keene also used it to open credit in other places. Farnham is trying to pay off these debts, which she said she did not create, in order to keep her credit from being ruined. However, she said she cannot answer her phone because of creditors calling. She is a full-time student and works part-

"I'm just trying to make things right, but it is going to affect the rest of my life,' Farnham said. "This is not the first, second or third time she has done this to someone."

Two short-term aquaintances spoke on Keene's behalf, both stating they have seen efforts Keene has made in the past few months to get her life together. Keene's ex-husband, Matthew Bezzarro, also testified, stating they have three children together and she has been making attempts to become more involved with their lives.

"These crimes involve deceit and deception," Pike questioned Bezzarro. "Have you ever known her to have trouble telling the truth?"

Bezzarro admitted he has and when pushed added "situations arose which led to our separation and our divorce."

Jones pointed out Keene had indicated she worked at Infocision for about a year, but investigation showed it was more like three weeks. She listed false dividend income on her credit applications and claimed to have seasonal employment at Toys R Us, when she had in fact been let go because of

Before sentencing, Pike also mentioned lies in the pre-sentencing investigation. He said Keene had claimed to the probation department she had been a student at Youngstown State University for a year, but had not attended school there. She had also claimed to have been a model in New York, which Pike said was also found to be a lie.

"The truth, the truth, the truth, that is always the best course," Pike said.

# Low natural gas prices not good news for everyone

In July 2008, the wellhead price of natural gas in the United States was \$10.79 per 1,000 cubic feet. By last week it had plummeted to \$2.08.

For many Americans, that is wonderful news. It is not a good thing for everyone in this part of the country, however.

Gigantic reserves of gas in the Marcellus and Utica shale formations have been unlocked during the past few years. Both formations underlie much of this area. Thousands of area residents have been involved in the feverish rush by gas companies to obtain leases to drill for gas and oil. Tens of millions of dollars in "bonus payments" have been handed out to those signing mineral rights leases.

But the really big money, those signing leases have been assured, is in royalty payments once gas is produced from the


But royalties are percentages of the prices charged for gas. When they drop, area residents lose money.

In addition, lower prices have meant many companies have stopped drilling for "dry" gas that does not contain valuable liq-

This, too, shall pass. Our nation's appetite for energy, including that produced from gas, is enormous. As some electric companies build new gas-fired power plants, it will grow.

Times are not good in the gas fields – but only for now. At some point, probably within a few years, prices will go back up. They always do.





# bama, Romney at gate

Any doubt that Mitt Romney would win the Republican presidential nomination vanished when Rick Santorum left the race. It also marked the end of Romney's time as the defining figure in the overall contest for the White House.

The GOP nomination process was seen by many as a competition between Romney and an entertain-

ing cast of I'm Not Mitt Romney challengers. Questions were raised about Romney's perceived weaknesses and whether he could win over the hearts and votes of conservatives. But now President Obama moves to center stage and becomes the defining figure of the general election campaign. Now it's about Obama, not Romney, as the election becomes primarily a referendum on his first term in office.

The most important indicator of the president's prospects will be his job-approval rating. That rating will be very close to his share of the vote on Election Day. In 2004, President George W. Bush had a 51 percent job approval rating and won 51 percent of the vote.

Obama's ratings suggest we are heading for a potentially very close race in November. For the past 32 months, the full month approval ratings for the president have been remarkably stable, holding to a very narrow range of 44 percent to 49 percent. People seem to have formed an opinion of the president, love him or hate him, and nothing can change their minds. Those who oppose the president tend to feel more strongly about it than those who support him.

For most of the past three years, the president's ratings have stayed in an even narrower band of 46 percent to 48 percent. Those numbers suggest Obama would earn just under 50 percent of the vote on Election Day. If the president can win over a few more voters and move those numbers up a bit in the coming months, he is very likely to keep his job. If the president's ratings falter, Romney is likely to be moving into the White House next January.

Economic concerns dominate the voters' agenda, and here the numbers for the president are more troubling. Forty-nine percent of the nation's voters trust Romney more than the president when it comes to the economy. Just 39 percent trust Obama more.

That double-digit advantage for Romney is consistent with other data showing a general lack of confidence in the president's economic policies. Only 37 percent give him positive reviews for his handling of the economy so far.

Middle-income voters are especially likely to have more confidence in Romney. Obama does best among those who earn less than \$20,000 a year and those who earn more than \$100,000 an-

Especially troubling for the White House is the fact that 20 percent of Democrats trust Romney more than Obama on this core issue.

On other issues, however, Romney and Obama are essentially even. This includes health care, taxes, national security and energy.

Still, in a year when economic concerns trump all other issues, these numbers represent a good starting point for Romney. But what really matters is how voters feel in November. If the economy improves between now and then, confidence in the president's economic policies -- and his job approval ratings -- are sure to improve as well, and he'll be much tougher for Romney to beat.

