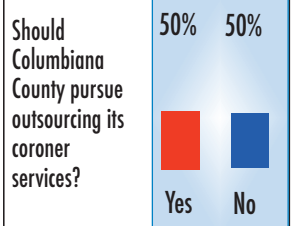

## Students live part of Ohio history

COLUMBIANA — Famous Ohioans such as Annie Oakley, Salem's barefoot kicker Rich Karlis, rock-n-roll icon Alan Freed, astronauts John Glenn and Neil Armstrong and others lined the halls and gym at Joshua Dixon Elementary School Friday.

At least that's what fourth graders tried to convey as they played the parts of the familiar and the less familiar who hailed from the Buckeye state as part of the first Famous Ohioans Living Museum at Joshua Dixon.

"I think they're doing a fantastic job. They've



worked really hard. They learned a lot about the different contributions Ohioans have made to the world," fourth grade teacher Melanie Strohecker said.

Strohecker and fellow fourth grade teachers Julie McClish and Raeann Gorby worked with their students on the project, providing them with a list of famous Ohioans and instructing them to pick one to study

and become for the museum.

Students had to learn about the person they chose and write a speech to educate others about the person. They also had to come up with a costume and were allowed to use props to authenticate the look.

The list of famous Ohioans played by the 73 students included everything from inventors and

business titans to presidents and professional athletes, actors and musicians, war heroes and pioneers of space travel.

McClish explained that students are supposed to learn about inventors and famous people from Ohio, so they combined biographies with social studies and came up with the living museum project, which the students

## Todd's statements retracted in murder case

LISBON — Assistant Prosecutor Timothy McNicol said Friday portions of statements made by Miranda Todd to Salem Police officers and other authorities in 2010 can be retracted during the case.

The 24-year-old Salem woman faces charges of murder, child endangering and involuntary manslaughter following the July 2010 death of her 7-month-old son, Derek A. Dennison. A court trial is set for March 5.

Her attorney, Jennifer Gorby, had initially requested entire statements made by Todd to investigators on five separate occasions be thrown out, but Judge Scott Washam denied that request in December on the basis that Todd was adequately advised of her rights and gave the statements voluntarily.

During a status conference on Friday Gorby said there are six or seven statements in which a portion of the statement should be retracted.

McNichol said he and Prosecutor Tammy Jones have reviewed the statements and have no objections to the requested retractions, although there are three or four areas in which they and Gorby may not agree.

McNichol said prosecutors may file any objections they have at the next status hearing, which was set for 11 a.m. March 2.

Neither side presented testimony for the requested retractions on Friday, and Washam ordered McNichol and Jones to respond to Gorby's request by Feb. 29.

Gorby also told Washam, McNichol and Jones she is still waiting to receive state records pertaining to child support enforcement. She said she has not yet received the records due to technological difficulty on the state's part.

Washam told her to request the records in paper format as opposed to disk format in order to have them by the next conference.

## Utilities commission OKs seismic testing on city-owned land

The city Utilities Commission gave permission for seismic testing on 530 acres of city-owned land to a company trying to map out the oil and gas reserves under the surface.

Mike Brazil of Cougar Land Services, a company with an office in Alliance, explained the project to commission members earlier this week. He had already made a presentation to city council after approaching Mayor John Berlin.

He's been making the rounds at local township meetings and with Columbiana County officials, get-

ting permits to use vibe trucks on some of the roads on the north and west side of the county. Vibe trucks bang on the road to send vibrations into the surface with the returning waves recorded as they bounce off the layers underneath.

The total project covers 409 square miles from Salem to Alliance to Minerva and Carrollton.

Brazil explained that source points are placed about 1,300 feet apart, with charges placed in the source points and then set off on properties where they have per-

mission to enter. Using geophones placed on the surface, which pick up the vibrations from the sonar in the ground, patterns can be seen of what's underneath the ground and the locations of oil and gas can be mapped out.

The companies involved with the work have already been consulting with Utilities Superintendent Don Weingart and Assistant Superintendent Matt Hoopes on where they can and can't place source points. Normally the source points can not be placed within 300 feet of a house or well or other structure, but in this case, Weingart said the distance parameter

has been widened to 500 feet. They're also staying away from the water plant and reservoir.

In places where the source points and charges can't be used, Brazil said they'll use geophones only.

Testing is scheduled to begin April 1 on U.S. Route 62 and he said they work seven days a week, but mostly from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Representatives of Cougar Land Services are working with area landowners and talking to them so they know when they're coming, he said.

worked on for about three weeks.

"I think they understand how people have impacted what we have today, how these people helped shaped Ohio," she said.

Some of the people students chose for their projects hailed from their own backyard and general area, people such as Harvey Firestone of tire fame who is the namesake for Firestone Park in Columbiana. The list included a pair with Salem ties, former barefoot Denver Broncos kicker Rich Karlis and Alan Freed, the disc jockey credited with coining the phrase "rock & roll."

"People can be from small towns like Columbiana and go on to do great things," Strohecker said.

Former Notre Dame football coach Lou Holtz was born in East Liverpool in southern Columbiana County and still visits from time to time, with the Lou Holtz Upper Ohio Valley Hall of Fame recognizing the accomplishments of Upper Ohio Valley natives.

Another famous football player with local ties who made the list was Larry Csonka. Csonka was born in nearby Stow and maintains a farm in Lisbon where he sometimes lives and where his brother, Joe, lives. The Hall of Fame running back played for the Miami Dolphins and helped lead the team to two Super Bowls in the 1970s, being named the Super Bowl MVP of Super Bowl VIII.

Some of the famous names from the Youngstown area included boxer Ray "Boom Boom" Mancini, former congressman Jim Traficant and Denise DeBartolo York, who owns the San Francisco 49ers.

In the world of entertainment, the list included Oscar winner Halle Berry, the late entertainer Bob Hope, actress Sarah Jessica Parker, director Steven Spielberg and singer/musician/songwriter Dave Grohl of the Foo Fighters, who was born in Warren.

