Todd's statements retracted in murder case

LISBON - Assistant Prosecutor Timothy McNicol said Friday portions of statements made by Miranda Todd to Salem Police officers and other authorities in 2010 can be retracted during the case.

The 24-year-old Salem woman faces charges of murder, child endangering and involuntary manslaughter following the July 2010 death of her 7-month-old son, Derek A. Dennison. A court trial is set for March 5.

Her attorney, Jennifer Gorby, had initially requested entire statements made by Todd to investigators on five separate occasions be thrown out, but Judge Scott Washam denied that request in December on the basis that Todd was adequately advised of her rights and gave the statements voluntarily.


During a status conference on Friday Gorby said there are six or seven statements in which a portion of the statement should be retracted.

McNichol said he and Prosecutor Tammy Jones have reviewed the statements and have no objections to the requested retractions, although there are three or four areas in which they and Gorby may not agree.

McNichol said prosecutors may file any objections they have at the next status hearing, which was set for 11 a.m. March 2. Neither side presented testimony for the requested retractions on Friday, and Washam ordered McNichol and Jones to respond to Gorby's request by Feb. 29. Gorby also told Washam, McNichol and Jones she is still waiting to receive state records pertaining to child support enforcement. She said she has not yet received the records due to technological difficulty on the state's part. Washam told her to request the records in paper format as opposed to disk format in order to have them by the next conference.

COLUMBIANA - Famous Ohioans such as Annie Oakley, Salem's barefoot kicker Rich Karlis, rock-n-roll icon Alan Freed, astronauts John Glenn and Neil Armstrong and others lined the halls and gym at Joshua Dixon Elementary School Friday.

At least that's what fourth graders tried to convey as they played the parts of the familiar and the less familiar who hailed from the Buckeye state as part of the first Famous Ohioans Living Museum at Joshua Dixon. "I think they're doing a fantastic job. They've worked really hard. They learned a lot about the different contributions Ohioans have made to the world," fourth grade teacher Melanie Strohecker said.

Strohecker and fellow fourth grade teachers Julie McClish and Raeann Gorby worked with their students on the project, providing them with a list of famous Ohioans and instructing them to pick one to study and become for the museum.

Students had to learn about the person they chose and write a speech to educate others about the person. They also had to come up with a costume and were allowed to use props to authenticate the look.

The list of famous Ohioans played by the 73 students included everything from inventors and business titans to presidents and professional athletes, actors and musicians, war heroes and pioneers of space travel.

McClish explained that students are supposed to learn about inventors and famous people from Ohio, so they combined biographies with social studies and came up with the living museum project, which the students

Utilities commission OKs seismic testing on city-owned land

Staff Writer The city Utilities Commission

gave permission for seismic testing on 530 acres of city-owned land to a company trying to map out the oil and gas reserves under the surface.

Mike Brazil of Cougar Land Services, a company with an office in Alliance, explained the project to commission members earlier this week. He had already made a presentation to city council after approaching Mayor John Berlin.

He's been making the rounds at local township meetings and with Columbiana County officials, get-

ting permits to use vibe trucks on some of the roads on the north and west side of the county. Vibe trucks bang on the road to send vibrations into the surface with the returning waves recorded as they bounce off the layers underneath.

The total project covers 409 square miles from Salem to Alliance to Minerva and Carrollton.

Brazil explained that source points are placed about 1,300 feet apart, with charges placed in the source points and then set off on properties where they have per-

mission to enter. Using geophones placed on the surface, which pick up the vibrations from the sonar in the ground, patterns can be seen of what's underneath the ground and the locations of oil and gas can be mapped out.


The companies involved with the work have already been consulting with Utilities Superintendent Don Weingart and Assistant Superintendent Matt Hoopes on where they can and can't place source points. Normally the source points can not be placed within 300 feet of a house or well or other structure, but in this case, Weingart said the distance parameter has been widened to 500 feet. They're also staying away from the water plant and reservoir.

In places where the source points and charges can't be used, Brazil said they'll use geophones only.

Testing is scheduled to begin April 1 on U.S. Route 62 and he said they work seven days a week, but mostly from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Representatives of Cougar Land Services are working with area landowners and talking to them so they know when they're coming, he said.