# Flying the turbulent skies of bankruptcy



From his office window, Thomas W. Horton, in his fifth month as CEO of American Airlines, can see in the distance the Manhattan-size footprint of Dallas-Fort Worth airport, where American has 85 percent market share;

it also has 68 percent in Miami, gateway to South America's booming market. In the foreground, however, he can see one reason why, nevertheless, his company recently entered bankruptcy -- the corporate headquarters of Southwest Airlines.

Southwest, the most successful of the "low cost" carriers that proliferated after the 1978 deregulation of the industry, has been profitable for 39 consecutive years, while the rest of the industry was losing \$60 billion between deregulation and 2009. Southwest, JetBlue and the others have 30 percent of the domestic market, up from 10 percent in 1999. The "two tier" airline industry is, however, becoming a thing of the past. All carriers are going to have low costs because of what Horton calls "fear-based discipline," aka competition.

In the last three decades there have

been 192 airline bankruptcies. Not coincidentally, fares, adjusted for inflation, are 18 percent lower than in 2000. Forty years ago, a majority of Americans had never taken an airplane trip. Now everyone is more free than ever to move about the country, air travel having been democratized by liberating it from government.

In 1938, the Civil Aeronautics Act codified a government-managed cartel. Reason magazine's Nick Gillespie and Matt Welch report that, 34 years later, United's percentage of market share had gone from 22.9 to 22, Eastern's from 14.9 to 11.6 and TWA's from 15.1 to 11.9. Why this bureaucrat's dream of near stasis? Because between 1950 and 1974, the Civil Aeronautics Board received 79 applications for startup airlines and rejected them all, believing that if even one passenger would be taken from an existing carrier, competition would be excessive.

Intellectuals are often the last to learn things, so John Kenneth Galbraith, Harvard's celebrity economist and one of liberalism's pinups in the 1950s and 1960s, argued in his 1958 book "The Affluent Society" that modern marketing -- advertising and other supposedly dark arts -- is so powerful that big corporations could manufacture demand for whatever they manufactured. In 1958, Ford put all its marketing muscle behind the Edsel.

Undiscouraged by evidence, in 1967 Galbraith, full of the progressive's enthusiasm for the administrative state, asserted in "The New Industrial State" that the U.S. economy would soon be dominated by large corporations essentially immune from competition and hence from market turbulence. Four years later, Southwest launched its first flight. The "legacy carriers" -- those that had operated under the CAB regime -- were in for heavy weath-

American bought TWA shortly before 9/11, adding capacity just when less capacity was suddenly required. American is the last of the six legacy carriers to enter bankruptcy. The other five are United and Continental, now merged, Delta and Northwest, also merged, and US Airways, which entered bankruptcy twice before merging with America West.

Airlines have resembled those local governments that have given unsustainable contracts to unionized public employees and now are contemplating bankruptcy. (Watch Stockton, Calif., which may soon be the biggest municipal bankruptcy since the Depression.) Bankruptcy has been a management tool for airlines that cannot stand strikes -- there has been no strike at a major airline since 2005 -because they must amortize their aircraft even when not flying. Bankruptcy has enabled carriers to shred improvident contracts entered into to purchase labor

If American's pilots had the work rules covering Continental pilots before the merger with United, American could have hundreds fewer pilots, and more earnings: A senior captain flying a widebody plane makes more than \$200,000 a year and has rich pension and medical plans.

Horton has done taxpayers a favor by deciding not to turn American's non-pilot pensions over to the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp., the deeply underfunded federal agency that would pay only a portion of what employees were expecting. American will pay benefits already accrued but henceforth employees will have defined contribution rather than defined benefit plans.

Airline bankruptcies are peculiar: Just last July American bought \$38 billion worth of new fuel-efficient aircraft. It takes money to save money and an air-

Horton is imperturbably noncommittal about the possibility that the industry's next consolidation will meld American with perhaps US Airways or Delta: "Our plan is to create the best outcome for our stakeholders." Which is a nice way of saying, "Please leave your seatbelts fastened." Turbulence is normal, and normally good for travelers.

However, when questioned by Hura, Goddard later added the teenage girl was also sober that night, but had drank in the past.

Birch also apologized for his actions in court, stating he has two daughters of his own and he wants to serve his time and get back to being with his family.

"I'm truly sorry," he said. Birch was granted credit for 223 days already served. djohnson@mojonews.com

Witnesses stated that the two men were being escorted from the building by a business owner when they manually activated a fire alarm before fleeing westbound onto private property. They were apprehended approximately five minutes later in the 7800 block of South Range Road after surrendering and admitting to setting off

All three are scheduled to appear Thursday morning in Mahoning County Court No. 3 in Sebring.

## SR board reinstates benefits

BEAVER TOWNSHIP - The South Range Local school board Monday reinstated severance benefits for three classified administrative positions.

The board approved the benefits for the food service director, a position being eliminated after this year, as well as the director of facilities and technology and an administrative position in the board office.

In other business, Smith said the bridge to the treatment plant, installed some seven or eight years ago, was never painted and is scaling badly. He brought a rusty broken-off portion to the meeting and pointed out the EPA had requirements to protect the water under the bridge.