Ohio was also home to famous inventors Thomas Edison and Orville and Wilbur Wright and to James Spangler, who invented the first portable vacuum cleaner.

Police say mom injected teens with heroin

LAURELVILLE (AP) — Authorities say an Ohio mother has been arrested on charges accusing her of injecting her teenage children with heroin before sending them to school.

The Hocking County Sheriff’s Office says 35-five-year-old Shantel Parker, of Laurelville, was arrested Friday at Ohio State University hospital on warrants charging her with two counts each of felonious assault, corrupting another with drugs and endangering children.

Investigators say Parker has been providing heroin and other drugs to her children, ages 14 and 16, for several months.

The teens have been placed with the county children’s services agency. Parker was to be jailed in Franklin County to await a hearing and transport to Hocking County. She was in custody and couldn’t immediately comment.

The Logan Daily News reports Parker had studied nursing from 2008 to 2010.

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Career Center hires maintenance chief

LISBON — The Columbiana County Career and Technical Center said good-bye to John Garwood and hired his replacement, long-time United Local employee David Starcher on Tuesday evening.

Garwood had worked as a teacher for the Career Center for four years and served as the maintenance supervisor for another four and a half years. Most recently he was the one who oversaw the construction project, which remodeled the building's heating and cooling system, added restrooms and created the new health sciences wing at the Career Center.

"We are sad to lose John," Superintendent Chuck Adkins said. "He has taken a job in the private sector."

Adkins continued the board is fortunate to get Starcher, who has served as the buildings and grounds supervisor at United Local for the past 15 and a half years. Starcher has 32 years of experience with that district, including involvement in renovation projects.

That will be important as the Career Center proceeds with the next planned project, the renovation and expansion of the welding labs. A meeting was recently held with prospective contactors to go over the engineering and architectural plans for the project. The bids are due by 11 a.m. Feb. 29.

Adkins said plan is to get the work started shortly and complete it prior to next school year. First empty space which once housed the old health academy classes will be remodeled for welding classes. Then the current welding classes will be moved into the new space while the current space also is remodeled.

By doubling the space, there is also hope to double the size of the welding program at the school. Adkins said currently there are 25 juniors and 25 seniors studying welding in the labs. However, for next school year the plan is to increase that number to 50 juniors starting the program, which will also include chemistry and automated materials joining.

Adkins believes there will be plenty of students for the program. They have already received more than 60 applications for the 50 spaces and it is still early in the application process.

Adkins added many of the programs at the Career Center are on the rise. He believes it is a combination of the economy and the reputations of the programs available there, programs that often allow students to move on to college coursework after completion of their high school years.

In other matters:

— Thanks to a switch in insurance programs last year, the district received a self-insurance refund check for \$650,000 and saved an additional \$300,000 in premiums. ## Common sense prevails in appeal on party noise

Too frequently it seems government, and that includes the courts, has abandoned the guiding light by which most of us live: common sense. Thank heaven the Ohio Supreme Court based a ruling squarely on it this week.

A Wayne County resident challenged the state's disorderly conduct statute, claiming its provisions — specifically on loud noise — were unconstitutionally vague. The man had been arrested after, during a Halloween party, he refused three times to turn down loud music his neighbors had reported to police.

State Supreme Court justices rejected the man's claim. The law is clear enough, they decided. It bans "recklessly causing inconvenience, annoyance or alarm to another by ... making excessive noise."

Justices decided, in effect, that people "of ordinary intelligence" can define "excessive."

Of course they can. If noise is loud enough to prompt someone to call the police, who agree with that judgment, it is excessive.

This isn't a license to use the statute as an excuse to harass others, of course. Remember, law enforcement officers have to be convinced noise is excessive, too.

But it is a blow for common sense. The court is to be commended for it.