Book discussion group at Leetonia Library

Career Center hires maintenance chief Ryan Griffith, home on West Danny and Judy Bartholow

LISBON - The Columbiana County Career and Technical Center said good-bye to John Garwood and hired his replacement, long-time United Local employee David Starcher on Tuesday evening.

Garwood had worked as a teacher for the Career Center for four years and served as the maintenance supervisor for another four and a half years. Most recently he was the one who oversaw the construction project, which remodeled the building's heating and cooling system, added restrooms and created the new health sciences wing at the Career Center.

"We are sad to lose John," Superintendent Chuck Adkins said. "He has taken a job in the private sector."

Adkins continued the board is fortunate to get Starcher, who has served as the buildings and grounds supervisor at United Local for the past 15 and a half years. Starcher has 32 years of experience with that district, including involvement in renovation projects.

That will be important as the Career Center proceeds with the next planned project, the renovation and expansion of the welding labs. A meeting was recently held with prospective contactors to go over the engineering and architectural plans for the project. The bids are due by 11 a.m. Feb. 29.

Adkins said plan is to get the work started shortly and complete it prior to next school year. First empty space which once housed the old health academy classes will be remodeled for welding classes. Then the current welding classes will be moved into the new space while the current space also is remodeled.

By doubling the space, there is also hope to double the size of the welding program at the school. Adkins said currently there are 25 juniors and 25 seniors studying welding in the labs. However, for next school year the plan is to increase that number to 50 juniors starting the program, which will also include chemistry and automated materials joining.

Adkins believes there will be plenty of students for the program. They have already received more than 60 applications for the 50 spaces and it is still early in the application process.

Adkins added many of the programs at the Career Center are on the rise. He believes it is a combination of the economy and the reputations of the programs available there, programs that often allow students to move on to college coursework after completion of their high school years.

Thanks to a switch in insurance programs last year, the district received a self-insurance refund check for \$650,000 and saved an additional \$300,000 in premiums. Adkins credited the staff and both unions for allowing the change, which will allow the Career Center to put its money to better use improving the educational programs and buildings for students.

Bill Tomlin, one of the students of Jim Beardsley, recently won a regional auto tech competition at Stark State. For his efforts, Tomlin will receive both tools and a \$1,000 scholarship to the Stark State program.

Police say mom injected teens with heroin

LAURELVILLE (AP) - Authorities say an Ohio mother has been arrested on charges accusing her of injecting her teenage children with heroin before sending them to school.

The Hocking County Sheriff's Office says 35-fiveyear-old Shantel Parker, of Laurelville, was arrested Friday at Ohio State University hospital on warrants charging her with two counts each of felonious assault, corrupting another with drugs and endangering children.

Investigators say Parker has been providing heroin and other drugs to her children, ages 14 and 16, for several months.

The teens have been placed with the county children's services agency. Parker was to be jailed in Franklin County to await a hearing and transport to Hocking County. She was in custody and couldn't immediately comment.

The Logan Daily News reports Parker had studied nursing from 2008 to 2010.

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OUR SIDE

Common sense prevails in appeal on party noise

Too frequently it seems government, and that includes the courts, has abandoned the guiding light by which most of us live: common sense. Thank heaven the Ohio Supreme Court based a ruling squarely on it this week.

A Wayne County resident challenged the state's disorderly conduct statute, claiming its provisions – specifically on loud noise – were unconstitutionally vague. The man had been arrested after, during a Halloween party, he refused three times to turn down loud music his neighbors had reported to police.

State Supreme Court justices rejected the man's claim. The law is clear enough, they decided. It bans "recklessly causing inconvenience, annoyance or alarm to another by ... making excessive noise."

Justices decided, in effect, that people "of ordinary intelligence" can define "excessive."

Of course they can. If noise is loud enough to prompt someone to call the police, who agree with that judgment, it is excessive.

This isn't a license to use the statute as an excuse to harass others, of course. Remember, law enforcement officers have to be convinced noise is excessive, too.

But it is a blow for common sense. The court is to be commended for it.

Fifty years ago this week, Ohio's own John Glenn soared into space on a trip that would take him around the Earth three times. His mission was one of the U.S. space program's great early successes.


And it inspired Americans by the tens of millions. The final frontier would be conquered - and we would do it.