"If we don't do something it won't last another 10 years," he said, and Jones asked Smith to contact three people for estimates.

Council also approved the purchase of a one-year, \$445 warranty for a new utilities department generator after Councilwoman Laura Trummer made the motion.

In other business, Husk also noted that the stop sign at Washingtonville Road and State Street had been knocked down and Road Supervisor Ed Garrett said he's had to replace it four or five times, noting that big trucks "clip it."

Garrett also said he could install a six-inch riser in front a residence on High Street.

Tervita, as it's the first rail transportation in our U.S. operations and will give our customers the opportunity to get their jobs done more efficiently, safer and with less impact to the environment," said Phil Vogel, president of Tervita's U.S. operations, according to a company news release.

Under the terms of the letter of intent, the port authority is to be paid by July 16, with \$150,000 to be received immediately upon execution of the letter of intent. Of the \$2.9 million, Drake said \$1.2 million will go to the Ohio Rail Development Commission to pay off a loan obtained from the agency and \$500,000 to pay off a bank loan.

As part of the deal the Ohio Rail Development Commission will forgive \$1 million in penalties owed by the port authority for falling behind on payments to the agency after Eastern States failed to follow through with its planned

Drake indicated the port authority will have lost \$1 million-plus from the deal when you include legal fees. "Overall, we're taking a bit of haircut on the deal, but we were able to preserve a railroad," he said.

Drake expects Tervita will also acquire the Negley landfill or a major interest in the facility.

The 36-mile rail line extends from Boardman to Dar-

lington, Pa., with the the majority of it in Columbiana County. Drake believes within two years the railroad will be experiencing 1970s level of 7,000-plus rail cars of traffic annually.

# Cobbler's Corner launching store on wheels

COLUMBIANA - Cobbler's Corner is launching a new shoe store on wheels, according to owner Terry Thompson.

The store will be available 24/7 and expand service to its industrial client base and, as the Red Wing Shoes exclusive brand distributor, increase brand awareness.

"It will sell and service accounts," Thompson said of the box truck he custom designed and fabricated to hold over 400 pairs of custom-made shoes. The mobile shoe store is aimed, partly, at the shale boom.


"Since their timetable is 12 hours (shifts) we'll try to be on site and be available 24/7 for whatever's needed on site for shoe store services."

The new company, Mobile Shoe Store LLC, will be run by the industrial store Manager Ron Huston and Thompson said one more staff member was hired to support the truck to manage inventory.

The Cobbler's Corner in the Village Plaza in Columbiana since 2006 stocks more than 12.000 pairs of shoes in its 14,000 square foot building.

Mike Mettler, the territory sales manager for Red Wing Shoes brands, said the Cobbler's Corner showroom is the largest in northeast Ohio.

Thompson, who can make or fabricate just about anything, said inventory control without the truck is a full-time job for the store

that employs 12 people full time and services a 50-mile radius customer base.

"Our store is unique ... we make custom-made shoes," Thompson said. "The truck will be job specific," he said, stocking safety glasses, steel-toed shoes, along with insulated and wool sox.

"We've signed up a lot of industry around here who are going to buy local. The Red Wing goal is brand recognition in our area," said Thompson who has been in business for 38 years. He said Cobbler's Corner has over 150 indus-

"The truck is basically a shoe store on wheels. It's mainly designed for new shoe sales," Thompson explained. "We have UPS shipping in our store to everywhere in the country."

The truck will be doing cold calls, repair pickups and rotating work shoes for customers.

Mettler said Red Wing would not be doing this if the store and corporate image didn't coincide or meet corporate standards. Thompson is a big believer in buying local.

The tip you give your server usually is shared with a busboy, a hostess and a bartender. I have to tip these employees based on my SALES, not my tips. (Heloise here: Many restaurants "pool" tips, and the total is divided among certain employees on a percentage basis.)

If the guests' check is \$100 and they leave a 10 percent tip of \$10, I have to give \$1 to the bar and hostess and \$3 to the busboy. This leaves me with \$5. If the table doesn't tip at all, I still have to tip based on those sales, so I'm actually paying \$5 to have served that table.

Servers get taxed on our sales and tips. We live off our tips. I know times are tough, but if people cannot afford to tip the proper amount, then they should eat at a place that doesn't require a service charge! -- Ashley in Camarillo, Calif.

Ashley, many people don't know what you have shared. But also remember that a tip is for good service and is usually not required, unless it's a party over a certain number of people. Most servers work very hard and do deserve a good tip. -- **Heloise**

**DEAR ABBY:** I'm a 43-year-old veteran of the grocery industry. I am also an associate of one of the premier supermarkets in the country, and I disagree with your response to "Chicago Clipper" (Feb. 18)!

All of this takes time and money away from the associates performing our duties in a very low-profit industry.