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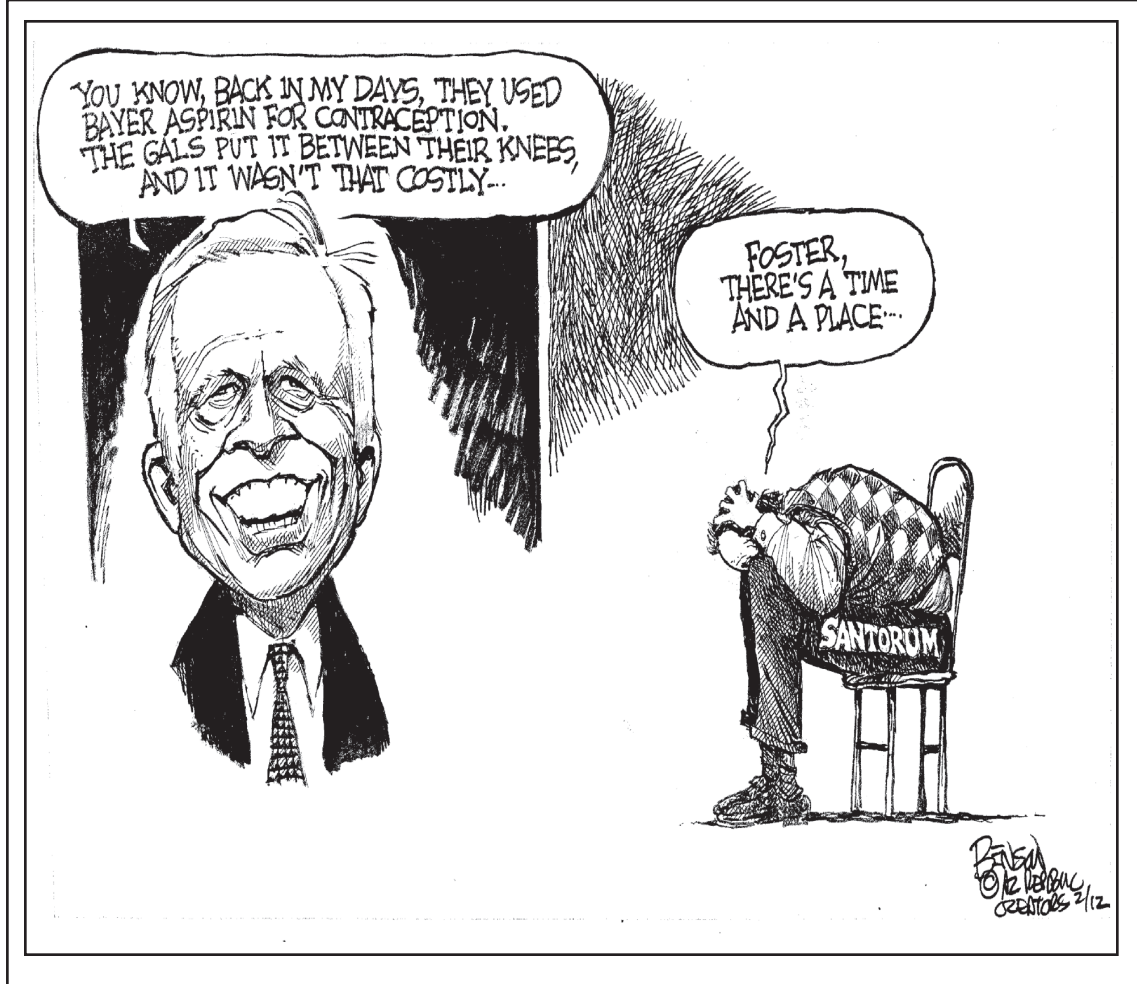
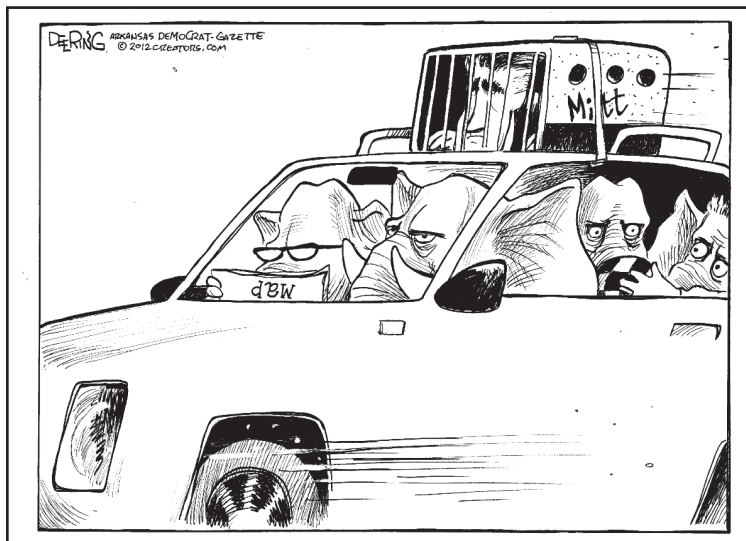

And it inspired Americans by the tens of millions. The final frontier would be conquered — and we would do it.

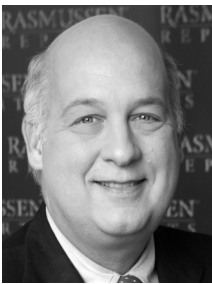
Things have changed. Major cutbacks have been made at NASA. Manned space exploration is virtually off the table. We have ceded the skies to others.

That could cost us more than we as a nation can afford in many ways.

Glenn, now 90, was among those who had "the right stuff" half a century ago. Now, it seems, we are admitting Americans no longer have that quality.



## Trickle down environmentalism has little support among public

As a candidate in 2008, Barack Obama declared his support for green energy development. "For the sake of our economy, our security and the future of our planet," he said, "we must end the age of oil in our time."

As president, Obama called for putting 1 million electric cars on the road by 2015. He backed that call with more than \$5 billion in taxpayer subsidies to jump-start the electric car industry. The president also put in place a program that gave \$7,500 to anyone who would actually buy an electric car. Despite that support, sales were minimal in 2011, so his new budget proposes hiking that subsidy to \$10,000 a car.

Voters are skeptical. Just 29 percent favor the \$10,000 subsidies, while 58 percent are opposed. When told that reaching the goal of a million electric cars on the road could cost taxpayers \$10 billion in subsidies, opposition reaches 65 percent. Voters are looking to reduce federal spending, not increase it.

But there's an important detail suggesting the president's plan could be an even bigger loser in the court of public opinion. The CEO of General Motors said recently that the average income of those buying Chevy's electric Volt is approximately \$170,000 a year. That puts electric car buyers in the same league as BMW buyers or those who drive a Mercedes-Benz. It may not be the 1 percent, but it qualifies in the top 7 percent of all American earners. That's a more elite group than those who buy Cadillacs or Lexus cars.

Such trickle-down environmentalism is hardly appealing to voters. Seventy-three percent be-

lieve those who earn \$150,000 or more should pay the full cost of the car themselves. Only 13 percent think a government subsidy is appropriate.

While agreeing with the president on the importance of reducing our dependence on foreign oil, voters don't see providing subsidies to wealthy electric car buyers as the way to reach that goal. Instead, 75 percent say that the United States should be doing more to develop its own gas and oil resources. Most (57 percent) think the best way to do that is through free-market competition. Only 27 percent believe government subsidies and regulations represent a better approach.

The president views taxpayer subsidies for electric cars as an investment in "clean energy technology — an investment that will strengthen our security, protect our planet and create countless new jobs for our people." But Americans are justifiably skeptical of political investments. Only 11 percent believe that government officials are better than private investors at seeing the potential benefits of new technologies. Seventy-one percent think investors do a better job. If private investors don't see the value and pass on an investment, 64 percent think it's likely any government investment will be a waste of money.