Things have changed. Major cutbacks have been made at NASA. Manned space exploration is virtually off the table. We have ceded the skies to others.

That could cost us more than we as a nation can afford in many ways.

Glenn, now 90, was among those who had "the right stuff" half a century ago. Now, it seems, we are admitting Americans no longer have that quality.





Trickle down environmentalism has little support among public



As a candidate in 2008, Barack Obama declared his support for green energy development. "For the sake of our economy, our security and the future of our planet," he said, "we must end the age of oil in our time."

As president, Obama called for putting 1 million electric cars on the road by 2015. He backed that call with more than \$5 billion

in taxpayer subsidies to jump-start the electric car industry. The president also put in place a program that gave \$7,500 to anyone who would actually buy an electric car. Despite that support, sales were minimal in 2011, so his new budget proposes hiking that subsidy to \$10,000 a car.

Voters are skeptical. Just 29 percent favor the \$10,000 subsidies, while 58 percent are opposed. When told that reaching the goal of a million electric cars on the road could cost taxpayers \$10 billion in subsidies, opposition reaches 65 percent. Voters are looking to reduce federal spending, not increase it.

But there's an important detail suggesting the president's plan could be an even bigger loser in the court of public opinion. The CEO of General Motors said recently that the average income of those buying Chevy's electric Volt is approximately \$170,000 a year. That puts electric car buyers in the same league as BMW buyers or those who drive a Mercedes-Benz. It may not be the 1 percent, but it qualifies in the top 7 percent of all American earners. That's a more elite group than those who buy Cadillacs or Lexus

lieve those who earn \$150,000 or more should pay the full cost of the car themselves. Only 13 percent think a government subsidy is appropriate.

While agreeing with the president on the importance of reducing our dependence on foreign oil, voters don't see providing subsidies to wealthy electric car buyers as the way to reach that goal. Instead, 75 percent say that the United States should be doing more to develop its own gas and oil resources.Most (57 percent) think the best way to do that is through free-market competition. Only 27 percent believe government subsidies and regulations represent a better approach.

The president views taxpayer subsidies for electric cars as an investment in "clean energy technology – an investment that will strengthen our security, protect our planet and create countless new jobs for our people." But Americans are justifiably skeptical of political investments. Only 11 percent believe that government officials are better than private investors at seeing the potential benefits of new technologies. Seventyone percent think investors do a better job. If private investors don't see the value and pass on an investment, 64 percent think it's likely any government investment will be a waste of money.

One reason for this is that investors are most interested in producing things that consumers will buy. Political investments are more about headlines. When it comes to buying electric cars, the headlines may be about going green, but the reality is most Americans say they'll be motivated to go electric for a far more mundane reason: When the price of gas gets too high, they'll switch.

induce your compliance? What if democracy is dangerous to personal freedom? What if democracy erodes the people's understanding of natural rights and the foundations of government, and instead turns elections into beauty contests?

What if democracy allows the government to do anything it wants, as long as more people bother to show up at the voting booth to support it than to oppose it?

What if the purpose of democracy is to convince people that they could prosper not through the creation of wealth but through theft from others? What if the only moral way to acquire wealth -- aside from inheritance -- is through voluntary economic activity? What if the government persuaded you that you could acquire wealth through political activity? What if economic activity included all the productive and peaceful things we do? What if political activity included all the parasitical and destructive things the government does?

What if governments were originally established to protect people's freedom, but always turn into political and imperialist enterprises that seek to expand their power, increase their territory and heighten their control of the population?

What if the idea that we need a government to take care of us is actually a fiction? What if our strength as individuals and durability as a culture are contingent not on the strength of the government but on the amount of freedom we have *from* the government?

What if we're seeing civil unrest around the world precisely because government is out of control? What if the cocktail of big government and democracy brings dependence and destruction? What if big government destroys people's motivations and democracy convinces them that the only motivation they need is to vote and go along with whatever the government does?

What if the Republican primaries

we're seeing unfold aren't actually as democratic as they may appear to be? What if the results you have seen from the states that have voted thus far don't match the composition of the delegates those states send to the Tampa convention this summer because the polls aren't what counts, but what counts are the secret meetings that come after the voting? What if Joe Stalin was right when he said the most powerful person in the world is the guy who counts the votes?

