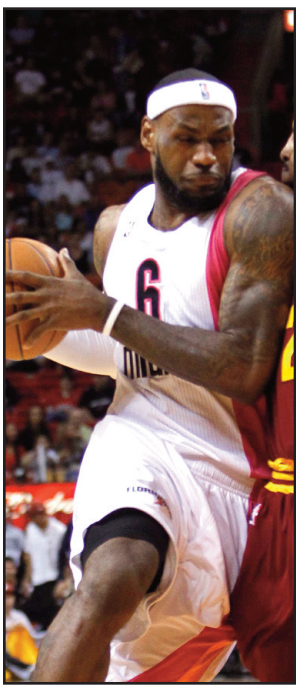

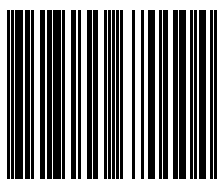

Dems endorse Brown's rival for recorder

LISBON — The Democratic Party has taken the unusual step of endorsing Columbiana County Recorder Craig Brown's primary opponent, saying the latest allegations against him left the organization little choice.

"Ultimately, the voters determine whether an elected official should remain in office. The Democrat Party encourages voters to support candidates with qualities becoming a public official. That

person is not Craig Brown," wrote county Democratic Party Chairman Dennis Johnson in a news release issued Thursday.

The party is instead endorsing Brenda Dickey Myers, Brown's opponent in the March 6 Democratic primary election.

"Endorsing against an incumbent does not often occur. By this action, the Columbiana County Democrat Party has sent a clear

message. We hope the voters are listening," Johnson said.

The action by the party comes little more than a week after the Salem News first reported a former recorder's office employee named Regina filed complaints accusing Brown of deliberately mispronouncing her first name in a way that rhymed with a part of the female anatomy. She said this occurred on three more occasions after she told him to stop, which was disputed by Brown, who said he quit immediately after being told

she was offended by what he described as a playful nickname he came up for her.

Grand opening set at North Lima complex

NORTH LIMA — Several new businesses at the North Lima Business Complex will hold a joint grand opening on Saturday. The event will run from 10 a.m. until 7 p.m.

The complex is located in the old South Range High School at 11836 South Ave. and is an initiative to help new businesses get started, according to Jim Komara.

Hot chocolate, coffee and cookies will be served to visitors.

The building is owned by Ed Schaeffer and John Monroe and managed by Michelle Au who is also the co-owner of a Crafting Affaire and The Hen House catering and commercial kitchen, with Sue Baron, which is located inside.

There are some 15 businesses scheduled to open in the "business incubator," Au said.

"We started with nothing but we've created something," she said, "the majority of the building is rented up."

She added, "It's like a business incubator. To help us all get off the ground and help the building succeed ... we're making it very community friendly."

Other businesses include, Halley Snow, an artist from Youngstown State University operating a studio, art supplies and artist co-op; Templar Training Group, a shooting accessory pro shop with CCW and CPR classes; Ruff and Rusty Antiques owned by Todd Tolson; Leather and Lace owned by Jan Hoagland; and Country Crafts and Noema Gems featuring fossils, rocks, gems and jewelry co-operated by

Hoagland; Ben Slagle owns Technology Sound; North Lima Antiques is owned by Jim Komara and Becky Fisher; 3TL (3 Tier Legacy), specializing in information technology, is owned by Mike Chuey; Use it Again educational merchandise and supplies is owned by Linde and Terry Smith; Engli's Discount Food Market; General Health retiree health insurance services are offered by Wendy Beatty; Mike Livosky owns an iPhone and iPad repair service. A ribbon cutting will take place outside in front of the main entrance at 9:30 a.m. prior to opening.

There is affordable space to rent, and the businesses work together to support and help each other get started, Au explained.

FAIRFIELD TOWNSHIP

Trustees seek gas leasing answers

FAIRFIELD TOWNSHIP — Trustees want to speak with DPS Penn regarding gas and oil leases on township property.

The township owns almost 35 acres including the old school (government building), the old garage, a house and park property on Southern Avenue.

Last month, the township received a letter from DPS which works for Chesapeake Energy in preparing oil and gas rights for development.

At that time, Trustee Chairman Bob Hum was concerned because they were dealing with the "people's property" and restated that concern again on Thursday.

Hum still had mixed feelings, saying, "I don't know where this is going."

One meeting guest, Wayne Wise, asked about the percentage the township would receive and Trustee Barry Miner said it was \$5,800 per acre and 18 percent for royalties.

"They're at 20 percent now," Wise noted.

Resident Tom Bell was also interested in a decision and Hum said, "It's the people's property ... if a lien's on the property it's forever ... if you're part of an interest and that well's producing, you're on it ... we're dealing with the people's property."

Bell said, "It's not going away ... if it's the people's gas they should be compensated."

Leetonia zoning inspector offers new landlord-tenant agreement

LEETONIA — Zoning Inspector John Rydarowicz has reintroduced a landlord-tenant agreement that should help enforce the zoning code.

Rydarowicz Wednesday night brought before Village Council a revised ordinance that would require landlords to disclose their tenants to the village. Council agreed to discuss the issue at a Zoning Commit-

tee meeting at 6:30 p.m. March 7 in Village Hall.

After much backlash from local landlords, council in January 2011 unanimously voted against the third and final reading of the initial ordinance, which the landlords claimed was unfairly restrictive against rental property owners.

The revised ordinance still requires the owners to pay a registration fee, open the property to inspections and purchase hazard and

general insurance for the home, but eliminates the requirement for proof of the occupant's legal citizenship or residency. It also eliminates the requirement that each additional members living in a unit register as an occupant.

Exemptions to the agreement include hotels, motels and dormitories; senior living rental units owned by Public Authorities and Dwelling Units; and senior living multi-dwelling units operated under

the Internal Revenue Service.

According to Rydarowicz, the need for the ordinance remains the same as when he first introduced it over a year ago.

"We're not getting responses from landlords (for zoning violations)," he said. "If we know who is living [in a rental unit] we can cite them instead of trying to track down the owner."