By leaving an unwanted coupon on a store shelf for the next customer, Chicago Clipper is NOT "paying it forward." She's adding to the problem. So, please, folks, keep your coupons in your purse, wallet, pocket or coupon book until you get to the checkout line. -- FLORIDA BUTCHER

**DEAR FLORIDA BUTCHER:** Thank you for pointing out to my readers and me some of the problems coupons may create. Your sentiments were repeated by many retailers. However, other shoppers and retailers offered suggestions that may help to eliminate the problem, including: coupon exchanges, donating them to the military, posting them on Freecycle, Craigslist or Facebook, etc. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: I am a coupon user. I am also a grocery store employee. I constantly have to pick up coupons left by customers who are "paying it forward" or "being generous." ## Medicines unproven for joint health



Dr. Donohue **DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** A co-worker told me everyone over 50 should be taking a glu-cosamine-chondroitin supplement for joint health.

What is your perspective on this? -- **R.M.** 

ANSWER: Does you co-worker mean

that glucosamine-chondroitin prevents arthritis, specifically osteoarthritis? If so, I don't agree.

Glucosamine has a large fan base for the treatment of osteoarthritis. That's the most prevalent kind of arthritis, the kind that comes from the wearing away of joint cartilage. A joint is the place where two bones meet. The ends of those bones are covered with cartilage to permit the joint to bend smoothly and comfortably. With age, joint cartilage fragments and thins. That exposes the bone ends to rub against each other, a painful situation. Osteoarthritis is the result.

Glucosamine is derived from the shells of crabs, lobsters or shrimp. It is also synthetically made. It's said to restore integrity to joint cartilage.

Chondroitin comes from bovine or shark cartilage. It, too, is said to rejuvenate joint cartilage.

Neither substance, alone or together, has proven to achieve the goals claimed for them

I do know many people who are ardent fans of these products. To them I say this: If you are convinced that they help your osteoarthritis, continue to use them. I happen to be a disbeliever. And I definitely cannot recommend them as preventatives for os-

teoarthritis.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** Please write about heart seizures and epileptic seizures. What is the difference between the two? -- **B.** 

ANSWER: An epilepsy seizure comes about from the sudden discharge of braincell-generated electric current. The discharge takes place in a small area of the brain or it travels through the entire brain. A localized seizure (small area of brain activated) is one where a person stares into space briefly, and is hardly noticed by others. Or it can be one where only an arm or leg jerks. A generalized seizure (entire brain activated) is one that spreads throughout the brain and gives rise to a more dramatic manifestation. The person drops to the ground, and the arms and legs jerk -- a grand mal seizure.

Heart seizure isn't a term much used by medical people. It again denotes a sudden and serious heart disorder such as a heart attack or a heart rhythm abnormality that prevents the heart from pumping blood.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My brother and I suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder. On a visit to my brother, my mother developed a high fever and was rushed to the emergency room. Her heart was beating rapidly. A doctor gave her a shot, and she died immediately. My brother and I have avoided doctors ever since. If I do see one, I become anxious and my blood pressure goes through the roof. My brother reacts the same. We get good blood pressure readings at home. What are we to do? Our doctor insists on taking blood pressure in the office. -- Anon.

ANSWER: You have a couple of choices. One is to find a doctor who will accept your home blood pressure readings. Or have your current doctor arrange for you to wear a monitor that records your pressure for a full 24 hours or longer. The doctor should accept those readings.

of everyone's needs.

Mom screams at me and makes the smallest of things seem like the end of the world. I don't want to see her in a nursing home, but I cannot do this 24/7. I'm losing my mind and my life. My kids don't want to be around me, and my oldest son's grades are declining.

Do I keep going, hoping things will get better? Or do I break the news to my mom that I love her dearly but can't take care of her? -- A.

**Dear A.:** You sound like a wonderful, caring daughter, but Mom is probably depressed and angry, and is taking it out on

you. There are limits to what you can reasonably do for her without sacrificing the wellbeing of your children. Please don't feel guilty. Your mother needs more help than you can give her. She not only requires round-the-clock physical care, but also would benefit from counseling to deal with her other issues and come to terms with her current situation.

Please look into home-health care options, including a full-time caregiver (perhaps your sister would contribute to the cost), as well as nearby nursing homes. Most do an excellent job, and you can visit Mom every day, not only to cheer her up, but also to check on her care. Then please get some counseling for yourself in order to get through this, because we doubt Mom is going to make it



ney Crosby tossed aside concerns about blows to his head and mixed it up in a couple of melees.



## Shurmur starts 1st offseason program

CLEVELAND (AP) — Four hundred fifty nine days after being hired as head coach of the Browns, Pat Shurmur is finally getting

the chance to run an offseason

program. Teams with new head coaches in

the NFL started their structured conditioning programs on April 2. The remaining teams began their programs Mon-

The first day having the

team together after more

than three months away might not seem like big deal to those on the outside, but it is a very big deal to Shur-

There were no offseason programs in the NFL last year because of the lockout. That meant no supervised conditioning or instruction until the start of training

"It's obviously exciting for me to have the players back in the building," Shurmur said on a conference call. "From what I can tell talking to the players, they're excited to be back. For a lot of the veteran guys, their body clock said the offseason pro-

gram began a month ago. "This is my first offseason program. It gives you clarity knowing how much work needs to be done on the field in the latter part of May and June. I realize how important these can be so you can get your systems in place and refined. The players have a chance to work together and develop a winning chemistry.