One reason for this is that investors are most interested in producing things that consumers will buy. Political investments are more about headlines. When it comes to buying electric cars, the headlines may be about going green, but the reality is most Americans say they'll be motivated to go electric for a far more mundane reason: When the price of gas gets too high, they'll switch.

What if democracy allows the government to do anything it wants, as long as more people bother to show up at the voting booth to support it than to oppose it?

What if the purpose of democracy is to convince people that they could prosper not through the creation of wealth but through theft from others? What if the only moral way to acquire wealth -- aside from inheritance -- is through voluntary economic activity?

What if the government persuaded you that you could acquire wealth through political activity? What if economic activity included all the productive and peaceful things we do? What if political activity included all the parasitical and destructive things the government does?

What if governments were originally established to protect people's freedom, but always turn into political and imperialist enterprises that seek to expand their power, increase their territory and heighten their control of the population?

What if the idea that we need a government to take care of us is actually a fiction? What if our strength as individuals and durability as a culture are contingent not on the strength of the government but on the amount of freedom we have from the government?

What if we're seeing civil unrest around the world precisely because government is out of control? What if the cocktail of big government and democracy brings dependence and destruction? What if big government destroys people's motivations and democracy convinces them that the only motivation they need is to vote and go along with whatever the government does?

What if the Republican primaries

we're seeing unfold aren't actually as democratic as they may appear to be? What if the results you have seen from the states that have voted thus far don't match the composition of the delegates those states send to the Tampa convention this summer because the polls aren't what counts, but what counts are the secret meetings that come after the voting? What if Joe Stalin was right when he said the most powerful person in the world is the guy who counts the votes?

What if the greatest tyrant in history lives among us? What if that tyrant always gets its way, no matter what the laws are or what the Constitution says? What if that tyrant is the majority of voters? What if the tyranny of the majority in a democracy recognizes no limits on its power?

What if the government misinforms voters so as to justify anything the government wants to do? What if the government bribes people with the money it prints? What if it gives entitlements to the poor, tax breaks to the middle class and bailouts to the rich just to keep all of us dependent upon it? What if a vibrant republic requires not just the democratic process of voting, but also informed and engaged voters who understand first principles of limited

government and free-market economics, and the divine origin of natural rights?

What if we could free ourselves from the yoke of big government through a campaign of education and information and personal courage that leads to a revolutionary return to first principles? What if the establishment doesn't want this? What if the government remains the same no matter who wins elections?

What if because of Ron Paul's presidential campaign, because he isn't campaigning just for votes as his competition is, because he is educating the population and winning the hearts and minds of a once free people and inspiring them to fight for their freedom once more, freedom wins? What if we can be free again? What will it take to make that happen?

Columbiana councilman: Live within means

COLUMBIANA — Councilman Bryan Blakeman wants the city to live within its means and only approve spending when it won't result in cost increases for residents.  
Blakeman said several times during a recent council discussion on electric rates that he doesn't approve of how the city is using the electric fund to cover the general fund.  
Council previously approved an ordinance that allowed for money in the electric fund to be transferred to balance the general fund, if needed. Money taken out of the fund would be paid back, with interest.  
"That doesn't feel right to me. There has always been that safety net, and anytime you need more money in (the electric fund) you just raise electric rates," he said.  
The electric fund will remain at or just above \$1.8 million all this year, according to the 2012 budget.  
The fund, which is used for maintenance and upgrading of the electrical system, has dropped by more than one million since September of 2010, when it was at \$2.9 million.

Blakeman has said the decrease over last year is attributed to costs to upgrade the north substation.  
Resident Richard McBane said the upgrades are necessary to keep the system working.  
"There's basically two parts, the direct cost of the power and the indirect costs like maintaining the system. Without doing that you're going to end up with a system that starts failing," he said.  
Blakeman said the city's indirect costs "go way beyond" maintaining the system, however.  
He explained that electrical department employees that should be paid out of general fund are being paid from the electric fund.  
"Those employees would be in the general fund but there is not enough money there because we spend it on other things, so we balance it in the electric fund" and raise rates to cover it, he said.  
McBane said employees like City Manager Keith Chamberlin and the accountant, who both work on the electric fund, should be paid out of the electric fund.  
But Blakeman said that paying em-

ployees out of the electric fund and not the general fund is like taxing residents without raising taxes.  
"That's called taxation without representation," he said.  
City income tax is a source of revenue for the general fund, whereas electric rates make up the electric fund.  
Councilman Tom Ferguson and Mayor David Spatholt agreed with McBane, however, that employees working on the fund should be paid out of the fund.  
"He (Chamberlin) spends time in that department so his money is charged to that department. I see nothing wrong with that," Spatholt said.  
Blakeman said there is nothing legally wrong with doing that but he isn't comfortable with paying people out of the electric fund since it is not taxes.  
The discussion then turned to how council would decide when to take on an electric department project, but no official determination was reached.  
"What we need to do is all be on the same page on what we need to upgrade," Blakeman said.

EL shooting investigated

EAST LIVERPOOL - Two men shot early Friday morning outside an East End bar told police they don't know the identity of their assailant.  
The victims, Taru L. Smith, 34, and Gary Manning, 35, both of Lorain, were shot outside the front door of the Hall of Legends on Mulberry Street about 12:47 a.m.  
They were transported by Lifeteam ambulance to East Liverpool City Hospital from the scene, Smith with an injury to his hand and Manning with a chunk taken from his leg.  
Smith was taken by ambulance to another facility, but officers were uncertain where. Manning was treated and released from the local hospital.  
Officers said the injuries were non-life-threatening.  
According to Capt. Pat Wright, Smith and Manning had been inside the bar about 10 minutes when four men came in and confronted them. An argument ensued and one of the four men pulled out a handgun.  
"Everyone took off running to the back of the bar, and the bartender started screaming for (the men) to get out," Wright said, adding that Smith, Manning and the four other men went outside at that point.  
As soon as the two victims went out the front door, three to six shots were fired, according to Wright, who said accounts varied as to how many were fired.  
Smith and Manning ran back inside the bar, and the four suspects fled on foot toward First Avenue. Officers searched the area but could not locate the men, who have all been identified by police as local residents, although Smith and Manning claimed not to know who shot them or why. Officers retrieved 40-caliber shell casings from the scene, where blood from the victims' wounds could be seen on the pavement and throughout the bar and its restroom.  
Smith was scheduled to appear in East Liverpool Municipal Court Friday on a charge of drug possession stemming from a traffic stop by Liverpool Township police on Sunday. A bench warrant was issued when he failed to appear.  
During that traffic stop, Smith reportedly had a bag of marijuana in his sock and was a passenger in the car of a Youngstown woman who was charged with speeding. Another passenger from Lorain was also with them.