What if the greatest tyrant in history lives among us? What if that tyrant always gets its way, no matter what the laws are or what the Constitution says? What if that tyrant is the majority of voters? What if the tyranny of the majority in a democracy recognizes no limits on its power?

What if the government misinforms voters so as to justify anything the government wants to do? What if the government bribes people with the money it prints? What if it gives entitlements to the poor, tax breaks to the middle class and bailouts to the rich just to keep all of us dependent upon it? What if a vibrant republic requires not just the democratic process of voting, but also informed and engaged voters who understand first principles of limited government and free-market economics, and the divine origin of natural rights?

What if we could free ourselves from the yoke of big government through a campaign of education and information and personal courage that leads to a revolutionary return to first principles? What if the establishment doesn't want this? What if the government remains the same no matter who wins elections?

What if because of Ron Paul's presidential campaign, because he isn't campaigning just for votes as his competition is, because he is educating the population and winning the hearts and minds of a once free people and inspiring them to fight for their freedom once more, freedom wins? What if we can be free again? What will it take to make that happen?

Columbiana councilman: Live within means

COLUMBIANA – Councilman Bryan Blakeman wants the city to live within its means and only approve spending when it won't result in cost increases for residents.

Blakeman said several times during a recent council discussion on electric rates that he doesn't approve of how the city is using the electric fund to cover the general fund.

Council previously approved an ordinance that allowed for money in the electric fund to be transferred to balance the general fund, if needed. Money taken out of the fund would be paid back, with interest.

"That doesn't feel right to me. There has always been that safety net, and anytime you need more money in (the electric fund) you just raise electric rates," he said.

The electric fund will remain at or just above \$1.8 million all this year, according to the 2012 budget.

The fund, which is used for maintenance and upgrading of the electrical system, has dropped by more than one million since September of 2010, when it was at \$2.9 million.

Blakeman has said the decrease over last year is attributed to costs to upgrade the north substation.

Resident Richard McBane said the upgrades are necessary to keep the system working.

"There's basically two parts, the direct cost of the power and the indirect costs like maintaining the system. Without doing that you're going to end up with a system that starts failing," he said.

Blakeman said the city's indirect costs "go way beyond" maintaining the system, however.

He explained that electrical department employees that should be paid out of general fund are being paid from the electric fund.

"Those employees would be in the general fund but there is not enough money there because we spend it on other things, so we balance it in the electric fund" and raise rates to cover it, he said.

McBane said employees like City Manager Keith Chamberlin and the accountant, who both work on the electric fund, should be paid out of the electric fund.

But Blakeman said that paying em-

ployees out of the electric fund and not the general fund is like taxing residents without raising taxes.

"That's called taxation without representation," he said.

City income tax is a source of revenue for the general fund, whereas electric rates make up the electric fund.

Councilman Tom Ferguson and Mayor David Spatholt agreed with McBane, however, that employees working on the fund should be paid out of the fund.

"He (Chamberlin) spends time in that department so his money is charged to that department. I see nothing wrong with that," Spatholt said.

Blakeman said there is nothing legally wrong with doing that but he isn't comfortable with paying people out of the electric fund since it is not taxes.

The discussion then turned to how council would decide when to take on an electric department project, but no official determination was reached.

"What we need to do is all be on the same page on what we need to upgrade," Blakeman said.

Commissioners get update on federal housing program

LISBON – Columbiana County commissioners were updated this week on a federally funded program to help local residents of a certain income either purchase a home or fix up the one they have.

Marti Grimm of the Community Action Agency, which administers the Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) on behalf of commissioners, advised them she needed them to officially appoint her program administrator to replace the previous administrator, who resigned.

While there, Grimm updated commissioners on the program, which is funded with a \$544,000 two-year federal CHIP grant obtained by the board. CHIP money, among other things, is used to rehabilitate owner-occupied homes and help first-time homeowners with their down payment.

Grimm reported the money will be used to help five prospective homeowners with their down payments; five people repair their homes; three people repair their septic system; three people rehabilitate their homes; and repair three rental units enrolled in the federal rental subsidy program.

Money is also set aside to provide financial counseling for those in the home-purchasing program, plus \$40,000 to help the local chapter of Habitat for Humanity. Approximately \$3,000 will go to the county Development Department to handle housing/rental discrimination complaints.