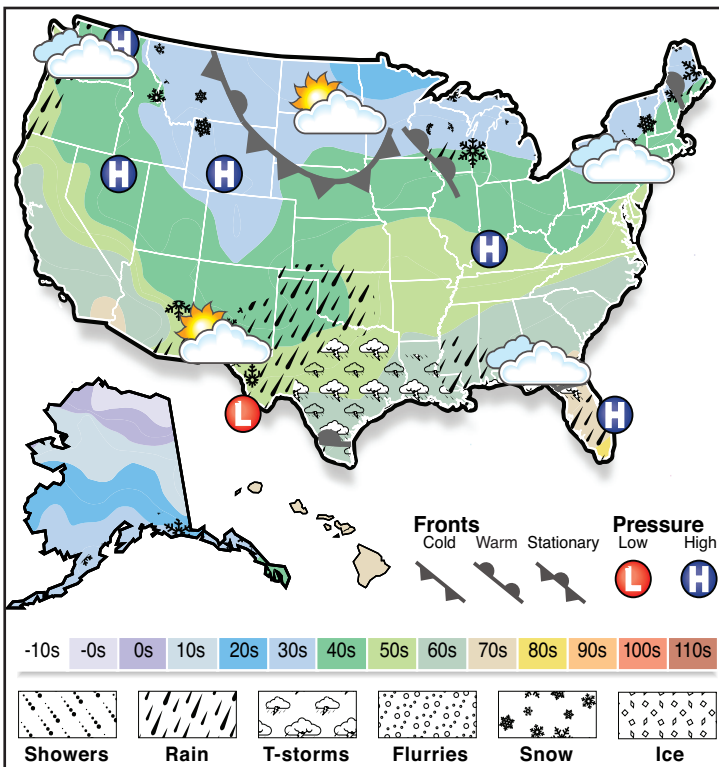

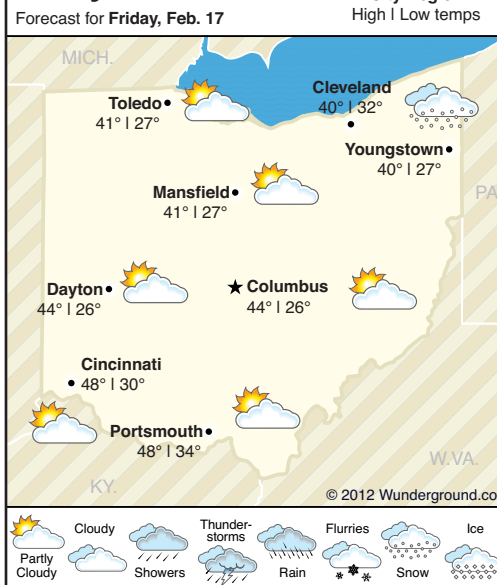

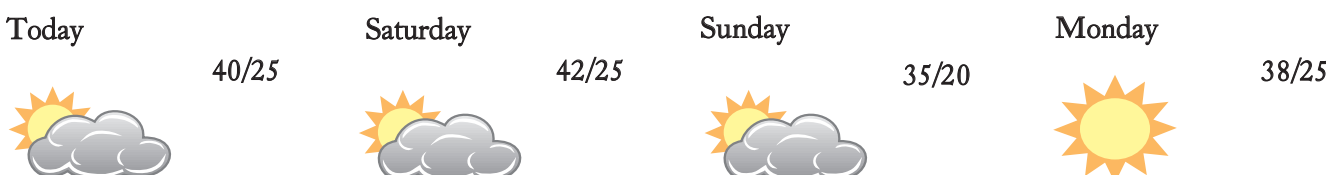

Syria rebels now include al-Qaida in Iraq; group is tied to bombings, US officials say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Top U.S. intelligence officials pointed to al-Qaida in Iraq on Thursday as the likely culprit behind recent bombings in Syria, the deadliest attacks against the Syrian government in the 11-month uprising.

Though the U.S. has called for Syrian President Bashar Assad to step down, his fall could lead to a power vacuum that al-Qaida's largest regional affiliate or other extremist groups could fill, Director of National Intelligence James Clapper told Congress. And that could allow such groups to help themselves to Syria's vast stockpiles of chemical weapons, he said.

At the Pentagon, Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said the crisis in Syria has become "that much more serious" and worrisome to the United States as a result of indications that al-Qaida has infiltrated the government's opposition. "It does raise concerns for us that al-Qaida is trying to assert a presence there," he said. "As to just what their role is and how extensive their role is, I think that still remains to be seen."

In New York, meanwhile, the U.N. General Assembly approved a resolution backing an Arab League plan calling for Assad to step down and strongly condemning human rights violations it said his government had committed. The vote, though not legally binding, reflects widespread world opinion.

Nigerian underwear bomber gets life in prison for trying to blow up jetliner

DETROIT (AP) — Defiantly declaring "a day of victory," a Nigerian man was given a mandatory life sentence Thursday for trying to blow up a packed jetliner with a bomb sewn into his underwear. People aboard the flight testified that the failed attack had disturbed their sleep and travels for more than two years.

Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab was the same remorseless man who four months ago pleaded guilty to all charges related to Northwest Airlines Flight 253. He seemed to relish the mandatory sentence and defended his actions as rooted in the Muslim holy book, the Quran.

"Mujahideen are proud to kill in the name of God," he said. "Today is a day of victory."

Had the bomb not fizzled, nearly 300 people aboard the flight would probably have been killed. The case stirred renewed fears that terrorists could still bring down an American jetliner more than eight years after 9/11, and it accelerated installation of body scanners at the nation's airports.

Citing slain scientists, Iran says it's the victim in nuclear showdown

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates (AP) — Facing international sanctions over its nuclear program, Iran is taking the position that it's the victim, not the aggressor. Iran is pointing to the cases of five slain scientists whose deaths it blames on Israel and its allies.

From Iran's view, it's been the target of clandestine hit squads for more than two years while the West has ignored Iran's claims that the Israeli Mossad spy agency is the mastermind. "Iran's official line is that it's under siege, not the aggressor. This shows up everywhere in Iran's policies and statements," said Mustafa Alani, an analyst at the Gulf Research Center based in Geneva.

President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad spoke on national television Wednesday next to photos of five nuclear scientists and researchers killed since 2010. Nearby was a large portrait of Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei holding the son of Mostafa Ahmadi Roshan, a senior director of Iran's main uranium enrichment facility, who was killed last month after a magnetic bomb tore through his car in Tehran.

During earlier ceremonies to insert domestically made fuel rods at a Tehran research reactor, Ahmadinejad lifted to his knee the daughter of nuclear electronics expert Darius Rezaeinejad, who was fatally shot last year by a pair of gunmen on motorcycles.

Record from Crooms trial corrected

LISBON — Questions regarding a judgment entry, unfiled and unsigned, during the conviction process of Christopher Crooms were argued in front of Judge Scott Washam on Thursday.

Crooms, 23, formerly of Clarks Mill Road, Hammondsville, is one of four men who are serving prison time in connection to crimes on Sept. 21, 2009, at Summitville Recycling on Lewis Road. The four men reportedly forced their way into a trailer there, held two men at gunpoint, bound them with duct tape and ransacked the trailer, stealing up to \$33,000.

Prior to trial, a motion had been filed by Crooms' attorney to strike a 27-page statement Crooms had made to investigating police. Assistant Prosecutor John Gamble said Judge David Tobin overruled the motion and wrote a judgment entry stating so. However, the judgment entry was issued only about two weeks before Tobin's final day on the bench.

To prove Tobin had overruled the motion, Gamble questioned on the stand defense attorney Dominic Frank, who had the job of preparing for the jury trial after the motion was ruled upon.

Frank was the third attorney who represented Crooms during the process before trial. Frank said the 27-page statement was a "big concern" as he began preparing for the trial. He was told when he took the case by one of the previous attorneys the motion had been overruled.

At Gamble's request Frank also discussed a copy of the judgment entry, which he said appears to be a standard judgment entry used in the court. However, the one he was shown had editing marks on it, marks Gamble said he put there to make a correction.

Crooms' current defense attorney in his appeal process, Douglas King, pointed out by questioning Frank that the judgment entry is not file stamped by the clerk of courts, not dated and not signed. After the hearing, King said he can show numerous rulings in

other court cases where it is clear the court's actions are determined solely on the basis of filed judgment entries. In this case, he said the judgment entry was not filed.

However, in the end Washam allowed Gamble to correct the record from the initial trial by adding the judgment entry to the case file. He asked Gamble to prepare the proper documents so it can be done.

King plans to appeal the case on Crooms' behalf. The original case was eventually decided by a jury trial in May 2011.

Following the trial Crooms was sentenced to 10 years for aggravated burglary and 10 years for each count of kidnapping, ruling they be served concurrently. Crooms was also sentenced to an additional three years on a firearms specification to be served consecutively to the 10-year term. He was given credit for 492 days already served and has been serving his time at the Lorain Correctional Institution.

EP man pleads guilty to break-in, theft

LISBON — Sean E. Johnson, 21, Park Avenue, East Palestine, pleaded guilty Tuesday in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court to theft and breaking and entering. Johnson faces up to two and a half years in prison and a \$7,500 fine. Sentencing is set for April 20.

Johnson was accused of trespassing in an unoccupied garage at the home Adam and Amy Sienerth, West Martin Street, East Palestine, on May 12, 2011, along with other co-defendants and taking two dirt bikes and a four wheeler.