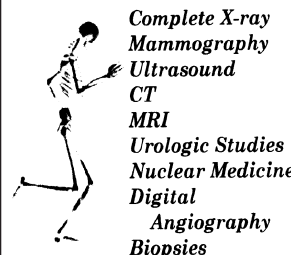

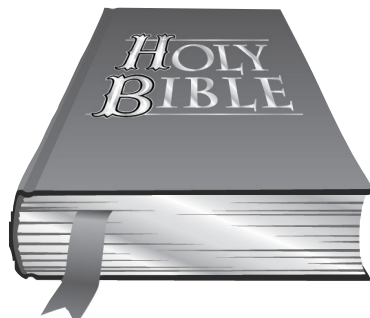

## Westwood, McIlroy advance in Match Play

Matt Kuchar drops top-seeded Martin Kaymer; Mark Wilson knocks out Dustin Johnson

MARANA, Ariz. — Lee Westwood and Rory McIlroy suddenly have more at stake than the Match Play Championship.



Westwood, who has led 48 of the 49 holes he has played this week, got a small measure of revenge against Nick Watney and advanced to the quarterfinals with a 3-and-2 victory on Friday at Dove Mountain. Watney had eliminated him each of the last two years.

McIlroy built a 3-up lead at the turn and hung on to beat Miguel Angel Jimenez of Spain, 2 and 1.

Westwood or McIlroy would go to No. 1 in the world with the title in this World Golf Championship. If they win their quarterfinal matches Saturday, they would meet in the semifinals Sunday morning.

"It's a nice incentive," McIlroy said. "It's nice to have in the back of your mind. And if you're struggling in a match and find it hard to get yourself up, or get any sort of momentum,

## Danica wins pole

Patrick qualifies for top spot in today's Nationwide race

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — In about 24 hours, Danica Patrick went from her biggest crash to her biggest moment in a stock car.

The former IndyCar star won the pole Friday for the season-opening Nationwide Series race at Daytona, becoming the first woman to secure the top qualifying spot in NASCAR's second-tier series since Shawna Robinson at Atlanta on March 12, 1994.

It came a day after she wrecked on the final lap of a qualifying race for the Daytona 500.

"It's a good turn of events," she said. It also set off a flurry of Twitter traffic that included words such as "Dansanity," "Danimosity," "Danimate," and "Dantastic."

"I really don't think about it from a girl's perspective," she said with her proud parents standing a few yards away. "I've been taught from a young age to want to be the best driver. ... It was about being the best driver and not the best girl."

Patrick won just once in 115 IndyCar starts. She had seven podium finishes, and two of them came when she began dabbling in NASCAR two seasons ago. She moved to NASCAR full time this season, and is scheduled to drive 10 Sprint Cup races for Stewart-Haas Racing and run every Nationwide race for JR Motorsports.

She will make her Sprint Cup debut in the Daytona 500 on Sunday.

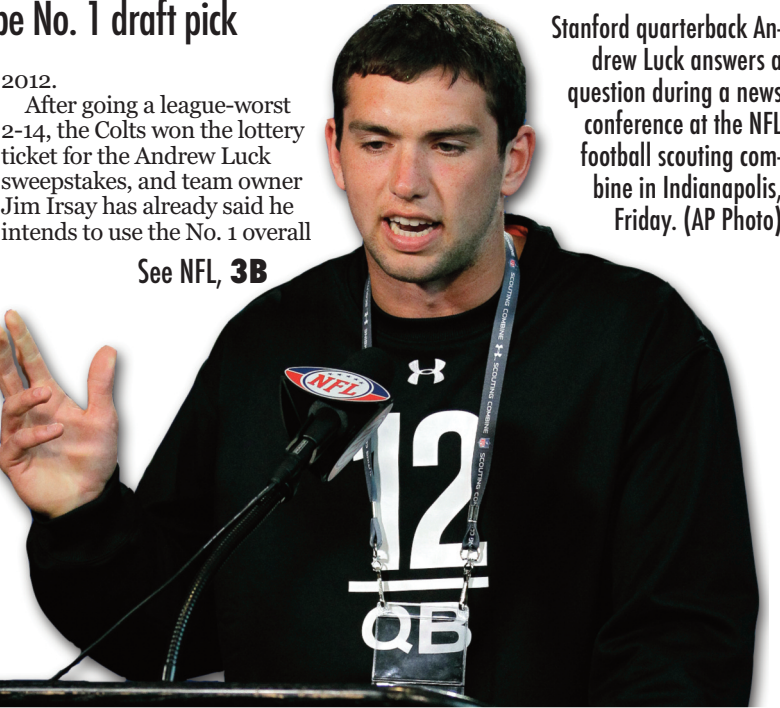
Manning as the face of the Colts' franchise though neither is ready to push him aside yet.