Besides septic repairs, Grimm said the other new component to the program is allowing those receiving federal rental subsidies to apply it toward their mortgage payments for 15 years if chosen to participate in the down-payment program. To be eligible to participate in any of the programs, the annual income of applicants cannot exceed a certain income level, which Grimm said is about \$29,000 for a single person and \$42,000 for a family of four.

Grimm reported three applications have already been approved for participation in the down-payment assistance program, one of whom is allowed to convert into a loan the federal rental subsidy they are currently receiving for the next 15 years. She also reported Leetonia is the community being targeted this time with the money set aside for home repairs.

The CAA will be paid \$58,500 for writing the application and administering the program, with another \$72,200 going to CT Consultants, which was hired by the CAA to perform the various housing inspections.

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) - In about 24 hours,Danica Patrick went from her biggest



crash to her biggest moment in a stock car.

The former IndyCar star won the pole Friday for the season-opening Nationwide Series race at Daytona, becoming the first woman to secure the top qualifying spot in NASCAR's secondtier series since Shawna Robinson at Atlanta on March 12, 1994.

It came a day after she wrecked on the final lap of a qualifying race for the Davtona 500.

"It's a good turn of events," she said.

It also set off a flurry of Twitter traffic that included words such as "Dansanity," "Danimosity," "Danimite," and "Dantastic."

"I really don't think about it from a girl perspective,' she said with her proud parents standing a few yards away. "I've been taught from a young age to want to be the best driver. ... It was about being the best driver and not the best girl.'







He still holds career passing records for most yeards in a career and most touchdown passes thrown. In basketball, Eric was a twoyear captain on two district runner-up teams (1985,1986). He averaged 17.6 points and 12 rebounds per game for the 21-3 for the Clippers who were the ICL Champs in 1986. Eric lettered in track his freshman and sophomore years. As a baseball player, he lettered three years, missing his junior year due to an ankle injury. Eric was captain his senior year and led the Clips in batting average and doubles. He was the starting catcher for the Clipper ICL champs and regional runner-ups. Eric graduated from Youngstown State with a degress in education. He began his coaching career in 1991 with the Clippers as eighth grade boys basketball coach. He coached J.V. for four seasons before becoming head varsity coach in 1996. Eric moved with his family in 1999 to Columbus where he continued his teaching and coaching career at Big Walnut High School in Sunbury. In 2007, he was selected Middle School Coach of the Year for boys junior high track and field posting a 54-0 record. Peggy swam only during the summer for Firstone Swim Team until her sophomore year of high school. She then began a YMCA swimming career as well. As a senior she qualified for Nationals thru the Neptune Y program in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Peggy not only swam freestyle, backstroke, and butterfly, but dived as well. Basketball was another sport Peggy played. At 5-foot-10 she was the Clippers leading scorer and rebounder. She averaged 15-20 points per game. As a cheerleader for the Clippers, Peggy was on a squad that won many awards at camps and clinics. Nothing was too complicated, from back flips off three-high stances, pyramids, and back roll offs from shoulders. COLUMBUS (AP) - Samantha Prahalis made her last home game a very memorable one.

The senior guard scored a school-record 42 points in her final home game and No. 8 Ohio State routed Minnesota 81-56 on Thursday night.

"I just got into a pretty good rhythm," said Prahalis, the Buckeyes' only senior. "It was almost like one of those nights where you don't really see the defenders."

Prahalis, leading the Big Ten in both scoring (21.3 points per game) and assists (6.7), had 22 points by halftime as the Buckeyes (24-4, 11-4) built a 12-point lead.

She hit 15 of 27 shots from the field including 7 of 12 3-pointers, and was 5 for 5 at the line. She also had six rebounds, four assists and three steals before leaving to a standing ovation with 2:27 left after breaking Katie Smith's 1994 record by hitting two free throws.

"I don't know who wrote the script. Somebody did," said Ohio State's Jim Foster, in his 34th season as a head coach. "You haven't even talked about zero turnovers. Think about it: She was all over the place, helping on defense, our second-leading rebounder, led us in assists and scored the points."

Minnesota (14-15, 6-9) coach Pam Borton said she'd never seen a better performance in her decade in the Big Ten.