Ryan C. Garretson, 20, West High Street, Lisbon, was found eligible for intervention in lieu of conviction. He was placed in an intensive supervision and treatment program for five years after pleading guilty to breaking and entering.

According to court documents, Garretson was involved in breaking into five storage units on Rose Drive, Lisbon, on Sept. 7, 2010.

Dewey J. Souers, 22, North Broadway, Salem, was found eligible for intervention in lieu of conviction on Monday. He was placed on five years of intensive supervision and treatment after pleading guilty to four counts of trafficking in marijuana.

Court documents state on two occasions in June 2009 and once in June 2010, Souers sold marijuana to a confidential informant near the First Presbyterian Preschool. Then on June 21, 2010, he prepared marijuana for shipment or distribution. He also had \$210 believed to have been used in the commission of a drug offense.

Gregory A. Dailey Jr., 24, last known address Athens Drive, Newell, W.Va., was sentenced Thursday to two years in prison for receiving stolen property and having weapons under a disability.

According to court documents, Dailey had a semi-automatic government handgun with three clips belonging to Bessie Rowand in his possession on March 28, 2011, while he was a fugitive from justice from the state of West Virginia.

BCI assists Wellsville with recent crimes

WELLSVILLE — Local police continue to work with the Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) on two recent crimes.

Chief Joe Scarabino said BCI is processing evidence and studying video surveillance footage related to an armed robbery Saturday at the For Your Convenience carryout on 17th Street, and a break-in Feb. 6 of a 10th Street home.

Scarabino urges anyone with information about either crime to call police at 330-532-1522.

In the Saturday afternoon robbery of the 17th Street carryout, police are seeking a white male about 6 feet tall and weighing 225 to 250 pounds. Police said the man brandished a dark-colored revolver and demanded cash from the clerk on duty. After the clerk surrendered an undetermined amount of cash, the man fled on foot through the alley near the store.

Regarding the 10th Street break-in, Scarabino said BCI officials are examining evidence gathered inside the home, near the area where the homeowner reported his television set was missing.

The alarm system company ADT notified village police that the burglar alarm had been activated. Police responded to the alarm around 10:30 p.m. and found the homeowner at the back door, where there was broken glass.

The homeowner showed police where the television had been sitting. Police gathered evidence and contacted BCI.

Police said Patrolman Tony Mancuso and his K-9 partner, Ryot, also responded, with Ryot tracking from the scene to a neighbor's door.

Occupants of the nearby home were at the residence, but when questioned they refused to allow K-9 Officer Ryot and other officers to enter and do a search of the residence.

Bailout of GM produces results

The topic of government bailouts and bankruptcy protection is a touchy one. It seems that you either support them or you don't. Such was the case when federal assistance prevented a complete collapse of General Motors in 2009. Some taxpayers wholeheartedly supported it and others were aghast. But at least in the case of GM it seems to be working. On Thursday, GM reported its biggest profit ever. The carmaker turned a profit of \$7.6 billion. That broke its old record of \$6.7 billion set during the 1997 pickup and SUV boom. The company made record money last year even though U.S. sales were near historic lows of 12.8 million cars and trucks.

GM is more streamlined than it was during its past boom years, having fewer workers and a less costly contract with the United Auto Workers. The good news Thursday should please our government. After all, it still owns 26.5 percent of GM and is still awaiting price share to rise more before regaining its bailout money. GM's stock price rose about 4 percent during trading yesterday. In 2011, GM's global sales rose 7.6 percent to 9.03 million vehicles to help it reclaim the title of world's largest automaker from Toyota Motor Corp.

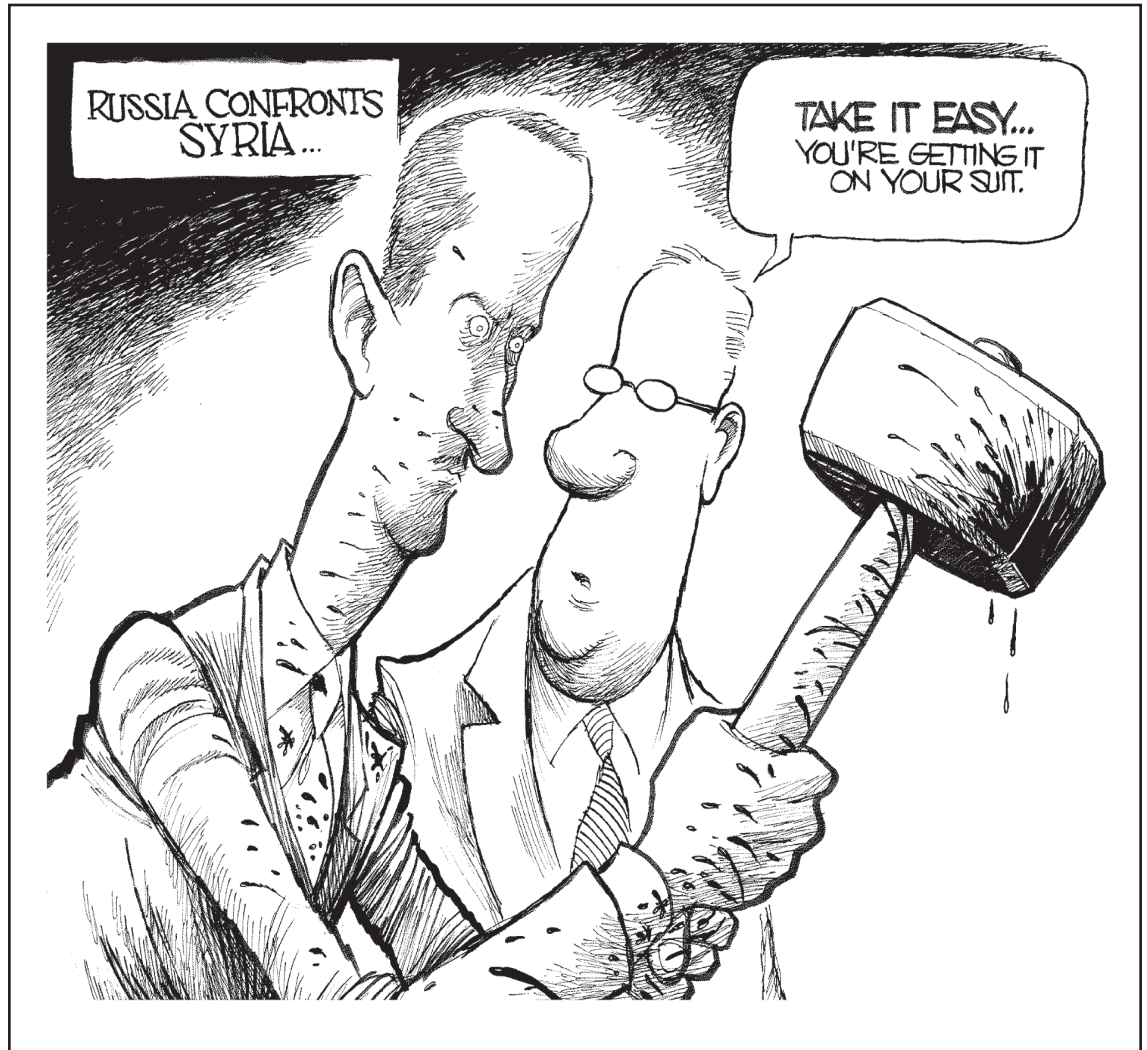
GM did report its profit slightly fell during 2011's fourth quarter. The company is expecting to turn that around because global sales are growing and consumers will be charged more per vehicle in 2012. According to an Associated Press report, GM will make less money per vehicle as the mix of sales continues to shift to cars from trucks, which have bigger sticker prices. It also expects to invest \$8 billion on new products and technology, and says pension expenses will rise. The company wants to keep expenses down by freezing its underfunded U.S. pension plan for salaried workers. The company does anticipate factory and worker cuts elsewhere, in Europe and South America. Last year, GM made the bulk of its income in North America, where its pretax profit totaled \$7.2 billion. International Operations, which includes Asia, made \$1.9 billion before taxes, but that was down. GM's 2011 profit of \$4.58 per share was 62 percent higher than a year earlier.