The new CBA resulting from the negotiations during the lockout last year pushed the start of offseason programs back from mid-March

# **Talking** with Jack

#### Nicklaus remembers his most magical shots

COLUMBUS - Now 72 years old, Jack Nicklaus jokes that he can't remember what happened yester-

Yet he's never forgotten what it was like to hit the most famous shots of his illustrious career.

"I can still feel it, it feels the same," he said Monday at a charity luncheon affiliated with the Memorial Tournament, which he founded and hosts. "You can still feel the shot, the way it came off your hands, 30 or 40 years later. I still have that same feeling. I haven't matched it lately. I do know that feeling, though. And it's kind of fun to know what it feels like in golf.'

The years have not dimmed the sweet spot he hit on the 1 iron that he drilled through the wind and off the pin at 17 to take the 1972 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, or the 5 iron with a slight draw at 16 that helped him win the 1986 Masters at

Nicklaus, who helped raise \$275,000 at the luncheon for Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, appeared with the defending Memorial Tournament winner, Steve Stricker, and two-time U.S. Open champion and golf analyst, Andy North.

Even though he no longer plays much golf — he said his five kids and 22 grandchildren all lead busy lives and don't usually have time Nicklaus said he hasn't forgotten his signature shots.

Funny, he said, how many of them were 1 irons. There was the shot at Pebble Beach that helped him hold off Bruce Crampton. There was also another 1 iron at Augusta National, with Tom Weiskopf and Johnny Miller pressuring him, that led to his Masters victory in 1975.

Stricker remains impressed by the 5 iron that Nicklaus carved into the back-left pin placement on Sunday at the '86 Masters.

"I still can't get over that shot," Stricker said. "I know you've hit a ton of great shots over the years, but that's not an easy pin, first of all. One little flick over there and you're in the water."

With some embarrassment, Nicklaus said that shot was memorable because of his reaction to it.

"On that particular shot, I made probably the cockiest remark I've ever made in my



## **Potential Clemens jurors** question cost of hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Roger Clemens stood and uttered "Morning" to the 90 po-tential jurors who had gathered in the ornate, sixth-floor ceremonial courtroom, the one deemed big enough to hold them all. After he sat down, he swiveled his chair, as if trying to make eye contact with as many as possible.

Some of those looking back had no idea who he was. Others, including two who survived the first cut, wondered if it was a waste of taxpayer time and money that got him to this point.

The seven-time Cy Young Award winner was back in court Monday in the government's second attempt to prove that he misled a House committee at a landmark drugsand-sports hearing in 2008. The first trial last July ended in a mistrial when prosecutors introduced inadmissible evidence after only two witnesses had been called.

One potential juror said he felt "it was a little bit ridiculous" when Congress held hearings on drug use in sports because he felt the government should have been focusing on bigger problems. Nevertheless, the native of Chile — an investment officer for an international bank was asked to return, the only male to remain in the jury pool

among those who were individually screened on the first day. Another potential juror re-

called the 2008 hearing by saying: "At the time, I remember thinking it didn't seem to be a great use of taxpayer money,' but she was kept in the pool after she said she could be impartial. "Even if I don't agree with

the reason that you're brought before Congress, you still have to tell the truth .... If you perjure yourself before Congress, it's still illegal," said the woman, who is an executive for an environmental nonprofit organiza-

But another potential juror was excused after she volunteered: "I don't know if that's the best use of government tax dollars at this time." She said her feelings could influence her ability to serve.

Clemens lawyer Rusty Hardin even hinted that perhaps the defense might challenge Congress' authority to call the hearing in the first place, but U.S. District Judge Reggie Walton was skeptical of that

line of questioning. By the end of the day — after the proceedings had moved to a smaller courtroom — only 13 potential jurors had been screened and just seven had been asked to return Wednes-

Crosby was blunt when asked why he didn't just skate away from Voracek's

"I don't like him. I don't like any guy on their team," he said after Game 3. "Guys are emotional and there's a lot of stuff going on out there. There's no reason to explain or sit here and say why I pushed a glove away. They're doing a lot of things out there, too. And you know what? We don't like each other. Was I going to sit there and pick up (Voracek's) glove for him? What

was I supposed to do?"

Crosby could ignite the Penguins offense instead of starting scrums. The Penguins can't match the Flyers once the first period closing horn sounds.

Crosby's attempt at playing enforcer got a laugh out of the Flyers.

"I guess we've got to be doing something right if he hates us, right?" a smiling Giroux said.