His love of sports was enhanced with his coaching which began when his own sons began to participate in athletics. Keith coached soccer, baseball, football, and track. In 1994 he joined the C.H.S. football staff and was an integral part for 15 years. During his coaching tenure, Keith was a junior high football head coach for eight years, junior high track head coach for two years, varsity head track coach for five years, and assistant varsity football for seven years. In 2003, Keith was awarded the AFLAC National Assistant Coach of the Year. In 2007, he was chairperson for "Fix Our Field" project at Firestone Park. Senden missed a 20-foot birdie putt to square the match on the 18th, and Bae completed a long two-putt par with a 5-footer. “He’s been very impressive this week,” McIlroy said. In other matches: —Hunter Mahan took advantage of some mental lapses by Steve Stricker to build a big lead and held on for a 4-and-3 win. Mahan will play Matt Kuchar, a 4-and-3 winner against Martin Kaymer, a finalist last year at Dove Mountain. That assures there will be an American in the semifinals at the Match Play for the first time since 2009. —One year after Mark Wilson was drubbed in the second round by big-hitting Bubba Watson, he overwhelmed another power player by beating Dustin Johnson for the second straight year. Johnson was too wild too often and couldn’t make putts, a bad combination in match play. Wilson will play Peter Hanson of Sweden, who dismantled

Brandt Snedeker during a quiet, effective march to the quarterfinals. “I know people keep talking about how I hit it so short that I can’t compete,” said Wilson, who has won three times on the PGA Tour in the last 14 months. “First of all, I don’t hit it very short. And secondly, it all comes down to putting. It really does. So I just don’t know how many times I have to explain it.” Watney eliminated Tiger Woods on the 18th hole Thursday, despite a poor round of putting. pick on Indy’s next big franchise quarterback. Presumably, that quarterback’s portrait will wind up on the wall of the same venue both are expected to participate in some of Sunday’s workouts. Who will it be? Luck met with Colts quarterback coach Clyde Christensen on Thursday night and will undoubtedly see more of the Colts staff this

weekend. Griffin has already met with Philadelphia and has meetings scheduled with Kansas City and Cleveland, a team that may be looking to swap picks with St. Louis to take Griffin. Coaches and general managers believe Luck, like Manning in 1998, is the more polished prospect. “He (Luck) has got a great start,” said Texans coach Gary Kubiak, who has been watching Luck since his high school days. “He’s been coached very well. The system he’s been running is

very similar to what most of the people do in pro football. He’s doing a lot of stuff at the line of scrimmage. He has a good chance to be a great, great player in this league.” Griffin, the Heisman Trophy winner, is believed to have more upside, just like Ryan Leaf, who went second in the ‘98 draft. And with scouting reports on Griffin steadily improving, the biggest concern heading into the combine was Griffin’s height. Some worried the quar-

terback who was listed at 6-foot-4 in high school and 6-2 at Baylor, was actually shorter. Griffin ended any speculation about the incredible shrinking quarterback by measuring in at 6-2 3/8, 223 pounds — a point he made three times during a 15-minute question-and-answer session with reporters. “Cam (Newton) is a bigger guy, 6-5, 240 and I’m 6-2 3/8 and 223,” Griffin said, drawing laughter. “I’m not going to let that one go.”

the Indians, perhaps out of some loyalty to Sizemore, decided to bring him back with a one-year, \$5 million contract loaded with incentives that could have earned him an additional \$4 million. Now, there’s no telling when Sizemore will be ready. Antonetti, though, will never count him out. “One thing about Grady is he is very tough minded,” Antonetti said. “He is an exceptionally diligent guy. He will overcome it and I’m confident he’ll be able to get back and still contribute.” Indians trainer Lonnie Soloff said Sizemore will not do any baseball activities as he’s monitored over the next few weeks and undergoes treatment. Soloff said Sizemore had been doing well in his rehab following knee

surgery and appeared on track to possibly begin the season on time. Sizemore has undergone five surgeries the past two years and played in only 210 games the last three seasons because of injuries. His full-speed-ahead style may have caught up with the 29-year-old, who once played in 382 consecutive games and endeared himself to Cleveland fans with hustle that could turn a double into a triple or save an extra-base hit with a crash into the outfield wall to make a catch. Sizemore played in only 71 games after beginning last season on the disabled list. He made three trips to the DL and underwent right knee surgery on Oct. 3, just days after his season ended with a .224 batting average 10 homers, 32 RBIs and zero steals for the first time in his career. Indians manager Manny Acta hasn’t seen a completely healthy Sizemore

since joining Cleveland two seasons ago. “I know,” Acta said. “(Former manager Eric Wedge) Wedgie was a lucky man — a blessed man — to be able to see this very talented guy get out there every day and enjoy it. I haven’t had that luxury so far, but I enjoy the human being and I’ve seen him from the other side. I’ve seen some of it over here, too. But, you know what? It’s a long season. Just because he’s not ready by opening day, doesn’t mean he’s not going to come on strong and contribute to our ballclub.” With Sizemore sidelined, the Indians will likely move Michael Brantley from left field to center. Shelley Duncan, Aaron Cunningham, Ryan Spilborghs and Felix Pie are among the team’s options in left. “We have Michael, who has been there the majority of the time the last two seasons for us and done a very

good job,” Acta said. “Also, we have some people in camp that might give us some different options.” The Indians, who were ravaged by injuries last season, have 12 other outfielders in camp. Cleveland opened last season 30-15 and played well in long stretches without Sizemore so there’s reason to believe they can survive again. “We certainly want Grady on the field and we feel we’re a better team when he’s on the field playing and producing,” Antonetti said. “But, obviously, at the time we signed Grady, we knew that there was some risk, even just around his knee rehab. So we tried to build in better quality alternatives maybe than we had at the start even of last year. Hopefully the guys that are here in camp can take advantage of the opportunity and earn a spot and, when the season starts, potentially contribute if Grady’s not ready to go.”