GM also said 47,500 blue-collar workers in the U.S. will get \$7,000 profit-sharing checks in March. The checks are based on North American performance and are a record for the company.

That should please the auto workers including many from right here who work in Lordstown. That complex's Cruze has been widely embraced and emerged as a poster child for the resurgence of General Motors. The Lordstown work force merits praise. Our entire region desperately needs the economic buttress that Lordstown provides. It looks like that is in place. The GM bailout seems to be working across the country and right here in our own backyard. That is encouraging to see.

Time to tame federal beast

When the federal government was created, those who risked their lives and their fortunes and their scared honors to secede from England were animated by recent events. The government did not come into existence in a vacuum. Rather, those who led the Revolutionary War joined those who fought and financed it to create a central government that would be constitutionally incapable of doing to Americans what King George III and Parliament did to the colonists.

The king abridged many personal freedoms, but among them, religion and the right to keep income were at the top of the list, along with the freedom of speech and the right to be left alone. The reason that religious rights and property rights so animated the Founders is simple: They had been aggressively assaulted by the British government, and most of it had to do with money.

The king and Parliament imposed a tax on the colonists to support the king's church in England. And the king and Parliament imposed an obligation on the colonists to purchase the king's stamps and to affix them to all papers in their possession in America. The Stamp Act led to the invasion of the colonists' homes by British soldiers without warrants, ostensibly looking for the stamps. Both of these taxes led to the Revolution, and the bitter aftertaste they left behind, in turn, led to a firm determination on the part of those who wrote the Constitution to craft a document that would assure that the new government would be constitutionally incapable of similar behavior.

How well have the Framers' hopes and plans and constitutional craftsmanship worked out? Not very well. I have written six books about the violations of the Constitution that the government has gotten away with. The feds take your taxes and give it to folks who will vote for them. They even fine churches that fail to violate their core teachings on contraception. These are not light or fleeting issues.

Today, Americans who rely on government entitlements receive an average of \$32,700

worth of benefits every year. The average American's annual income after taxes — Americans who work, not those who receive benefits — is \$32,400. This is the first time in history that we have seen this inversion. I realize that this is just an average, but the numbers show, by a tiny amount, that the average recipient of entitlements has more disposable wealth than the average wage earner.

These entitlements cost the taxpayers about \$2.5 trillion per year. The federal government collects only \$2.5 trillion a year in revenue. So, the rest of the government — defense, justice, the goons in the TSA, national parks, even the Post Office — is paid for by borrowing. And most of the borrowing is paid for by the Federal Reserve printing cash. And that causes inflation, which decreases the purchasing power of your savings.

On top of all of this is Obamacare. That is the president's signature piece of legislation. It is the instrument by which the president is threatening to fine religious institutions — mostly Catholic — that dare not to pay for contraception health care coverage for their employees. That would be the same Obamacare that is forcing every person in America to buy health insurance. This brings us back to where we started historically: The last time the central government in America tried to force all Americans to buy something against their will, it was the king of England and his Stamp Act. And that fomented the Revolution.

You can see how far we have come from the freedom the Framers intended — and how far we need to travel to return. The federal government refuses to leave us alone. It taxes too much, borrows too much, regulates too much, gives away too much money and is in our faces over something as intimate as contraception.

We need a game changer in the White House, now more than ever.

Tea Party plots Senate takeover in November

The tea party isn't dead. It's just looking down ballot. While fiscal conservatives remain split over the GOP

the boot at the GOP state convention. Young conservative lawyer Mike Lee, who clerked for Supreme Court Justice Samuel Alito, went on to win the seat.

Now, young conservative entrepreneur and renowned state pension reformer Dan Liljenquist is taking on Utah's other big government Republican baron, 77-year-old Hatch. Liljenquist excelled in the private sector as a global management consultant and business strategist; he also helmed a privately owned call center company that grew from two to 1,500 employees since its 1995 founding. Liljenquist was elected to the Utah Senate in 2008, where he spearheaded state pension and Medicaid reforms that earned him the non-partisan *Governing* magazine's 2011 "Public Official of the Year" award.

The 36-year, six-term Hatch was first elected in 1976 on an anti-entrenched incumbent platform. Hatch's campaign line then against his opponent Frank Moss: "What do you call a Senator who's served in office for 18 years? You call him home."

Now, Hatch is clinging to power after almost four decades in government — and vainly attempting to claim the tea party mantle to stave off Liljenquist's David vs. Goliath primary challenge.

Hatch co-sponsored the \$6 billion national service boondoggle and dedicated it to his good friend Teddy Kennedy, with whom he also joined hands to create the ever-expanding SCHIP health care entitlement. He slobbered over corruptocrat Democratic Sen. Chris Dodd, supported tax cheat Treasury Secretary Tim Geithner from Day One, lavished praise on Joe Biden's manhood, and embraced and defended Attorney General Eric Holder's nomination because, he said, "I like Barack Obama, and I want to help him if I can."

In Indiana, another aging liberal Republican dinosaur is fighting for his political life by masquerading as a tea party standard-bearer. The six-term 79-year-old Sen. Dick Lugar — who prides himself on being Obama's favorite Republican — hasn't lived in his home state

since 1977. He supported the Obama stimulus law, job-killing environmental mandates and the taxpayer bailouts of Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, as well as the auto and banking industry bailouts.

Richard Mourdock, Indiana's former state treasurer, offers a fresh alternative with widespread support from both grassroots activists and local and state GOP officials. While others hedged their bets, Mourdock took the federal auto bailout head on, lodging a court complaint against the Chrysler bailout to expose its illegal abuse of shareholders and punitive impact on Indiana citizens. He was elected to the treasurer's office in 2006, a tough year for Republicans, and was re-elected handily in 2010. Before politics, he worked in the private sector for 30 years managing businesses in the energy, environmental and construction industries. He's never had a Beltway zip code.

In Texas, young attorney Ted Cruz is making waves in the GOP race to replace retiring GOP Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison. The former Texas solicitor

general is a 10th Amendment scholar who doesn't just speak the tea party's language. Cruz has put constitutional conservatism into action, winning many of the 40 cases he has argued in front of the Supreme Court. Cruz isn't afraid to challenge the GOP establishment. In 2008, he successfully battled the Bush administration and meddling globalists all the way to the high court to prevent international law from superseding American sovereignty.

The GOP needs just four seats to take control of the Senate. With inspired and inspiring free-market candidates like Dan Liljenquist, Richard Mourdock and Ted Cruz, 2012 bodes well for the tea party footprint on Capitol Hill. Remember: Entrenched incumbency is the disease. Fresh blood is the cure.

will be cited into mayor's court, eliminating the hassle of finding property owners, most of whom live outside the village, Rydarowicz noted.

Rydarowicz said currently he must cite into mayor's court the landlord for violations, but if the landlord lives outside of Leetonia, a police officer must deliver the citation or it must be delivered by certified mail. Since it is not feasible to hand deliver the citations long distances, he sends them by mail. The citations are then not accepted by the landlord and returned to his office unopened, he said.

There are over 30 outstanding citations at his office, he noted.

Council President Dan Summers, who noted that the police department has also expressed a need for the ordinance, asked that council sit down with Rydarowicz to address the issue in more depth.

This was the second time Brown has been accused in the newspaper of making improper comments, with the other alleged incident occurring in September 2010, when Brown served as director for the Johnny Appleseed Festival queen pageant. "At that time we expressed concerns about allegations against Mr. Brown. Although disturbed, we determined to reserve judgment until more facts were disclosed," Johnson said.