The Flyers are doing plenty right offensively against a hapless defense. The Flyers are the first team to score eight-plus goals in two straight playoff games since Wayne Gretzky and the Los Angeles Kings did it against the Calgary Flames April 27 & 29, 1993, according to STATS LLC.

Oh, Hartnell, their top goal scorer, has yet to put the puck in the net.

The 158 penalty minutes, superstar-on-superstar dustup, 12 goals and a Hulk Hogan cameo made Game 3 one to remember.

Flyers coach Peter Laviolette wasn't sure it could be topped as an entertainment spectacle — not that it matters to him, as long as the Flyers win.

"I had a lot of texts, people just texting me saying it was one of the best games, if not the best game, they've ever seen," he said.

#### 25 years ago, SI made an unforgettably bad Indians prediction

CLEVELAND (AP) -Some years are unforgettable. Others are forgetful. Put them together, it's unforgettably forgetful. Such was the story of the 1987 Cleveland Indians. Oh, but what a beginning. In April of 1987, the world turned upside down for Indians fans. It's the only way to describe the hysteria created by two words and one iconic cover of Sports Illustrated.

The headline read, "In-

dian uprising." When the April 6, 1987 editions of Sports Illustrated hit newsstands and mailboxes across the country, Joe Carter and Cory Snyder graced the cover in front a Chief Wahoo logo with the words, "Believe it! Cleveland is the best team in the American League.'

For those not old enough to remember that famous SI cover, and arguably the most off-base prediction in sports history, such a claim by the No. 1 sports publication in America 25 years ago was equally shocking and surprising to an Indians fan base starved for a winner.

If ever the so-called SI cover jinx had merit, this was Exhibit A, or least close to it. The 1987 Indians were the magazine's pick to win the AL pennant, and by the end of the season, the Tribe was a major-league worst 61-101.

General-admission tickets at Cleveland Municipal Stadium were \$2 that season, and by the end of it, those tickets couldn't be given away. Early on, though, there was so much promise, so much hope, so much

baseball fans to dream, and SI did plenty to fuel that fire. For one interested observer – one who's been with the Indians every year but one since 1979 — that week in early April of '87 was as surreal as it gets.

A year prior, Bob DiBiasio was let go as the Indians' media relations director as ownership of the team shifted from the late Francis

J. "Steve" O'Neil to the late Dick Jacobs, and DiBiasio spent '87 with the Atlanta Braves as their public relations director.

"I remember getting that issue in the mail in my office at Fulton County Stadium, and I couldn't believe it," he said. "I thought, 'Son of gun, that's my team."

A year later, DiBiasio was

back with the Indians, and even though he watched from afar in '87, something as simple as a magazine cover resonated with him, and countless others. Why the Indians were SI's surprise pick in '87 is still a mystery. DiBiasio, who knew many of the magazine's baseball writers at the time, said it was probably nothing more than a hunch

"I really think it was an emotional pick by them," said DiBiasio, the Indians' vice president of public affairs. "At that time, Sports Illustrated was a bit quirky with how they did those things. I just think they thought it was (the Indians')

The author of SI's cover story, Ron Fimrite, explained the magazine's preseason choice for the AL pennant. A sampling of his writing in the April 6, 1987

What? Baseball in Cleveland? You gotta be kidding. Let me tell you something about baseball in Cleveland. ... Last season, the Indians won more games (84) than they had in any year since 1968, and they passed 1985's attendance in their 38th date. The fans are excited. It's like 1948 all over again. There's a feeling that this is the year. People, baseball

people, are starting to talk.

Those baseball people
stopped talking about the Tribe quickly. SI's pick as the best in the AL went from totally chic to totally bleak. The Indians started a dismal 1-10 and by the end of May were 16-34. Manager Pat

Corrales was fired after 87 games, but the futility continued under his replacement. Doc Edwards.

When the carnage of '87 was over, 37 games separated Cleveland and AL East champion Detroit. Cover boys Carter (32 home runs) and Snyder (33 homers) put up excellent power numbers, but everything else that could go wrong, went wrong. For those who believe in such things, the SI jinx had struck again. Snyder, who was his second season in the majors in '87, didn't buy into

"It was an exciting time for us," Snyder, the hitting coach for the Double-A Jackson (Tenn.) Generals, said in a phone interview. 'We felt we had a good team, and it was neat to see the Indians finally getting the media attention we had not had in so long. That was the fun part about it. It put the Indians on the map in the '80s. Granted, we had some great players, but we were probably short in various areas to really compete for a pennant ... Ås for the SI jinx, Î don't believe in those things.'

That iconic SI cover continues to live on in DiBiasio's office at Progressive Field. He received a call last month from longtime SI writer and now retired Steve Wulf about a prop left over from the original SI Snyder-Carter photo shoot. A 5-foot tall Chief Wahoo logo painted on barn wood was initially used before the magazine decided on a traditional studio portrait for its cover.

"(Wulf) called one day and said, 'Do you want it?' I said, 'Sure,' "DiBiasio said. "When it arrived, I couldn't believe how big it was."