## Prahalis’ school-record 42 leads Ohio State women

COLUMBUS (AP) — Samantha Prahalis made her last home game a very memorable one. The senior guard scored a school-record 42 points in her final home game and No. 8 Ohio State routed Minnesota 81-56 on Thursday night. “I just got into a pretty good rhythm,” said Prahalis, the Buckeyes’ only senior. “It was almost like one of those nights where you don’t really see the defenders.” Prahalis, leading the Big Ten in both scoring (21.3 points per game) and assists (6.7), had 22 points by halftime as the Buckeyes (24-4, 11-4) built a 12-point lead. She hit 15 of 27 shots from the field including 7 of 12 3-pointers, and was 5 for 5 at the line. She also had six rebounds, four assists and three steals before leaving to a standing ovation with 2:27 left after breaking Katie Smith’s 1994 record by hitting two free throws. “I don’t know who wrote the script. Somebody did,” said Ohio State’s Jim Foster, in his 34th season as a head coach. “You haven’t even talked about zero turnovers. Think about it: She was all over the place, helping on defense, our second-leading rebounder, led us in assists and scored the points.” Minnesota (14-15, 6-9) coach Pam Borton said she’d never seen a better performance in her decade in the Big Ten. “It’s probably one of the most special performances that I’ve seen since I’ve been at Minnesota,” she said. “On senior night, the way she played and the way she came out focused. She’s a competitor, what more can you say? She made sure she was going to have an evening like this.” Salem graduate Amy Scullion also made her return to the Buckeyes Thursday playing the games final two minutes and connecting on two free throws.

## Braun: ‘The truth is on my side’

PHOENIX (AP) — His voice self-assured, Ryan Braun stood a few feet from the batter’s box and hit back at those who he feels tarnished his name and image. The NL MVP insisted Friday that he always believed his 50-game suspension for a positive drug test would be overturned and that he would be able to suit up opening day along with Milwaukee teammates who never doubted him. “We won,” he said with conviction, “because the truth is on my side. The truth is always relevant, and at the end of the day, the truth prevailed.” Less than 24 hours after Braun’s suspension was overturned by an arbitrator, a decision that irritated Major League Baseball officials, the star outfielder was back with the Brewers. With many of his teammates, all in full uniform, sitting in the stands of Maryvale Baseball Park, Braun confidently professed his innocence while questioning the system that allowed him to be suspended for failing a test he took following a playoff game on Oct. 1. Now he is the first major league player to successfully challenge a drug-related penalty in a grievance, ending a four-month personal “nightmare.” “There were a lot of times where I wanted to come out and tell the entire story, attack everybody as I’ve been attacked as my name has been dragged through the mud as everything in my entire life has been called into question. I wanted to come out and tell the entire story, but at the end of the day I recognize what is best for the game of baseball,” Braun said. “I can’t ever get that time in my life back.”

## A break from Lin to put focus back on Howard

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Carmelo Anthony saw the wall of reporters and knew immediately who was being surrounded. Back in New York, it would be Jeremy Lin. But with All-Star weekend in Orlando, the focus is shifting back to where it was to start the season, to Dwight Howard’s future. That means Howard gets the same questions Anthony was peppered with last year during the NBA’s midseason break, just before he was traded. “Thank you, Dwight!” Anthony yelled. “It’s your turn!” The center has asked for a trade, but he’s still here and there’s no telling for how much longer. The Magic could deal him before the March 15 trade deadline, or hold onto him all season and risk losing him while getting nothing back in July. Howard didn’t want to discuss any of that Friday. “All the other stuff can wait,” Howard said. “I just want people to have fun and enjoy themselves. This is All-Star weekend. This is a time of celebration for guys who’ve had great first halves and guys who have never even seen this.” Howard’s table was between Anthony and LeBron James, two of the league’s best-known stars. Yet neither had anywhere near the attention of Howard, and Anthony was glad to yield the spotlight after his status overshadowed last year’s festivities in Los Angeles.

## Miller, Nelson top 2012 Hall of Fame finalists

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Reggie Miller has a chance to nail his legacy, just as he did so many 3-point shots. The Indiana Pacers great with the smoothest of strokes was announced Friday as a first-time finalist for the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. He is one of 12 finalists for the class of 2012. “When you’re in the backyard and you’re trying to play the 3-2-1 game, and you’re trying to be the Iceman (George Gervin) and do the figure roll. ... Now to be on the same stage with these guys. It’s just a great honor,” Miller said. Miller, a five-time All-Star, was joined as a first-time finalist by five-time NCAA Final Four coach Rick Pitino, former NBA coach Bill Fitch and two-time Olympic gold medalist Katrina McClain. On the ballot again are Don Nelson, Maurice Cheeks, Bernard King, Dick Motta, Hank Nichols, Ralph Sampson, Jamaal Wilkes and the All-American Red Heads, known as the female version of the Harlem Globetrotters and the first women’s professional basketball team. Miller and Cheeks were the only finalists in attendance for Friday’s announcement. “I also played against these guys and it’s the highest honor And to be selected would be an honor,” Cheeks said. “To get to the NBA was special for me. To have an opportunity to be elected to Hall of Fame would just be an honor.”

had Richardson's combination of speed, power and thirst for contact. Richardson, considered the top back in this year's class, ran for 1,679 yards and 21 touchdowns last season and was a Heisman Trophy finalist. He also caught 29 passes for 338 yards and three more scores.

Richardson says it's more than physical tools that set him apart. He enjoys blocking and watching film, important things that aren't nearly as popular as carrying the ball.  
"Not to be cocky or anything, I work on my game every day," he said. "Even if it's not physical stuff, I work in the classroom, running plays, learning formations or learning the defensive line, learning what the linebacker's doing."  
As far as his speed, Richardson said numbers don't matter.  
"I've never been caught from behind," he said. "People who want to question my speed, look at the tape."  
Richardson feels there would be no need to replace him with a specialist at any time because he can do it all.  
"When it comes to playing football, I can say look at each game, any game you want to and just really try to find a negative," he said. "A lot of people try to find a negative, anything, in your game. It ain't too many negatives I have out there."