"In light of the recent disclosures it appears Mr. Brown has conducted himself in a manner inconsistent with the principles of the Democrat Party. Enough is enough. The executive board, in good conscience, can neither offer nor endorse Craig Brown as a candidate for public office," he added.

When contacted for this story, Brown decried the board's decision as an illegitimate action conducted by a small group of Myers supporters who are using the latest allegations as an opportunity to undermine his re-election efforts.

"This is the worst kind of politics. It's unfair, it's undemocratic ... This isn't a legal or legitimate endorsement in my opinion," he said.

The party's executive board, which met Wednesday night to endorse Myers, consists of all elected Democrat county officeholders plus at-large members appointed by the chairman. Brown said as an elected county official, he should have been notified but instead found out about it on his own and went to the meeting. He and his wife were allowed to stay for a portion of the meeting.

"I should have been allowed to stay and hear everything that was said," he said.

Brown said the endorsement issue should have been brought up before the central committee, which consists of the executive board and precinct committee members elected by Democrats.

Brown said politics is the real reason behind the decision, and he is being punished for not being a good party member. He said party leadership leaned on him to hire certain Democrats in his office, regardless of whether they were qualified, "and I bucked that pressure."

"I refuse to hire someone just because they put up signs for Linda Bolon, or whoever," he said, referring to the former state representative who is running for county treasurer. "This is politics as usual ..."

Johnson predicted in his news release that Brown would attribute their decision to politics "and will attempt to portray himself as the victim. He is not the victim, although real victims exist. As Democrats, we stand for good government. The people of Columbiana County should rightfully expect officeholders to be worthy of their trust, regardless of politics," he said.

Brown is upset the party would abandon him over these allegations without giving him a real chance to address the accusations, noting in the United States you are presumed to be innocent until proven guilty.

Brown pointed out he has been endorsed by the United Auto Workers in every election, including this year, and he also picked up the endorsement of the Citizens for Community Values, which describes itself as an organization that promotes Judeo-Christian moral values.

As for what impact the party's actions will have on the election, Brown said voters should judge him on how well he runs his office instead of what he described as unfounded allegations.

"If you look at the facts, there's no contest who is more qualified. That's why no one has attacked my record," he said.

Sergiy Matirniy not in court for hearing

LISBON — Sergiy Matirniy failed to appear Thursday in Columbiana County Municipal Court.

Matirniy is facing five charges stemming from a traffic stop on July 4, 2010. That traffic stop by a highway patrol trooper led to state Route 11 beings shut down after suspicious equipment was found in his vehicle.

Thursday, Judge Mark Frost issued a new bench warrant for Matirniy's arrest with a \$25,000 cash surety bond. Matirniy's attorney, Peter Horvath, indicated to Frost his client will appear today.

"Your client's word he will be here is not exactly credible," Frost said.

Matirniy was due for a final pre-trial prior to his court trial, which was scheduled for Feb. 22. Assistant Prosecutor Don Humphrey requested the jury trial be postponed. Humphrey said he does not now have enough time to issue all the subpoenas for law enforcement witnesses in time for the trial without knowing for sure if Matirniy will appear.

Frost canceled the trial and instead set a hearing for Feb. 28, where he will consider either revoking Matirniy's previous bond of 10 percent of \$5,000 or another court trial date will be set. Horvath indicated that he intends to request a trial by jury instead of a trial before the judge.

Matirniy failed to appear before, but that was when he was incarcerat-

ed in Florida on charges involving a suspected meth lab in the backyard of a home owned by his girlfriend's mother. However, once he was released from jail, Matirniy did begin appearing again on the charges in Ohio.

To clear up a glitch, Frost withdrew a \$50,000 cash surety warrant before Matirniy's hearing. The warrant had remained in the sheriff department's system from Matirniy's failing to appear during the Florida incarceration.

Matirniy, whose last known address is 217 Juniper Drive, Moon Township, Pa., is charged with speeding, obstruction of official business, carrying a concealed weapon and two counts of drug paraphernalia. djohnson@mojonews.com

Evaluation: Man charged in beating knew actions wrong

LISBON — Joseph Eltringham, the man accused of beating and attempting to rob a World War II veteran, knew the wrongness of his actions that night in August according to a psychiatric evaluator, according to a report challenged in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court Thursday.

Joseph Eltringham, 44, is charged with aggravated robbery, a first degree felony; felonious assault, a second degree felony; and intimidation, a third degree felony. He is scheduled for jury trial on March 12.

Defense attorney Richard Hura filed a motion before Judge Scott Washam requesting a second opinion. Hura said documents show the evalu-

ator signed in and out of the jail in about an hour and 15 minutes. That includes time for the jail warden to go and get Eltringham from his cell after the evaluator arrived, Hura said. He questioned whether that was enough time to make a proper evaluation.

Hura said he objected to the report and Eltringham, who has served overseas and spent most of his adult life in the military, needed a Post Traumatic Stress Disorder expert to provide an evaluation.

Washam disagreed, noting his research has shown Ohio does not recognize any diminished capacity defense with the exception of not guilty by reason of insanity. In his opinion, PTSD would be a diminished capacity defense.

Instead, Washam said the current

evaluator determined Eltringham was not insane and Hura was welcome to challenge that decision by filing a motion for a second opinion on his client's sanity. However, he also noted that if Hura continues to use a not guilty by reason of insanity defense, that would also require the defense to release the medical records Assistant Prosecutor Ryan Weikart has been requesting.

Weikart agreed with Washam that the diminished capacity defense is not allowed. However, he also defended the psychologist who performed the initial evaluation as competent.

Washam gave Hura until Feb. 21 to speak with Eltringham and make decisions about whether to continue an insanity defense.

Hum said, "We'll have to see where it's going."

Trustee Barry Miner said he's wrestled with the issue too but noted, "We also have a fiduciary responsibility."

He noted the township has waited, but cautioned against waiting too long.

Bell said two bad things can happen — water can get into a well and the driller can come up with a dry well.

Miner said he would contact the DPS representatives to attend the March 1 meeting.

In other business, Miner distributed a punch list after conducting a field review for work needed on Beeson Mill Road where drilling-related road work was performed by the drilling company.

"There's a lot that still has to be done," Miner said, explaining he provided the company, Chesapeake Energy Shale Operations (CESO), with a copy of the list which includes additional top base coating; an apron with number 304 limestone; and low shoulder signs need to be installed at both ends for elevation changes.

In other business, trustees unanimously approved an agreement to hire Wendy Moeller on an on-call basis for supplemental zoning review services.

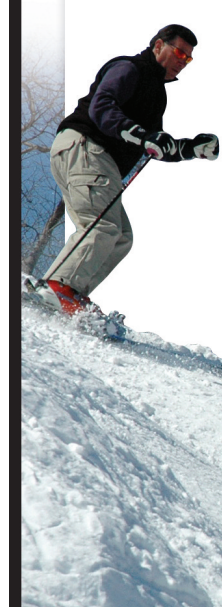

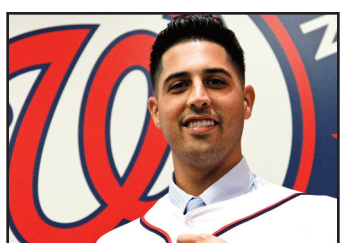

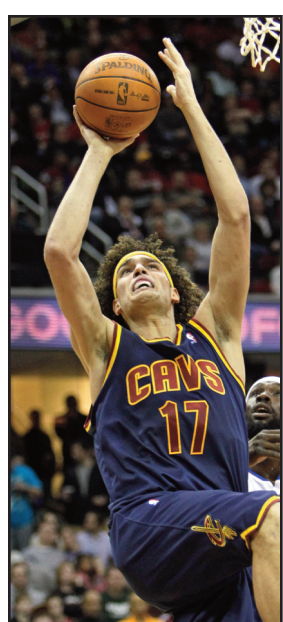

Daytona debut

Danica Patrick is in the spotlight at Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — The buildup for Danica Patrick's first Daytona 500 began in earnest at Thursday's annual media day, where auto racing's sweetheart was saddled with a full schedule of commitments.