"It's probably one of the most special performances that I've seen since I've been at Minnesota," she said. "On senior night, the way she played and the way she came out focused. She's a competitor, what more can you say? She made sure she was going to have an evening like this."

Salem graduate Amy Scullion also made her return to the Buckeyes Thursday playing the games final two minutes and connecting on two free throws.

(AP) - Think NASCAR is running out of sponsorship cate-gories to mine? Think again. The sanctioning body already has a bucketful

of official sponsors, including an official outdoor and RV retail partner, an official shaving product and even an official cheese filled snack. Now add a new category: "Green" sponsors. This week, NASCAR signed a deal with Creative Recycling Systems, a company that provides businesses and other organizations with a way to discard electronic devices in an environmentally responsible manner. A sport based on burning fuel at a rapid rate

might still be a tough sell to hard-core environmentalists, but this week's deal may be an indication that the sport is beginning to shed its stigma. "The stigma is history," said Mike Lynch,

NASCAR's managing director of green innovation. Yes, managing director of green innovation is

a job in NASCAR. Lynch said several existing NASCAR spon-

sors already had environmental initiatives, including at-track recycling programs. Now that they've landed a completely environment-focused sponsor, NASCAR hopes to add more "It's a new category, sort of, historically for the sport." Lynch said.

Brian Diesselhorst, vice president of marketing at Creative Recycling, said the company wasn't sure initially if NASCAR was the right place to showcase its services.

"That was one of our reservations when I first brought this to my CEO," Diesselhorst said. As it turns out, Diesselhorst said: "They're actually doing stuff.'

As part of the deal, the company hopes to set up stations at racetracks where fans can turn in unwanted electronics for recycling. They also hope to gain new business by talking to other NASCAR sponsors about potential partner-

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

DEASING CODE

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I'm a point guard on my

high-school's basketball team. There's a good chance that we will make it to the playoffs.

My left knee, right in front of the kneecap, has started to hurt when I walk up and down stairs. The pain isn't great, and I might be making too much out of this. I don't want to miss the playoffs.

What do you think I have, and what can I do to stop it from getting worse? - **B.J.**

ANSWER: The knee is a vulnerable joint, and the number of possible knee injuries is enormous. The best I can do for you is give you a guess and some general advice. If the knee pain worsens, or if it's not gone in one more week, see the family doctor.

Pain on the front of the kneecap often indicates patellofemoral pain syndrome. Climbing and descending stairs intensifies the pain. The patella is the kneecap. It's embedded in a large tendon that comes from the front thigh muscles. The tendon inserts on the lower leg bone. "Femoral" refers to the thigh bone, the femur. It has a groove for the kneecap. When you bend the knee, the kneecap can partially come out of its groove and cause pain. Pain also arises if you sit for a long time and then arise. This is patellofemoral pain syndrome.

Flat feet are said to favor this condition. I don't know if that's true. Other anatomical abnormalities also make the kneecap partially pop out of the femoral groove.

If you have no pain when you play basketball, then you can keep playing. It's not likely to keep you out of the playoffs.

In the meantime, apply heat or ice, whichever gives you greater relief, to the knee for 15 minutes a couple of times during the day. Nonsteroidal antiinflammatory drugs like Aleve or Advil are safe to use for pain. If you can get by without medicine, do so. A knee brace could prevent further injury to the joint.

DEAR ABBY: I have worked in a medical clinic for 35 years and hear a lot of complaints about the wait for doctor appointments. May I explain some of the reasons for it?

Sometimes the doctor arrives late, but other factors can cause delays:

1. If you need to be seen, call first to get an appointment time. Most offices leave open spots to accommodate urgent-care matters. If you just walk in, we must work you in with patients who already have appointments, which pushes the doctor be-

The problem is, D.J. will be coming to visit again this summer. While I understand that this is my husband's son, I must protect our younger kids from his violence. My husband is upset that I don't want D.J. in our home. Please help. — **Scared to Death**

Dear Scared: D.J. sounds like a very disturbed young man who takes his hostility out on your children. Based on his track record, he cannot be trusted around them. It must be difficult for your husband to accept that his son is so violent, but we think having D.J. stay with his grandparents is sensible. We hope your husband will consider getting some counseling for him, and also for the entire family.