**NASCAR hopes to open door for 'green' sponsorships**  
DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Think NASCAR is running out of sponsorship categories to mine? Think again.  
The sanctioning body already has a bucketful of official sponsors, including an official outdoor and RV retail partner, an official shaving product and even an official cheese filled snack.  
Now add a new category: "Green" sponsors.  
This week, NASCAR signed a deal with Creative Recycling Systems, a company that provides businesses and other organizations with a way to discard electronic devices in an environmentally responsible manner.  
A sport based on burning fuel at a rapid rate might still be a tough sell to hard-core environmentalists, but this week's deal may be an indication that the sport is beginning to shed its stigma.  
"The stigma is history," said Mike Lynch, NASCAR's managing director of green innovation.  
Yes, managing director of green innovation is a job in NASCAR.  
Lynch said several existing NASCAR sponsors already had environmental initiatives, including at-track recycling programs. Now that they've landed a completely environment-focused sponsor, NASCAR hopes to add more.  
"It's a new category, sort of, historically for the sport," Lynch said.  
Brian Diesselhorst, vice president of marketing at Creative Recycling, said the company wasn't sure initially if NASCAR was the right place to showcase its services.  
"That was one of our reservations when I first brought this to my CEO," Diesselhorst said. As it turns out, Diesselhorst said: "They're actually doing stuff."  
As part of the deal, the company hopes to set up stations at racetracks where fans can turn in unwanted electronics for recycling. They also hope to gain new business by talking to other NASCAR sponsors about potential partnerships.  
"This is a big sport, and we want to be in it for the long term," Diesselhorst said.  
FAST FRIDAY: Brad Keselowski posted the fastest 10-lap average during Daytona 500 practice Friday, barely edging Kyle Busch.  
Keselowski averaged 195.898 mph during the second of two sessions at Daytona International Speedway. Busch averaged 195.895 mph. Clint Bowyer was third, followed by Tony Stewart, Jeff Gordon, Joey Logano and Mark Martin. Denny Hamlin, Martin Truex Jr. and AJ Allmendinger rounded out the top 10.  
Only 16 cars took the track in the morning session, and 23 turned laps in the afternoon.  
Eleven drivers, including former Daytona 500 winners Kevin Harvick and Jamie McMurray, didn't even leave the garage. Many teams avoided practice because they don't have backup cars and were wary of causing damage.  
Drivers have one final chance, a 90-minute session Saturday, to get on the track before Sunday's opener.  
BEER SWAP: Budweiser is removing its name from NASCAR's Shootout exhibition race at Daytona International Speedway beginning next February and instead will be the title sponsor for the 150-mile Duel qualifying races held before the Daytona 500.  
The beer brand will become title sponsor of Daytona Speedweeks and the Daytona 500 pre-race show. It also sponsors the No. 29 car driven by Kevin Harvick.  
Daytona president Joe Chitwood said the track is shopping for a new title sponsor for the Shootout.  
Next season's Shootout field will feature mostly pole position winners from this season. The pole position is sponsored by a rival brewer, Coors Light.  
PASTRANA'S SCHEDULE: Travis Pastrana's foray into NASCAR will include seven National Series races and 11 events in the K&N Pro Series in 2012. Pastrana released his schedule Friday. It could change if he secures more sponsorship in the Nationwide Series.

Painful knee worries

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** I'm a point guard on my high-school's basketball team. There's a good chance that we will make it to the playoffs.

My left knee, right in front of the kneecap, has started to hurt when I walk up and down stairs. The pain isn't great, and I might be making too much out of this. I don't want to miss the playoffs.

What do you think I have, and what can I do to stop it from getting worse? — **B.J.**

**ANSWER:** The knee is a vulnerable joint, and the number of possible knee injuries is enormous. The best I can do for you is give you a guess and some general advice. If the knee pain worsens, or if it's not gone in one more week, see the family doctor.

Pain on the front of the kneecap often indicates patellofemoral pain syndrome. Climbing and descending stairs intensifies the pain. The patella is the kneecap. It's embedded in a large tendon that comes from the front thigh muscles. The tendon inserts on the lower leg bone. "Femoral" refers to the thigh bone, the femur. It has a groove for the kneecap. When you bend the knee, the kneecap can partially come out of its groove and cause pain. Pain also arises if you sit for a long time and then arise. This is patellofemoral pain syndrome.

Flat feet are said to favor this condition. I don't know if that's true. Other anatomical abnormalities also make the kneecap partially pop out of the femoral groove.

If you have no pain when you play basketball, then you can keep playing. It's not likely to keep you out of the playoffs.

In the meantime, apply heat or ice, whichever gives you greater relief, to the knee for 15 minutes a couple of times during the day. Nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs like Aleve or Advil are safe to use for pain. If you can get by without medicine, do so. A knee brace could prevent further injury to the joint.

Take simple steps to  
avoid delay at doctor's

**DEAR ABBY:** I have worked in a medical clinic for 35 years and hear a lot of complaints about the wait for doctor appointments. May I explain some of the reasons for it?

Sometimes the doctor arrives late, but other factors can cause delays:

1. If you need to be seen, call first to get an appointment time. Most offices leave open spots to accommodate urgent-care matters. If you just walk in, we must work you in with patients who already have appointments, which pushes the doctor behind.
2. Do NOT come an hour early and announce in front of the entire waiting room that you must be somewhere and expect to get worked in before your scheduled time. Reschedule instead.
3. Always bring your insurance cards with you. Do not tell us to call another doctor's office to get the information.
4. Don't walk in with forms you need filled out and signed by the doctor and expect someone to take care of it immediately. It requires your chart to be pulled, a nurse to fill out the information and the doctor to look over the form and sign. Instead, leave the form. We'll mail it or call you to pick it up.
5. Don't expect to call the office and speak with the doctor in the middle of a clinic day. A nurse can usually handle the question. If not, she'll have the doctor call you back after seeing the scheduled patients. — **GENTLE REMINDER IN SIOUX FALLS, S.D.**