Patrick was shuffled from interview to interview, answering questions and shooting promotions for her first full season in NASCAR. She couldn't even



find solitude in the bathroom: an autograph seeker followed Patrick inside and patiently waited for the driver's signature.

Patrick will make her Sprint Cup Series debut in the Feb. 26 season-opening Daytona 500. It's the first of 10 races this year at NASCAR's top level driving for three-time champion Tony Stewart.

She's also racing for the championship in the second-tier Nationwide Series for JR Motorsports.

Her defection from the IndyCar Series is complete, and Patrick will be the center of the spotlight for Speedweeks at Daytona. She's fine with it, though, as seven years of running the Indianapolis 500 taught her how to handle intense attention.

"I think that if I had not experienced

Daytona win hasn't led to full-time ride for Bayne

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — A year later, Trevor Bayne still can't quite believe the whirlwind of instant notoriety that followed his wild Daytona 500 victory.

Bayne fondly recalls taking a congratulatory phone call from

Vice President Joe Biden, meeting a

list of celebrities that included Pamela Anderson, and talking to an athlete he's often compared with, Tim Tebow.

What all that newfound fame hasn't done for Bayne, though, is get him a full-time ride in NASCAR's Sprint Cup series or a guaranteed starting spot in this year's Daytona 500. Bayne's team, Wood Brothers Racing, currently plans to run him in 14 Sprint Cup series races this season. For now, at least, he doesn't have a full-time Nationwide Series ride either.

"It's OK," Bayne said at Thursday's media day at Daytona International Speedway. "We're just making the best of what we've got right now and it's tough to do that when you only have a few races. For me, I'm running about the same schedule I ran in Cup last year. It's kind of one a month with the 21 car, but in Nationwide I had hoped to run a full season this year and run for a championship. Obviously, as a young guy

No. 9 Lady Buckeyes breeze to win

Ohio State hands Indiana its 13th-straight loss

COLUMBUS — Taylor Hill said for a while her Ohio State teammates were trying too hard to "be a Sam."

Then, after getting accustomed to being without Big Ten scoring leader Samantha Prahalis, the ninth-ranked Buckeyes settled down and took off.

Hill scored 27 points and the Buckeyes never trailed in

handing Indiana its 13th straight loss, 75-54 on Thursday night, despite not having Prahalis, who was out with the flu.

"We had some people trying to make the plays, trying to be a Sam," said Hill, who went 7 for 8 from 3-point range. "But if we just make the simple plays, the layups and the open shots will come."

Averaging 21.8 points in conference play along with being one of the nation's assist leaders with 6.7 a game, Prahalis was a huge loss. She had hit for 77 points over the last three games.

Prahalis had started the last 48 games for the Buckeyes and had been in the starting lineup in 126 of her 127 career games.

Still, the Buckeyes adapted.

"She didn't participate in shootaround this morning and did some things through the course of the day to try to be ready. But she was just too drained. There was no juice there," coach Jim Foster said of Prahalis, who spent the first few minutes of the game on the bench before going home. "Other people had to step up a little

all the media crazy around this whole part of things it would have been somewhat overwhelming," she said. "My whole (public relations) team knows how it works and how to organize everything so it's done effectively and efficiently.

"But I feel good — let's not forget I've been exposed to the Indy 500, which is one of the biggest races in the world, if not the biggest race in the world, and there's lots of media around that, too, and lots of hype."

NASCAR has been anxiously awaiting Patrick's move to stock cars because, as one of the most recognized athletes in the world,

she'll bring attention to the series. Research shows she's already increased interest:

— According to The Nielsen Company, ratings for the 2010 Nationwide Series opener at Daytona were up 33 percent with her in the race from the 2009 ratings.

— Overall, 11 of the 13 Nationwide races Patrick ran in 2010 had better ratings than the 2009 events. Average viewership for her 13 events was up 9 percent.

— Patrick's merchandise sales last season ranked in the top 15 best-selling drivers at the NASCAR.com Superstore.

— Through last week, Patrick already ranked in the top 10 in merchandise sales in 2012.

— A survey last August of the NASCAR Fan Council

showed that 80 percent of those polled agreed with the statement, "Danica Patrick is good for NASCAR."

— Nielsen N-Score data through January showed that Patrick ranks in the top 5 of most recognized NASCAR drivers among the U.S. population.

"There's so much interest with Danica coming over to NASCAR, I think it's going to really broaden our fan base," Lesa France Kennedy, the CEO of NASCAR sister company International Speedway Corp., said last month.

"When she shows up, it just has a different feel to it. She's a real dynamic individual to start with and I think it'll be interesting to see her compete on the track. There's certainly a spotlight,

without a doubt, but she seems to do well with that. She seems to do well under pressure."

Patrick said she's prepared for the workload leading into the Daytona 500, and with the increased schedule in NASCAR. The IndyCar season was just 18 races; the Nationwide schedule is 33 races and next year, when she moves full time to the Sprint Cup Series, she'll have races on 38 weekends.

Dabbling in the Nationwide Series the past two years has prepared her for what to expect.

"Back a few years ago, I definitely was concerned with the work load that NASCAR schedules bring," she said. "But the last two years, I went from doing a 16-18 race season to about

you want to have championships under your belt and full seasons."

The Feb. 26 Daytona 500 is on Bayne's limited schedule, but he doesn't have one of the starting spots guaranteed to the top 35 teams in points from last season. He says they don't plan on trying to buy a guaranteed spot from another team — so he'll have earn a spot in Sunday's qualifying or Thursday's qualifying races.

Bayne doesn't have a full-time ride in the Nationwide series, either. Roush Fenway Racing plans to run him in the first three races of the season, hoping to attract potential sponsors with good results and run more races.

"I still haven't spent a whole full season with one

team yet in Nationwide, and I think that would be great to have that opportunity," Bayne said. "But, right now, we're going to run the first three races and kind of see where we stand, work on sponsorship deals. It just shows how tough it is right now. Here we are at Roush Fenway Racing with great things to offer and it's still tough for us, so we're working really hard at that."

Bayne certainly hoped his Daytona 500 win would catapult him into a full-time ride right away, but he's remaining patient for now.

"It's almost like being a part of the family there," Bayne said of the Wood Brothers team. "I think for this point in my career the Wood Brothers is the best place for me to be. If we could run full-time, that would be better, but I enjoy that family and just the sup-

port that they give me."

NASCAR veteran Michael Waltrip sees Bayne's struggle to secure a full-time ride is another sign of a sluggish economy.

"It's not just NASCAR, it's how difficult things are today," Waltrip said. "Trevor's a sharp young man, very well-spoken, good-looking kid and got a great heart. Can drive the heck out of the car and just didn't get the opportunity, hasn't had the opportunity to do it full time yet."

But trying to refine his driving skills while running a limited schedule wasn't the only challenge Bayne faced last year. He missed several weeks after being diagnosed with a mystery ailment that turned out to be Lyme disease. Sitting out those races, Bayne said, made him realize "how much you appreciate being

here."

Bayne says he's feeling fine now, good enough to take a mission trip to Kenya in the offseason.

"What's wild about people in Kenya is like no matter who are, if you're from out of town or an American and you show up on their front porch, they're pulling out chairs and trying to give you food at their little mud huts," Bayne said. "They're incredible people, so I would tell anybody they should go check it out because, to me, it was humbling. These people don't have hardly anything and here they are, their kids are so happy. They've got their bellies sticking out because they're malnourished and stuff, but they're the most pumped kids in the world to be alive. It was an incredible experience."