Much like those hopes and the subsequent flameout in '87, which continue to live on in Indians lore.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Steelers re-signed backup quarterback Charlie Batch to a one-year contract on Monday. Financial terms were not disclosed.

#### Kenya's Wesley Korir, Cherop win Boston Marathon

BOSTON (AP) — Trailing the leaders by 200 yards when the Boston Marathon slogged through Heartbreak Hill, Wesley Korir passed them one by one until he took the lead on his way out of Kenmore Square.

That's when leg cramps forced him to slow down and relinquish the lead.

"It's hot out there, in case you didn't know," he told reporters after enduring temperatures in the mid-80s to win the 116th Boston Marathon on Monday. "I knew it was going to be hot, and one important thing that I had to take care of today ... was really hydrate as much as possible. I guess my biology degree kicked in a little bit."

Singing religious songs as he trudged along the scorching pavement, the native Kenyan — a permanent resident of the United States — retook the lead from Levy Matebo in the final mile to cross the finish line in 84.8-degree temperatures with a time of 2 hours, 12 minutes, 40 seconds.

It was almost 10 minutes behind the world best established here a year ago by Geoffrey Mutai and the second-slowest Boston victory since 1985. Mutai, who was hoping a repeat victory would earn him a spot on the Kenyan Olympic team, dropped out after 18 miles with stomach cramps.

Instead, it was Korir who may have won a ticket to the London Games. "To me, I think running the Boston Marathon is an Olympic event," he said. "I

don't care what comes up after this, but I'm really, really happy to win Boston."

Sharon Cherop won the women's race to complete the Kenyan sweep, outkicking Jemima Jelagat Sumgong to win by 2 seconds in 2:31:50. The women's winner was decided by a sprint down Boylston Street for the fifth consecutive race all of them decided by 3 seconds or less.

Cherop, who was also hoping to be selected for the Kenyan Olympic team, was third at the world championships and third in Boston last year.

"This time around, I was really prepared," she said. "Last time the race went so fast and I didn't know I was about to finish. I didn't know the course well and I didn't know the finish line was coming."

Matebo finished 26 seconds behind Korir, and Bernard Kipyego was third as Kenyans swept the podium in both genders. Jason Hartmann, of Boulder, Colo., was in fourth place and the top American.

#### Ex-Pa. swim coach pleads in teen sex case

GREENSBURG, Pa. (AP) - A former high school assistant swim coach has admitted having a sexual relationship with a 15-year-old student on the team.

Thirty-three-year-old Raymond Novak pleaded guilty Monday, the sixth day of his trial in Westmoreland County Court. He faces five to 10 years in prison under the terms of a plea agreement.

Novak told the court he was pleading guilty on the advice of his attorney. Novak's accuser testified last week that she had sexual contact with the coach at her home and at the Burrell High School pool during the 2008-2009 school year.

Novak's attorney said in his opening statement the teen had made up the accusation because she was infatuated with the coach.

#### BCS buster: Alabama's crystal ball shattered

TUSCALOSSA, Al. (AP) The crystal football Alabama won for beating LSU in the BCS championship game in January was shattered on A-Day when it was accidentally knocked off a display by the father of a current player.

Athletic department spokesman Jeff Purinton said the Waterford Crystal trophy, valued at \$30,000, was on display in the Mal Moore Athletic Facility as part of the festivities for the Crimson Tide's spring football game Saturday in Tuscaloosa, Ala. He says the man stumbled on a rug that was under the trophy display.

Purinton said the school is working with the American Football Coaches Association, which owns the trophy, on getting a replacement.

Florida's 2006 trophy was destroyed when it was accidentally knocked off a

pedestal by a recruit in 2008. In 2004, Florida State had two trophies stolen. "In 2009 and again this season, Alabama did a great job showing the trophy off to fans even after we turned it over to them," said Charley Green, manager of the coaches' trophy. "Unfortunately it is fragile, and accidents can happen."

Green said the trophy makes appearances for several weeks before it is turned over to the school in mid-January.

# Manning goes to work with his new team

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) -Peyton Manning is back in his element, barking out calls, throwing passes and working out with his new teammates. It sure beats watching, wondering and worrying.



both quarterback and coach on the football field instead of pacing the sideline and wondering when his neck is going to allow him to return to the hud-

Manning and his new teammates reported to the Broncos' headquarters Monday morning for the start of the team's offseason conditioning program. After some work in the classroom and weight room, Manning threw passes to his new receivers during some on-field work without the coaches, who aren't allowed to join them outdoors until OTAs start up in May.

"Everybody's been looking forward to this day for some time now," Manning said. "I thought it was a productive first day, but we've got a lot of work to do.'

He didn't want to make any rash judgments about his receiving corps and although he said he was pleased with his first official workout since signing a five-year, \$96 million deal with Denver on March 20, Manning declined to talk about his health or the progress he's made as he regains his arm strength following a series of neck operations that sidelined him for all of last season and led to his departure from

"I'm not going to get into these weekly reports. I've kind of been there and done that all fall of last year," said Manning, who is rehabbing under the direction of head athletic trainer Steve "Greek' Antonopulos and new strength and conditioning coach Luke Richesson.