Bayne, a Baptist, wants to

use his racing success as a platform to talk about his religious faith — leading to frequent comparisons with Tebow.

The two still occasionally text, and Bayne says it has been tough for him to watch Tebow get criticized for voicing his beliefs.

"It's tough," Bayne said. "But it says that we're going to have criticism and persecution and stuff, so I'm good with it and we'll just not let it change us, I guess."

But while the parallels between Bayne and Tebow are apparent, Bayne isn't necessarily the right guy to ask about the sports world's latest surprise sensation, New York Knicks guard Jeremy Lin.

Before saying a few nice words about Lin's success, Bayne had to double check.

"That's basketball, right?" Bayne said with a laugh.

Miami.

Asked if he could play for the Cavs again, James initially paused before giving his answer.

"I don't know. I think it would be great," he said. "It would be fun to play in front of these fans again. I had a lot fun times in my seven years here. You can't predict the future and hopefully I continue to stay healthy. I'm here as a Miami Heat player, and I'm happy where I am now, but I don't rule that out in no sense.

"And if I decide to come back, hopefully the fans will accept me."

James' comments may have been calculated, coming one day before the Cavs host the Heat for the third time since the superstar's infamous and messy exit from Cleveland. In mentioning a possible reunion, he may be trying to soften the negative response he'll get Friday night from fans who haven't forgotten what he did to them.

However, James appeared sincere when talking about a potential return to the Cavs, his fractured relationship with Cavs owner Dan Gilbert

and topics ranging from phenom Jeremy Lin to rookie Kyrie Irving following practice on the fourth floor of Quicken Loans Arena.

Perhaps it was because he was back in familiar surroundings that prompted James' remarks. Or maybe it's part of a larger agenda. Whatever the case, his past with Cleveland, and his decision to bolt from the Cavs, will always be a sensitive subject.

After all, James put Cleveland back on the NBA map by taking the Cavs to one finals and winning two MVP awards during his stay. He left the franchise during a summer in which he held an entire city at bay as it awaited his decision. After he announced he was joining the Heat during a nationally televised special, the Akron native was vilified by the same fans who cheered every one of his dribbles and dunks.

Time has healed some of the wounds — not all.

James said he has made no attempt to patch things up with Gilbert, who harshly criticized James in a scathing letter to Cleveland's fans. Gilbert promised to win a title before James, questioned his character and told The Associated Press he

felt James quit on the Cavs during the playoffs.

James said he has no bitterness toward Gilbert. They have not spoken since James met with the Cavaliers on July 3, 2010, when they were one of several teams courting him to sign with them.

"I don't have any hard feelings. He said what he said and I've moved on," said James, who is under contract with the Heat for two more seasons. "But there's been no attempt to patch things up."

James, however, said he can envision being friends again with Gilbert.

"I don't hold grudges," he said. "I hold them a little bit, but I don't hold them that long. He said what he said out of anger and he would probably want to take that back. But I made a mistake, too, and there are some things I would want to take back as well.

"You make mistakes and move on."

But could he play for Gilbert?

"Dan is not the coach," he said. "I can play for any coach. We'll see what happens."

Attempts to reach Gilbert were unsuccessful.

It wasn't clear if by "mis-

take" James meant the way he announced his departure from Cleveland or joining the Heat. He insists he's happy in South Florida and committed to winning a title with the Heat, who are favored to win it all this season after losing to Dallas in the finals last June.

James acknowledged he's changed and enjoying hoops the way he once did.

"I'm back to how I was in Cleveland, having fun with the game, appreciating the game, loving the game and playing at a high level," he said. "I got away from that last year. It was a difficult year for me last year, making the whole transition, on and off the floor, going through everything I went through."

"I just got back to how I got to this point, back to playing the way I know how to play."

James' comments about a return to Cleveland — albeit unlikely — caught former teammate Antawn Jamison off guard.

"It surprises me that he's saying that now," said Jamison, who played 25 games with James in 2010 after coming over in a trade. "Three years down the road it wouldn't surprise me if he entertains the idea. But hey, after the first go-round, I

don't think anything would surprise you as far as scenarios taking place."

Cavs guard Daniel Gibson can't envision Cleveland fans ever receiving James warmly again.

He may have moved on. They haven't.

"I don't think he'd be welcome," Gibson said. "Not with the way that went down. It was a pretty tough situation. I'm sure they wouldn't feel comfortable with that at all."

James knows what's coming on Friday. He's prepared for a rough reception, but not as hostile as the one the seven-time All-Star got on Dec. 2 last season. James expects to hear boos, but maybe not as many obscenities.

"It doesn't sting anymore," James said. "The booing isn't as bad as it was last year so it's not even a big deal."

James' comments about a hypothetical return to Cleveland didn't surprise teammate Dwyane Wade, his running mate in Miami.

Even Wade, who stayed with James at his home Bath, Ohio, could imagine his friend reuniting with the Cavs — some day.

"Anything is possible," Wade said. "Hopefully, I'm retired."

Raises slow for players in arbitration

Pirates' Casey McGhee agrees to 1-year deal

among players agreeing to one-year contracts, an eight-fold increase from \$465,000 to \$3.9 million.

Just 11 players received multiyear contracts, down from 14 last year and the fewest since nine in 2004.

The only players whose salaries went down were Milwaukee reliever Francisco Rodriguez, who went from an average of \$12.7 million in a three-year contract to \$8 million; and Chicago Cubs third baseman Ian Stewart, who dropped \$50,000 to \$2,237,500.

The average of this year's group rose from \$1.95 million to \$3.7 million, while the average for the 119 players in arbitration last winter increased from \$1.68 million to \$3.76 million. The total of players in arbitration this year were the most since 150 in 1992.

For multiyear contracts, figures include average annual values. For 2011, earned bonuses were included.

About a half-dozen more players will become eligible for arbitration next year, when eligibility increases

slightly for players with two to three years of major league service, from the top 17 percent by service time to the top 22 percent. They join unsigned players with at least three, but less than six years of service.

Pittsburgh defeated Garrett Jones in the final decision Thursday, and the outfielder will receive the team's offer of \$2.25 million rather than his request for \$2.5 million.

Teams finished with a 5-2 advantage in arbitration decisions this year, their 14th winning record in 16 years. The seven hearings were more than double the total last year, when players won two of three cases.

Both players who won this year were on the Miami Marlins: pitcher Anibal Sanchez and infielder-outfielder Emilio Bonifacio.

In addition to Jones, four pitchers lost in arbitration: Washington's John Lannan, Tampa Bay's Jeff Niemann, Milwaukee's Jose Veras and Baltimore's Brad Bergesen.

Overall, owners lead 291-214 since arbitration began in 1974.

Pirates third baseman Casey McGhee, who had been the last player scheduled for a hearing, agreed to a one-year deal for \$2,537,500 — the midpoint between his request for \$2,725,000 and the team's \$2.35 million offer.

Hall of Fame catcher Gary Carter dies at 57

NEW YORK (AP) — Gary Carter was nicknamed "Kid" for good reason.

His smile, bubbly personality and eagerness to excel on a ballfield made him a joy to watch at the plate and behind it.

Even his Hall of Fame bronze plaque at Cooperstown shows him with a toothy grin — the Kid forever.

The star catcher, whose single for the New York Mets in the 1986 World Series touched off one of the most improbable rallies in baseball, died Thursday. He was 57.

Carter was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor last May, two weeks after finishing his second season as coach at Palm Beach Atlantic University. Mets spokesman Jay Horwitz said Carter died at a hospice in the West Palm Beach, Fla., area.

"I am deeply saddened to tell you all that my precious dad went to be with Jesus today at 4:10 p.m.," Carter's daughter Kimmy Bloemers wrote on the family website. "This is the most difficult thing I have ever had to write in my entire life but I wanted you all to know."

Carter was an 11-time All-Star and three-time Gold Glove winner. His bottom-of-the-10th single in Game 6 of the 1986 Series helped the Mets mount a charge against the Boston Red Sox and eventually beat them.

With curly, blond locks flaring out from beneath his helmet, and a rigid, upright batting stance, Carter was immediately recognizable. And anyone who watched Carter recognized his zest.

"Nobody loved the game of baseball more than Gary Carter. Nobody enjoyed playing the game of baseball more than Gary Carter. He wore his heart on his sleeve every inning he played," Mets Hall of Fame pitcher Tom Seaver said.

After Carter's diagnosis, the Mets began playing a highlight reel of his accomplishments on the video board during games at Citi Field and posted this message: "Our thoughts are with you Gary. From your millions of fans and the New York Mets."

Delle Donne has 42 as Delaware women top Hofstra

HEMPSTEAD, N.Y. (AP) — Elena Delle Donne had a season-high 42 points, including the 2,000th of her career, and added 14 rebounds and six blocks to help No. 10 Delaware beat Hofstra 89-79 on Thursday night.

Delaware (23-1, 14-0 Colonial Athletic Association) used a 15-2 run spanning halftime to take control of the game. Delle Donne, who leads the nation with 28 points a game, had nine points during the burst — including a tough bank shot that capped the spree and made it 50-41.

She hit a pretty 3-pointer from the top of the key a few minutes later to cross the 2,000-point milestone and give the Blue Hens a 59-48 lead. The 6-foot-5 junior scored 14 straight points to help keep Hofstra (17-8, 9-5) from getting any closer than six the rest of the way.

Candice Bellocchio and Katelyn Loper scored 21 points each to lead the Pride. Loper returned after missing the last two games because of a concussion.

The Blue Hens continued their ascent up the Top 25, earning their highest ever ranking Monday. Delaware has won 13 straight games since its lone loss of the season to Maryland.

Delle Donne has been the main reason for the success. She has feasted on Hofstra this season, scoring 41 points and grabbing 15 rebounds in the first meeting between the teams three weeks earlier. She's now had four 40-point games this season.

No. 7 Michigan State beats No. 15 Wisconsin

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Draymond Green had 20 points and 10 rebounds, Keith Appling scored 20 points and No. 7 Michigan State beat No. 15 Wisconsin 69-55 on Thursday night to move back into a first-place tie with No. 6 Ohio State.

The Spartans (21-5, 10-3 Big Ten) have won four straight — the longest active streak in the conference — and six of their last seven games.

The Badgers (19-7, 8-5) had won seven of their last eight, including their previous four road games, after opening the Big Ten season with three straight losses.

Appling's three-point play with 5:24 left in the first half capped a 14-0 run that gave Michigan State a 22-12 lead.

Wisconsin's Jordan Taylor missed 10 of his 13 shots and was held to 13 points.

Report: Manning had additional neck surgery

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Peyton Manning reportedly had three surgeries last year, not two, as the Colts originally said, according to a new report.

SL.com, citing anonymous league sources, reported Wednesday that Manning had a previously unknown procedure between his May surgery and the September surgery that ended his season.

The report says the same doctor who performed the fusion in California did not perform either of the previous two surgeries.

It was believed Manning had undergone three neck procedures in a 19-month span that ended in September. According to the report, it was actually four.

The report also says Manning may have bone spurs in the neck and could require more surgery.

Neither Manning's agent, Tom Condon, nor Colts owner Jim Irsay responded to interview requests left by The Associated Press on Wednesday.

PSU's O'Brien promises team will make fans proud

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (AP) — New Penn State football coach Bill O'Brien received a rousing ovation when he and his coaching staff were introduced at halftime of the school's men's basketball game against Iowa.

Wearing a blue Penn State sweatshirt, O'Brien thanked the fans for welcoming him to Happy Valley. He's in his second full week as coach since returning from the Super Bowl, where he finished up as offensive coordinator for the New England Patriots.

O'Brien said he's not one to make many promises, though he guaranteed his team would make Penn State fans proud come fall.

The 2012 campaign will be O'Brien's rookie season as a head coach. He succeeded the late Joe Paterno, who was ousted in November in the aftermath of child sexual abuse charges against a retired assistant coach.

Mickelson returns to the top of leaderboard

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Four days after his big win at Pebble Beach, Phil Mickelson keeps right on rolling.

Mickelson hit driver off the deck from just under 300 yards on the par-5 11th that led to a two-putt birdie, and he ended a gorgeous afternoon Thursday at Riviera by chipping in from 35 feet for birdie. That gave him a 5-under 66 and a one-shot lead in the Northern Trust Open.

Dating to the back nine of his second round at the Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, Mickelson has made birdie or eagle on one-third of the holes he has played. And his streak of consecutive holes without a bogey finally ended at 49 on the par-3 16th.

No matter. He looked good with the putter and with his low, penetrating tee shots that he kept below the tree line on a windy day that prevented low scoring.

J.B. Holmes, in his fourth tournament since returning from brain surgery in September, played his final six holes without a par. His round ended with a 315-yard tee shot — a big drive in the cool air of Los Angeles in February — and an approach to 8 feet for birdie at No. 9, the second-toughest hole at Riviera.

That gave him a 4-under 67. He was tied with Hunter Mahan, whose 35-foot birdie at No. 5 sent him on a string of four straight birdies.

They all played in the afternoon, when the wind began to die late in the day.

Jonathan Byrd, who faced the chilly, blustery conditions of the morning, had a 68. He was joined by Carl Pettersson.

The first round was suspended by darkness with 30 players yet to finish the round, a typical occurrence at this tournament with 144-

man field and limited daylight.

Mickelson is coming off an 8-under 64 in the final round at Pebble Beach, where he rallied from a six-shot deficit — and beat playing partner Tiger Woods by 11 shots — to change the outlook on his West Coast Swing. Riviera is his final tournament before the tour moves to Florida, and even on a different golf course, not much has changed.

He holed a 30-foot birdie putt on the long par-3 fourth hole, and then really got going on the back nine.

After a tough pitch to 12 feet that led to birdie on the 10th, Mickelson had 297 yards to the hole on the 11th and decided to hit driver, a shot he had not tried in months.

It came off perfectly and climbed onto the front edge of the green, making Mickelson the only player to have an eagle putt on the 587-yard hole, which played right into the wind. The pin was all the way back, away from a large hump in the putting surface, which gave Mickelson the green light.

His eagle putt from 60 feet died next to the hole.

"I didn't think it was going to necessarily be reachable into that wind, but I was able to hit a low drive off the tee that scooted along the ground, and I felt like if I could hit one more of those with a driver I could get right up by the green," Mickelson said. "I felt like it was worth the risk to try to scoop one up."

The chip-in from behind the 18th was a bonus.

Mickelson made his lone bogey when his chip behind the 16th green ran 7 feet past the cup, and he missed the putt. On the 17th, his wedge rolled back to 7 feet for birdie, but the putt slid by on the left.

Cleaning a windshield

Dear Heloise: I can't seem to CLEAN MY AUTO WINDSHIELD. I have tried vinegar and ammonia, to no avail. When the morning sun hits the glass, I cannot see out. Any suggestions? — **J.H., via email**

Cleaning the windshield is important, because you do need to see out! Heloise Central checked a few automobile owners manuals and spoke with an auto detailer. They all recommend using ordinary household window cleaner, with a soft cloth, followed by drying with a microfiber cloth. This works for both inside and outside the vehicle, and is best to remove smoke and dust film. If possible, leave windows open to circulate the air. Don't use chlorine-based and disinfectant-type cleaners. They can damage defoggers, electrical conductors and radio antenna pieces. — **Heloise**