"I'm enjoying being under one roof, being supervised by those two

guys," Manning said.

Wide receiver Eric Decker, who has caught more passes from Manning than anyone else over the last month thanks to a series of workouts at local high schools, said the four-time MVP's passes were precise and powerful.

"I'm not his doctor, I don't know how to speak on his health, but catching balls from him, it looks like there's nothing wrong to me," Decker said. "He's throwing great balls, he's getting the work in just like we're getting the work in, knocking the rust off. I see no issues at this point."

Although he's been putting in a lot of miles finding remote high school fields to practice on, Manning said he hasn't really gotten to know his new city yet.

"It's been all business," he said. 'Everybody's asking where I'm living. I've been living over here in the

Rehabbing, lifting weights and

studying his new playbook.

Manning said he was glad to throw the ball around at team headquarters rather than sneaking around to the local high school fields to play catch with Decker and good friend Brandon Stokley, who signed a one-year deal to return to the Broncos on Monday.

Manning, 36, has always embraced the offseason regimen, and he said he's sure he wasn't the only one who was relieved Monday when NFL teams opened their doors for the voluntary offseason conditioning programs that were scuttled last year by the league's

"I am (excited), there's no question. I think a lot of players around the NFL will tell you the lockout threw a lot of players off their routine and what they're used to," Manning said. "So, I (like) the fact that everybody's allowed to be in the facility now working out under one roof, we can throw on the field now, right next to the weight room now as opposed to going to a high school. That was what you had to do, but it's nice to be able to do

## AP source: Brees, Fujita, Smith meet with NFL

NEW YORK (AP) — Saints quarterback Drew Brees, former New Orleans linebacker Scott Fujita and players union head De-Maurice Smith were at the NFL offices Monday discussing the team's bounty program.

Other issues also were being discussed with league executives, according to a person with knowledge of the meetings. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the talks are not being made public.

The league would not comment on the meetings, which also included discussions of HGH

Also on hand was NFL Players Association President Domonique Foxworth, who was elected to that position last month.

Brees and Fujita, now with the Browns, are members of the NFLPA's executive committee. Fujita was with the Saints in 2009 when the pay-for-pain bounty pool grew as large as \$50,000 and the team won the Super Bowl.

Browns coach Pat Shurmur said on a conference call with Cleveland media Monday that Fujita missed the team's first offseason training session because he was in New York.

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell is expected to soon punish players for their roles in the program that got Saints coach Sean Payton suspended for 2012. Between 22 and 27 current and former Saints defenders were involved, according to the league investigation.

The NFL investigation found that Payton initially lied about the existence of a bounty program and instructed his defensive assistants to do the same.

The Saints have been fined \$500,000 and stripped of two second-round draft picks. General manager Mickey Loomis is suspended for the first eight games of the upcoming season, while interim head coach Joe Vitt who took over that role Monday as Payton began his suspension through the Super Bowl will be barred for the first six reg-

ular-season games. Former Saints defensive coordinator Gregg Williams, who oversaw the bounty system in which opponents were targeted for hits that could sideline or injure them, is suspended indefinitely. He left New Orleans in January to become defensive coordinator in St. Louis.

Williams has apologized for his role in the bounty program.

The league's investigation found that Williams' bounty system offered off-the-books cash payments of \$1,500 for "knockouts," in which an opposing player was knocked out of a game, or \$1,000 for "cart-offs," in which an opponent needed help off the field

Last summer, the NFL an-nounced it would begin testing for human growth hormone, but the union had to approve the process. The players have yet to do so, citing uncertainty about the detection methods and appeals process.

Manning, though, said he felt like the new kid in school.

"I think a number of us did. I was with Jacob Tamme and Joel Dreessen, Caleb (Hanie), the same way. We have some new guys. So, I'm learning as we go, as well," Manning said. "Certainly when you get out there on the field and you're throwing passes to receivers, you feel a little more comfortable there,

as far as knowing what you're doing a little bit.'

Decker said Manning is making everyone around him better because of his famous work ethic, and cornerback Champ Bailey said that goes for Denver's defense, too.

Bailey sent Manning numerous texts during the quarterback's whirlwind free agency tour pleading with him to come to Denver.

"Why? Because he's an amazing player and his leadership alone is bar none the best in the league," Bailey said. "You need a guy like that on your team, and where I want to go, what I want to do toward the end of my career is win a championship and I feel like he gives us the best chance.

Bailey said he puts Manning at

he knows, he just knows. Bailey said the Broncos have to be careful they don't take Manning's presence for granted.

"I tell everybody in our defensive room, 'Just because we have a guy like that, it's not going to get easier for us.' We've got to work harder because the expectations are here,' Bailey said, holding his right hand high. "He's going to kick our butts in practice, so we've got to be ready to go.'
